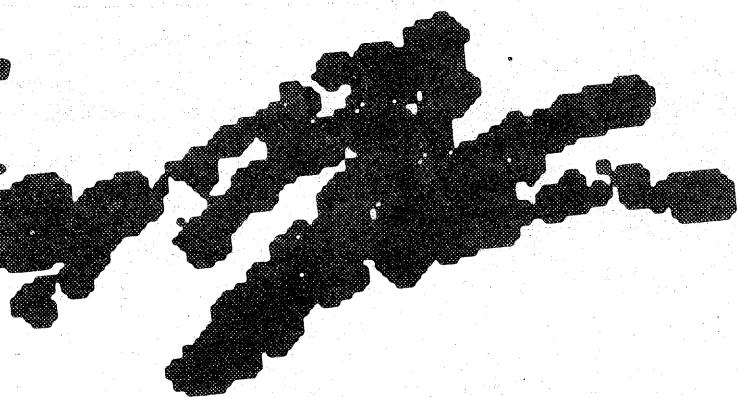

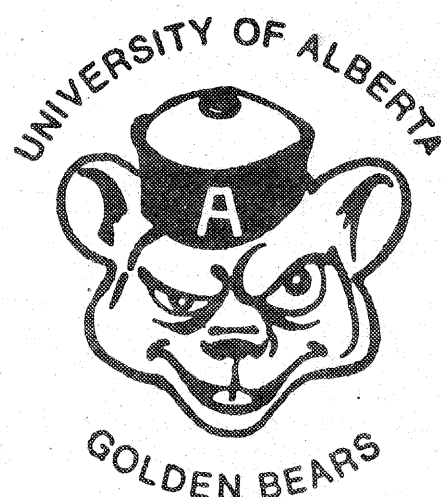
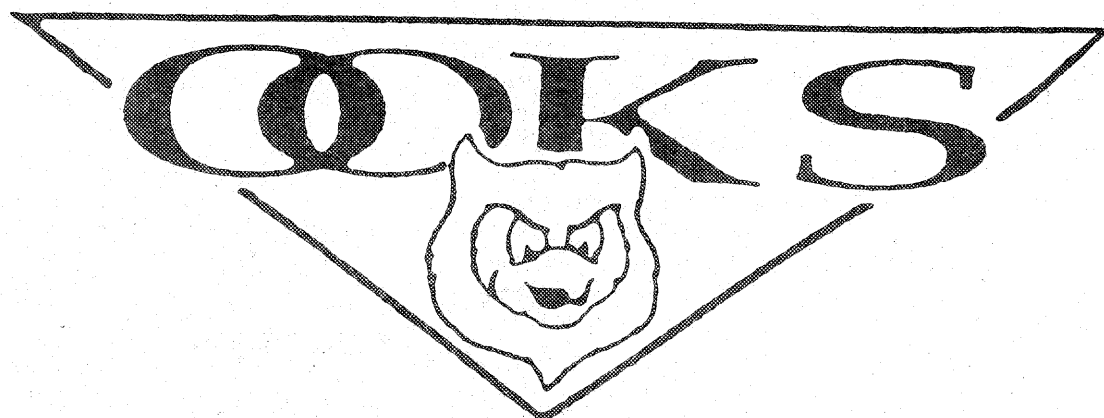

MEET US AT THE MALL CAMPAIGN

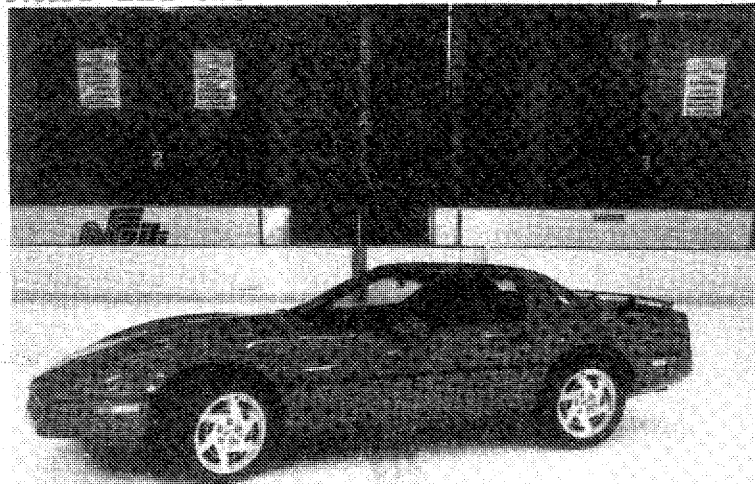
Once again, the NAIT Foundations "Meet Us at The Mall" campaign is underway. This project is designed to create awareness for NAIT and the NAIT

Canada has in the past remained neutral in such matters, but this time they have joined forces with the other countries of our so very precious earth to try and stop this unreasonable madman.

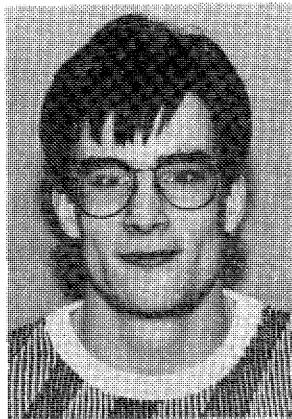
Most of us have not known war, some remember the tragedy of the Vietnam War, and some remember World War I and World War II. This could quite possibly be World War III.

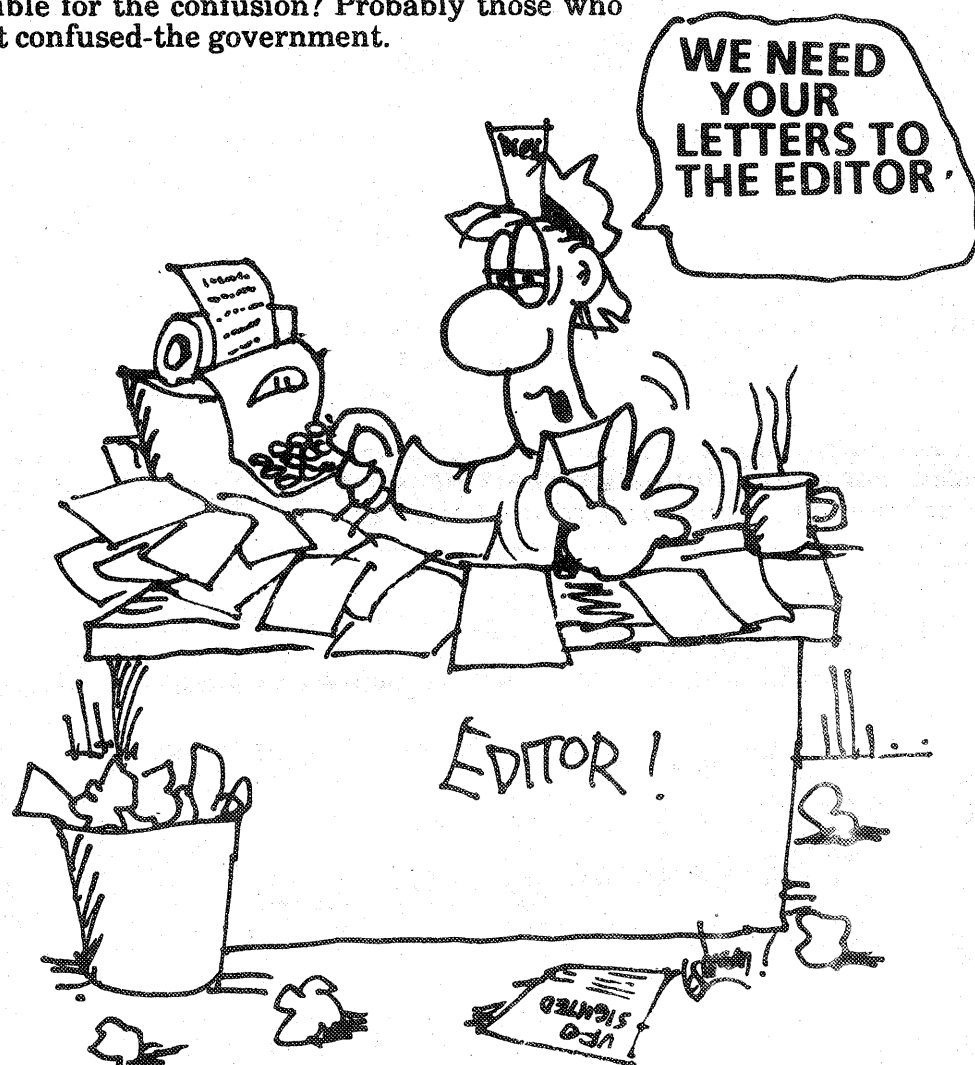

Budget Cuts Deep

The recent Edmonton Municipal budget proposal will hit Edmontonians hard. The budget proposal will see \$4 million cut out of social and essential services such as daycare, ambulances, and transit budget.

What it means is that bus passes will increase to \$36.00 from \$34.00. Peak hour cash fares will increase 25¢ for adults and 15¢ for children. High school passes will increase from \$28.00 to \$36.00 and adult passes will increase to \$40.00 from \$36.00.

Daycares and afterschool care will face reductions in subsidies. Two hundred families who make less than \$1100.00 a month and who depend on these programs will be faced with no subsidies.

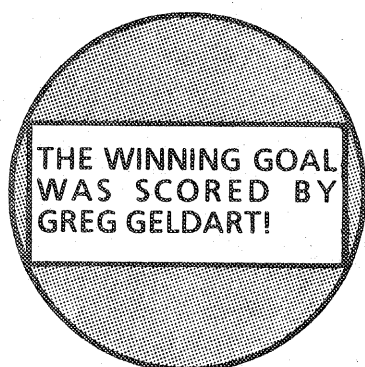

The NAIT Ooks and the University of Alberta Golden Bears tuned up for Faceoff '91 with a 3-3 overtime tie at the Alberta University Cup in Lethbridge on Sunday, December 30th.

Greg Geldart netted the equalizer for the Ooks with only 19 seconds left in regulation. Todd Kinniburgh and Mark Hilton rounded out the NAIT scoring. Garth Premak netted a pair for the Bears while

Scott McDonald netted a single.

The Bears directed 39 shots at NAIT's Alec Sheflo. The Ooks tested the Bears tandem of Gavin Armstrong and Scott Ironside 30 times.

The Ooks led 2-0 after 20 minutes and 2-1 following 40, before squandering the lead and salvaging the tie.

The two teams will now meet one another at Northlands Coliseum on Tuesday, January 15th in Faceoff '91 to settle the bragging rights once and for all.

In earlier tournament action, the Ooks posted a record of no wins, one

loss and one tie, while the Bears recorded two victories, no losses, and no ties.

On Friday, December 28th, the Ooks suffered a 5-3 defeat at the hands of the University of Calgary Dinosaurs.

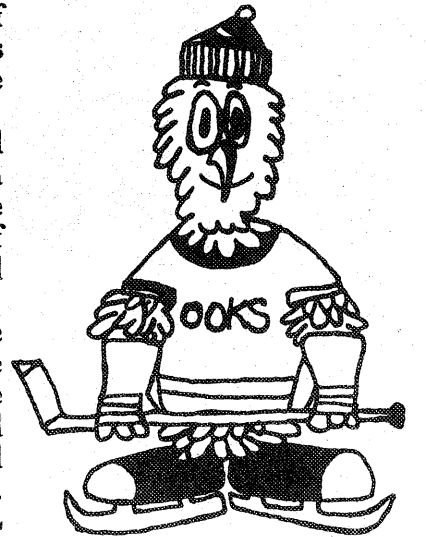
Steve Wienke, Mark Hilton, and Corey Hastman tallied for the Ooks in the losing effort.

Outshooting the Dinos 38-28, the Ooks trailed 3-2 after the first and 4-3 following the second. Rob McKinley and Alec Sheflo shared the netminding duties for the Ooks.

On Saturday, December 29th, the Ooks and the University of Lethbridge Pronghorns battled to a 4-4 overtime draw.

Ian McAmmond paced the Ooks with a pair of goals while Corey Hastman and Jeff Wildeboer added singles.

The two teams were tied at 1-1 after the first, but the Pronghorns forged ahead for a 3-2 lead following two periods. NAIT outshot the U of L 40 to 28. Rob McKinley received the call in the NAIT nets.

On Friday, January 4th, in Saskatoon, Canada won their second straight World Junior Hockey Championship. Frankly, the victory may be the last triumph in the sport by the team that wears the maple leaf.

A number of happenings in recent months show that

gathering together as a nation is becoming harder to do.

In the fall of 1990, Revenue Canada announced that it was taxing the Stanley Cup rings given to the Calgary Flames and the Edmonton Oilers in recent years. Without a doubt, if the rings were given to the Montreal Canadiens or the Toronto Maple Leafs there would be no such action. This is yet another example of Central Canada trying to break the spirit of the extremities.

Also this fall, the lunkheads at the OCAA decreed that they were not coming west for the

proposed CCAA National Hockey Championship to be hosted by Alberta in 1991. Last year, the ACAC champs incurred all expenses to represent their province. Yet, when ACAC representatives offered to provide ground transportation and accommodation if the OCAA champs paid their airfare, the Ontario contingent whined and backed out.

Ever since the 1700's, Central Canada has been pillaging the rest of the country. Whether it be through the fisheries, the fur trade, the National Energy Program, or the Crow

Rate, eight provinces and two territories have suffered. Now the GST has come in and who will pay the brunt of it-- the West through higher transportation costs.

A committee has been formed to foster national unity. Face it, trying to save Canada is like trying to save one of Zsa Zsa's marriages -- a waste of time and money.

A better committee would be one to encourage Quebec to separate and take their share of the national debt so that the remaining provinces can leave Ontario high and dry for once.

Megan Gorman Women's Basketball

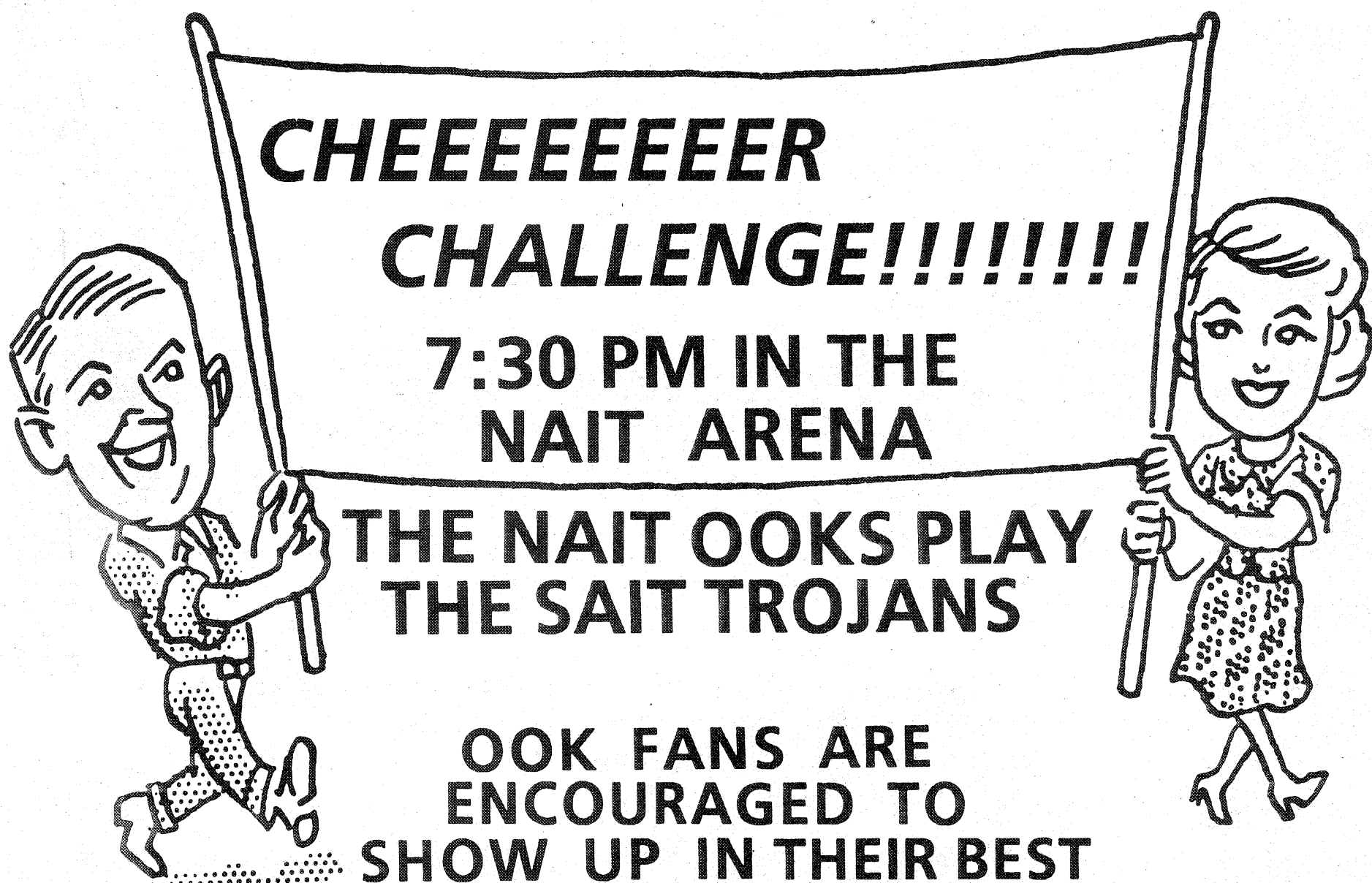
