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Ooks Couldn't Capitalize

The NAIT Ooks had the opportunities to bury the U of A Golden Bears in the first period, but did not do so and dropped a 6-0 decision to their crosstown rivals at FaceOff '91 played at Northlands Coliseum on Tuesday night in front of 2,947 fans.

The Ooks showed no effects of their disheartening Saturday loss to the SAIT Trojans in the first period and had glorious chances to take control of the contest. The Ooks outshot the Bears 12-4, received three powerplays, and sent teammates in on a pair of breakaways. However, when the first period drew to a close, the Bears were ahead 1-

0 courtesy of Garth Premak's goal at the 1:27 mark on the first shot of the game.

"We deserved a much better fate in the first period than we got on the scoreboard. We needed to score to come into the dressing room on a more positive note," stated NAIT coach Rick Carriere solemnly after the game.

The second period was even until the Bears' penalty killing unit took the wind out of the Ooks' sails at 10:10. Todd Goodwin scored at that moment to give the Bears a 2-0 lead. The Bears cushion increased to three a short 69 seconds later when Todd Gordon found the mark. Adam Morrison then

made no mistake on a breakaway opportunity to give the Bears a 4-0 lead at 16:22. Kent Dochuk of the U of A ended the period scoring at 19:24.

The third period was much similar to the first as the Ooks outshot the Bears 11-6. Like the first, the U of A scored the stanza's only goal. Serge Lajoie completed the night's scoring at the 8:33 mark.

The Ooks outshot the Bears in the contest 26 to 22. Gavin Armstrong and Scott Ironside shared the netminding duties for the Bears. Rob McKinley and Alec Sheflo tended the Ooks crease.

U of A coach Bill Moores was hardpressed to come up with reasons

why the outcome favored the Bears by such a margin after the teams battled to a 3-3 draw in Lethbridge over the holiday season. "I think we were fortunate that the puck went in the net for us. It seemed that NAIT had quality opportunities and either we got a stick on it or our goaltender got a glove on it. There is no question that it wasn't a 6-0 hockey game, but that's the way it ended up."

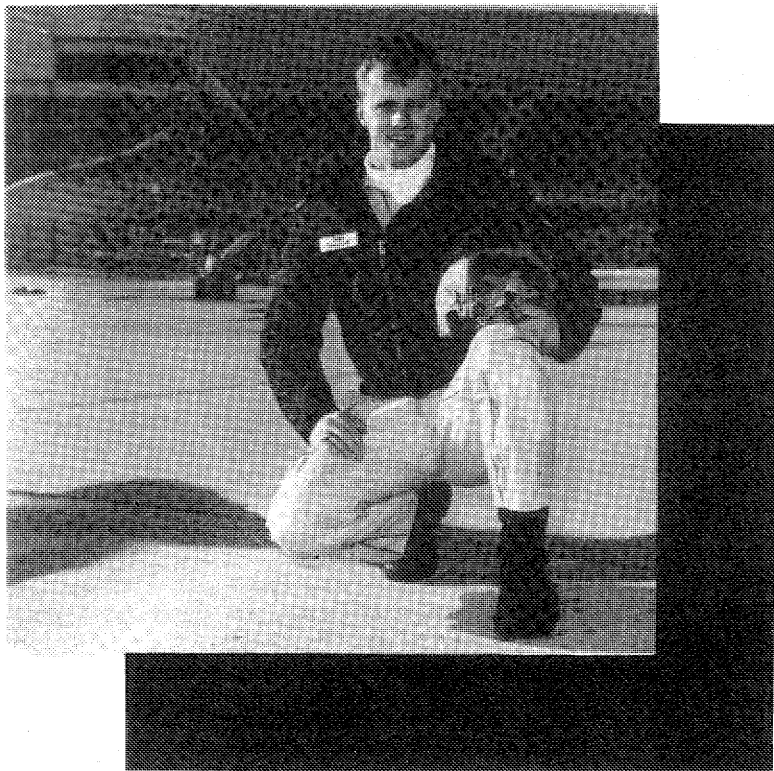

The news has been full of many analysts and experts both prior to and after this deadline. The viewing public should be very selective about what they feel is a sound belief. At times like this there are too many so called intellectuals who want to be on television. For people who have no background in defence, distinguishing between reality and illusion may be very hard. For people who feel a personal crisis over these events, it is important to not let soap box speakers drive you over the edge.

Well it is true that the coalition, led by the USA, has extremely accurate and overwhelming airpower, this is a war and in any war the innocent pay the greatest toll.

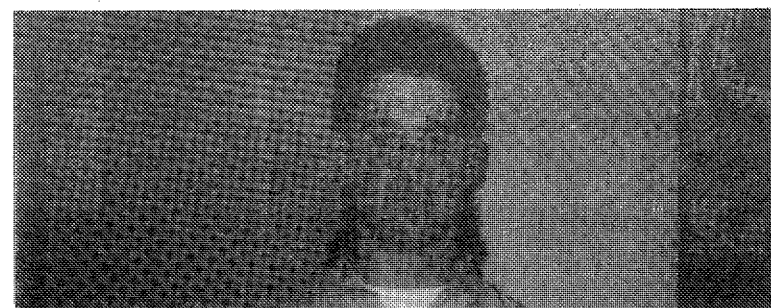

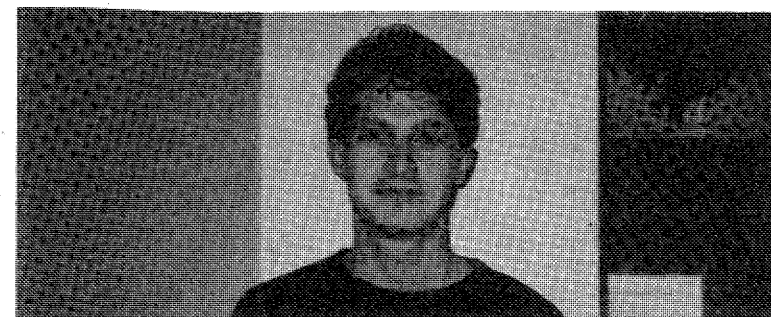

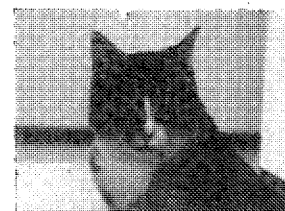

The NAIT men's basketball team returned to league action after the Christmas break last weekend winning a pair of games over SAIT (75-52) and Mount Royal College (99-60). These two victories allowed the Ooks to remain in first place, improving their league record to 7-1 and overall record to 16-6.

On Friday the men hosted the SAIT Trojans and jumped out to a 13 point half-time lead enroute to a 75-52 victory. Moe Amery led the way for the Ooks with 16 points while Rob Hansuk added 14. Norm Barthel and Neil Vangy each had 11 points. The Ooks continued their fine play Saturday in a totally dominating 39 point victory over the Mount Royal College Cougars, where five players scored in double

figures. Rob Hansuk had 18 points, Norm Barthel, Neil Vangy and Moe Amery each had 13 points and Sandy Malhi added 11 points.

The first place Ooks continue to play very well as a team, particularly defensively where they lead the league with a 64.3 points per game average against. With the two wins the Ooks will certainly remain in the

top ten National Rankings for Men's Basketball, currently they are ranked fifth in Canada.

The Ooks host crosstown rivals Grant MacEwan Community College this Friday at 8:15 in the NAIT gym. The game has always been a tremendous rivalry and Friday's game will be no different as the teams battle for first place.

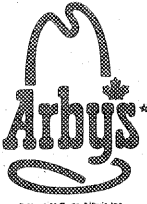

The NAIT Ooks resumed ACAC league play with a convincing 11-5 victory over the SAIT Trojans on Friday, January 11th, at the NAIT Arena.

The triumph was one

that was enjoyed, but not necessarily remembered in the morning by a good portion of the fans attending the game who made the Ooks' home rock like the Chicago Stadium.

Like the Blackhawks and Bulls who use the noise to their

advantage, the Ooks utilized the powerplay to their benefit scoring seven powerplay goals in the chippy contest.

Referee Bob Porter had his hands full handing out 136 minutes in penalties including three game misconducts to the Trojans.

The Ooks started early as Corey Hastman opened the scoring at 1:18 of the first with his fifth of the year. With two Trojans in the sin bin, Scott Melnyk's sixteenth of the season gave the Ooks a two goal lead with 8:37 elapsed in the frame. The Ooks widened the lead to 3-0 on Mark Hilton's first of the night at 13:45. Randy Keller netted the first Trojan goal on the powerplay at 15:38. Ian McAmmond reinstated

the Ooks three goal advantage with a powerplay marker at 18:06.

The Ooks continued the scoring outburst in the second. With 33 seconds gone in the stanza, Dale Dach rifled in his second of the year to give the Ooks a 5-1 lead. Jeff Wildeboer's second of the season on the powerplay gave the Ooks a five goal cushion at 2:46. Randy Keller replied with a SAIT tally at 4:02 before Mark Hilton countered for NAIT at 7:47. Newcomer Darwin McClelland scored his first as an Ouk at 13:45 to make the score 8-3. Mark Woolgar of SAIT closed out the period's scoring at 18:03.

The Ooks reached double digits in the third. Mark Hilton of the Ooks completed the

hat trick at 3:31 before Darren Perkins lifted the Ooks into double digits at 4:33. The Trojans' fourth goal came off of the stick of John Gingras 43 seconds later. Doug Wadlow concluded the NAIT scoring at 10:11 on the powerplay. Troy McIvor of SAIT closed out the game's scoring at the 12:24 mark.

NAIT netminder Alec Sheflo faced 24 shots, while SAIT goaltenders Ian MacLeod and Andy Neilsen were tested 53 times.

While enjoying the game, a number of fans received prizes ranging from sports bags to a print of Paul Henderson's winning goal in the 1972 Canada-Soviet series courtesy of United Cycle and SportImages.

The NAIT Ooks were not overconfident heading into FaceOff '91 at Northlands Coliseum. After thrashing the SAIT Trojans 11-5 on Friday, January 11th, the Ooks were brought down to earth 24 hours later.

The SAIT Trojans regrouped and shocked the Ooks by scoring the game winning goal with one second left in regulation for a 5-4 conquest.

In the first, the Trojans acquired a 1-0 lead with Randy Keller's shorthanded goal at 1:31. The Ooks

then tied the contest on Doug Wadlow's fourth of the season at 3:10. The Trojans then regained the lead as Scott Blakeman scored at 11:43 and Randy Keller found the net at 14:27.

The Ooks are now five points behind the Red Deer College Kings with one game in hand in the battle for first place. The Ooks will also be looking over their shoulder as they lead the third place by Camrose Vikings by only two points.

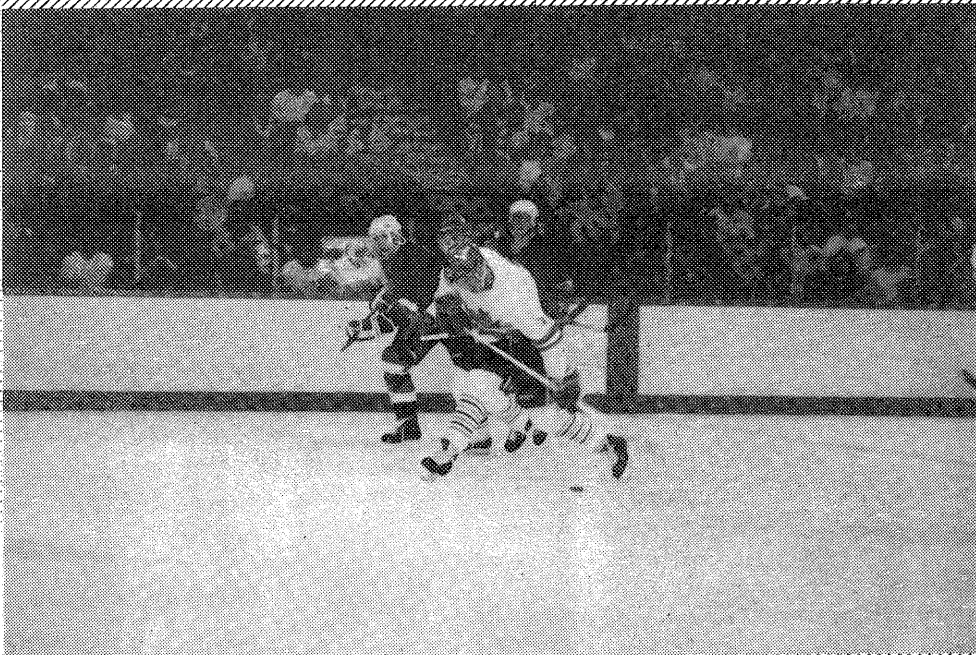
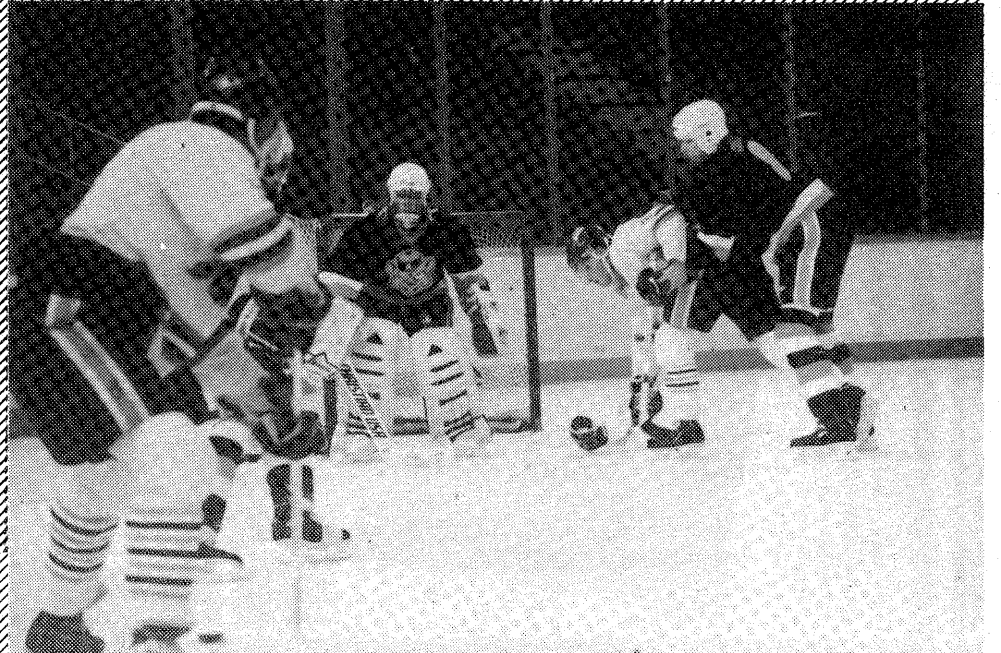

With the imminent demise of the University of Alberta's football program and their track and field, gymnastics and volleyball programs in jeopardy one would have to wonder about the future of post secondary sports in Alberta.

The reason for trouble at the U of A is simple. Not enough money. To play in the university football league, teams have to travel lengthy distances and this means air travel. That spells expensive travel costs. This coupled with rising equipment costs and lack of fan support

is the cause for problems for the U of A.

Lack of fan support for U of A teams was exemplified at last Tuesday's Face Off. NAIT pre-sold around 1800 tickets and there were 1000 "walk-ins". This means the university was responsible for selling a pathetic 200 tickets.

A football team has to rely on fans to carry part of the high financial costs of running such an organization. 1990 ticket sales for the football Bears totaled about \$4000, not even 1/12 the cost of running the team. Maybe the team should consider transferring to NAIT.

NAIT's athletic program, according to Irwin Strifler, co-ordinator of athletics here at NAIT, is on fairly stable ground.

"We're not in a lap of luxury by any means. By taking the no frills approach without sacrificing the athletes ability to play we can

get by", says Strifler.

NAIT Ooks teams have the advantage of only playing in Alberta during the regular season. This allows them to travel by bus and substantially cut down costs. The only overwhelming expenses would be incurred if one or more of the teams (hockey, soccer, basketball, volleyball, badminton or curling) made it to the Canadian Collegiate finals. As oddly as it may sound if all of the NAIT teams made it to the finals it could be a financial disaster for NAIT's athletic program.

But all in all we are not pressing the panic button as they are at the university. But, hopefully, a resolution can be found that would save the 80 year old football team at the U of A. Maybe the same Fairy Godmother that touched the Edmonton Trappers can pay a visit to the University of Alberta in the near future.

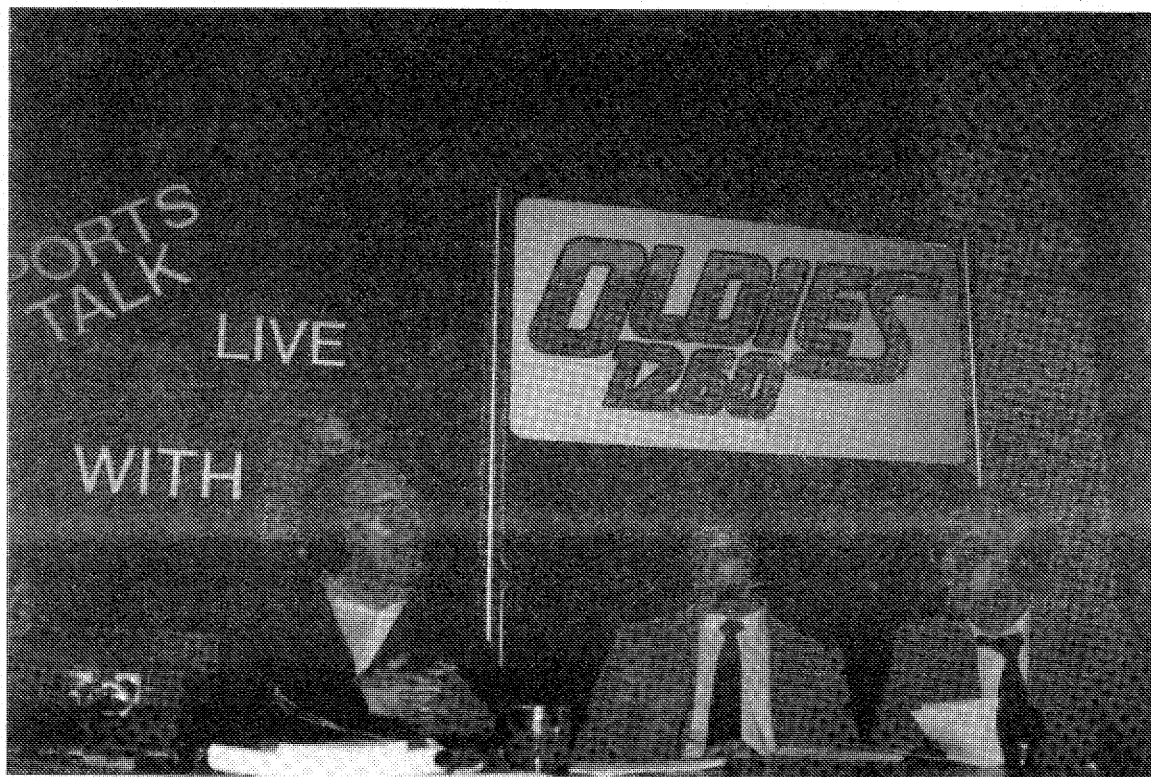
