

LET'S SELL THOSE CORVETTE CAR RAFFLE TICKETS



Once again, the NAIT Foundation's "Meet Us at The Mall" campaign is underway. This project is designed to create awareness for NAIT and the NAIT Foundation as well as offer a grand prize of a 1991 Corvette valued at over \$58,000 through a car raffle.

The "Meet Us at The Mall" display and car raffle travels to every major mall and trade

show in Edmonton and it's surrounding area, and began December 20, 1990 and ends on August 24th, 1991 at West Edmonton Mall. It can easily be said over 1,000,000 people will have been exposed to the project.

This year's 1991 corvette is a beautiful medium quasar blue convertible equipped with a 5.7 litre tuned-port-injection V8

engine. It also has over \$7000 in options, including a removable hard-top, leather reclining seats, and a deluxe AM-FM stereo package. As well, a matching mini-convette valued at \$2,200 accompanies the grand prize.

On April 27th, 1991 there will be an early bird draw for a trip for two to London, England plus \$2,000 cash. Tickets can be purchased at the student store, the cashier's office and NAIT Foundation office. Tickets are only one for \$3.00 or three for \$5.00.

The goal of the NAIT Foundation's "Meet Us at The Mall" project is to net \$100,000 of which \$90,000 plus a possible matching grant will be directed towards the General Endorsement Fund. \$10,000 plus a possible matching grant will be directed to capital equipment for Westerra Campus. To date the total amount of money raised by "Meet Us at The Mall" project exceeds \$640,000.

Students are encouraged to get involved with this worthwhile project by selling raffle tickets. NAITSA is offering cash prizes to the largest and smallest technology and to the individual student that sells the most tickets. A goal of \$25,000 worth of ticket sales has been set by NAITSA President, Roxanne Beaubien.

Based on that goal, it means \$2,500 in cash is up for grabs. The breakdown will be \$1,425 to the largest technology, \$712 to the smallest technology and the balance (\$363) to the individual student who sells the most tickets. Sales are on a technology per capita basis.

Of course, if higher sales are achieved then the cash prizes will be higher. Ten percent of the total student sales is available in prizes from NAITSA.

In addition, prizes are available for the individual student who sells the most tickets in a two week period. A random draw every two weeks will also take place for those who have returned their cash and stubs from completely sold books. The sooner you sell and return the money and stubs the better chance you have of winning a prize. Prizes include Oiler tickets and various gift certificates. Remember, the more you sell the more you can win! NAITSA welcomes you to come down and visit their office to pick up your book of tickets. 

It is not all labour though, there is a wealth to be learned through active participation with the student executive. Goal setting is a priority and



Your touch was soft and gentle, And then came, so passionate, your kiss. You aimed your arrows carefully, And never seemed to miss.


Then how quickly, dawn was breaking. The sun began to rise. I knew I had found someone special, I could see it in your eyes.



On Friday, February 15th, the Ooks routed the Wolves 10-1.

Kevin Lovig tallied twice for the Ooks while Corey Hastman, Bill Moody, Randy Wong, Ian McAmmond, Alex Bouma, Tim Murphy, Mark Hilton, and Mark Platzer added singles. Don Gaboury replied with the lone Wolfmarker.

NAIT held period leads of 2-1 and 5-1 before adding five goals in the third.

NAIT outshot Grande Prairie 60 to 18. Alec Sheflo received the call in the NAIT net while Mike Bell got the nod in the Grande Prairie crease.

On Saturday, February 16th, the Ooks closed the books on Grande Prairie's winless regular season with a 14-2 triumph.

Geldart completed the hat trick for the Ooks while Jeff Wildeboer, Bill Moody, Ian McAmmond, and Corey Hastman each turned in two goal Tim performances. Murphy, Randy Wong and Scott Melnyk completed the NAIT scoring barrage. Jason Carleton and Rod Stearn replied for the Wolves in the losing

The Ooks acquired a 4-0 lead after 20 minutes and a 7-2 advantage after two before finding the mark seven times in the final frame.



The NAIT Men's Basketball team, playing their fourth and fifth consecutive road games, lost games to Lethbridge Community College (76-58) and Medicine Hat college (90-76) last weekend. While undefeated at home, the Ooks have lost five of seven road games this year. Their record now has dropped to 9-5 and the team finds itself in third

In the game against the LCC Kodiaks, the Ooks played a strong defensive first half, combined with balanced scoring, and found themselves down 38-37 at the half. In the second half the Ooks could only manage 21 points shooting a dismal 24% from the floor, as the Kodiaks pulled away to an 18 point victory. Norm Barthel led the Ooks with 12 points while Neil Vany and Rob Hansuk had 9 each.

One day later in Medicine Hat, the Ooks faced a charged up MHC Rattlers. The Rattlers,

who played great pressure defense throughout the game, forced the Ooks into an up-tempo game, resulting in a 90-76 defeat. The Ooks, down 23 points, could not take advantage opportunities at the free throw line to take the lead. The Ooks shot a horrendous 19 from 47 on the line in the loss. Neil Vany led all NAIT scorers with 19 points, Rob Hansuk added 17 points, while Chuck Royer and Dan Grapentine each had 11

The 9-5 Ooks are now tied for third place with Camrose Lutheran University College, who they host this Friday evening. The winner of this game will likely hold onto third place as the regular season winds down this weekend. The Ooks also host the Red Deer College Kings on Saturday afternoon.

But, excluding Grande Prairie, the ACAC is competitive this year. All other colleges have managed to build a system of recruiting and enticing players to be able to build a strong roster.


