Council to Vote on Increases

The Alberta College and Technical Institute Student Executive Council (ACTISEC) may raise its fees substantially next year in order to fund new projects and a research staff, says the ACTISEC Vice-Chair of the Growth and Development Committee, Dan Lachambre.

Presently, each student association pays thirteen cents for every full-time student to belong to ACTISEC. This puts NAITSA's present contribution at approximately \$1200.

Lachambre wants to increase the dues up to two

dollars per full-time student. This would up NAITSA's portion to about \$19,000. ACTISEC's budget would then burgeon to approximately \$95,000 from the \$8.092 where it is now.

Lachambre says that the increases are justified because they are urgently needed to correct the shortcomings of ACTISEC in the areas of lobbying and information sharing.

According to Lachambre, since its inception seven years ago, ACTISEC, "has not been very successful." It has not been able to effectively lobby the provincial government. He

points to the recent Bill C31 that allows corporations a tax break on donations to universities while the deductions on gifts to technical institutes remain at a significantly lower rate. Without a full-time staff, ACTISEC often learns about government policy only after it is passed. Lachambre asserts that such a situation is "chaotic" and "has to change".

The Growth and Development Committee proposes to rent an office and hire ACTISEC's first full-time salaried positions, one researcher and one administrative assistant. The committee hopes that

these additions will vastly improve ACTISEC's contracts and influence with the provincial government.

Secondly, more money would be needed to set up a proposed computer system that would allow all ACTISEC members to access information for their campus.

Finally, additional revenue would be used to help out smaller colleges that cannot presently afford to send members to ACTISEC conferences.

Further to the proposed per student increase, Lachambre is looking at corporate sponsorship and a "gift in kind" from member student associations. University of Lethbridge students have already given \$2000 and Mount Royal donated \$10,000 to further the committee's plans.

Of course, General Council must pass any increased NAITSA contribution to ACTISEC. At next week's General Council meeting, Lachambre will be seeking a motion to approve the increases and a flat out grant to ACTISEC.

The final proposals must also be approved by the entire ACTISEC directorship. A vote is expected during ACTISEC's meeting November 15-17 in Vermillion.



Two weeks ago, NAITSA General Council voted against becoming members of CFS themselves, believing that ACTISEC must be allowed to grow independently, if it was to become a political force in this province.

Now, it seems that NAITSA, and the other institutes and colleges, feel that Dhir's experience from CFS is an invaluable resource for ACTISEC. This may be well and true, but it raises some unsolvable problems.

Where will Dhir's loyalty lie? His membership in ACTISEC depends upon his allying himself with ACTISEC whenever conflicts arise, but surely, a man with ten years of experience is too valuable to sit on the CFS fence whenever the two groups collide.

I will not call Mr. Dhir's ability to perform, or to perform well, into question. That is for ACTISEC to decide.

Two weeks ago, there seemed to be too many ideological differences between CFS and ACTISEC for NAIT to become a CFS member. From General Student Council minutes, part 5.0.2 "If Naitsa joins (CFS), it would take a lot of time and energy to get out if it turned radical". CFS was moving in a political direction contrary to NAITSA's. Now, it seems that NAITSA's opinion has changed. They feel that an integral member of the CFS is an asset to ACTISEC.

NAITSA voted to retain Mr. Dhir as the vice-chair in the only student organization we belong to. If they believe there will be no conflicts of interest, why didn't we join the CFS in September?

Overtaxed Students

If you are a recipient of a Canada Student loan, you will have noticed something new in this year's package. A three percent tax has been assessed on all federal loans.

To some, it may seem small, yet this tax is just the latest change to Canada's tax system. Along with other taxes, like the Goods and Services Tax, this levy strongly reflects the federal government's philosophical break with the Canadian tradition.

At least in theory, Canada has had a progressive tax system since the early years of this century. People paid taxes according to their wealth. It seemed only fair that the affluent paid the largest percentage of the tax burden.

Unfortunately, this conception of justice seems defunct. Now, some of the economically weakest groups in society, like students, carry a tremendous proportional load. Not only do we pay the same GST rate as the richest Canadians, but we now pay taxes for unavoidably going into debt!

Who's to blame for this fundamental turn about in the fortunes of students? Clearly, the new fiscal environment is one of survival of the fittest. Obviously, we can no longer rely solely on the government's sense of fair play for an equitable student tax load. We have done far too much of this in the past. As a result, students have become complacent targets for taxation. More must be done to fight these injustices in the arena of public relations.

Despite our current government's philosophy, there remains many Canadians who firmly believe in a progressive tax system. Unless student apathy is overcome and an effective opposition is formed to restrain the government, it will continue to overtax the politically weak and allow the powerful to escape their fair share.


With the two theatre companies in town, Cineplex Odeon and Famous Players, prices are averaging around \$8. I don't frown at paying \$8 provided that the movie is worth it. However, if the movie lacks in content and acting ability, then I really question the \$8 price tag.

But not only do you have to pay \$8 for the movie, if you want popcorn and a pop be prepared to pay a lot more money. This past weekend at the Paramount Theatre, it cost \$11 for a large popcorn, a large pop, a small pop and a bag of licorice.

The Meadowlark Theatre recently dropped their movie prices to \$1 for all movies and are going to rely solely on their concession sales to pay the bills. After paying the \$11 for food, I presume that the concession sales are going to grow dramatically for Meadowlark, while all the other theatres are going to suffer.

With the recession, people just don't have the money to spend on movies. Not many people are willing to pay the \$8 when in a few months they can pay \$2.99 (plus G.S.T.) at the corner video store to rent it, and pay \$1.79 for 2L of Coke, \$1.49 for a bag of unpopped popcorn and 99¢ for a pound of margarine. All of that totals much less than the \$11 and in the end there is much more than you would ever get at the theatre.

I know for the next little while I'll be waiting for the videotape to come out for most movies. At least I can afford \$5 as opposed to \$20 for a two hour night out at the movies, except I'll be in the comfort of my own home. And hey, I might as well buy a stereo TV and hook it up to my stereo system and have better surround sound than at the theatre.

ACTISEC Vice Chair Stays On

Last week, the vice-chair of the Alberta College and Technical Institute Student Executive Council, Sandeep Dhir, easily survived a movement that aimed to expel him from his position.

At the ACTISEC meeting in Fort McMurray last weekend, questions were raised about a possible conflict of interest between Dhir's role on ACTISEC and his position as the Alberta member on the national executive of the Canadian Federation of Students.

Some members of ACTISEC, including NAITSA, have expressed concern that a small, relatively inexperienced group like ACTISEC could be unduly influenced by such a large student

association -like CFS. Clearly, Dhir's links to CFS did nothing to quell member's apprehension.

Nevertheless, after a three hour debate among ACTISEC'S sixteen campuses, it was unanimously decided to maintain Dhir as the vice-chair of ACTISEC.

The reason for the resolution was explained by NAITSA's Academic vice-president Dan Lachambre as there simply being "more pros than cons". Lachambre said that Dhir's ten years of political experience and his "phenomenal" knowledge of student issues would be hard to replace.

Lachambre indicated the ACTISEC consensus that despite their reservations about Dhir, "no one could do as good a job".

AIDS: It is a People Issue

As of June 1, 1991, the Federal Centre for AIDS has received reports of 4959 cases of AIDS in Canada. This includes 4643 males, 255 females and 61 pediatric (under the age of 15) cases.

It is because of statistics like these that the AIDS Network of Edmonton Society is

organizing the Third Annual AIDS Candlelight Walk.

Barry Breau, Executive Director of the Edmonton Society says, "The candle symbolizes public awareness, serves as a memorial to friends and family who have died from AIDS, and it shows hope through light in the midst of darkness."

The walk commences at 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 6, 1991 at the main entrance of the U of A hospital and will finish up at Athabasca Hall (U of A) with a social. Breau stressed that through the walk, the society hopes to "make the public realize that AIDS is a people issue and it is real people who get the disease."

Alarming statistics, like the number of reported cases in Canada is currently doubling every 27 months, are bringing more people out to the walk each year.

Breau encourages anyone with questions about the walk or other events during AIDS Awareness Week (October 7 - 11) to contact the Society at 424-4767.







Ooks Win Two of Three Against Canada West

The NAIT Ooks continued their preseason with an impressive showing against CIAU competition at the Molson Invitational hosted by the U of A at the Clare Drake Arena over the weekend.

The Ooks dropped a 7-3 decision to the University of Calgary Dinosaurs on Friday night before scoring a 6-3 win over the University of Alberta Golden Bears, on Saturday night and a 4-3 victory over the University of Saskatchewan Huskies on Sunday afternoon.

On Friday, NAIT and the U of C engaged in a tight defensive battle for two periods before the offenses came to the forefront in the third. The two teams were tied at 1-1 following the first. The Dinos moved in front 2-1 after 40 minutes and then erupted for five goals in the final frame to post a 7-3 win. Tim Murphy, Bill Moody, and Kevin Lovig netted goals for the Ooks in their first loss of the preseason.

On Saturday, Mark Souch sparked the Ooks with three goals en route to a 6-3 victory over the University of Alberta Golden Bears. Darren Perkins chipped in a pair and Trevor McCallion added a single to round out the Ooks scoring.

Outshooting the Bears 31 to 29, the Ooks held period leads of 1-0 and 4-2.

On Sunday, Mark Souch netted his second of the game with 2:16 left in regulation to give the Ooks a 4-3 come from behind victory over the University of Saskatchewan Huskies. Brent Harden and Jason Yuzda completed the the Ooks scoring.

The Ooks trailed 2-1 after the first and 3-2 following two before muzzling the Huskies in the third period. The Ooks outshot the Huskies 50 to 30.

The Ooks then host the University of Manitoba Bisons in a two game set at the NAIT Arena.
