All You Need To Know About Graduation



Few graduating students need to be reminded that graduation is coming up - April 13 to be exact. The Class of '91 joins the ranks of the more than 46,500 men and women who have graduated from NAIT since it opened its doors in 1963.

Approximately 830 students (out of 3,000 eligible graduates) will be in attendance at the graduation ceremony. Because of this large number, and the fact that only 1,900 seats will be made available on a first-come-firstserved basis, we ask that you bring only two guests to the ceremony. If guests are unable to obtain a seat, they may watch the proceedings on television monitors which will be set up in the lobbies of the

The doors to the Jubilee will open at 12:45 p.m. with the ceremony beginning promptly at 1:30 p.m. Graduates are asked to line up according to the signs, by technology, between 1:00 and 1:20 p.m. The general outline of the proceedings is as follows:

- Distinguished Friend of the Institute Award - Dr. Brian Sproule

Once you have received your diploma holder, please return to your seat until all of the presentations have been made. The ceremony will last for about two hours, after which a reception will be held for all the graduates and their guests (between 3:30 and 4:30 p.m.). Before you leave the Jubilee, please make sure that you have returned your gown to the coat-check

Student Loans

Application forms for student loans for 1991-92 will be available in the Counselling Office after May 1st. If you received a student loan in the current academic year and will be continuing into the second year of your program, the Students Finance Board will be sending you a 1991-92 application form.

With respect to your summer earnings, you are expected to have a minimum amount of savings of \$1,250 - more if your earnings were very good. To calculate the amount of savings you should have, below is a simple way of calculating:

Example:

Single Student Living Away From Home: Monthly SFB Living Expenses:

 $$6\overline{1}5 \times 4 \text{ months of}$ employment + 110 (expenses related to e m p l o y m e n t) =\$2,900.

You deduct the amount of \$2,900 from your gross earnings and the remainder is the amount you should be saving.

Students' Finance Board uses gross earning as opposed to net earning because it is aware that students will receive a refund when filing their income tax returns.

When completing your application for a student loan, you must estimate what your savings will be. If you are unable to provide an estimate, the Students' Finance Board will automatically reduce your budget by the amount equal to the minimum savings, i.e. \$1,250. If your savings were less than your estimate, you can submit an appeal to the Students' Finance Board. If your savings were greater than your estimate, you must notify the Students' Finance Board.

Students' Finance Board Monthly Budget for the 1991-92 Academic Year should be available in May, as well as the cost of books and supplies. These two documents can be obtained at the Office of Student Awards and Financial Aid.



"Don't let anybody tell you can't do the job-because you can."



One of the real dangers of alcohol is that it sneaks up on you and the damage may be done by the time you become aware it's happening. The following health risks apply to all of us; they're not reserved for the down-at-heel, they can apply to you or your colleagues.

- Ulcers. Alcohol irritates the gastrointestinal tract. Taken with aspirin, the risks are even greater.
- Liver damage. Irreversible liver damage is a major cause of death, but other disorders, like hepatitis, may result.
- Neurological disorders. The effect of excess alcohol on the brain is to accelerate the natural loss of brain cells which can seriously deplete the body's surplus. Symptoms associated with the aging process develop-clouded thinking, memory failure, disorientation, stiffened limbs and poor co-ordination.
- Cancer. Abuse increases the risk of certain types of cancer, including mouth, larynx and esophagus.
- Malnutrition. If your lifestyle interferes with your getting proper nutrition, you're a candidate for this problem. Alcohol does have calories- you get heat and energy, but little nutrition.

If you drink in moderation, you may never face any of these. But it pays to have a healthy regard for the potential problems associated with that common social acquaintance-alcohol.
