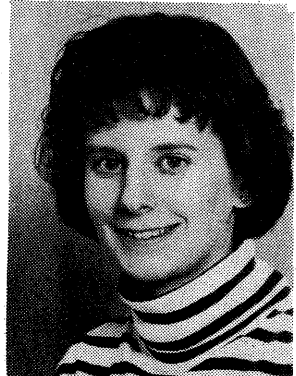

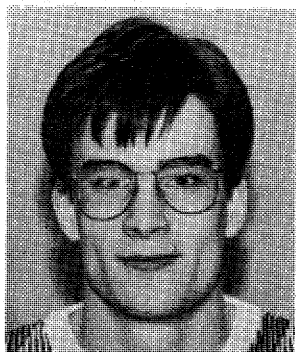

Campus Death And Injury Review, 1980-1990

When we happily welcomed 1990 this year it gave me the opportunity to also reflect back on the alcohol on campus issue in the last decade. While I admit that things are getting better, and interest is building, it seems that we constantly move one step forward and then take two steps back.

Just for an example, take the number of reported and unreported deaths and injuries on campuses in this country. Reports are difficult to come by, and because of this a number of rumors circulate about incidents which either did or did not take place. With funding we received from Employment and Immigration Canada through their S.E.E.D. program we were able to hire a student this summer to look into these incidents. Essentially, Steve Fridmann, the student hired, was to spend a great deal of his time calling campuses all over Canada. What he ended up doing was tracing a lot of newspaper articles in the main reference library in Toronto.

The following is the "Reader's Digest" version of his report. Why would we print such a gruesome account? For a number of reasons. Mainly because it seems to take a major incidence to create change. Take for example the recent death at Saint Francis Xavier. The death itself did not receive the wide spread attention that the University of Guelph generated in 1988. However, the issue is one we have

seen come and go in Ontario. Why do we allow large vehicles in parades when we KNOW that students riding on and walking around the vehicle are going to be drunk? Because we don't want to break with tradition. The number one problem for alcohol educators is tradition.

We chose to print the listing to also remind everyone that the majority of incidents revolve around people who do not attend our campuses. It seems we may be doing a great job educating our own...but maybe we need to extend the education off-campus as well...and is it our job? We are also publishing the listing because we are trying to track down other incidents which we know of, but could not find a tangible resource to include in the report. We need your help here.

We tried to very hard to ensure that the brief blurbs on each incident were accurate, but please note that many of these were taken from newspaper accounts. If you would like to clarify an event, please do so, as we want to ensure that our report is correct. We also did not want to offend the families of any of the young people who died. For us at BACCHUS Canada, we think about these people often, and we hope that at the minimum their deaths will not go unnoticed.

You will note that our theme this holiday season is a special one.

We want everyone to imagine a year when no one dies because of irresponsible drinking. Let's hope that it will be 1991.

York University - October 1990 a visitor from Guelph fell four stories down an elevator shaft in a residence on campus. Police are investigating the incident reported that alcohol was a factor in the investigation, as the accident occurred after a party. The injuries suffered included a broken shoulder, broken hand, three cracked vertebrae, broken ribs, cuts and internal injuries.

Saint Francis Xavier - September 1990 Gerard Sampson, a University College of Cape Breton student who had been riding on a float in the annual homecoming parade was crushed to death under the rear wheels of a flatbed trailer. Conflicting stories about whether he fell off the vehicle or fell trying to get on are still circulating. Recent news coverage has reported that friends admit he was drinking heavily the day of the parade.

Queen's University - May 12, 1990 Stephen Baker, a 21 year-old Queen's student, died of alcohol poisoning. The part-time science student had been drinking rye with friends after work. His friends went on to Alfies' leaving him behind because he felt unwell. His sister Sharron, also a second-year student, came home and found him. The initial autopsy reports said that he died of toxic shock due to the alcohol.

Trent University - April 11, 1990 Timothy Roger Steele, a North Bay man was hurt during a celebration at Trent when another man named Bacchus

landed on him after apparently jumping 40 feet from the podium near Bata Library. Police have charged Barry Carlin, 29, of London with criminal negligence causing bodily harm. One witness said that Barry Carlin seemed drugged or intoxicated.

University of Guelph - January 29, 1989 Richard Sloan went to the university to celebrate a friends 21st birthday. That evening 19 year-old Sloan went on a rowdy drinking binge with his friends. Less than four hours later Sloan collapsed at the bottom of the residence stairway. He choked to death on his own vomit.

Acadia University - The Students Union Building had its liquor licence suspended following a brawl at a students event on January 28, 1989 during winter carnival celebrations. One person was charged with assault and one charge each of underage drinking and intoxication were laid.

Western University - Western is facing a licence suspension at all its bars after members of the bar staff were caught drinking after hours on the premises with patrons. (February 1989)

Carleton University - 38 students were taken to five area hospitals after a railing collapsed Saturday afternoon (October 17, 1987) during the annual Panda game between Carleton and Ottawa. Students drunkenness was held partly to blame for the accident.

Acadia University - Acadia was forced to cancel its annual

Summer Extravaganza after one person was killed and two injured due to a drinking and driving accident. The tragic car accident took the life of student, Harold Sheldon. The summer Ex 86 was one of the rowdiest in Acadia's history. Over 25 arrests were made during the weekend amongst the some 1500 participants.

Wilfred Laurier University - 19 year-old Brigitte Bouckaert, a second-year student was crushed to death under the wheels of a bus while trying to control a crowd of students during Orientation Week. Initial reports from police said the crowd was not rowdy but some students said there had been "a lot of drinking" at the party. (September 1985)

Concordia University - David Gilmour, 22, died after having his throat slit with a beer bottle at Montreal's Concordia University. Gilmour had asked Glen McCall, also 22, for a mouthful of the beer he was drinking. McCall responded by smashing the beer bottle and slashing it across Gilmour's throat. McCall later pleaded guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to four years in prison. Neither were Concordia students. (September 1985)

University of Saskatchewan - September 29, 1984 Shawn Reineke, a non-student died after being shoved down a residence garbage chute following a bizarre mock funeral. He had been drinking heavily at a residence party.

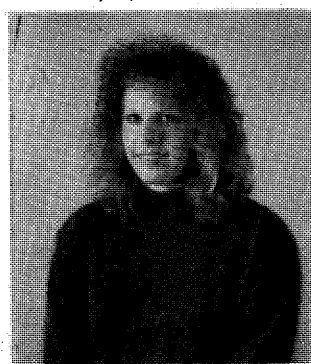

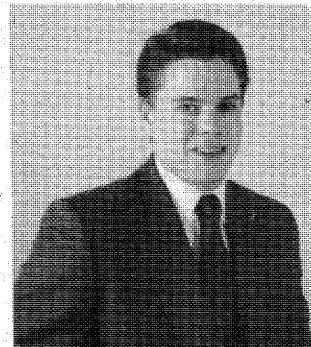

It is not all labour though, there is a wealth to be learned through active participation with the student executive. Goal setting is a priority and

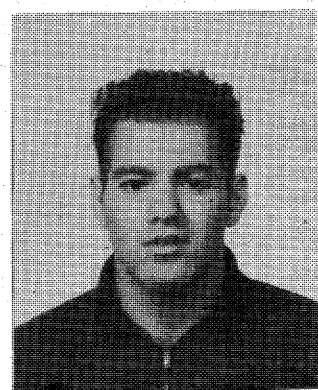

PRESIDENT

- Preside over all meetings of NAITSA, General Council, Executive Council.
- Be responsible to the Student Association membership in so far as the activities of the Student Association are concerned, and shall exercise supervision over all officers in the discharge of their duties.
- Be responsible for the maintenance of proper procedures according to the Constitution and Policies; and the interpretation and revision of such when necessary.
- Act as the official representative of NAITSA to the President of NAIT, the Board of Governors and any body outside of the Student Association.
- Voting Director on ACTISEC (Alberta Colleges and Technical Institutes Student Executive Council); required to attend all meetings, share information, state concerns and make decisions representing NAITSA; may be required to participate in ACTISEC Committees.
- Is an ex-officio member of all NAITSA standing committees and special committees.

- Shall be a voting member of the Activities Committee and Publications Board.
- Responsible for presenting a budget for his/her division to the NAITSA Administrative Vice President.
- Shall be a signing authority in the absence of the NAITSA Administrative Vice President.
- Responsible for preparing an agenda for General Council and Executive Council meetings from submissions made by Council members and other items deemed important to the functioning of NAITSA.
- Establish any General Council ad-hoc and/or standing committee deemed necessary to the effective operations of NAITSA.
- Be registered in a minimum of three (3) and a maximum of fifteen (15) class hours per week.
- Keep regular posted office hours in order to do business of the position.

ACADEMIC VICE PRESIDENT

- Perform all duties and assume the responsibilities of the NAITSA President in his/her temporary absence.
- Responsible for assisting students in academic related matters.
- Responsible for the organization of all Special and General meetings of NAITSA.
- Sit on Academic Council and report to Executive Council on its activities.
- Responsible for arranging bi-monthly caucus meetings for Academic Council student representatives.
- Responsible for all NAITSA elections and be the Chief Returning Officer; if running for re-election, shall appoint another Chief Returning Officer from the Executive Council.
- Be a voting member of the Activities Committee.
- Act as a liaison and work with an individual or group which is not a function of the student body; this includes outside charities.
- Responsible for presenting a budget for his/her division to the NAITSA Administrative Vice President.
- Keep regular posted office hours in order to do business of the position.

COMMUNICATIONS VICE PRESIDENT

- Preside over all meetings of the Publications Board.
- Responsible for the supervision of all NAITSA publications; and hiring of necessary staff for such publications in compliance with the NAITSA Hiring Policy.
- Responsible for internal public relations of NAITSA.
- Official liaison between the Publications Board and the Executive Council and General Council.
- Responsible for presenting a budget for his/her division to the NAITSA Administrative Vice President.
- Keep regular poster office hours in order to do business of the position.

ADMINISTRATIVE VICE PRESIDENT

- Shall be the Chief Financial Officer of NAITSA.
- Responsible for assisting the NAITSA Accountant in the administration of the office functions of NAITSA.
- Responsible for cash management of all social functions and other NAITSA events.
- Shall be the signing authority of NAITSA.
- Responsible for preparing and maintaining budgets.
- Responsible for maintaining a copy of the Bylaws or Constitution for each technology club or student club.
- Assist the auditor in the annual audit and present to Executive Council and to NAITSA membership at the Annual General Meeting.
- Take and maintain minutes of all meetings of Executive Council, General Council and any other committees for which minutes are deemed necessary by the NAITSA executive.
- Keep regular poster office hours in order to do business of the position.

ATHLETICS VICE PRESIDENT

- Responsible for hiring the Intramural Head Referee as defined in the Hiring Policy.
- Chair all meetings of the Intramural Council.
- Shall be a voting member of the Athletics Board.
- Responsible for internal promotion of athletics in conjunction with the Coordinator of Intramural and Intercollegiate Athletics of NAIT.
- Responsible for presenting the Athletic Board budget and financial statements to the NAITSA Administrative Vice President.
- Official liaison between the Athletic Board and the Executive Council and General Council.

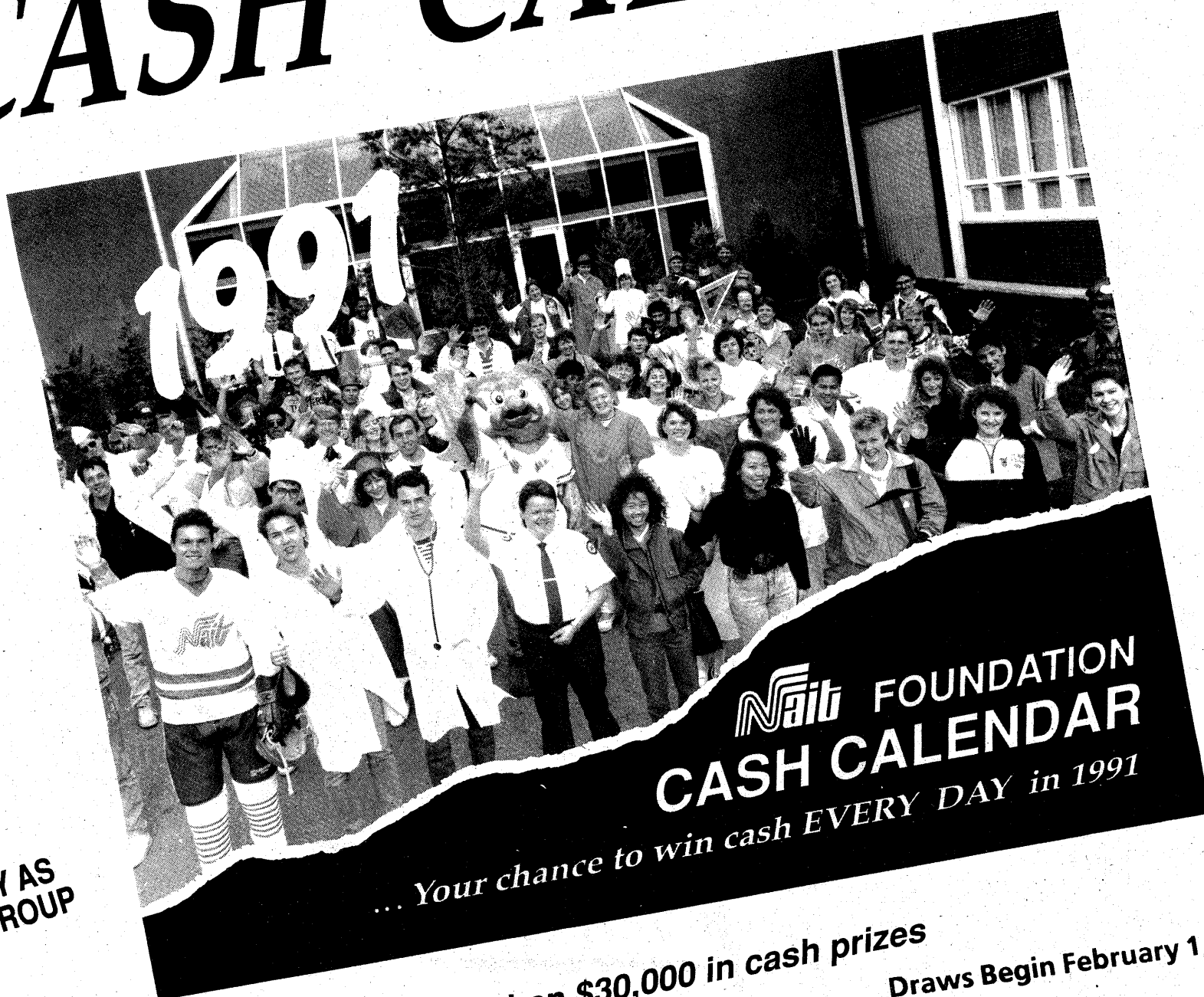

NAIT's three teams, Mens, Ladies, and Mixed will be going across the river to the Balmoral Curling Club March 1-3, 1991 to battle for the ACAC Championship.

The Provincials, using the triple knockout format, will bring together the top three teams in each division from the North and South.

The NAIT teams over all record of 23-3 in the two regionals is a NAIT record and a very impressive achievement.

In the fall regional (Keyano) they went 11-2 and bettered themselves in the winter regionals (Grande Prairie) 12-1.

Unfortunately for the three provincial winners the trail will end. The CCAA Nationals, scheduled for Thunder Bay, March 20-23, 1991 has been cancelled for this year.

The men became the first North team to go undefeated in the regional, posting an 8-0 record.

Missing their skip Rob Schlender, who will represent Alberta in the Winter Games February 25-March 2, second Tim Schnuder took over the skipping duties. Not missing a beat, the men curled superbly, edging CLUC

7-6, GMCC 8-6, LCC 7-3, and controlling GPRC 10-3.

The Ladies, skipped by last years' Provincial Champion Brenda Coswan, were perfect in regional I at 4-0. With first place virtually cinched, they saw their drive for a perfect record disappear when LCC, in the last draw of the day, stole one in the 10th for a 7-6 victory. In earlier games they were very impressive, winning handily over CLUC 8-2, LCC 13-4, GPRC 10-5, and edging CLUC 6-5.

The mixed, skipped by Aaron Westgard, were the story in the playdowns. Tied with LCC for second with a 3-2 record, the team won four straight to end round robin day tied for first. Both GMCC and NAIT finished with 7-2 records. They crushed GPRC 11-2, edged CLUC 7-5, GMCC 6-5 and cruised against LCC 8-3.

All three teams have an excellent shot at the Gold. NAIT is the only college in ACAC history to win 3 golds - 1984. With the personnel, the attitude, and the right bounces, the '91 team has a legitimate shot.

The NAIT Ooks had a glorious opportunity to move into second place

in the ACAC standings, but their inability to play well two games in a row cost them once again and, if the trend continues, the Ooks could be hitting the links instead of the opposition sooner than they think.

On Friday, the 8th, the Ooks defeated the Cougars 8-2 thanks in large part to the outstanding goaltending of Rob McKinley.

In the first, the Ooks acquired a 1-0 lead on Randy Wong's ninth of the season at 3:04. Greg Geldart then doubled the Ooks advantage with 8:22 gone in the frame. The Ooks

powerplay then connected at 12:22 with Ian McAmmond scoring his eleventh of the campaign. At 19:05, Scott Melnyk gave the Ooks a 4-0 cushion with his 19th of the year.

In the second, Melnyk reached the 20 goal plateau at the 2:57 mark. The Cougars then bounced back with goals by Cal Wiltshire at 6:31 and Greg Suchan at 14:17. Greg Geldart then turned the tide for the Ooks with a shorthanded marker at 18:48.

In the third, the Ooks scored a pair of goals in a span of 42 seconds which encouraged the Cougars to make a

goaltending switch. Darren Perkins found the mark for the fifth time this season at 4:07 and Todd Kinniburgh turned on the red light for his tenth of the year at 4:49.

MRC's Randy Beekhuizen and Buddy Brazier teamed up to turn away 47 of 55 shots. NAIT's Rob

McKinley stopped 30 of 32 drives.

On Saturday, the 9th, only a handful of Ooks came to play and the team deservedly lost 5-4 to the Cougars.

In the first, the Cougars jumped out to a 2-0 advantage as Mark Greyeyes scored at 3:06 and Greg Suchan tallied at 15:48.

In the second, the Cougars widened the advantage to three goals when Mark Greyeye's notched his second of the game at the 4:23 mark. NAIT's Corey Hastman closed the gap to 3-1 with 5:03 gone in the frame. The Cougars regained a three goal cushion on Brian Bosch's tally at 5:42. The Cougars then acquired a 5-1 lead on Corey Taylor's marker at 8:27 before the Ooks Greg Geldart cut the margin to three at 9:27. NAIT captain Randy Wong pulled the Ooks to within two with 66 seconds left in the period on the powerplay.

In the third, the Ooks trimmed the margin to

5-4 with Randy Wong's second powerplay goal of the contest at 14:14, but could not obtain the equalizer despite having chances.

Randy Beekhuizen received the call in the MRC crease stopping 43 of 47 shots. Alec Shell handled the netminding duties for NAIT stopping 32 of 36 shots.

NAIT coach Rick Carriere reflected frankly about the inconsistency of the Ooks. "We need to put forth a solid effort not just one night, but both nights. We also must play sound, disciplined hockey for 60 minutes when we take the ice."

ON THE BENCH: The Ooks travel to Grande Prairie for games with the Grande Prairie Regional College Wolves (0-22) on Thursday at 8:00 p.m., on Friday at 8:00 p.m., and on Saturday at 1:30 p.m. The Ooks then close out the regular season with 7:30 p.m. contests at the NAIT Arena on Friday, February 22nd, against Mount Royal and on Saturday, February 23rd against SAIT.

Women Show Their Stuff

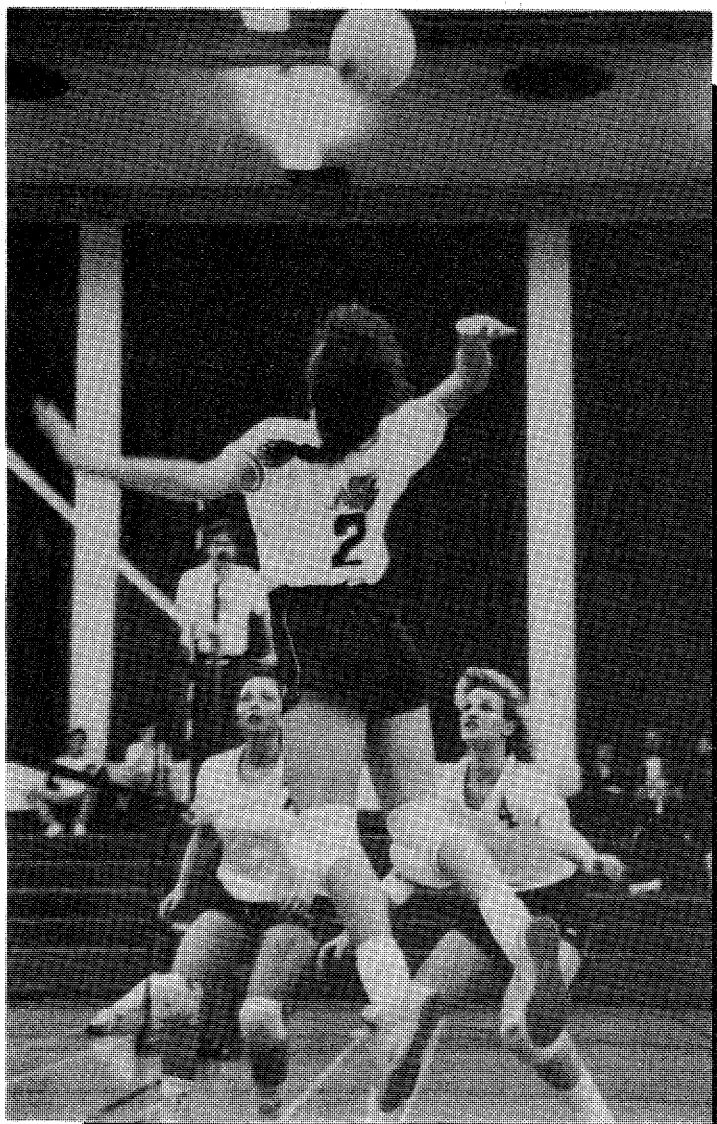

The first cut seems to be just fine, just what you would want from an album that has been in the works for over three years. David worked with bar bands in Vancouver for four months in developing a stylized type sound of a hungry good rock band, something like the "Van Halen" debut album.

There is noticeable growth from David's last album, but he still sounds like the wild man we have grown to love. This album rocks the way it should: hard, loud and boisterous.

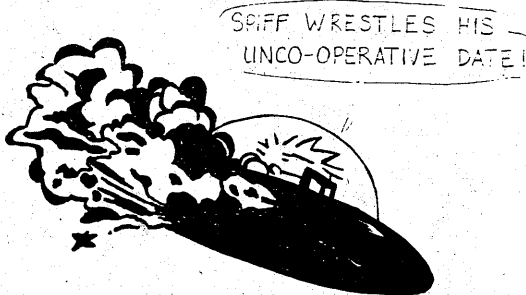

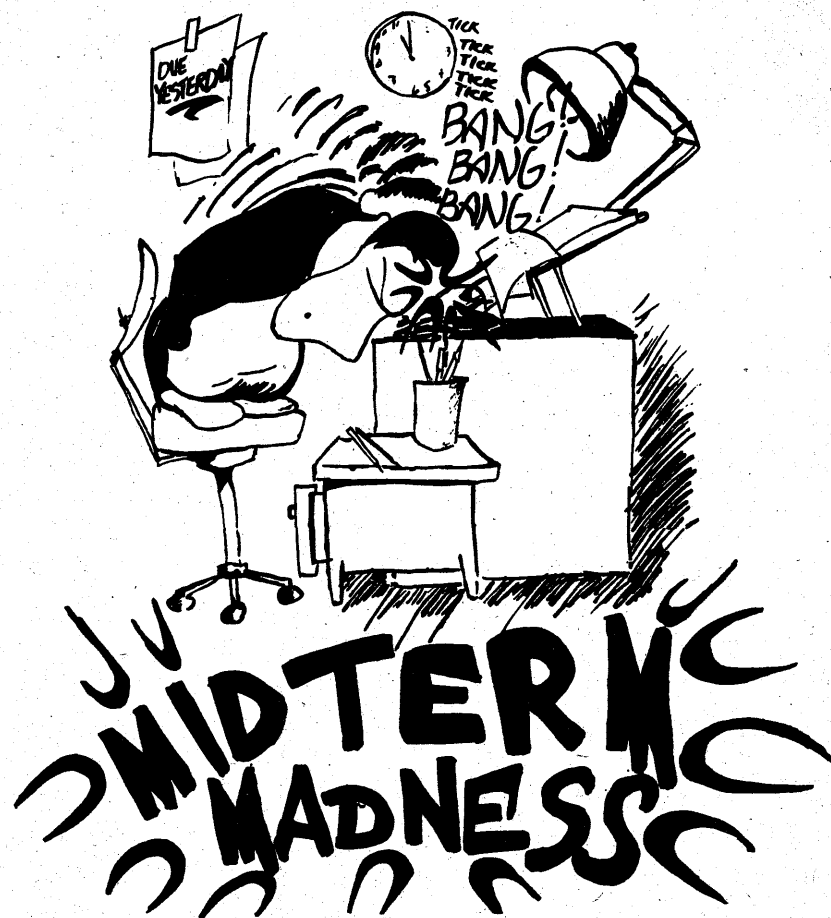

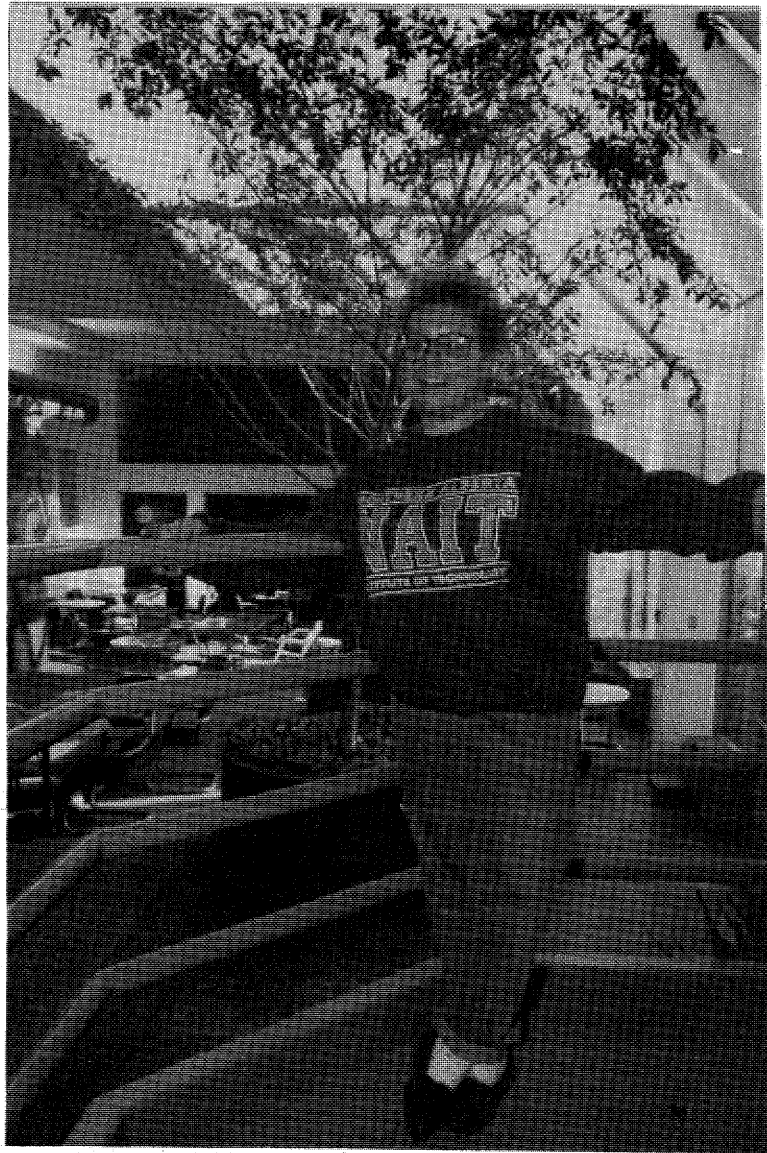

CGA Presentation To Foundation

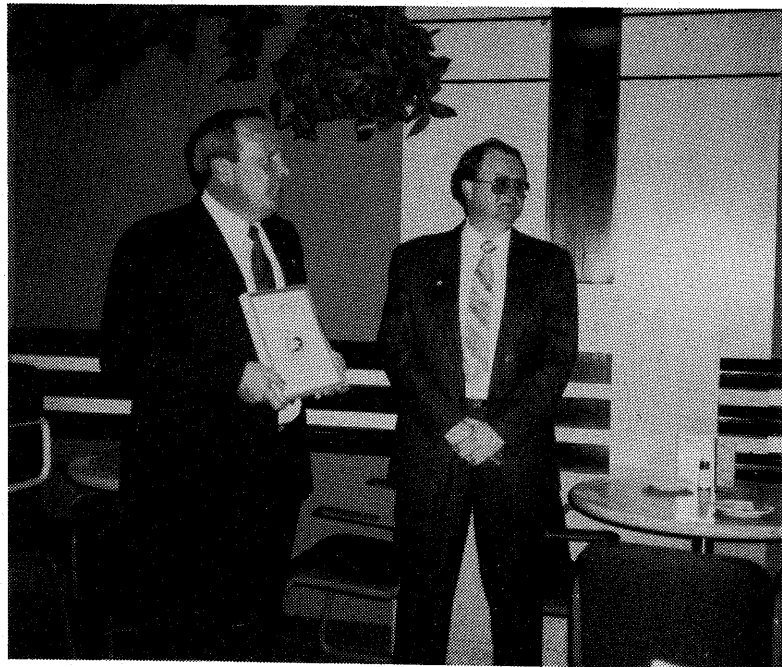


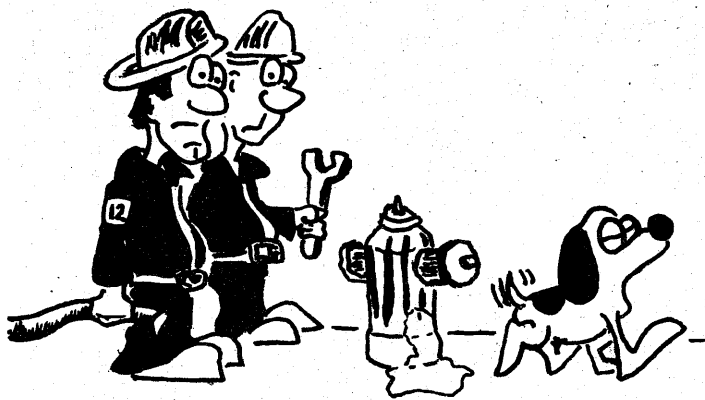

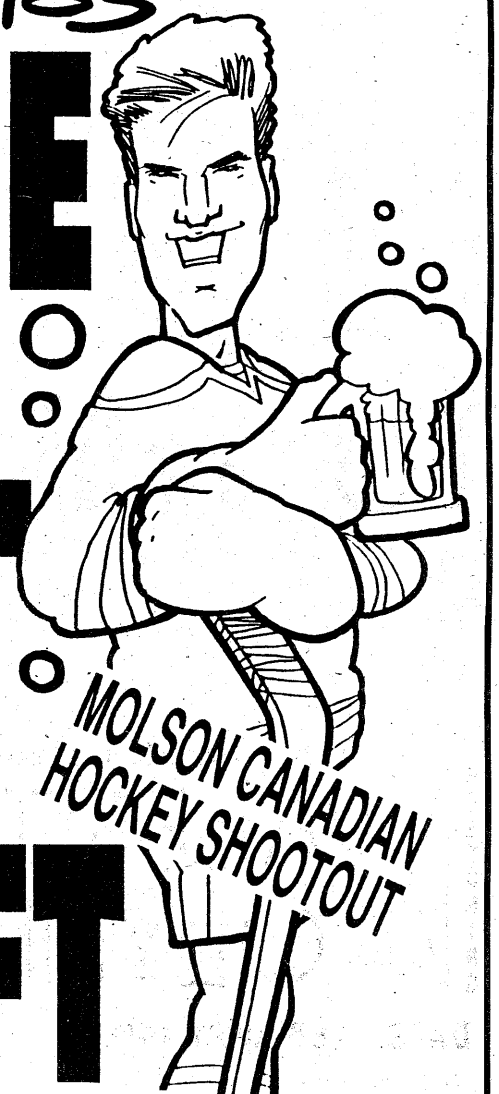

"The legal limit is .08 or 8.0 or something like that."

Actually, .08% is the legal blood alcohol limit for driving. The only thing at 8.0% is probably a pickled egg. But what does it all mean? Basically there are two considerations—the rate at which alcohol enters the bloodstream and the rate at which alcohol is taken out of the blood by the liver. The difference between the two determines the concentration of alcohol in your blood. And it is this blood alcohol concentration (BAC) that determines the effect on your brain and nervous system.

Twelve ounces of beer, four ounces of wine or one and a half ounces of spirits have about the same amount of alcohol—half an ounce. And your body can break down about half an ounce an hour or .02% (based on 150 lb. person).

Because alcohol is a depressant, it works by putting portions of the brain "to sleep" and the effects are cumulative.

Less than .03 to .05%. Feelings range from no effect to mild alterations of moods and feelings. Minor modification of control is happening but not discernible.

Between .05 and .10%. Increased feeling of relaxation, sedation and/or euphoria. Feelings of stimulation and increased confidence are illusions because alcohol has put the "attitude" compartment of the brain "to sleep". Your physical co-ordination is impaired and reaction time is longer.

Between .10 and .20%. Further deterioration of your motor control, judgment and reaction times. Speech may be slurred.

Over .20%. You're well sedated. Your brain is anaesthetized to the point that you have trouble knowing what's happening. Even standing or staying awake is difficult.

Over .40% - .60%. Usually fatal.
