



Dental Health Facts

Dental Disease: Dental disease is the most common chronic health problem for Canadians. More people suffer from dental disease than from any other health disorder. At some time in their lives, over 94 percent of Canadians will develop gum disease; 95-98 percent will have decayed teeth. Ironically, dental disease is also the most preventable disease in Canada today. Gum disease and tooth decay result primarily from neglect.

Consequences: Dental disease is an important health issue. If left untreated, tooth decay and gum disease can cause extreme discomfort. Moreover, teeth will fall out or will have to be extracted.

Tooth loss: The major cause of tooth loss in children is dental caries (tooth decay). The major cause of tooth loss in adults is gum disease. Tooth loss has serious consequences: it can affect speaking and chewing abilities, alter eating habits, and restrict food choice. It

can also detract from appearance, cause deterioration of the jawbone, and generally affect well-being. Prevention: The key to

keeping teeth good for a lifetime is control of plaque, a clear, sticky film of live bacteria that forms constantly in the mouth and acts on sugar to produce toxic acids that weaken the teeth and gums. There are three aspects to keeping plaque at bay. One is home care: scrupulous daily brushing and flossing to remove plaque from the teeth and gumline. Another is sensible nutrition: in particular, limiting sugar intake. The third is seeing a dentist at regular intervals for a checkup professional cleaning. Fluoride: Fluoride, a naturally occurring mineral, is an essential nutrient. It unites with the tooth enamel, making it more resistant to the acids that cause decay. By even the most conservative estimates,

fluoride in local water

supplies can reduce

children's cavities by 40

percent. Children who don't live in an area with fluoridated water should be taking fluoride supplements. And everyone needs a daily application of fluoride, which is easily available by using a CDA-recognized toothpaste mouthrinse.

Dentalphobia: Millions of Canadians are afraid of the dentist. For some, the fear is so intense that they never seek professional care; many more stay away until painful dental disease forces them to get help. Many people became fearful in the days before high-speed drilling and accurate anaesthesia. Others developed anxiety as children, either from a bad experience, or because family or friends led them to expect pain at the dentist's. Dentists are aware of and understand these Some problems. dentists specialize in treating anxious patients. A variety of seminars and courses-including a special course in hypnosis offered at the University of British Columbia's dental school--help dentists care for the fearful.



University of Calgary Student Union Elects First Female President (News Release)

The Students' Union of, The University of Calgary, today announced the unofficial results of the 1991 General Election. This year's campaign saw 43 students running for 31 positions on the 49th Students' Legislative Council.

The top position of President went to Dana McDougall--the third woman to hold this The position in Students' Union's history and the first female President in a decade. McDougall, a 22-year old native Calgarian, has been active in student politics for the past three years and is currently Vice President External.

The candidates who each won a Vice President position include: Heidi Kutz, Vice President Academic, Shannon Zwicker, Vice President External, Garth Lyon,

Vice President Finance and Dave Neufeld, Vice President Events. In the Commissioner races, 20 students each won a seat on Council.

The new Students' Legislative Council will be officially sworn in at The Students' Union annual Color Night ceremony on April 27th.

In this year's General Election, students were also asked to respond to a number of questions to determine their willingness to support various issues. Among the questions was a referendum question regarding the University's 25 thAnniversary Fundraising Campaign and a plebiscite question on the proposed athletic fee increase. The results of both questions indicate that the majority of students support the 25th Anniversary Fund and are in favour of increasing athletic fees.

Reaction Received

The three-member committee of Andy Jones, Vicki Vaitkunas, and Bill Glanville, which was appointed by the Board of Governors to obtain reactions from members of the NAIT community to the Strategic Institutional Plan document, has decided to proceed as follows:

1. Written comments on the content of the study documents may be submitted to members of the committee directly or to Laurel Wrotniak (in O102B), who is providing secretarial support to the committee. Written submissions should be as concise as possible, highlighting the specific issue being addressed and your response to it. A simple response guide has been developed to provide a standard format for input to the committee; this should

be obtained from Laurel prior to finalizing your written input to the committee. Documents longer than five pages should be accompanied by a summary page. The deadline for written responses to the committee is Friday, May 3, 1991.

2. A series of seven public presentation sessions has been scheduled at which individuals or groups may speak to the content of their written submission. These sessions will be held in the Governors' Board Room on Main Campus and are scheduled as follows:

●Wednesdays at 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m.; March 20, April 10, and April 24 ●Wednesdays at 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon; March 27, April 3, April 17 and May 1

The committee is

willing to hold one or more of its meetings at alternative sites if the volume of presentations by people at other campuses warrants this. Presentations to the committee on the dates noted above will be scheduled in 15-minute periods; please call Laurel at 471-7702 to book a time. Longer time periods can be considered for responses from a group, depending on the total volume of requests.

The four reports contained in the combined Study Documents represent an important body of information on the current state of the Institute. encourage all members of the NAIT community to read these reports and to provide their comments to the committee using the process described above.

Chem. Instructor Wins National Award

Excellent teaching can pay off in several ways. The most important, of course, is the benefit to those fortunate enough to be students of the excellent instructor. Hardly less important is the benefit that accrues to the school when its graduates prove their mastery of the subject in their subsequent work or in further study. And not to be discounted is the satisfaction that the instructor feels in a job well done.

Occasionally, a further benefit comes the way of the excellent teacher: formal public recognition. And when it comes from a nation-wide professional association of the recipient's peers, the fruits are rather to academic awards.

gratifying. Cindy Rothwell, Instructor of Chemical Technology, has won the 1990 NOVA Corporation of Alberta Award for Chemistry Teaching in Community and Technical Colleges. News of her citation came to Cindy a couple of weeks ago in a telephone call from the Chemical Institute of Canada (CIC), which administers the award for NOVA. The award includes a onethousand-dollar cash prize, a commemorative scroll, and assistance for travel to the annual Canadian Chemical Conference. The actual presentation will be made at the 1991 event in Hamilton this June.

Ted Ondrus, Program Head of Chemical Technology, in his nomination letter to the CIC, wrote, "Cindy has developed a reputation among students and colleagues for her practical approach to teaching. Her emphasis on the application theoretical concepts quickly gains students' work.'

Cindy is no stranger to academic awards. While working on her Honours B.Sc. in Chemistry, she won the Undergraduate Summer Research Award of the National Science and Engineering Research Council of Canada. As a postgraduate student, she won a scholarship from the same council, a Champlain Fellows Prize, and the Gold Key Award of the Society of the Chemical Industry.

"Lured from postgraduate studies at the

University of Alberta by the opportunity to teach," as Ted puts it, Cindy joined NAIT as a chemistry instructor in 1983. Since then, she has developed a course Food and Agricultural Chemistry and taken active parts in the Chemical Institute of Canada, College Chemistry Canada, and the Canadian Society for Chemistry. In the 1988/89 year, Cindy chaired the NAIT Open House steering committee.

A current project is a textbook for Alberta Education. Cindy is contributing the section on chemistry to a new Science 20 textbook that is being planned for introduction in Alberta schools in 1993.

Although Ted admits to having to choose among several fine instructors in Chemical Technology, there seems little doubt that the 1991 NOVA award has gone to one who is fully and very ably involved in the art and science of chemistry teaching. Congratulations to you, Cindy Rothwell!

It is believed that this is the first such award to be won by a NAIT instructor.

Transfer Students Facing Difficulties

Many eligible students will not be attending University this fall, due to enrollment cuts, quotas and program changes or

cuts.
Students in Alberta's Colleges and Technical Institutes are finding it increasingly harder to transfer into Alberta Universities as Provincial funding shortfalls create devastating effects on the post-secondary education system.

In 1988, Alberta Advanced Education increased funding to the colleges in order to expand transfer programs because of the increasing number of spaces in the Universities warned that their funding would have to be increased in order to accommodate the influx of transfer students.

However, funding has not been increased to the Universities or the colleges or technical institutes in the past couple of years. In fact, funding has not even kept up with the rate of inflation and the institutions in essence are forced to take cuts each year as the

Provincial government attempts to balance the \$1 billion deficit. As a result many programs are in danger of being reduced in size, or cut completely.

These quotas and cuts make it increasingly difficult for transfer students to get into University to continue their education. There is a bottleneck in third year programming at the universities, admission requirements keep going up, and many students are left out in the cold.

Dr. Terry Moore, Chairperson of the Alberta Council on Admissions and Transfer, ACAT, said one of the main concerns in Alberta education is ensuring all qualified students can continue their education in the Province.

"We are worried about whether there is enough space for students. We want to ensure that all students who are performing satisfactorily in their education program will be able to continue on," Moore said in an interview.

To help solve the bottleneck problem, the Universities have implemented early

Winnipeg Jets in the first round, not the defending champions and playoff-worthy Edmonton Oilers.



admission procedures for transfer students. The early admission process still needs some improvements, however, as many students are still not informed of acceptance until late July or early August.

While transfer students are waiting for notification admission, the Universities' domestic students are registering in classes. There are some concerns that this process is direct discrimination against transfer students, however Dr. Moore is not aware of this problem. His concern is to ensure all students


are treated alike.

"Generally, the Universities are trying hard to be fair to University and Transfer students alike. I am sure they place everyone vying for a university space into the same competitive pool," Moore said.

Other concerns for transfer students are the continually changing course requirements and graduation criteria. A student may complete two years of University transfer, only to find upon transferring that some of their courses no longer apply to their graduation. This can be

very frustrating for students, but Dr. Moore feels it is a necessary occurrence.

"We have a very dynamic system and dynamic programs. We wouldn't have a very good educational system if they weren't," he said.
