

## RTA TEST CALLED UNFAIR

Radio and Television Arts admission policy for handicapped people is inconsistent and selectively discriminatory, so charges an Edmonton woman, Laurie Slipchuk.

Slipchuk, who lives in a power wheelchair, was first turned down by RTA in 1987. Yet after being refused this year, Slipchuk appealed.

Slipchuk's academic qualifications and volunteer experience greatly exceeded the criteria set. RTA requires high school level English, math and social studies. Slipchuk has her social studies, a strong mark of 77 percent in English and a university level math class.

Furthermore, Slipchuk has experience volunteering over three summers with production companies like Shaw Cable, Videotron and the now defunct Randy Lennon Productions.

However, despite all her qualifications, RTA had some questions as to Slipchuk's physical capability to complete the course. At RTA's request, Slipchuk agreed to go through a series of tasks to test the physical capacity.

Slipchuk admits that she was "slow" in doing many of the tasks, yet she says that this test was so grossly unfair that it betrayed its real purpose, that is to serve as a basis of justifying her earlier rejection.

Slipchuk claims that without any instruction or warnings of the dangers she was to thread tape through a

reel to reel machine as part of the test. Slipchuk was unable to complete the task, but she says that her failure was due to the lack of instruction and not from physical inability. Threading the reel to reel is part of the RTA curriculum and is not required knowledge for entrance.

Other tests bordered on the ridiculous, says Slipchuk. From her wheelchair she was asked to bring down some compact disks from a shelf nearly six feet high.

Slipchuk also says that RTA had promised that an occupational therapist would be present during the test. However, a therapist was not there to advise Slipchuk on different methods to accomplish tasks. Nor did RTA have any special equipment present, like a grasping stick, to aid her.

RTA Program Head Jim Herron refused comment on the issue.

The NAIT Vice President of Student and Staff Services, Jim Berg, says that Administration and RTA is reconsidering the fairness of the test.

Berg admits that because the therapist was not present at the test, "there is some need that we review the tests carefully and insure that we have to most capable people there to make sure they are fair."

Berg says that the test was designed to reflect "the common things required in a television or radio studio". RTA must know a student's capabilities beforehand so as not to "build any false

expectations that we cannot deliver on".

Nevertheless, Slipchuk says she is convinced that she is physically capable of completing the course and is mystified that while she was refused, RTA has accepted a man who is both a parapalegic and an amputee. Nor was the test applied to another handicapped woman in RTA.

"To me, this is blatant discrimination," says Slipchuk. She believes that her rejection was based on a personality conflict with RTA and the test served only as a rational for refusing her.

Berg categorically denies that the test was designed to reject Slipchuk. He says that NAIT does not "set up tests for anyone to fail".

Slipchuk also claims that Service to Disabled Students did little or nothing to advocate her candidacy. No one offered or seemed willing to try to accomodate her special needs, says Slipchuk.

Dr. Shirley Kabachia of Service to Disabled Students was not available for comment.

RTA and NAIT Administration are planning to have an occupational therapist determine the

fairness of the test. They have also offered to give Slipchuk the the same test again with an occupational therapist present. However, Slipchuk has refused. She says that she will not "jump through any more of RTA's hoops". She believes that NAIT would again use these tests to simply rationalize RTA's previous decision.

Slipchuk says that this whole experience has left her "degraded and demoralized". However, she has hired a lawyer to take the issue to the Human Rights Commission and vows to fight until her "right to an education" is recognized.

Who will suffer in the end? Everyone, including Audrey Jensen.

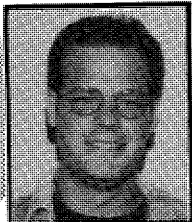

## Time For ACTISEC To Grow Up

If all goes as it should, the Alberta College and Technical Institute Student Executive Council (ACTISEC) will hike its fees in a long overdue effort to become a full-fledged student lobby group.

ACTISEC represents some 50,000 students in small colleges and technical institutes, including all students here at NAIT.

Presently, ACTISEC fees are at the nominal level of thirteen cents per full-time student. However, if ACTISEC has its way, full-time students will be paying two dollars each for its services.

This seems like a large increase, yet when placed in the broader spectrum of the \$95 NAITSA fees we all pay, two dollars is almost insignificant.

Furthermore, the recent rise of special interest group politics in Alberta and shrinking education budgets has made a student lobby group an absolute necessity.

Students should not be too put out by giving two dollars to a group that will fight for student benefits like tax breaks and lower interest rates on provincial student loans. If, every year, only one petition is accepted, students could expect much more than their money is worth.

However, although the principle is sound, there are some debatable fine points. Hopefully, General Council, who have yet to pass the proposal, will consider if the new full-time chair is worth the \$1500 per month plus housing to "oversee the office and have the researcher accountable" and "provide a channel to coordinate information requests." Conversely, is \$18,000 to \$20,000 enough to hire a competent researcher?

All NAIT students are represented in General Council by their technology representative. So, if you have an opinion or want more information, find out who your tech rep is and let him or her know. The proposal is not written in stone and could be passed with amendments, so it's well worth your while to air your opinions or even go down to General Council at H-005 this Tuesday at 4:30 and ask a few questions.

They are spending your money, so you might as well find out how they're doing it.

# NAIT'S Career Fair Has Something Different

"As well, the new name more accurately reflects the purpose of the event, which is to enable students to explore their career options."

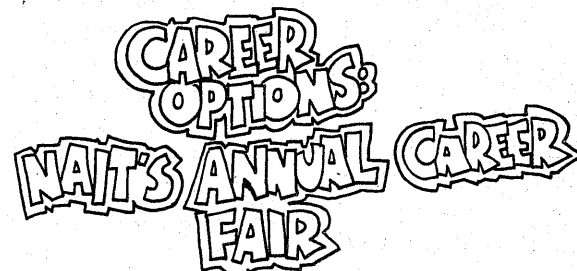
"Things that people who have been in the workforce

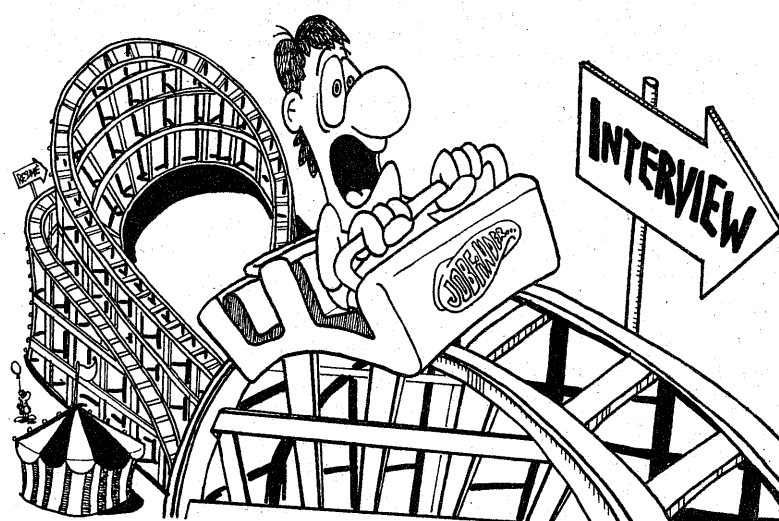

## Speakers Tell Students To Get Involved

Group action is the best way to make a difference in the environment. This was the message of the several featured speakers during NAIT Environment Action Week.

Tooker Gomburg, from the Eco City Society of Edmonton, told students that becoming educated about environmental issues and then getting involved is the best way to make a difference. The society hosts many live bands and social functions and Gomburg encourages students to come to these events and discuss environmental issues in a social atmosphere.

Dr. Ray Rassmussen from the University of Alberta encouraged students not to waste their years of post secondary education by only studying text books. He suggested students get involved with environment action groups and round out their education.

The speakers forum held in the Naitrium on the last day of the week featured Deryl Thompson from the City, Bill Carter from BFI and Maryann Walker from Imagination market.

Thompson listed some of the environmental programs offered by the city. When questioned about composting for apartment dwellers he held up a pamphlet on red wiggler worms. "These worms will compost your trash with no odor," and Thompson added that even,

"Mayor Reimer has a worm compost farm in her office."

Bill Carter uncovered the mystery surrounding what happens to the trash Edmontonians sort into their blue boxes. Clear glass is powdered and used for lines on highways, plastics are melted down and reused and colored glass goes to a recycle plant in Calgary.

The pictures that have been shown on TV of warehouses of blue box items are no longer accurate according to Carter. "All of our materials are sorted and leave the warehouse within 48 hours of arrival."

Finally Walker spoke on the values of reusing. Imagination market takes products that are no longer usable for their original function and sells them for whatever the customers imagine they can use them for. Many of the products are

left overs from custom projects or out of date samples. "This year," says Walker, "all the decorations and gift wrap in Eatons Centre will be done by Imagination market. Calvin Klein products from Hold Renfrew will be wrapped in re-used material." In case you are thinking that the Obsession you buy for a loved one will be wrapped in the Sunday funnies think again.

"We hired top designers to come in and design and wrap these gifts. They will look classy, professional and be environmentally friendly," says Walker.

Communications Vice President Susanne Glenn said, "The week was a success. The speakers were informative and though I had hoped for more students to attend, I know the ones who did were more informed when they left."

The NAIT Ooks hockey team continued to be consistent at being inconsistent in a two game home stand with the Augustana University College Vikings. Despite, the lackluster effort, NAIT coach Perry Pearn recorded wins 399 and 400 of his college coaching career.

On Friday November 8th, at the NAIT Arena, the Ooks held on for a 4-3 victory over the Vikings.

In the first, the teams traded goals with Andre Legace giving the Vikings the lead with two NAIT players in the sin bin at 5:54 and Wayne MacDonald of the Ooks tying the game at 15:31.

In the second the Ooks dominated scoring three unanswered goals. Mark Souch tallied his fifth of the season at 1:26 to give the Ooks a one goal lead. The Ooks acquired a 3-1 advantage at the 4:25 mark when Mike Park pocketed his third of the campaign. The cushion increased to three goals on Souch's second of the evening with 8:55 gone in the period.

In the third, the Vikings came close to sending the game in overtime. Goals by Todd Forsyth at 1:20 and Kirk Humphreys at 18:28 set the stage for a nail biter in the 92 seconds of regulation.

Chad Bannister stopped 28 of 32 in the Augustana net while Alec Sheffo turned away 29 of 32 in the NAIT crease.

On Saturday, November 9th, the Ooks were not sharp but managed to score a 4-1 triumph over the Vikings.

In the first the Ooks acquired a 1-0 lead on Tim Murphy's third of the season with 13:22 elapsed in the frame.

In the second, the Ooks outshot the Vikings 27 to 5, yet surrendered the only goal of the period. Glen Sunderland of the Vikings tied the contest at 1-1 with 2:54 gone in the stanza.

In the third, the Ooks put some of the pieces together netting three goals. Jason Krueckl notched his eight of the season 12 seconds into the period on the powerplay putting the Ooks ahead 2-1. Wayne MacDonald scored his fifth of the campaign at 9:07 to give the Ooks a 3-1 advantage. Dean Beattie then tipped in his sixth of the season at 15:44 to seal the victory for the Ooks.

Brent Harden blocked 40 of 44 shots in the Vikings crease while Don Davidge stopped 22 of 23 shots in the NAIT net.

Though the Ooks are tied for the lead the ACAC with a record of six wins and one loss, the team knows they will have to up their game a notch against the Red Deer College Kings (6-1-0) this weekend. "We'll have to play a lot better to be successful," stated rookie rearguard Kyle Spencer. NAIT captain Greg Geldart echoed Spencer's thoughts.

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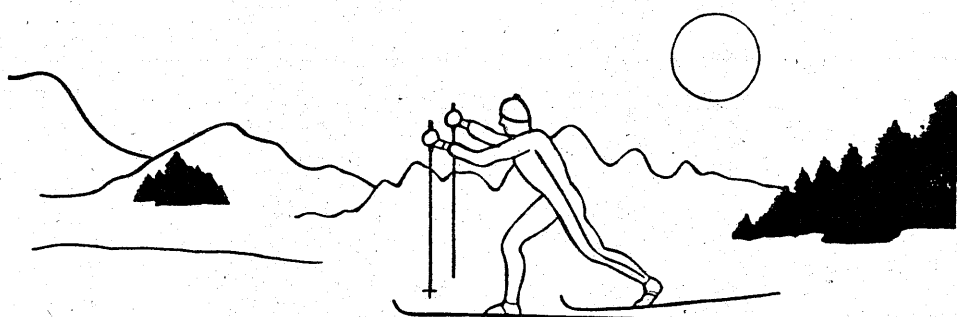


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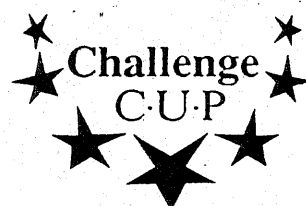

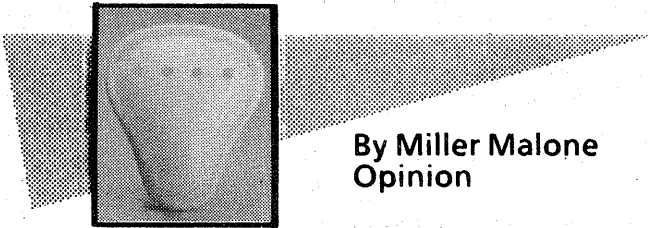

In the 60's they had some good ideas about peace and love, and freedom, but they neglected to come up with a better way.

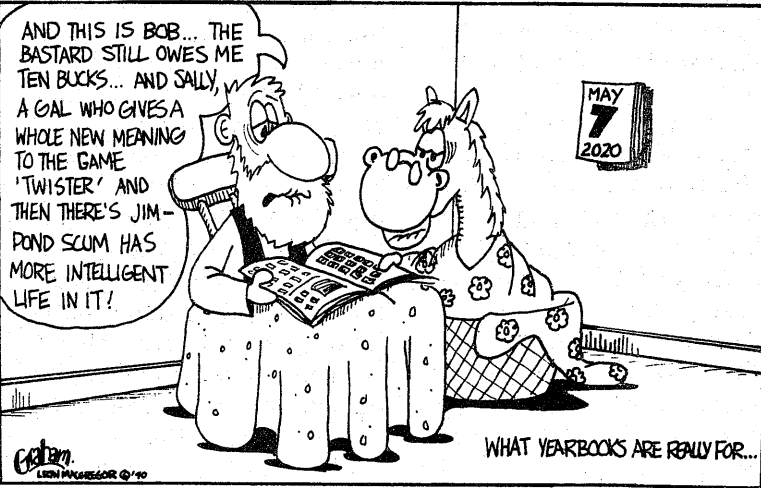
Saying that you must be free from something says to me that something is bad. It

I hope our generation has the work ethic of our grand parents, and social consciousness our parents believed they had in their youth, because there's an ozone hole that's waiting to define our generation.

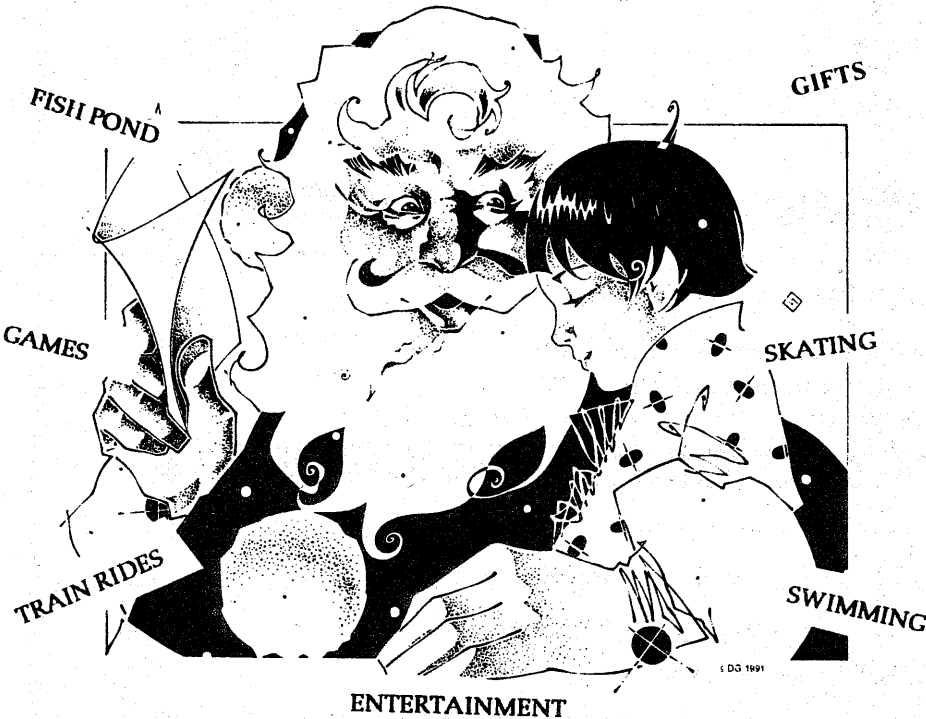

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# Van Halen The F.U.C.K. Show For Unlawful Carnal Knowledge

Hailed as the world's greatest rock band in the early 80's, the 1991 version of California's best musical export hit the Coliseum Saturday night for a concert that will stand as one of the finest rock shows in recent memory. Having seen Van Halen twice before, I had a pretty fair idea of what I was in store for. But the show still blew me (and thousands of others) away.

Starting off with the new monster single *Poundcake*, the band hit the stage amidst a blinding onslaught of lights and an enormous P.A. set up that threatened to loosen the rafters of buildings downtown.

The band was well rehearsed, and the music was so tight and flawless that only a band named Queensryche put on a better musical show lately.

The sound was surprisingly very clear for the number of amps and the volume. This was a definite plus. But what caused the biggest buzz among the crowd was the mere fact that Van Halen had finally returned. After a 7 1/2 year wait and the changing of lead singers, Edmonton finally demanded the prompt return of Van Halen. Even the "new" lead singer, Sammy Hagar, was treated as if he was there from the beginning.

Highlights also include the songs *Runaround*, *When it's Love*, *Only One Way to Rock*, and *I can't drive 55*; (the last two being thundering versions of old Sammy Hagar classics.)

Probably the most anticipated point of the concert was the guitar solo. Eddie Van Halen has been the most influential guitarists in the world in the last 13 years. His unique style has caused literally millions of aspiring guitarists to run to their instructors begging to be taught how to do the things Ed does. Combining speedy hell-bent guitar solos with intelligent cohesive chord phrasings has been Edward's trademark for years, and nobody does it better.

The solo began with the beautifully melodic *3:16*, then progressed to a medley of some of the more memorable guitar licks Eddie has had. And the two best and well-known of his instrumentals *Cathedrals* and especially *Eruption* were also included.

There was a low point in this show, and unfortunately it had to do with Sammy Hagar. Or rather, his voice and the lack of it. At times he would sing rather well and other times he hardly registered above a whisper. But such are the perils of global touring.

All in all, I am going to state that the absolute highlight of the concert was a song the band hasn't played live since the 1984 World Tour. The band performed an amazing version of *Jump* and the audience was quite shocked at the inclusion of it in the concert.

Eddie, Alex Van Halen, and Michael Anthony comprise the best group of background singers in any hard rock band, bar none. Michael Anthony, in particular, could be a competent lead singer in almost any other band.

Huge stage, huge light show, great tunes, high energy; these phrases have defined Van Halen concerts for years, and they still apply today. If you missed the show and enjoy any of their music, I pity you. It was incredible!

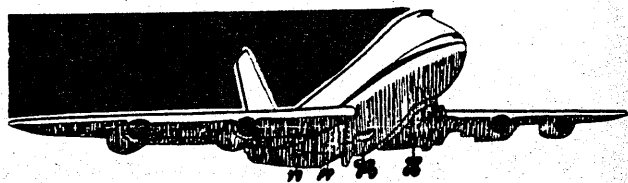

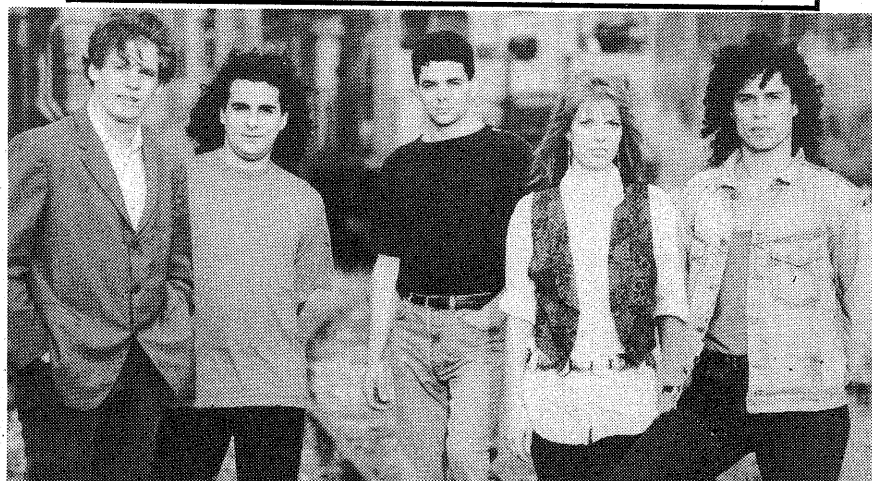
