## OOKS NOW 5 AND 1

For the third straight weekend, the Oaks scored a victory over a team from the Canada West. The Oaks now have a record of 5 wins and 1 loss against teams from the Canada West and a 9 and 1 mark overall in preseason.

The Oaks swept a pair of games from the University of Manitoba Bisons at the NAIT Arena. The Oaks downed the Bisons 5-2 on Saturday and 5-3 on Sunday. The Oaks had opened the weekend with a 6-2 triumph over the Augustana University College Vikings (formerly Camrose Lutheran) on Friday in Camrose.

On Sunday, the Oaks acquired a 4-0 lead and hung on for 5-3 win over the Bisons.

In the first, the Oaks jumped out in front at 8:12 as

Greg Geldart scored shorthanded. Wayne MacDonald then doubled the Oaks advantage to 2-0 at 12:39. Geldart then netted a powerplay goal at 16:11 to give NAIT a three goal cushion.

In the second, the teams traded powerplay markers. NAIT acquired a 4-0 lead on Craig Hawryschuk's tally at 9:09. Manitoba's Riley Saunders then narrowed the gap to three with 84 seconds left in the frame.

In the third, the Bisons drew to within one at 9:16 as Dennis Martin scored 22 seconds after teammate Greg Cheyne. NAIT's Kevin Lovig iced the victory as he scored with the man advantage at 14:28.

Alec Sheffo blocked 24 of 27 shots in the NAIT net. Lauren Belland stopped 20 of 25 in the U of M crease.

On Saturday, the Oaks

scored a pair of shorthanded goals en route to a 5-2 victory over the Bisons.

Mike Park tallied twice for the Oaks while Dean Beattie, Greg Geldart, and Craig Hawryschuk added singles. Kevin Barrett and Kyle Galloway replied for the Bisons.

Outshooting the Bisons 35-30, the Oaks held period leads of 2-1 and 4-1. Alec Sheffo went all the way in the NAIT net.

On Friday, the Oaks skated to a 6-2 decision over the Augustana University College Vikings.

Mark Souch and Brad Faills each pocketed a pair for the Oaks while Greg Geldart and Wayne MacDonald rounded out the NAIT scoring.

Don Davidge and Chuck Edwards shared the NAIT netminding duties as the Oaks outshot the Vikings 30 to 22. The Oaks led 2-1 at the end of 20 minutes and 4-2 at the end of 40.

### Syncrude Turns Down NAITSA

Communications Vice President Susanne Glenn had to unexpectedly ask General Council to fund the Environmental Action Week (November 4-8) after private funding fell through at the last minute.

Last year, the NAIT Foundation gave a loan to buy shirts and reusable cups that were resold to students. The items sold well and the money was later repayed.

However, this year NAITSA did not request a loan from the NAIT Foundation. Glenn reasons that this year, NAIT is "tapped" and "we need to find outside sources" of revenues. "We can't be running to (NAIT) everytime we need money," says Glenn.

Glenn applied for private funding from Syncrude, an environmentally sensitive oil company developing the

Fort McMurray tar sands, on June 2nd.

Unfortunately, on October 2nd, Syncrude turned down NAITSA's request saying that all their private citizen funding has recently been shifted to the newly created Alberta Ecotrust Foundation. Their applications for funding will not be available until January.

As a result, Glenn had to obtain a motion from General Council approving the \$3,400 to buy the shirts and coffee cups.

When asked why she asked only one company for funding, Glenn said that Syncrude is a "reliable source" and that she "really felt" she would get the required revenue.

Glenn nevertheless remains confident that NAITSA will eventually get its funding from the new Ecotrust Foundation that will cover any losses incurred during the week.

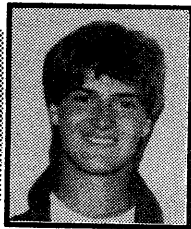

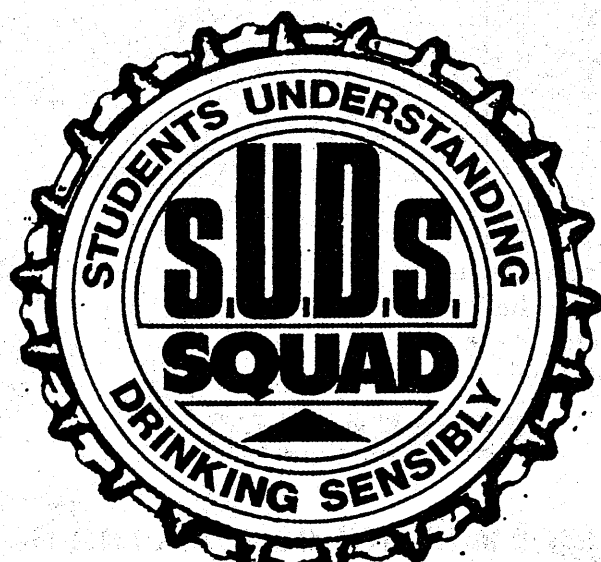

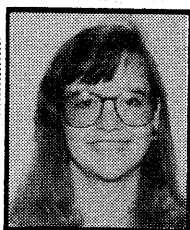

# Alberta on the Right Path

Last week, Attorney General Ken Rostad named Thomas Goodson as Alberta's first native judge.

An appointment like this has been far overdue. There is little doubt that aboriginals often suffer from a systematic discrimination in the Canadian justice system. One only has to point to examples like Donald Marshall, and here in Alberta, Willie Nepoose to see that the courts could, at the very least, be more thorough in their dealings with natives.

This view is shared by Justice Alan Cawsey who recommended in a report to the government earlier this year, greater aboriginal involvement in administering justice. He told The Journal that he wants "as many aboriginal people as possible" to be appointed judges.

Some will argue that this approach is mere tokenism. Clearly, the bench is no place for someone without adequate qualifications. Nevertheless, it's obvious that the status quo cannot remain. Purportionally, natives in Alberta make up 31.1 percent of the prison population, while being only four to five percent of the general population. So, unless we want to continue to support an expensive and overloaded prison system, alternatives must be found.

More qualified native judges would show mere understanding of aboriginal's socio-economic background. Furthermore, greater contact and socializing among native and white judges could go a long way towards mitigating the latest racism that exists in Canadian society.

Many natives feel that the Canadian law is just a mere reflection of white justice and for all intents and purposes, they are right. In this country, whites both make and enforce the law. Unless more natives are encouraged to help administer the law, it will continue to be viewed as alien, and far too many natives will spend time in jail.

You could literally feel the political power pulsating deep in the bowels of NAIT as the General Council met again for its bi-monthly meeting.

Activities Vice President Darren Stepanik opened the meeting asking Council to rescind their motion of last week to restrict all technologies to only using NAITSA security staff for their functions.

Stepanik said that a lot of technologies have been complaining about the cost.

With very little discussion the motion passed unanimously but was quickly followed by another motion that "strongly recommend" that techs use NAITSA security.

NAITSA President Chris Horne then asked Council for a motion allocating \$911.14 to send Administrative Vice President Annette Sarauer to the National Conference of Student Services in Florida. This is where many North America colleges get together to share information and put on seminars. Like past

NAITSA Presidents, Horne will be attending this year, yet he has reports from people who have gone, stating that there is far too much information for one person to assimilate. Furthermore, this conference is especially important because as Horne states, there is "a lot of information that's hard to get on the Canadian scene."

After an uncomfortable hesitation, a motion was put forward and the funds were approved.

Communications Vice President Susanne Glenn asked for some emergency funding for Environment Action Week. Private funding fell through at the last minute and a \$3,400 loan was needed for guest speakers and to buy shirts and reuseable coffee cups that will later be sold. Glenn expects a loss of \$275.

After looking at some environment-friendly overheads (no tree killing photocopies here!), the motion was approved.

With that, the shortest meeting of the year was adjourned and Council members filed up the stairs to the light of day.

The Men's team had their best results of the season, with the team finishing fourth behind Mount Royal, Lethbridge, and Red Deer.

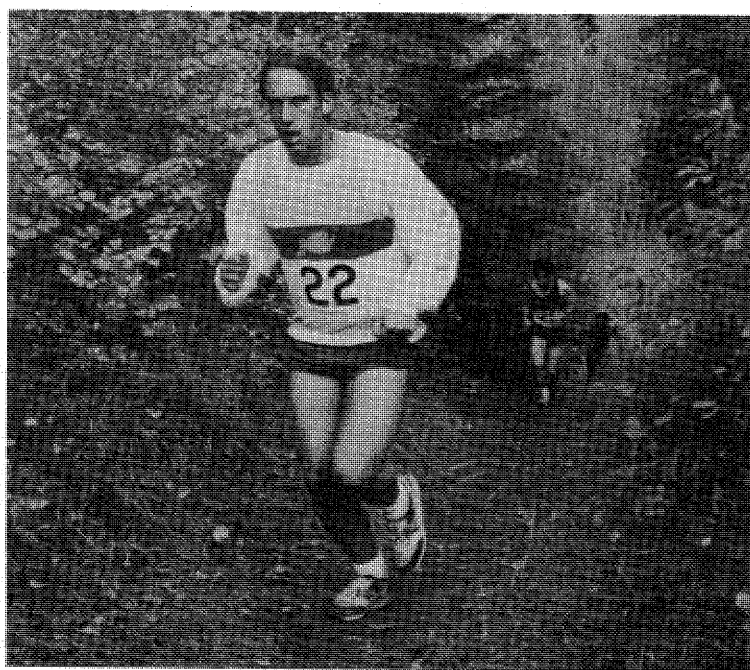

On Saturday October 19th, the Ooks participate in the ACAC Cross-Country Championships hosted by Keyano College in Fort McMurray.



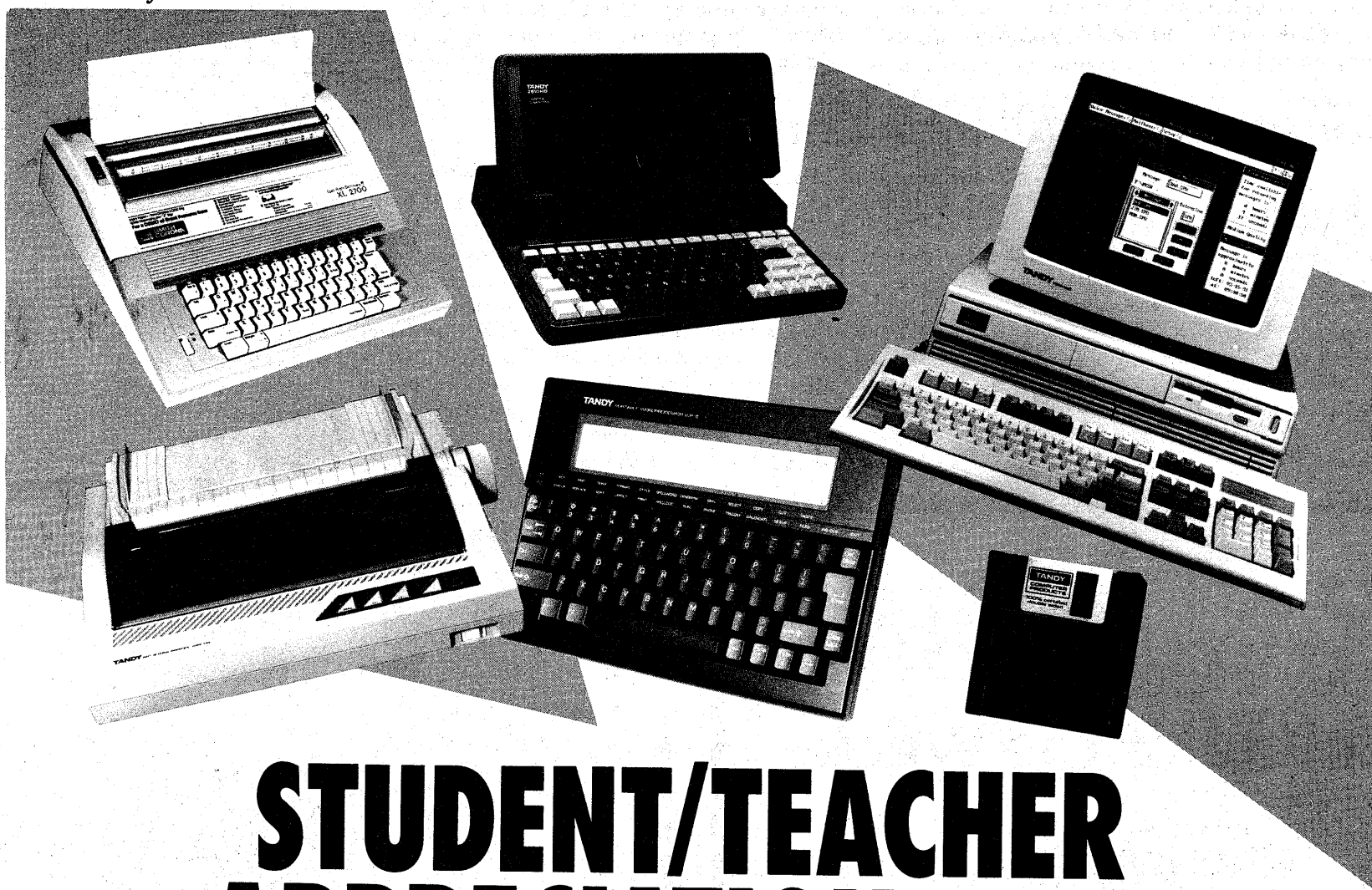
## Curling Club Starts Up

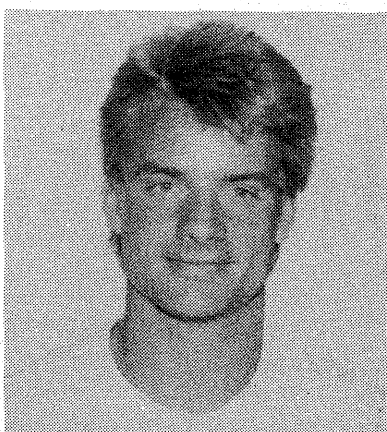
not been impressive over the last few years and the Ti-Cats may be on their ninth life.

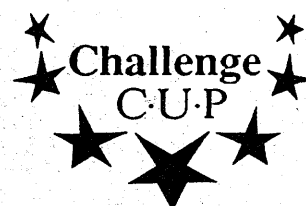
Dave is an aggressive midfield player who follows the saying, "Never Say Die". Because of this, he has been a great inspiration to his teammates.

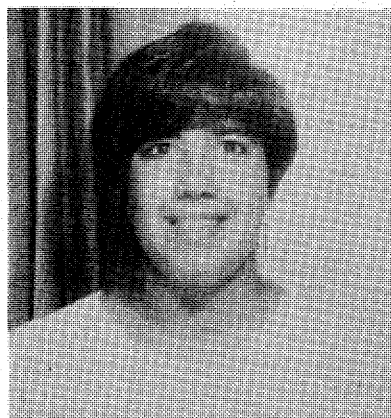

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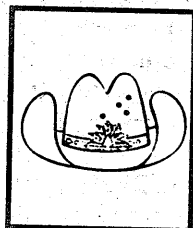
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# Nightmare at Bank Machine

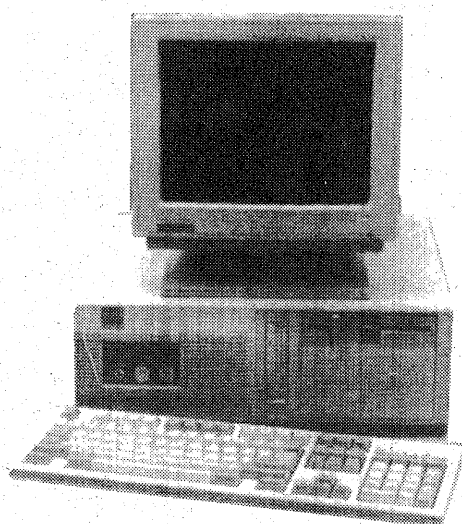
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Music Review

Barton Fink: Uncommonly Good

"Barton Fink" is the latest offering from Joel and Ethan Coen whose previous works consist of quality films like "Miller's Crossing" and "Raising Arizona".

The setting is Hollywood in the early 1940's where an earnest playwright, Barton Fink, played by John Turturro, has just moved to write for the pictures after a successful stint on Broadway.

Yet, despite his success, Barton is determined to maintain his links with the "common man" that he writes about and he checks into a decidedly working class hotel. It's here that Barton writes his first assignment for the studio which is, of all things, a wrestling movie.

While struggling with a huge case of writers block, Barton meets his neighbour,

an amiable and outgoing salesman named Charlie Meadows (John Goodman).

Yet, despite Barton's claims of champion the "common man", his condescending towards Charlie is clear. What makes it even more ironic is the obvious fact that Charlie is full of the one thing Barton needs: stories.

Barton Fink is a movie about maturing. Barton arrives in Hollywood a naive idealist, but by the end all his illusions are wiped clean and he begins to live in the real world. Barton owes this transformation not to the experienced but to drunkard fellow writer W.P. Mayhew (John Mahoney).

Like "Miller's Crossing", the plot is constantly tossing and turning. Almost everything that happens seems unexpected, sometimes challenging the borders of realism.

The only strong criticism of "Barton Fink" is that it ends somewhat unresolved. Some people like that.

Turturro is masterful. An audience could easily come to dislike Barton, especially early in the movie, but he never lets this happen.

John Goodman puts in his best performance to date in a role that was created just for him.

The film is full of hilarious characters of 40's style movie moguls that on their own are almost worth the price of admission.

There are no car chases in "Barton Fink". There are no Schwartzenegger-esque one liners and only a sit of gore. So, if you're looking for a typical movie, don't go to Barton Fink. Barton Fink is an extraordinary movie in all senses of the word.

Barton Fink has won awards for Best Actor and Best Director award at the Cannes Film Festival and is now playing at the Eaton Cinemas.

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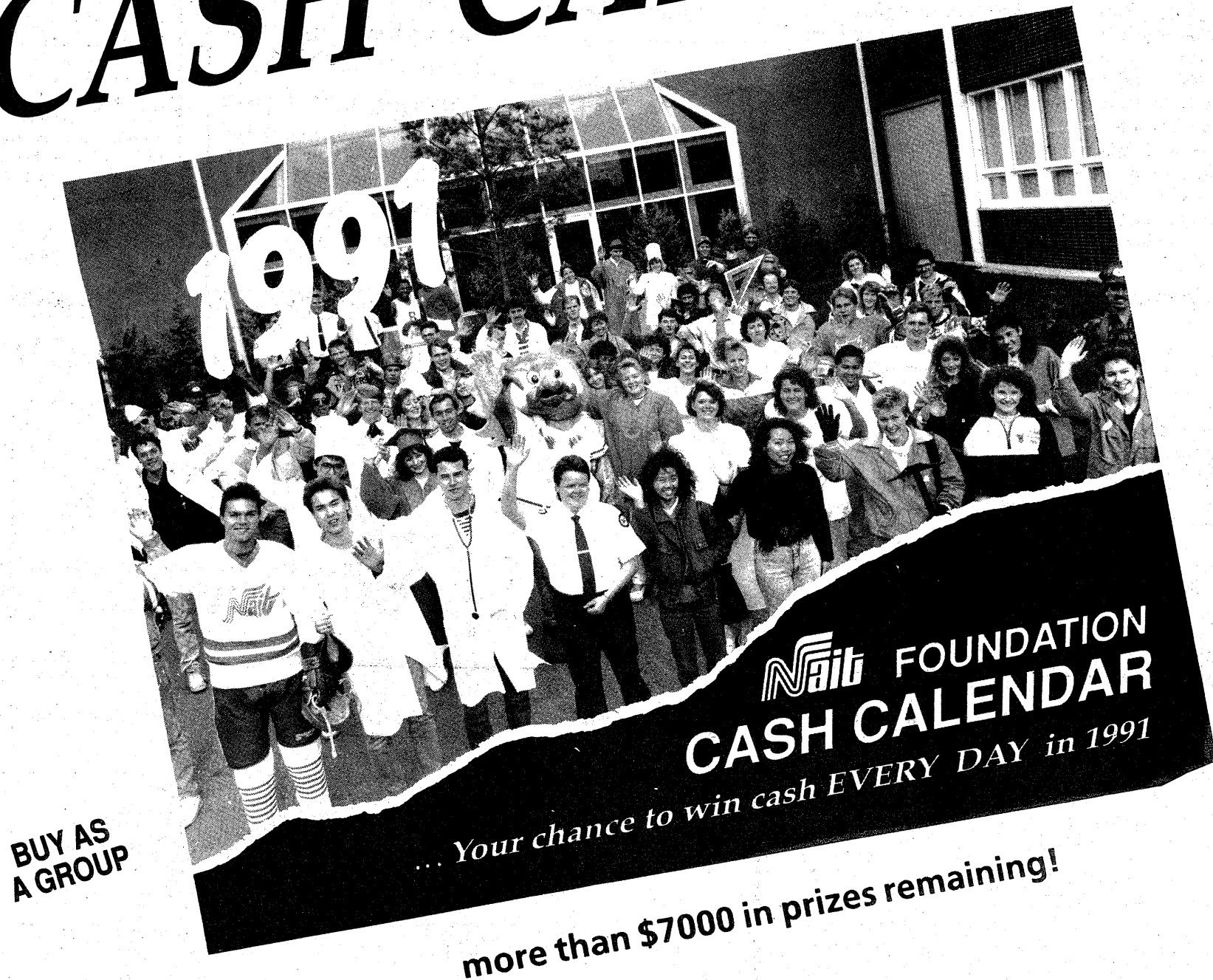

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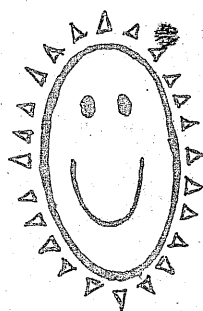
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
