GREENER CURRICULUM NEEDED

There should be a much "greater environmental focus in post-secondary institutions" like NAIT, says Susanne Glenn, NAITSA Communications V.P. and delegate to the Canadian University Students Environment Network conference in Waterloo last week.

The problem with the present curriculum is that "students are not getting a wide enough perspective" says Glenn. While students may be given an understanding of production, they are relatively unaware of the environmental aspects of their technology.

Glenn says that technologies like Plastics and Computer Systems do a good job recycling. Yet, a technology like Business, which ultimately has the most potential to affect the environment, virtually ignores the environmental aspects of business. For

example, Business concentrates on the financial advantages of mass production and discounts the ensuing environmental damage.

Glenn admits that making money is what business is all about yet, she asks, "Why not try to make a socially conscious dollar?"

Further examples that Glenn gives include Cooking. She would like to see students learn about the environmental effects of food production. Cooking students should be aware of cattle's effect on the ozone layer or how the purchase of cashews and brazil nuts help save the rain forest.

Glenn doubts that NAIT as an institution has considered bringing in an environmental curriculum. However, NAIT is a member of the Association of Canadian Community Colleges (ACCC) and they "do realize this has to be done" and "probably in five to eight years it will be instituted."




moderation as opposed to excess.

A Sheep in Wolf's Clothing

It has been a peculiar year for the United Nations. It opened the year with an uncharacteristic flexing of its muscle in the Middle-East, liberating Kuwait from its Iraqi conquerors. Yet, as the year draws to a close, the Yugoslavian civil war has shown the U.N. to be back to its normal impotent self.

Why is it that the U.N. was so determined to stand up for Kuwaiti aristocrats and will do nothing for Yugoslavians except declare one ineffectual cease fire after another?

Kuwait was a case of Iraqi interests against those of the rest of the world. The thought of so much of the world's oil in the hands of an extremely unpredictable man combined with the fall of Soviet power provoked the U.N. to stop Iraq's international aggression.

However, the aggression in Yugoslavia is not international but internal. This is an immeasurable distinction for most member countries of the U.N., including Canada. Proponents of this policy warn that if the U.N. gets involved in ethnic conflicts in Yugoslavia, they will soon be committed all over the globe, especially with the looming possibilities of ethnic wars in the Soviet Union. Yet, during the Persian Gulf War, the U.N. seemed almost self-righteous in defending the right of self-determination and maintaining the peace everywhere.

During the Persian Gulf War, the U.N. showed promise evolving into an institution with real power and real principles. Yet, with each passing day that the U.N. refuses to send in peace keeping troops, more Yugoslavians are killed and the U.N. ebbs further back to its old position, bound by its members' hypocritical self-interest.

Designated Drinkers

How much can you drink before your reactions are significantly slowed?

This was the question posed by Constable Meads of the Edmonton Police Service at "How Much is Too Much" last Friday in the Nest and with the help of Brenda Powis of CST and Colin Porowski of Marketing as the "Designated Drinkers", he intended to prove that the answer is a definite "not very much."

Before the participants started drinking, they were run through a battery of tests. They had to walk down a balance beam, then read a public announcement to the crowd and execute a test in which they were to grab a falling pole as fast as they could.

When the tests were finished, the real fun began. Based on their weight, Porowski and Powis were given the equivalent of seven and six drinks respectively and forty minutes to drink them. Neither were told how much alcohol they were to consume.

While the drinkers drank, Activities V.P., Darren Stepanik, questioned the spectators on their alcohol knowledge. A few interesting facts came out. For example, alcohol affects women taking oral contraceptives for roughly double the normal period. Also, if a driver fails a roadside co-ordination test, regardless of his blood alcohol level he could be charged with impaired driving.

After the forty minutes Powis and Porowski were again put through the tests. On the balance beam Powis looked stable yet Porowski was a little shaky. However, during the public announcement, Powis faltered a few times but, Porowski actually seemed to improve. The pole drop showed that Powis' reactions

slowed thirteen percent while Porowski slowed only a Johnny Fever-ish three percent!

Constable Meads warned that after forty minutes, alcohol is just beginning to have its effects as it moves into the bloodstream. Someone may be under the .08 percent legal limit, yet ten minutes later, without taking another drink, he could be legally impaired.

At the test's conclusion everyone had a greater appreciation of just how difficult it is to judge one's impairment level. The agreement seemed to be that to "know when to put a lid of it" when driving means being very cautious indeed.

OOKS Take Two From Cougs

In Calgary, the NAIT Ooks (10-1-0) swept a weekend series from the Mount Royal College Cougars (3-5-0) to maintain a four point lead over the Red Deer College Kings (8-3-0) who also won both games of a set with Augustana (1-7-0) this past week.

On Saturday, November 23rd, the Ooks and the Cougars hooked up in a shootout at Centennial Arena with NAIT scoring a 10-7 win.

In the first, the Ooks acquired an early advantage on goals by Brent Harden at 2:58 and Greg Geldart at 6:19. Dean Dorchak of MRC then found the mark at 10:50 before the Ooks responded with markers from Wayne MacDonald at 13:33 and Darren Perkins at 18:27.

In the second, the goals were not an endangered species. Dean Dorchak brought Mount Royal to within two at 1:22 only to have NAIT's Darren Perkins reinstate the two goal lead two minutes later. In the next twenty seconds, the teams exhanged markers with Al Wonitowy scoring for MRC and Darren Perkins replying for NAIT. At the 8:08 mark, Wayne

MacDonald gave NAIT a 7-3 advantage only to have Jason Dunham cut the lead to 7-4 at the 9:34 mark. The Ooks then acquired a 9-4 lead before period's end on Mark Souch's tally at 10:20 and Darren Perkins' marker at 16:21.

In the third, the Cougars rallied back on goals by Trevor Pohl at 1:01 and Bob Rutz at 11:23. Mark Souch then lifted the Ooks into double digits at 13:13 before MRC's Jason Dunham rounded out the scoring at 14:51.

Don Davidge turned away 25 of 32 shots in the NAIT net while Ken Weiss and Curtis Hoople blocked 45 of 55 shots in the Mount Royal crease.

On Sunday, November 24th, the Ooks shelled the Cougars 10-2.

In the first, Darren Perkins started things off for NAIT with his fifth goal of the series at 4:18. MRC's Brian Benson tied the contest at 1-1 with 8:46 gone in the period. The Ooks then went ahead to stay on goals by Mike Park at 12:47 and Darren Perkins at 19:15.

In the second, Wayne Manley gave the Ooks a 4-1 advantage before Trevor Pohl scored for the Cougars 11:09. Jason Krueckl of NAIT scored the Ooks fifth marker at 17:09.

In the third, the Ooks tallied five unanswered goals. Dale Dach, Wayne MacDonald, Mike Park, Mark Souch, and Greg Geldart all found the mark to seal the Ooks 10th win of the season.


Alec Sheflo stopped 23 of 25 shots in the NAIT crease while Ken Weiss and Curtis Hoople redirected 43 of 53 while guarding the MRC net

The special teams played well with the Ooks racking up seven powerplay goals and two shorthanded markers on the weekend.

Offensively, Darren Perkins led NAIT with six goals and three assists. Perkins had the potential to rack up more points in game two but left near the midway point with an injury.

In exhibition college hockey action at the NAIT Arena, the Ooks will entertain the Briercrest Clippers of Caronport, Saskatchewan on Friday, November 29th at 7:30 p.m and on Saturday, November 30th at 2:30 p.m. The Ooks will resume regular season action on Sunday, December 1st when they host the Grande Prairie Regional College Wolves (0-10-0)in a p.m match-up. Admission is free to NAIT students and staff.

The NAIT men's volleyball team traveled down to Olds this past Friday night, and managed to chalk up their second win of the season, winning three games to one.


