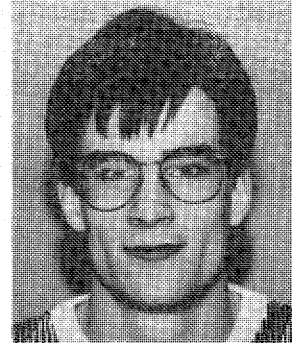
And, what's the deal with making the noise level on commercials twice as loud as the program you are watching. Talk about irritating. Also, way to go, who ever dreamed that one up!

When I entered the pool I asked if the boards were open. The lifeguard said yes, but only for 5 minutes because a class would be starting. Well it was only 5 minutes but I figured I could get in a few dives, and then splash around in the pool. The first dive was off the tower, fun but took too long to do, so I

decided to try the low spring board. I can't see too well without my glasses so I almost lost my footing trying to get on the board, because you see the step was broken and some hero had tried to fix it by putting a towel around it and taping the towel there with black tape. That was the first danger sign I should have noticed.

The second sign came minutes later when I tried to adjust the tension, seems it was in a state of disrepair too, but I figured I would live with it and dive anyways.

The first dive off the board was a reverse dive, pretty simple, but as soon as I came out of the water the lifeguard said I wasn't allowed to do any inward or reverse or backward dives. I was pretty mad because that was only 75% of the dives I can do, and because in my 6-7 years of diving I have never dived at a pool as well equipped as NAIT that had such a policy. So I asked how come no dives other than forward dives. The answer I got was that it was pool policy, like it or leave it.

Well, undaunted, I decided to dive again, this time a one and a half. It went smooth, so I went for a third dive, a back flip, but before I could execute it, the lifeguard barked, "No back dives," so I just dove straight in. Now comes the accident.

I was ready to take another dive when the guard says time is up, take my last dive. So I figure might as well go for another one and a half. Little did I know that the board was now wet and very slippery, because there was very little "sandpaper like" coating on the board, to prevent divers from slipping off the board. Pretty good thing that I was only allowed to do forward dives (seems someone knew more than they were telling). So now I am underwater in a great deal of pain. I swim to the edge of the pool where the lifeguard and pool manager are now standing, when the pool manager says I should climb out of the pool so she can see what I hurt. I reply with the fact that I am in pain and would like to let it subside a little before climbing out of the pool.

None the less I

eventually climb out of the pool and am checked over by the school nurse who figured I wasn't too bad off. Well, I wasn't content and decided I should get x-rays because my foot was swollen and my leg hurt. The nurse agreed and offered crutches, which I declined, because I could get around and wanted to keep circulation in my foot. She asked which hospital I used and how I got to NAIT. I told her the University and by bus. She said that the buses go almost right to there and that I was to let her know how things turned out.

So I took a fifteen minute bus ride, I guess, it seemed like hours. And found out that I had severely bruised my large toe, twisted my knee, and had a class 1 sprained ankle. I figure I got off pretty lucky, just a lot of pain, and hassle, and a ruined weekend or two (that remains to be seen).

Abbas Hudda - EET - No, I disagree because Canada has a reputation for being peacekeepers. In the future it will tarnish our image abroad.



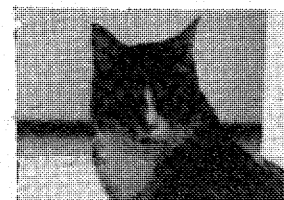
Jennifer O'Connor - Hairstyling - No, I think most Canadians are not in favor of what the government is doing. We should have a chance to have a say in it.

The resolution to make NAIT entirely smoke free has been struck down. More than 50% of the NAIT population, which includes the students, AUPE, NAITSA and Administration, voted against the proposal. The health and safety committee, however, appointed an environmental sub-committee to deal with many issues including smoking.

Results from the student survey shows that the voting was very close. The survey was answered by 855 students. Out of those, 51.5% disagree with the proposal while 48.5% agreed. The survey has a 10% margin for error.

Some of the popular suggestions offered on

the surveys were as follows:

-With all of today's modern technology, an institute like NAIT should be able to accommodate the smokers with an efficient air circulation system.

-The cafeterias are the only places where smoking areas should be reduced.

-Keep the H, I and J wings as smoking areas.

-Make the Tower Lounge non-smoking.

-Leave the previously designated areas as they are.

-Create a non-smoking lounge in the engineering annex.

-Keep "The Dock" in Plaza II a smoking area.

-Ensure that The Nest student lounge remains a smoking area.

Overcoming Unconscious Condemnation

What is it about human nature? Why do we seem to always be looking for differences? Generally, with our discoveries is to make ourselves feel better, at someone else's expense.

Now, this is not every student, nor is it the majority of students who do this, consciously that is. Unfortunately, often times we don't stop to consider how our actions will appear to the other people around us.

One of the impressions that struck me the strongest, while researching this piece on physical disabilities, were the eyes of seemingly everyone I encountered. They would all watch, usually not you, but the

machine you travelled on or the aids that you used to walk. In interviewing some people with physical disabilities, I found that this is a common occurrence. And when you try to look back at them, to smile or just interact with another human being, they look away, and act like they are either embarrassed to be caught staring or just act like they weren't looking in the first place.

One lady I interviewed, who has been in a wheelchair for the last 13 years, said that she, "Often felt like people thought that because I had a physical disability, I had a mental disability as well." She referred to

incidents such as when in a restaurant and the waiter/waitress would ask someone else (without a disability) what "she" (the person with the disability) would like to drink.

This kind of unconscious patronage, on the part of some people, often leads the person with the disability to build up resentment and sometimes even anger at the way some people treat them.

Just in case any of those kinds of people are reading this story, I will say it once more. **HAVING A PHYSICAL DISABILITY IN NO WAY INTERFERES WITH THE FUNCTIONING OF ONE'S BRAIN!!!**

Even if a person doesn't develop a physical addiction, a psychological dependency can develop.

It's this good friend/bad friend attitude that sets up some interesting paradoxes.

- It can strip away inhibitions and ease social functions; yet too much can release aggression and set you up for social indiscretions.
- Alcohol can help induce sleep; yet interferes with the phase of sleep that is essential to get a satisfying rest.
- It may enhance sexual desire but can do terrible things to performance.
- It can raise your sense of courage or bravado when facing tasks, yet seriously impair your ability to actually carry them out.
- Alcohol can relieve pain, yet its toxic effects can result in painful stomach ulcers.
- In the short term, alcohol helps you cope with stress, yet, long-term, it will hinder your ability to deal with the sources of the stress.

Knowing what alcohol can do is important. Knowing what it can't do is vital. Like make you more attractive, more socially adept, or solve your problems. And, perhaps, when we expect it to do just that, we turn it into a problem for ourselves.

to finish as both teams gave it everything they had defensively. It was a battle for first place as both teams entered the game with 7 wins. NAIT, ranked 4th nationally improved their league record to 8-1 while the 11th ranked Griffins dropped to 7-3. The Ooks received outstanding

performances from Moe Ameroy who had 21 points including a phenomenal 14 for 14 effort from the free throw line. Norm Barthel contributed with 18 points in a solid effort and Neil Vany had 10 points in a strong rebounding effort role.

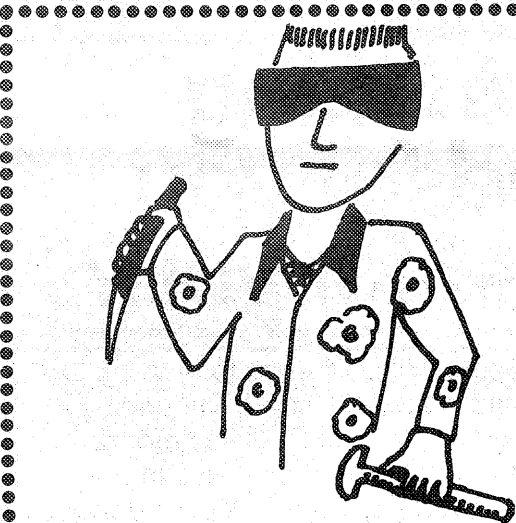
Currently the Ooks are one match win out of first place in the overall ACAC standings. NAIT Ooks Badminton ready for Regional tournament Jan 27.

King) would rather see him write a book because its not as blunt. His sister, Nina (Jan Wood) is upset that her part in the play is small.

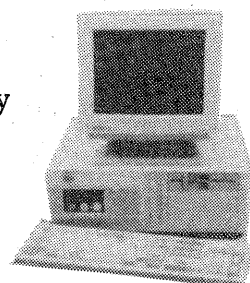
