NAITSA Bill 31 Response

A bill that may result in a lack of bills for Alberta colleges and Technical Institutes

The colleges and technical institutes of Alberta have been put between a rock and a hard place with the Provincial Government. It is in the form of a new bill that is in the process of being passed through the Legislature. This is the new University Foundations Act and it gives the universities of Alberta unwarranted edge on raising money for their institutions.

In the bill under section 6 it reads, "...the foundation is an agent of the Crown in right of Alberta." This is where the colleges and technical institutes of Alberta find their dilemma. The university Foundations will now be an agent of the crown, therefore any donations to

Foundation will be given a 100 percent tax credit up to 100 percent of the donors income. Donors to foundations will only get the tax credit up to 20 percent of their income. This may result in the large donations going to the Universities of Alberta because of the large tax credit donors will receive. An example of this kind of donation would be large one-time gifts from estates and donors who disposing of large assets.

Minister of Advanced Education John Gogo has tried to reason this bills unbalanced charity by saying that this bill is primarily for research donations. While NAITSA agrees research is important to the organization of the universities, we feel in these rough economic times, all Alberta schools deserve a chance to enhance their own Foundations moneymaking

It is NAITSA's position that we are behind any venture to support post secondary institutions as long as it does not give advantages particular groups. This bill does give that advantage to the universities, and our solution would be to include the colleges and technical institutes of Alberta in this Legislation.

Considering that most of the Colleges and Technical Institutes of Alberta have recently made cutbacks on their campuses, they are relying more and more on their Foundations to help them supplement their budget. Without the Government of Alberta increasing funds to post secondary education, this bill might result in some harmful effects.

Foundations rather than passing the cost to students through auxiliary fees.

Nobody really knows what this new legislation will result in, but can we be satisfied by the "wait and see" mentality? It may have little or no impact on NAIT because the Bill's target impact on donations traditionally go beyond the scope received by college Foundations. But how long do we have to wait to see if there are any harmful effects? If one large donation is missed a college or technical institutes of Alberta because of this Bill, it is one too many. The Bill should be amended to include colleges and technical institutes.

Locker Fees Initiated

This year NAIT has initiated a new locker fee which will add to the financial burden the students undertake. This will now add another \$20.00 to full term students' costs. The idea of adding this auxiliary fee was officially conceived of in the middle of 1990 but was not incorporated until this year. The new NAITSA Executive was disappointed to hear that this would be the year to start this new fee.

It is unfortunate that this fee had to come into effect. The NAIT Administration must feel that this will help supplement their straining budget, but I feel auxiliary fees are the answer. Students find it hard enough with the financial commitment they have right now, and nickel and diming

the students hurts the system more than it helps it.


Along with the new locker fees comes increased parking fees. Full time students will now pay \$7.00 more a month to have a parking spot. This is an increase of over 65% across the board. Last year's NAITSA Executive made a point of saying that the locker fees must not set a precedence with auxiliary fees; the higher parking fees shows that these costs will continue to mount. This will then deter many students from coming to NAIT because of higher costs. Student loans do not always take into account the auxiliary fees a student must pay, therefore these students will have

cannot continue to be stuck with these auxiliary fees. NAIT needs to find the extra money they need elsewhere. This money should be available from the Provincial or Federal Government but right now they do not make education a priority. If we want education to be a right and accessible to all people who want to make the effort, the government must reset its goals. The next Provincial and Federal elections could be the determining factor of where post secondary education is going in this country. It is imperative that this issue is at the top of the election mandates in the upcoming elections.

The future of Canada is lying in our hands. It is up to the government to direct it in the best possible way.

Euphoria (n) - feeling of elation or well being on Friday after the last class. Also can be felt somewhere above .08.


Evidence (n) - that feeling of euphoria that RCMP will use against you in a court of law, etc., etc. It's generally better to take a cab.

Garnish (n) - those pickles that stay on your plate long after the hamburger is gone.


Glenn, Susanne (n) -Student Association Communications VP who has been known to say "I can do this" on numerous stressful occasions.

Guts (n) - see Lab.




Hangover (n) disagreeable physical effects following heavy drinking. See also B12 Complex.

Labs (n) - a piece of equipment for experimental study in a science. Generally not the most favorite part of any course. Let's refer once again to the dissection of the fetal pig.


Lachambre, Dan (n) -Student Association Academic VP. Has that cheshire cat smile, you never know what he's up to.


Media Workshop (n) you can stencil it, overhead it, photocopy it, and cerlox it. If you have a report, group project or oral presentation make use of this place.

Sarauer, Annette (n) -Student Association Administrative VP, ultimate woman behind the scenes.


School (n) - large institution composed mainly of bricks and glass. You can't get out when you're a kid and you can't get in when you're an adult.
