



## COUNCIL SHOWS SOCIAL AWARENESS

Last Tuesday's General Council meeting addressed mainly awareness of environmental issues as well as fund-raising activity for charity. Lisa Meilen, in charge of Publications suggested the adoption of a school wide aluminum can recycling program. A maximum of 15 bins would be placed around campus for used pop-cans. The Nature Club, comprised of NAIT instructors and staff would be responsible for depositing cans to recycling stations and cleaning the bins. This project would be undertaken strictly for environmental concerns, and would not be profit motivated. The Council has yet to vote on its implementation pending further cost analysis and "outrageousness". Some may choose

brushing toilets clean with toothbrushes or cutting grass with scissors as their group activity.

Prizes include a cabaret sponsored by Molson Lite and a \$1,000 cash award given at the end of the year to the group raising the most money and spending the most time on their activity. This event kicks off on October 10 to November 16.

## UPDATE ON TENDER PRACTICES AT NAIT

On August 13, NDP Advanced Education critic Pam Barrett called on Advanced Education Minister John Gogo to investigate the tendering practices of NAIT's Board of Governors.

Last June, the Board chaired by Catherine Wyatt, awarded a \$180 000 marketing contract to three consulting firms without opening the bid to public tender. Former Tory Minister David King is a director and shareholder of one of the firms. NAIT's purchasing guidelines do not specifically cover marketing contracts. However, the general purchasing process stipulates that contracts estimated over \$25 000 should be awarded using sealed tenders and given an "evaluation on the basis of quality, service, availability and price."

Supporting the allegation is Seeth Seethran, who retired as Vice President of NAIT on August 10, 1990. He cited the controversy of the contract as one of his reasons for leaving NAIT. He is now Vice-President of a local college in Whitehorse.

Seethram was in the middle of an internal marketing study when the board announced the hiring of the three firms. "That was personally kind of insulting to me," he told the Edmonton Journal.

"When you're using public funds, I think you've got to establish...processes that are highly visible, and you've got to follow those processes," he told the Journal. "If you don't, personally I think that borders on unethical practices."

In explaining the awarding of the contract to the firms in question in a NAIT news release, Wyatt, a defeated Tory candidate for the provincial riding of Gold Bar in 1989 stated, "the selection of consultants without tendering is a departure from the normal internal process. (However) Selection of this particular group of three individual companies (including King's) was based on qualifications and not on past associations."

She also said that Seethram did not make his views (on the

matter) known to the Board.

On Thursday, September 20, Pam Barrett informed the Edmonton Sun that NAIT board members have used Holiday Travel instead of the Alberta Motor Association, NAIT's official travel consultants. She alleged that Holiday Travel is owned in part by a board member.

Catherine Wyatt replied that the board member in question no longer owns Holiday Travel. She then denied that any policies regarding contract purchases were broken.

NAITSA President Roxanne Beaubien, in an interview with both the Sun and the Edmonton Journal questioned the objectivity of the process used to hire the consulting firms as well as the justification for spending \$180 000 on a contract directed towards forming a marketing and communications strategy which could have been done internally.

NAIT's Board of Governors set policies in accordance with recommendations from the Administration. The administrators were not in favour of the marketing study being handled by the three firms or of the money being spent for them, Beaubien says.

She added the Administration had always been able to balance the budget "nickel and diming" the students. Recently, Administration proposed to charge each NAIT student a \$20 locker fee. NAITSA was able to postpone it's application for at least a year.

Baubien observed that this proposal may not be directly connected with Administration's need to cover the cost of the marketing survey which in the opinion of the board is desperately needed. However, she further noted that money has come from somewhere to balance the budget.


"Dr. Souch (NAIT's President) and the administrators have only the students' best interest at heart," Beaubien says. She added that if the Board of Governors does not take into serious

consideration Administration's position on proposals, it is easy to understand why the Board's motivation is being questioned.

On Wednesday, September 19, John Gogo announced that Auditor General Donald Salmon will investigate the allegations of wrongdoing by the Board.

"What I'm asking the auditor general for is to examine those policies (which were allegedly not followed) and if they're in accordance with the (Provincial Technical Institutes Act)," said Gogo to the Journal.

The results of the audit should be made known to Mr. Gogo within the next two months.

## OOKS DOUBLE BEARS TO WIN BLUE/GOLD

For the first time in history, the NAIT Ooks have won the NAIT Invitational Hockey Tournament. The Ooks doubled the University Of Alberta Golden Bears 4-2 in the championship final of the tourney on Sunday at the NAIT Arena.

In the first, the Ooks jumped into the lead early as Todd Kinniburgh found the mark at 3:08. Todd Goodwin of the Bears

tied the contest on the powerplay at the 8:58 mark. The Ooks regained the lead with 15:14 gone in the stanza as Darren Perkins scored with a point drive.

In the second, the Bears pulled even on Mike Moore's powerplay marker at 13:43.

In the third, Mark Hilton tallied the winner for the Ooks with the man advantage at 7:09. With 17 seconds left in

regulation, NAIT's Greg Geldart sealed the victory with an empty net goal.

Rob McKinley went all the way in the NAIT net turning away 18 of 20 shots. At the other end, Scott Ironside and Gavin Armstrong of the U of A were tested on 31 occasions.

Both teams came into Sunday's match with records of two wins and no losses.

On Friday, the Ooks began the tourney with a 5-2 victory over the

Red Deer College Kings.

Corey Hastman, Lonnie Spink, Greg Geldart, Ian McAmmond, and Todd Kinniburgh netted singles for the Ooks.

Going into the second, the two clubs were deadlocked at 1-1. The Ooks broke the game open with three in the second before the teams traded goals in the third.

The Ooks received solid goaltending from Rob McKinley and Chuck Edwards as the Ooks outshot the Kings 48 to 27.

On Saturday, the Ooks scored an 8-5 come from behind win over the Camrose Lutheran College Vikings.

NAIT's Kevin Lovig spurred the comeback with a hat trick. Terry Nieth, Bob Duchak, Todd Kinniburgh, Scott Melnyk and Tim Murphy provided the other Ooks markers.

The Ooks trailed 3-0 after the first, but tied the game at 4 before the end of the second. The Ooks then outscored the Vikings four goals to one in the third.

NAIT outshot Camrose 35 to 26. Alec Sheffo and Chuck Edwards shared the netminding duties in the NAIT nets.

In contrast, the Bears opened the tournament on Friday with a 7-0 triumph over the Camrose Lutheran University College Vikings on Friday.

Doug McCarthy and Jeff Krukowski paced the Bears with two goal performances while Cory Cross, Dave Hingley, and Serge Lajoie added singles.

Steve Flett and Scott Stanley turned away 19 Viking drives in posting the Bears' shutout.

On Saturday, the Bears rallied for four goals in the final frame to score a 6-3 win over the stubborn Red Deer College King club.

Brent Harden, Paul Foisy, Stan Marple, Marty Yewchuk, Garth Premak and Jeff Krukowski tallied for the U of A.

The two teams were tied at 2-2 after the first and following the second. The shots on goal favored the Bears -- 52 to 36.

**ON THE BENCH:** The next action for the Ooks will be at the U of A Invitational Hockey Tournament slated from Friday, the 28th, through Sunday the 30th. The Vikings defeated the Kings 4-3 to finish third at the tourney.





## NARROW MARGIN PACIFIC HEIGHTS




*Where can people get copies of your music?*
