Citizens' Forum

THE PEOPLE SPEAK

When the Canadian government announced the formation of The Citizens' Forum to allow Canadians the chance to have a direct impact on the country's destiny last November, skeptics lathered. Here, they said, was another royal commission--another weighty volume to gather dust in the parliamentary library. They were wrong.

The Citizens' Forum was created to hold "a process of public discussion and dialogue...with and among Canadians", on a variety of specific issues. Within this mandate, the Forum was given free reign to identify the ways and means it chooses to consult with Canadians. And with that simple statement, this commission was set apart completely from the all other royal commission.

When the twelve commissioners of the Citizens' Forum met to set their own rules, they decided not to have any. Instead, they came up with some loose guidelines:

- There will be no imposing line of formally-dressed individuals, holding court in the usual hotel ballroom or in a cavernous conference centre.
- There will be no formal procedures for Canadians to follow in order to be heard by the Commissioners.
- There will be no restricting criteria for making your views known to the Forum.

This Commission has your name on it: The Citizens Forum on Canada's Future. The contents of the report to be submitted to all Canadians by July 1 will reflect your thoughts, your ideas, your recommendations.

The Forum hopes to thrive without borders. It's relying on Canadians to make their statement in a variety of ways.

1. Organize a small discussion group or ask one of the campus clubs to which you belong to devote a part of their next meeting(s) to such a discussion. The Forum can provide you with Discussion Kits and advice on how to organize such a group.

2. Invite another group in your community or campus to join your group in a discussion, planning the session jointly if possible. The Forum suggests that you invite a group whose experience of being Canadian is different from those in your group.

3. Make your campus facilities available for a community meeting, even if you can't organize such a meeting yourself. School newspapers or newsletters could be used to publicize Future of Canada discussion elsewhere on the campus.

4. Encourage fellow students to discuss the future of Canada informally with friends or family. It's not necessary to go to a formal meeting in order to contribute to the process.

5. Remember this number: 1-800-663-6786 (English) or 1-800-563-6789 (French). This is a toll-free number to ask when the Commissioners will be visiting in your area, how to contact the provincial office of the Forum or how to order Discussion kits that contain discussion points, response forms, and other items for organizing meetings.

6. Make your views and opinions on Canada's future known directly by:

Apprentices Irrate Over Changes

On February 26, the Minister for Career Development, Norm Weiss, visited NAIT's apprentices to discuss the proposed changes to the Apprenticeship Program.

In his opening address to the 200 plus crowd, Norm Weiss discounted the media's interpretation of the changes as being doom and gloom for the Apprenticeship Program.

"The media has presented the changes to the Apprenticeship

Program as being the end of the program, the deterioration of NAIT and other technical schools; the loss of safety standards. This is simply not true."

The Minister had justified the changes as being needed in order to continue to compete in a global market and to provide future training.

In explaining the changes to an already confusing legislation, Mr. Weiss tried to assure the group that these changes would be procedural/administra-

tive. In his explanation he had angered and confused the group more. The apprentices had many times heckled the Minister through the explanation.

During the question period, many tried to get a clear explanation of the changes. There were, however, many who asked the Minister questions about how he plans on policing businesses who were cheating apprentices. Many questioned the Minister's statement that industry will be responsible for promoting the Apprenticeship Program.


Will this issue of what to do with our garbage ever be settled? Or more importantly, if it does eventually get settled, will it be in time?

The U.S. has no business in trying to be a major influence in the peace plans for the Middle East unless they are asked to by a country that is directly affected.






Response:



Instructor Evaluation

A new process for student Feedback on instruction has been developed.

The following schedules list the options available for both Instructors and students, if their interest or concern about the class or program.

1. This schedule is used whenever the Instructor wants to be informed on their progress. It is required twice a year.
2. This schedule is one that will be used if there are students complaints, or if the Program Head feels a need to request the feedback.
3. This form will be used for temporary or probationary Instructors to evaluate their progress.

4. This form will be used through the Continuing Education Department for their Instructors.

The new process of student feedback is one that will allow Instructors to evaluate themselves and find out if more than one student has the same concerns.

Future plans for the committee on this project are to develop a format for longitudinal analysis of quality of instruction, and to work on developing a Peer Education Team for Instructors, if there is concern and need for personal development.

ASET's Council decided last week to charge those E.T.T. applicants who have not been ASET student members a \$25 application fee as an incentive to belonging to the Society while at school.


Student members of ASET also qualify for a reduction in their annual membership dues when converting to E.T.T. status.

ACAC HOCKEY FINAL STARTS FRIDAY AT THE NAIT ARENA

The NAIT Oaks and the SAIT Trojans open up their best of five ACAC final series at the NAIT Arena on Friday night at 7:30 p.m. Game two goes on Saturday night also at 7:30 p.m.

In the quest for their tenth league title, the Oaks advanced to the final with a series sweep over the Mount Royal College Cougars. The Trojans moved into the final after upsetting the Red Deer College Kings in a best of three series that went the limit.

The last time NAIT and SAIT met in the ACAC final was in 1981-82 when the SAIT Trojans were defending national champions.

In game one of the NAIT-MRC series, the Oaks blasted the Mount Cougars 11-1 to take a 1-0 lead on Thursday, February 28th at the NAIT Arena in the best of three semi final.

The Oaks started the scoring barrage early as Mark Hilton netted his first of three with only 24 seconds gone in the game. By the end of the first the Oaks held a 4-0 advantage and by the end of the second the Oaks led by a 7-0 margin.

In addition to Hilton's hat trick, the Oaks received a two goal performance from Darren Perkins. Greg Geldart, Tim Murphy, Corey Hastman, Alex Bouma, Doug Wadlow, and Dale Dach rounded out the Oaks scoring. Greg Benson netted the lone Mount Royal goal with 2:05 left in the

contest.

In the Cougars crease, Buddy Brazier and Randy Beekhuizen teamed up to turn away 35 of 46 NAIT shots. In the Oaks net, Rob McKinley stopped 20 of 21 Mount Royal shots.

Referee Jim Otteson called a total of 39 penalties. NAIT received 13 minors, while Mount Royal received 17 minors, one match penalty, two ten misconducts, five game misconducts, and one gross misconduct.

In game two of the NAIT-MRC series, the Oaks defeated the Cougars 5-2 in Calgary on Saturday, March 2nd, to win the best of three 2-0.

NAIT's discipline and Mount Royal's lack of it played a key factor in the victory as the Oaks broke a 2-2 deadlock with powerplay goals

from Lonnie Spink and Darren Perkins in the first three minutes of the third while the Cougars were killing off a cross checking major penalty to Mark Greyeyes.

Randy Wong, Dean Beattie, and Scott Melnyk also tallied for the Oaks while Brian Bosch and Mark Greyeyes countered for the Cougars.

Outshooting the Cougars 37 to 33, the Oaks led 2-1 after the first but the two teams were tied at 2-2 heading into the final frame.

Netminders Ken Weiss of the Cougars and Alec Sheflo of the Oaks went the distance in their team's respective creases.

NAIT coach Rick Carriere spoke proudly of the team's performance. "From our goaltenders on out,

we made the simple, easy play and did not get into trouble on the ice. We pulled together as a team."

ON THE BENCH: In the other best of three series, the SAIT Trojans edged the Red Deer College Kings 3-2 in Red Deer on Thursday, February 28th. Red Deer then staved off elimination with a 4-2 victory over SAIT in Calgary on Saturday, March 1st. In the series finale on Sunday, March 3rd, the SAIT Trojans completed the upset with a 2-1 victory in Red Deer. Center Greg Geldart, winger Ian McAmmond, and rearguard Randy Wong were selected as first team ACAC all stars this past week. Rearguard Jeff Wildeboer was named as a second team ACAC all star.



The NAIT Men's Basketball team will have to settle for an ACAC bronze medal, as they fell short in their bid to advance in the playoffs. The Ooks travelled to Lethbridge last weekend to play a best of three ACAC semi-final against the Lethbridge College Kodiaks and lost in consecutive games 76-74 and 68-64.

The evenly matched series was not without controversy. In Friday's game with the score tied 74-74 and one second left on the clock, Ooks forward Neil Vany was called for fouling a Kodiak player in the act of shooting some 80 feet from the basket. The player was awarded 3 free throws and made two of three to steal the victory. The loss marred an outstanding performance by the Ooks who shot an incredible 60% in making 12, three point baskets. Rob Hansuk led all scorers in the game with 23 points while Neil Vany chipped in with 11 points.

The Ooks did bounce back on Saturday with a great overall effort, playing some outstanding team defense, and had a shot to win the game with five seconds left. The shot went in and out

and the Ooks then fouled and the Kodiaks made the free throws to win by four points. Once again the Ooks hit extremely well from three point land, hitting for 11, three point baskets. Rob Hansuk had 17 points to lead NAIT in scoring while Norm Barthel added 10 points.

Although the Ooks lost the series, they did play some of their best basketball of the season. Dramatically over-matched in terms of size, NAIT held its own on the boards and shot the ball extremely well. While the team did not advance to the ACAC finals they can certainly hold their heads high with the effort they put in this season.

This weekend when the Oaks battle the Trojans, the student body of NAIT has the






Cabaret Reviews

This movie opens Friday, March 8, 1991. If you see only one movie this year, make it "Blood Clan".

This turn of the century gothic thriller was filmed in Edmonton, Alberta in March of 1990.

This is about the story of Katy Bane (Michelle Little), a Scottish orphan brought to Canada following the court-ordered execution of her family. When local villagers begin to die under mysterious circumstances, rumours about the Bane clan resurface and Katy must defend herself against accusations of murder.

On a barren Scottish heath in 1895, the last of the notorious Bane family, a clan of barbarians, is tracked down and brought to cruel, swift justice. Intended to rid the world forever from the depraved clan, the order to hang them is brought about by Judge William McKay (Gordon Pinsent). McKay, however, cannot ignore the look of forlorn despair from four year old Katy Bane, who has been orphaned by his decree. He rescues her, but is forced to move her and his family to Canada for a new start far away from the lingering horrors and

superstitions surrounding the Bane family.

Thirteen years later, Judge McKay, his wife (Anne Mansfield), and two daughters are settled on a farm in a remote Alberta prairie community, where the Judge has a law practice. Suddenly, a series of gruesome murders rocks their small farm town. Despite the protests of both the Judge and his handsome law clerk (Robert Wisden), Katy becomes a prime suspect.

The cast consists of Canadian actors, actresses, and a Canadian writer/producer Glynis Whiting.

Many of you will remember Michelle Little from her roles in such films as *My Demon Lover*, *Radioactive Dreams*, and *Out of Bounds*. Little gives a star performance as Katy Bane.

Robert Wisden, a St. Albert native, stars as the handsome and charming law clerk who comes to Katy's "rescue". Wisden has appeared in the action/thriller *Fiercibird 2015*, the *Fight For Life*, and *Glory Enough For All*. virtually the same; hardcore, blatant and excessive. As usual Stone goes beyond the audiences' expectations (judging by the complete and utter silence in the theatre).



Caulfield is remembered for his role as Miles in the short lived television series "The Colbys" and his parts in such movies as "Grease 2" and "The

Caulfield gives a chilling performance as an 18-year-old youth, who through Babs' influence commits a murder for the sake of committing a murder.

Although the play flips between past and present, it keeps us in total suspense until the end as to what really happened/or how it happened.
