Axe Falls On Westerra Campus

Yesterday, President Souch and Stan Chairman Jim Shaw announced to staff and members of the Stony Plain community that further reductions in programming and support services are planned for the Westerra Campus.

In February 1990, NAIT agreed to the Provincial Government's request to assume responsibility for the Westerra Institute of Technology and to do so with a base grant reduction of \$2.8 million.

"The 1991/92 financial plan is now being prepared to achieve a balanced budget and to complete integration of Westerra and NAIT operations. While some savings can be realized through attrition.

Some programs currently offered at Westerra will be affected. Pre-Technology and Electronic Publishing programs will be discontinued. Pretechnology will be discontinued because it is impractical to run the same program at two different locations. The student quota for Computer Engineering Technology will be reduced and the program will be transferred to NAIT's Main Campus where some efficiencies will be achieved by operating it within the electronics cluster of programs. Those students who are in their first year of this program will be transferred to Main

Campus to finish their offered on the Main second year.

The apprenticeship programs at Westerra Campus have a strong training base and have a strong potential for growth, as well as the potential to develop resourse (environment) related programming.

Westerra Campus currently houses the following programs: Water and Wastewater Technician (apprenticeship), Computer Engineering Technology, Electronic Publishing Technician (apprenticeship), Pretechnology, Secretarial Arts.

Further economies will be achieved through reduction of clerical services and the consolidation of other support services such as library, computer capability, registration with those

Campus.

It is anticipated that up to 19 staff positions will be cut from the current complement Westerra. Dr. Souch stated that NAIT will employ a variety of strategies - employment counselling, redeployment, retraining, s e v e r a n c e arrangements - to lessen the impact on individuals affected. This indicates that NAIT shows concern for its employees by implementing the above strategies to help staff deal with the shuffle.


Yesterday's announcement represents the second phase of economy measures intended to

bring Westerra operations in line with the \$2.8 million reduction government base funding. The first phase, which occurred between February and June 1990, realized savings of \$1.6 million.

NAIT officials are confident that the remaining Westerra programs can be sustained within the resources available and that they will provide a sound foundation for future development. Westerra will also continue to serve the needs \mathbf{of} surrounding community with continuing education programs.

"The facilities and program base at Westerra afford an excellent opportunity for development of a campus with distinctive character." - Dr. Souch

The current budget planning cycle is the last one to treat Westerra activities as distinct from those of NAIT, according to Board Chairman Jim Shaw. As of July 1, 1991 Westerra and NAIT operations will be fully integrated and a single budgeting process will be followed said Mr. Shaw.


Over the years, it has become readily apparent that a certain hockey player received the tag of the "Great One" not for his hockey ability, but rather his whining and wimpiness.








Jennifer O'Connor **Swimming**

"Here's to your good health!"

A fine sentiment. And drinking in moderation won't undermine that well-intentioned toast. But, if someone takes several alcoholic drinks a day or despite periods of not drinking goes on benders, they run the risk of real physical harm.

One of the real dangers of alcohol is that it sneaks up on you and the damage may be done by the time you become aware it's happening. The following health risks apply to all of us; they're not reserved for the down-at-heel, they can apply to you or your colleagues.

- Ulcers. Alcohol irritates the gastrointestinal tract. Taken with aspirin, the risks are even greater.
- Liver damage. Irreversible liver damage is a major cause of death, but other disorders, like hepatitis, may result.
- Neurological disorders. The effect of excess alcohol on the brain is to accelerate the natural loss of brain cells which can seriously deplete the body's surplus. Symptoms associated with the aging process develop-clouded thinking, memory failure, disorientation, stiffened limbs and poor co-ordination.
- Cancer. Abuse increases the risk of certain types of cancer, including mouth, larynx and esophagus.
- Malnutrition. If your lifestyle interferes with your getting proper nutrition, you're a candidate for this problem. Alcohol does have calories- you get heat and energy, but little nutrition.

If you drink in moderation, you may never face any of these. But it pays to have a healthy regard for the potential problems associated with that common social acquaintance-alcohol.
