New Plan for Technology Education

The provincial government will be putting much more emphasis on career and technology programs according to Alberta Education's new plan, "Vision for the Nineties".

The study outlines proposed changes to the high school curriculum in Alberta designed to better prepare

students for the workplace of the next century.

The government plans to highlight such classes as Vocational Education, Industrial Arts, Home Economics and Business Education. It hopes that greater emphasis will translate into more technology students to help meet the projected demand for highly skilled labour in the 1990's.

Scott Day, the Assistant Director of Curriculum for Alberta Education says that demand for technology students is about to "take off".

Day says that he would like to see more university students consider technical institutes because that is, "where (students) are getting jobs."

There is a "strong and long standing relationship

between business and tech schools," states Day. This is not always the case with universities where students often graduate without the degree of specialization needed by employers.

Day believes that the future enrollment at schools like NAIT will greatly increase due to students heightened technological backgrounds.

Furthermore, Day says that if the plan is implemented, future high school students could expect a better opportunity to qualify for, or even get, advanced placement, at technical institutes.

The plan is to be discussed in a series of communities across the province.

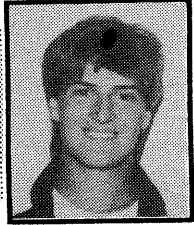

Fear and Loathing in Canadian Politics

Here we go again. A year and a half after the Meech Lake Accord failed, the federal government has initiated yet another round of discussions in order to find a constitutional consensus for Canada.

As always, the proposals that deal with the relationship between English Canada and Quebec are the most controversial. There is anything but a consensus on Quebec's role in Confederation. Is Quebec simply another province or is it "distinct" with a special duty to promote the French language and culture?

Many English-speaking Canadians will again argue against the proposed clause that, like in Meech Lake, would recognize Quebec as a "distinct" province in Canada. They assert that such a proposal would put Quebec at the top of a hierarchy of Canadian provinces. Such an attitude, while noble in its concern for equality, really portrays an antipathy towards Quebec and belies a profound distrust of Quebecers.

One must realize that French-speaking Quebecers have a very strong fear of cultural assimilation. Demographic studies have not borne this fear out showing that French in Quebec is stronger than ever. Yet, as any politician will tell you, in politics, reality means nothing and perception is everything.

In response to perceptions, Quebec politicians have turned to legislation that will establish Quebecers'

Why Another Mall?

Sometimes I really question City Council's decisions. It seems like all they are interested in is big business and not the people who elected them to council. A good example of this is occurring between council and some very upset North-East Edmonton residents.

Residents around the area of 137 Avenue and Fort Road (Manning Drive) are upset because of the sale of the land that once housed St. Mary's Salesian School. The Salesian Father's of Alberta recently closed the school due to low enrollment and are looking to sell the six-hectare piece of land. Delcon Development Group has expressed a very strong interest in the land, and has proposed building a shopping centre.

Understandably the residents are very upset because there is a shopping mall directly across the street, and Londonderry Mall (only 10 blocks away) is expanding and renovating. There was a door-to-door campaign throughout the summer months in the neighborhood, and campaigners received over 1000 signatures of concerned residents.

A public hearing was held last week to look into the rezoning of the land in order for the mall to be built, and council chambers were filled by members of the community, showing true community dedication.

"Council gave first reading to the rezoning bylaw and then postponed further decision until December to give the community more time to work with the developer and the site's owners, the Salesian Fathers of Alberta."

communal right to live in a French environment over rights to express oneself in English. Bill 101, that restricts English signs, is a prime example of this. Nevertheless, it is important to note that despite their fears, Quebecers have consistently offered more minority language services than all other provinces except New Brunswick.

Those like Pierre Trudeau who will argue against the distinct society clause say that it will reaffirm communal rights over individual rights and only lead to more draconian legislation like the deportation of anglophones out of Quebec. I recognize that this is a possibility; about as possible as the sun not coming up tomorrow. Ironically, any deportation or other anti-anglophone legislation would be legal even now by simply evoking the "not withstanding" clause that Mr. Trudeau himself put in the constitution to get around those very individual rights that he professes to cherish.

Quebecers see the distinct society clause as recognition from English Canada of their right to live in French. The clause would give Quebec no more power than it already has. However, it would go a long way towards soothing English-French relations in Canada. Hopefully, once communal French language rights are recognized in Quebec, Quebecers will not be so quick to try to protect themselves with discriminatory legislation. However, if we don't recognize communal French language right, Quebec will continue to view English as a threat, leaving separation as the only logical alternative.

Locker Break-ins

Student's possessions are not as safe this year at NAIT than in years past.

This is reflected most recently by a series of locker break-ins in the E-wing area on October 7.

The padlocks on at least eight lockers were cut by bolt cutters and various items within the lockers were stolen.

Dick Maertens-Poole, the Manager of Safety and Security for NAIT, does not have many clues as to the thief's or thieves' identity. Yet, he suspects that "it is probably someone coming into the facility from outside."

Maertens-Poole says that the recent thefts are only part of an alarming trend.

So far this school year, there have been 25 locker break-ins as compared to 32 and 28 break-ins for the entire years of 1989-90 and 1990-1991 respectively

Maertens-Poole suggests a few crime prevention methods. Firstly, use a good lock. A lock that has a shorter or case hardened shackle is much more difficult for a potential thief to cut. The short locks have been used by Cooking technology students for the past year and have proved very secure. Unfortunately, these locks are not presently available at the bookstore, but they have been recently ordered.

Secondly, ensure that your locker is indeed locked. Maertens-Poole says that it is "fairly common" that thieves will check locks to see if the combination has been spun.

Thirdly, talk to strangers at NAIT. This will often deter potential thieves because they can now be identified.

If this doesn't work, report to security or an instructor.

NAITSA is looking into forming student-based patrols to help security keep an eye on student property.

This approach is endorsed by Maertens-Poole. Security cannot be everywhere, so students can help security by being more "aware of what's going on around them". Maertens-Poole hopes that this greater deterrence will translate into less crime at NAIT.

Here, NAIT will be competing in various singles, doubles and mixed events against Keyano College, Grande Prairie, Grant MacEwan and Red Deer.

The ACAC season will include a total of six league tournaments which then lead up to the National Championship, which will be held in mid-March.

The Oaks' team has been working hard since the beginning of the school term and as head coach Mark Bosworth points out, the team looks better than ever.

The high billing he gives this team comes as a result of NAIT acquiring some very talented badminton players over the past couple of years.

Shirley Mah is back for another season after reigning as NAIT's Female Athlete of the Year in 1990-91.

Mah is currently ranked sixth in the province by the Alberta Badminton Association and is considered to be the top female badminton player in the ACAC.

Joining Mah on the squad this year is first year business student, Karen Marner. Marner is a welcomed addition to the team, as she is ranked number four in the province by the Alberta Badminton Association.

The biggest change in team personnel will come next semester with Wang Wen coming over from Grant MacEwan College.

NAIT Golfers Finish Fourth

NAIT's '91 Golf team was comprised of six rookies during the September 28th ACAC Championship, which was played in Calgary. At best, it would become a tremendous chore to duplicate any of the previous three years accomplishments - two golds and one silver.

Confidently, the team felt they could play with anyone, but they miscalculated the caliber of play. In their defence, no one else visualized MRC and SAIT being so powerful in this championship.

The Cottonwood Golf Course, with its majestic valley layout, presented the ACAC golfers with a pleasant challenge. With no radical contouring and no artificial landscaping the 6747 yards from the black was a joy to play.

Perfect is the only way to describe the course and the weather. The conditions put the course at the mercy of the golfers. Martin Brown of MRC posted a

Jana Kolot became NAIT's first female golfer to participate in the ACAC Individual Ladies championship. She did extremely well, winning the bronze medal with rounds of 90-95. She was 14 strokes behind SAIT's Mary Pickell.

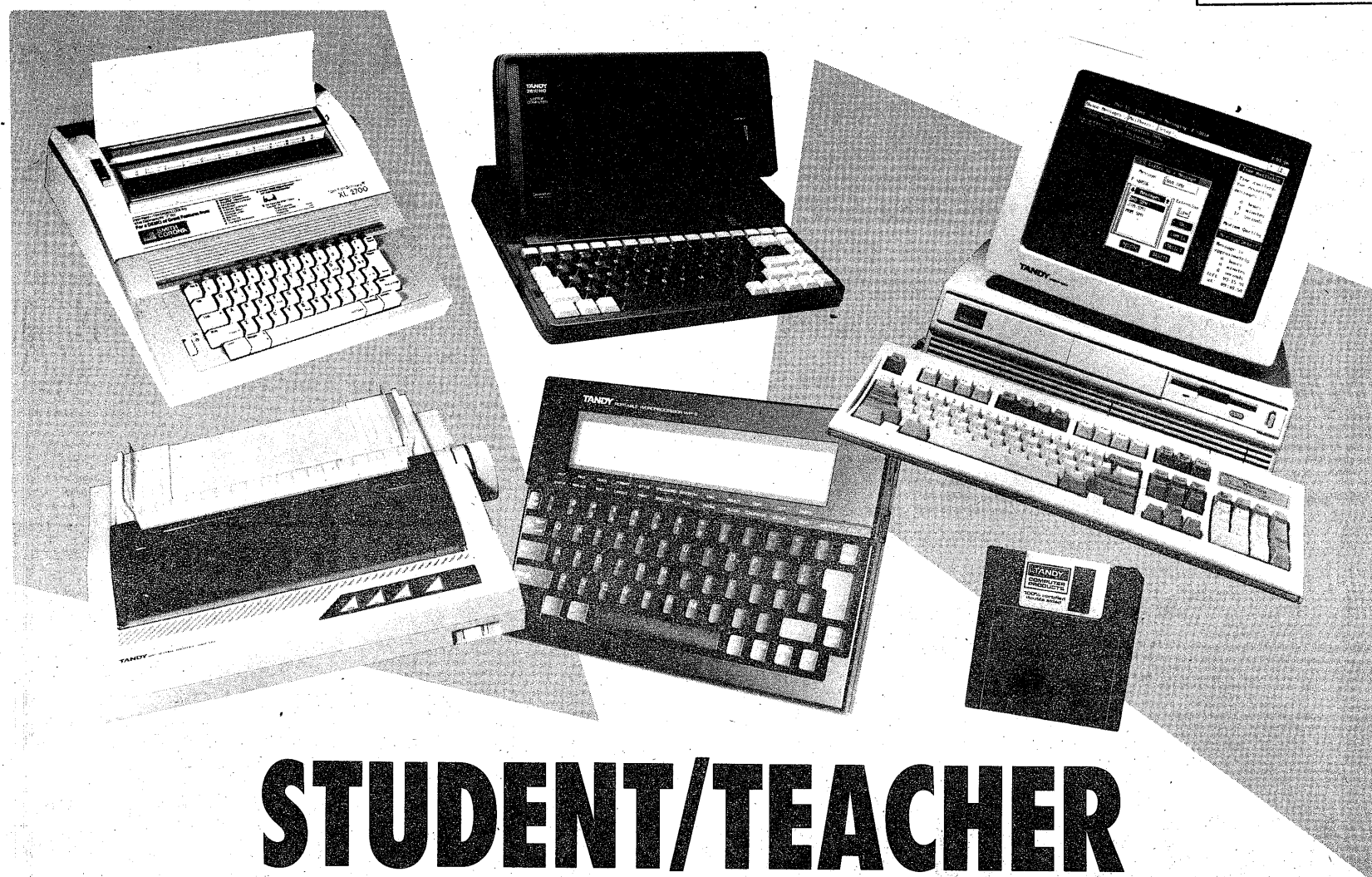

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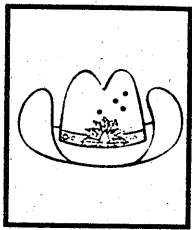

Robin Williams put out a string of bad (or badly received) movies during the early eighties: *Popeye*, *Moscow on the Hudson*, and to a lesser degree *The World According To Garp*.

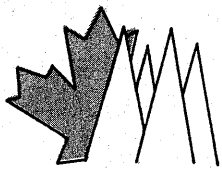

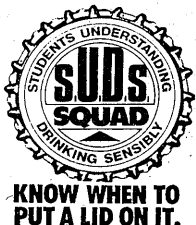

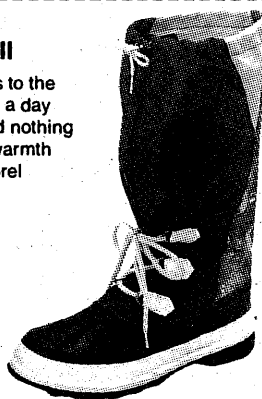
