The NAIT Ooks defeated the SAIT Trojans 5-2 at the SAIT Arena in Calgary on Friday night to win the best of five ACAC final series three games to none. For the Ooks, it was their tenth ACAC title and their second in a row.

In the first, the Ooks gained a 1-0 advantage as Jeff Wildeboer scored on the powerplay at 9:44.

In the second, Grant Chorney increased NAIT's lead to 2-0 at the 5:26 mark as he rang a shot off the post which then bounced off SAIT goaltender Ian MacLeod before crossing the red line. The Trojans pulled to within one as Dean Rutledge scored on a goalmouth scramble with 7:03 elapsed in the frame. Jeff Wildeboer then netted his second powerplay goal of the game from a bad angle at 9:44 to reinstate the lead. In the third, Kevin Lovig poked in a

rebound at 3:32 and Scott Melnyk added a powerplay goal at 10:09 to place the Ooks ahead 5-1. SAIT's Randy Keller closed out the scoring at 13:12 to make the final 5-2.
Following the triumph, NAIT coach Rick
Carriere cited the difference in the series

clincher.

In the Persian Gulf War many of the victims weren't named. Many of the victims weren't counted and they weren't seen.

The war is over for the military but the battle has only begun for the people left to rebuild their homes and their country. It's difficult to imagine their sense of utter despair as their lives are drastically changed by a war over which they had little control.

To many Albertans and Northwest Territories residents the war became like a noisy game that they quickly tired of. What they couldn't see, hear, touch or smell seemed unreal. And the only window on the war they had-the media-was severely restricted.

In the post-war phase, the Red Cross needs to take up the challenge of changing the rules of the game--convincing people to believe what they cannot see.

The Red Cross needs to convince people that there are victims in this war-innocent civilians who are homeless and who need help starting over again.

The fate of these victims rests with the success of Red Cross fundraising campaigns. Without money to buy the goods and transport personnel to help rebuild the lives of these

innocent civilians, their future looks bleak.

The citizens of Alberta and the Northwest Territories were generous, contributing a substantial amount of public donations for the Persian Gulf assistance across Canada.

The work of the Red cross does not stop because the war has ended. Every dollar raised is giving the victims, 90 percent of whom are civilians, another chance at life.

And isn't life the most precious gift one can give!


So, leave the flashy "Nintendo" game behind. Find the reality in the war. Help the victims of the war rebuild their lives.





Substance Abuse Equals Psychiatric Illness

There are a number of drugs which are toxic, thereby producing a variety of mental illnesses. You've no doubt heard of these drugs--cannabis, LSD, heroin, morphine and cocaine.

You've also no doubt heard that these substances can't hurt you, at least not if you use them "socially". But, where do you draw the line between social use and abuse? And how does one condone using just a little, as compared to using a lot?

Among those of Alberta Hospital's patients who have a substance abuse history, the substance of choice is cannabis, otherwise known as marijuana and hash. Cannabis possesses a toxic agent which affects the frontal lobes and frontal limbic parts

of the brain. Symptoms of abuse include impulsive, irrational behavior, depression, paranoid anger and mood instability. The result: chronic psychiatric disability.

Abuse of LSD or "acid" results in chronic depression and anxiety which is quite difficult to treat

Heroin and morphine abuse can make you quite indifferent to life and eventually cause withdrawal.

Cocaine, like amphetamines, can produce delusions, paranoid mood swings, rage and pathological excitement. Mix cocaine with alcohol or valium and you run the risk of convulsions. Cocaine abuse has also lead to cardiac arrest.

At this point you may

be saying, "I don't take drugs. I just like my beer." Alcohol is the most abused "drug" on the market. A chronic alcoholic knows full well the terrors of coming down off a drinking binge; disorientation, shaking, and D.T.'s or visual hallucinations. Chronic alcoholics are also prime candidates for Korsakov dementia which involves the complete destruction of short term memory.

The bottom line is that alcohol abuse causes brain cell death. In later stages, the brain actually shrinks. This is the cause for concern given that Alberta has the dubious reputation of having the highest per capita consumption of alcohol in Canada.
