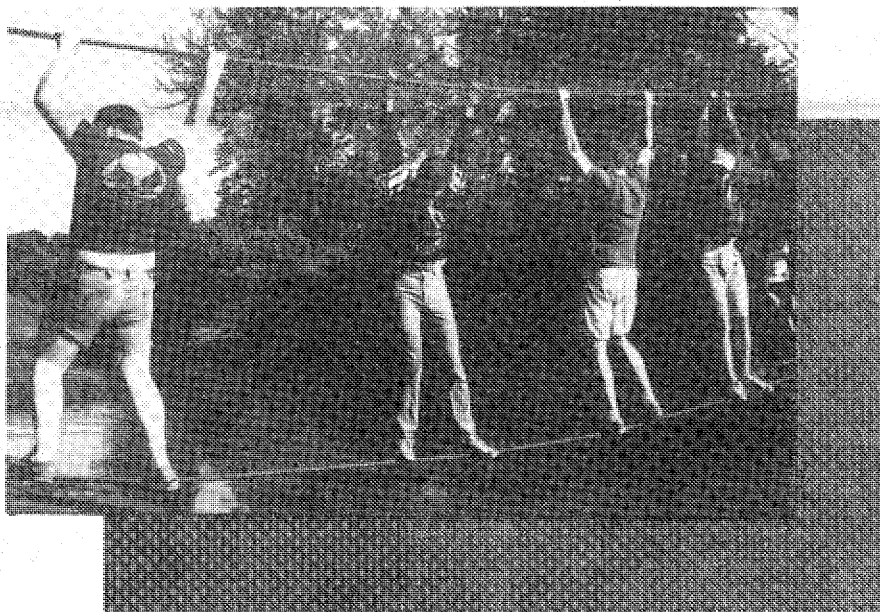

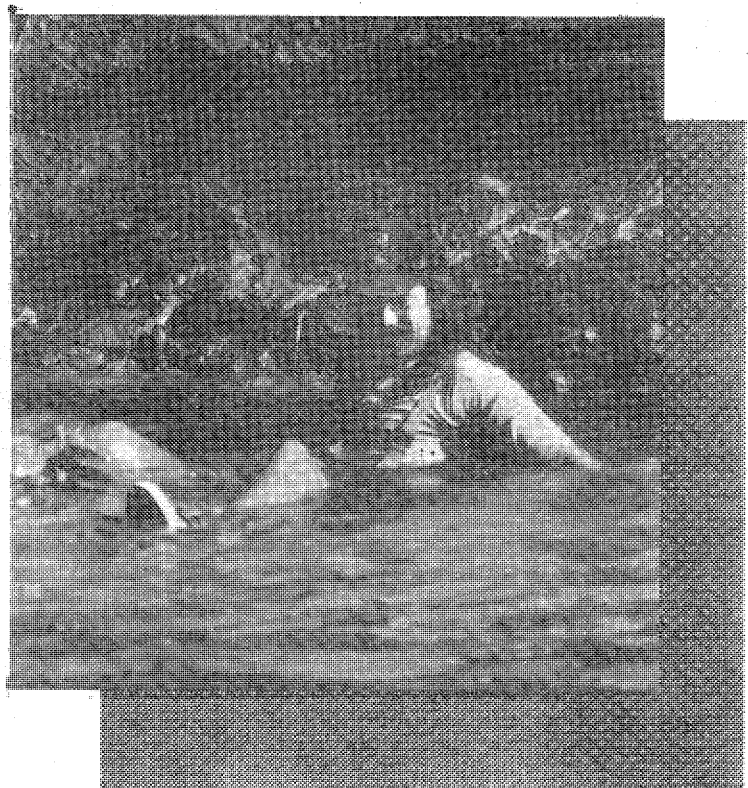

What can you possibly do with 150 feet of rope, a murky old creek, twenty people, and a stretcher? Leave it to NAIT's BCET to organize a successful 18th annual "Bridge Building" contest.

It was a sunny Saturday morning on September 18, when six teams of twenty adventurous men and women took up this challenge: "to construct, test, and dismantle a suspension bridge across Whitemud Creek in the shortest time".

It looked like an early morning army drill - a bunch of dedicated "grunts" urging their teammates to victory - or at least a dry bridge crossing. However, even the bravest of the Marines would think twice about crossing these bridges, which were nothing more than long ropes tightly wound and knotted around two trees on opposite sides of the creek.

Each team member had to tightwalk across the creek and back with only another rope above their heads to hang on to. For a sense of "M.A.S.H." - like authenticity, a stunt duo from each team carried across an "injured" man on a stretcher. The stunt carriers had to pad their shoulders with towels to ease the rubbing of the stretcher's rope on their skin.

The rope needed to be kept at proper tension. This required four or five members to pull the rope tight on at least one of the banks. Chills and spills resulted from too much slack (just ask the drafting team). Really, very few teams escaped the pleasure of stirring the still waters of Whitemud Creek. The creek, however, was not too kind to those who disturbed it and expressed its anger by keeping the shoes of some of those who fell in. The mud on

the northern bank could reach a quicksand-ish three feet.

The contest winners were announced after everyone dried off at the equally successful cabaret held at the Castle Downs Recreation Center. The seven judges, coordinated by BCET instructor Charlie Grant, awarded all the teams with some sort of prize. This is of great consolation for all since the contest required a great deal of courage and skill from each team.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the province of Alberta's twinning with the province of Hokaido, Japan.

This coming month of March will mark another anniversary, the first of the twinning of NAIT with Aoyama Technical Institute in Hokaido.

In connection with these celebrations, NAIT entertained a Hokaido student delegation headed by Mrs. Watanabe, the President of the Institute and Mr. Shikano, the Institute's owner.

They arrived Thursday, September 12 and immediately followed a jam-packed itinerary for the next three days.

The group came to promote cultural exchanges and trade at

"Hokaido Days" held at the Edmonton Convention Centre on September 13 and 14. During their visit, they got a closer look specifically at our institution's facilities and structure with the help of Wally Romanko, Executive Assistant to the President's Office, and Ken Ohashi, the Director of International Education and Applied Research.

Roxanne Beaubien, President of the Students' Association hosted the group at a coffee break which was held at the NEST.

The delegates noted that one of NAIT's most surprising features is the availability of alcohol on campus; particularly at that hang-out we so lovingly call "The NEST".

"He (Mr. Shikano) was surprised, but considering that our

cultures are very different, you can expect that," says Roxanne. "I told him that we serve drinks only after classes start and he just laughed."

Later that Thursday, NAIT officials toured the delegation at Plaza II, the International Education Center and the General Hospital Rehabilitation Center. On Friday, the group went to Stony Plain to tour Westerra Campus, the Japanese Gardens, and the Multicultural Center.

They also went on a fieldtrip to Lewis Farms and decided to stay at the farm instead of visiting the Kurimoto Japanese Gardens (sights they must surely be familiar with by now).

Mrs. Watanabe commented on the warm relations between students and staff. The Japanese students themselves, noting the competitiveness of their own school, were pleasantly surprised to see students helping each other.

"Everyone at NAIT works so hard, no matter what the job," is the group's general impression as interpreted by Wally Romanko.

Ken Ohashi, says, "Visitors from foreign countries will be regular ongoing occurrences at NAIT." Over the past years our institution has hosted groups from Hungary, Germany, Thailand and recently, a student from Honolulu.

NAIT will surely continue to show what must now be its trademark of teamwork and dedication - traits highly commended by the Japanese delegation. Good work, team!

## LET'S END THE SILENCE

Hi, let me introduce myself. I am the WCB relayist Jerry Carter, a 52 year old master electrician.

Just under three years ago I was on a 12 foot ladder. The ladder collapsed. I fell head first into a carpet covered concrete floor. I was unconscious for three and one half days. I still do and always will suffer the consequences of that accident.

I didn't receive active treatment or therapy for 21 months. I as almost every brain injured individual is, was left to vegetate in the dark. I was lucky enough to have been a very self motivated person all my adult life. This gave me the opportunity to be part of the first brain injury group at the WCB rehab centre. I also was born with an IQ high enough that I could afford to lose some and still be functional. There are hundreds in Alberta not so lucky.

The consequences of the accident led the WCB to tell me I cannot work as an electrician any more. I am being retrained as a computer programmer at NAIT. In short, while I was unlucky enough to have the accident, for me to survive it and be able to look forward to a productive, meaningful balance of my life is the equivalent of winning the big prize in LOTTO 6/49.

Let me tell you, and let there be no misunderstanding, there is no group less able to take care of themselves. No group with less private and government support then the brain injured.

For example there are large expenditures for support programs for the chemically dependent. I don't need to add there is a big difference between addiction, self imposed or otherwise, and a brain injury accident.

The WCB has about 1200 head injuries per year of which about 25% or 300 suffer some form of brain damage. Last September the WCB initiated a Brain Injury Group, the first of its kind in the Western Canada. I was fortunate enough to be part of that first group.

That is the sole reason that I have the opportunity, the ability and the motivation to appear in front of you today. I understand there had been three such groups since. That means less then forty people have had active rehabilitation programs out of let's say 3000 in the last ten years. I was lucky, 2 960 others were not!

The worse part is as bad as the above numbers, are, you are far better off under the WCB then in the private sector. If you are motivated and have the capability the WCB will RETRAIN you. Very few of the balance of the brain injured get this opportunity.

For society at large to benefit it cannot continue to just supply inadequate medical therapy with not enough counseling and little or nonexistent retraining.

Don't get me wrong, there are many dedicated individuals out there doing their best. Unfortunately it is too little, and usually, too late. The sheer numbers are inundating too few resources.

Every year over three thousand Albertans suffer brain injuries of

varying degrees. I have had the experience of both a brother in law and a close personal friend becoming victims of serious brain injuries since my accident less then three years ago.

In this most fortunate provinces blessed with both agriculture and abundant natural resources we are short of people. How can we afford to waste this valuable human resource. We must help the brain injured to become productive useful members of society.

The government must expand existing programs and initiate new ones to help all the hundreds of unfortunate brain injured citizens of this province. Help them to get back to the point where, when they are able to, they can lead meaningful productive lives. We can no longer endure this waste.

What is better? To continue to spend funds, ineffectively? To just maintain the status quo? To continue to waste this untapped human resource? To leave them as a permanent drain on the public purse?

Let's do as I advocate, let's give them the helping hand needed to be retrained. Let's allow them the opportunity to become productive members of society. The pride that goes with being self supporting! There can only be one answer. **"LET'S END THE SILENCE!"**

Remember the high auto accident injury rate and the preponderance of head injuries involved. It may be your family next! Your mother or father, wife or husband, bother or sister, your daughter or your son!

I fell into a pit of silence for 18 months. I was lucky enough to get back out. I ask, and society at large should demand **"LET'S END THE SILENCE"**. We must help, where help is needed.

Head injuries touch all of us. Let's reach out as Albertans and do what is needed. **"LET'S END THE SILENCE"**, speak out on behalf of those individuals who are unable and largely incapable of speaking out for themselves.

In closing I must tender my, and my families heart felt thanks to the Workers Compensation Board. Its minister, the honourable Peter Trenchy, and Mr. Ian Sinclair, Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of the WCB. I understand Mr. Sinclair is the person who was largely instrumental in providing the motivation that allowed the setting up of the WCB head injury group.

Also my thanks to the workers compensation board rehab centre staff. In twelve weeks I made more friends than in any twelve years previous.

**"LET'S END THE SILENCE"**. Make this relay and **BRAIN INJURY AWARENESS WEEK** the first of many steps forward, both by our Government and the people of Alberta.

Ladies and Gentlemen that's it! That's what the steps to end the **SILENCE** and **BRAIN INJURY AWARENESS WEEK** is all about!

## PARKING TIPS TO EASE FRUSTRATION

For some people, the parking situation here at NAIT is certainly not ideal. Then again, the parking situation where there is a large conglomeration of desperate drivers is never ideal. Nevertheless, NAIT's parking office has almost been jammed with complaints about the availability of stalls. Here are some points to remember to ease your frustrations.

The first parking application forms were sent through the mail to all students attending NAIT during the fall. All of the applications were put through a "priority checklist." Those with special medical or health considerations are placed first and in the lot closest to their buildings.

Distance from campus is another point to be considered. Bus schedules are studied and also taken into consideration. The

further away from NAIT one lives the greater the chance of the application being accepted. For example, someone living 45 minutes away from campus will be considered over someone living 30 minutes away. Appealed and late applications are put through the priority list again.

At times, the number of cars expected to use the parkade on any given day do not show up. This is the reason a lucky few can buy a ticket for a stall on the top floor of the parkade without a regular permit. Do not count on this happening every day.



Although there are no plans for a new parkade in the near future, Mr. Dick Maertens-Poole, Head of Security at NAIT informs that 107 Street and 117A Avenue has been transformed to accommodate 150 more cars with free parking. Also, when the new medical laboratories building is completed, more space will be left for other technologies in the area of the old building. The "D" lot is another parking place which is fenced between NAIT's staff parking

area and the Municipal Airport. There is a four hour parking limit after buying a ticket at the dispensers. Beware of the signs if you have to park at Kingsway Garden Mall or in residential areas. Cars will be towed if parking regulations are violated.

For those lucky enough to possess a parking permit in any of the designated lots. Facilities Management would like to warn drivers to keep radar detectors and special audio equipment well hidden to deter potential break-ins. For bicyclists-secure your

bikes with stronger locks. "Kryptonite" locks seem to work the best. Last year there were 15 reports of stolen property. Security has been increased throughout the hours of 10:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Parking stickers should be properly displayed on the back left window where they are more visible to security. "Transferable permits" with the suction cups must be stuck behind and under the rear view mirror. Such practices will ease the flow of traffic into parking areas.

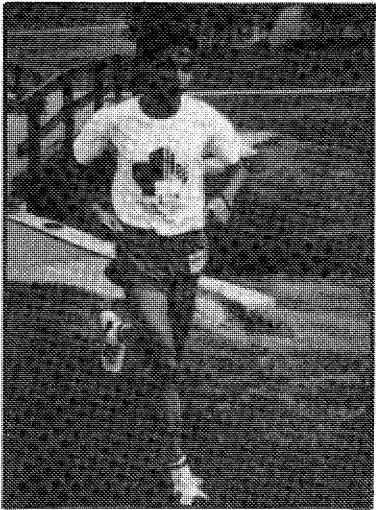
Champs
