On Monday, a mural depicting a human fetus connected to the earth will be unveiled. NAIT is the first stop for the mural, painted by Patrice Boyer, that's touring North America on its way to a world environmental conference in Brazil.

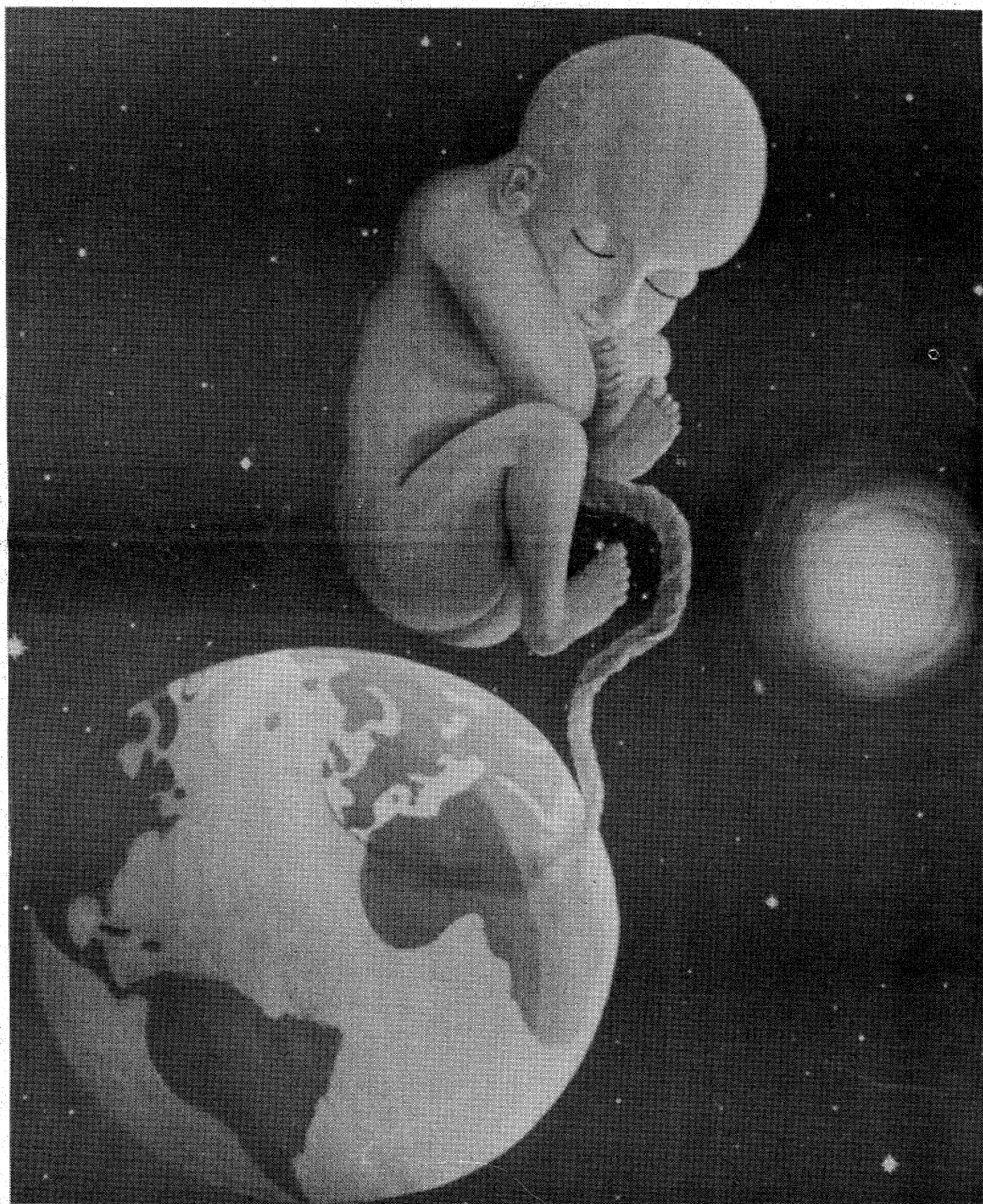
Tuesday offers Doctor Jim Butler's slide show on endangered places on the Earth.

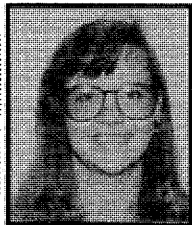
However, Mulroney still refuses to take his name off the short list for the United Nations job.

What can we do?

Nowadays it seems like all we ever hear about is the environment and how we can help to preserve it. Sometimes it gets a little much to take, but it's getting hard not to notice that we have to start doing something to save our planet.

Everywhere we look we can see the environment deteriorating before our eyes. Garbage on the roadsides. Lakes that look like swamps. All are signs of pollution. There are many unseen events causing pollution.

Acid rain is just one devastating aspect. It is a silent killer. Each day thousands of tons of sulphur dioxide and nitrogen oxides are released into the atmosphere by automobiles and businesses.

Sulphur dioxide and nitrogen oxides are oxidized, with the help of trace elements, which changes them to acidic compounds. When mixed with rain or snow, it changes into the deadly form of acid rain/snow. The processing of sour gas, that is, gas containing significant quantities of hydrogen sulphide, is the second largest source of sulphur dioxide in Canada, with most of it from Alberta.

The Greenhouse Effect and depletion of the ozone layer are the two other large environmental concerns. The Greenhouse Effect is caused by an increased amount of Carbon Dioxide (CO₂) in the atmosphere. The CO₂ level increases from the burning of carbon-rich organisms such as trees, and the cutting down of forests (which absorbs CO₂). The depletion of the ozone layer is caused primarily by the release of chlorofluorocarbons (CFC's) into the environment. CFC's are found in aerosol cans, chillers, rigid foams and automobile air conditioners. If CFC's were banned worldwide it alone could reduce the Greenhouse Effect by as much as 20%.

To find out more about these and other environmental concerns I encourage you to participate in the Environment Action Week November 4-8. See how artist Patrice Boyer expresses his environmental views through his mural. Learn how you can help our environment so that the future of our families will be brightened, rather than be dulled by smog, pollution and no hope. Support the environmental movement.

October 23 marked Buck-A-Cup Day. For two dollars, students received a bottomless cup of coffee. NAIT President Stan Souch

freed up the cost of the event by donating all the coffee.

Future events include the United Way Breakfast on Saturday. For five dollars, students can get breakfast served to them by the associate deans in the Patricia Cafeteria.

Also on Saturday is the Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious Garage Sale. Items to be purchased include: clothes, bikes, appliances and other garage sale paraphernalia. Everything is donated and all proceeds go to the United Way Campaign.

National Carpentry Apprenticeship Contest

An outhouse is a rickety shack cobbled together by a backwoodsman wielding a hammer and a bucksaw, right?

Not necessarily. At West Edmonton Mall one day last month, eight skilled young carpenters built outhouses that were models of style, fit, and finish. With planed spruce framing, high-grade panel siding, curved gable webs, partial hip roofs, and vent stacks--these biffies would benefit even the most elegant of country estates.

In case you're wondering why these carpenters were building outhouses--structures hardly in great demand these days--and why they would be in WEM, there are good reasons. First, as a recently certified journeyman ranking at the top of his class in one of six jurisdictions across Canada, each was competing in the National Carpentry Apprenticeship Contest. Second, an outhouse, despite its humble and rustic image, actually contains, if well built, most of the elements of a regular house. And third, it made sense to give the event the exposure afforded

by the largest shopping mall in the country.

The contest attracted much attention from passersby in the Mall. A gentleman in his eighties was heard to remark, "Boy, that's a damn-sight better lookin' outhouse than the one I used as a lad!"

The contest, which included both a surveying test and a written test of woodworking knowledge conducted the next day, was won by NAIT alumnus Dave Johnstone. Dave, who completed his 4th year last spring, is employed

by ATCO Industrial Manufacturing and Leasing in Spruce Grove. Taking second place was Edward Cunningham from British Columbia. The eight competitors built the biffies in one working day.

In co-hosting the contest, NAIT's Woodworking program had the task of coming up with the building idea and design, preparing the construction drawings, obtaining the materials, cutting the pre-fabricated parts, and transporting everything to the Mall site. Program Head Don

Robinson's staff also built the prototype privy.

Expenses were covered by a fund managed by the International Brotherhood of Carpenters. Mike Board, Business Representative of Local 1325, also a co-host, explains that a small percentage of each member's pay is directed to the fund, so that the contest may be held each year. The third co-host was Alberta Apprenticeship and Trade Certification.

As winner, Dave Johnstone is eligible to compete in the international contest, which this year will be held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, in December. Good luck to him! A most enthusiastic carpenter, Dave loves to demonstrate his trade to the public.

The other good news is that the classy outhouses will be put to really good use. The eight built by the contestants have been donated to various non-profit community organizations, such as Boysdale, and the prototype has been given to the NAIT Foundation's 1992 SS Benefit NAIT Auction. This one may turn out to be a pretty pricey privy!

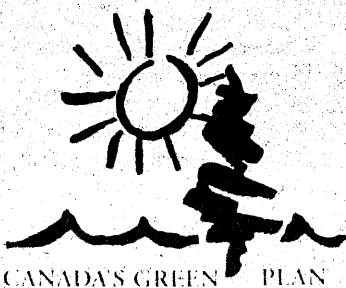

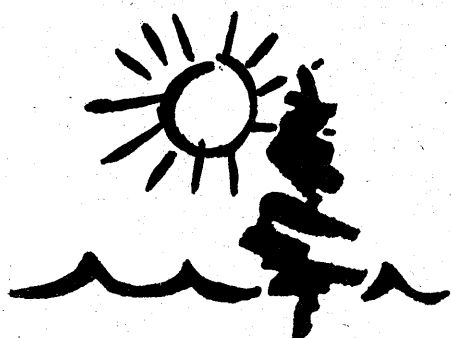

It is true that one more styrofoam cup, bottle or Drayno or non-composted tomato will not push the planet over the brink of disaster. Likewise, by clipping a plastic cup to your backpack and stocking up on baking soda, you will probably not save the world.

However, too often I hear people scoff at the idea that the positive efforts of individuals can help change the course of the environmental crisis. This attitude is that of those who are unwilling to listen to environmental facts, for committed environmentalists have enough ammunition to influence anyone ready to listen. Because of this power, individuals are changing the direction of the environmental dilemma every day.

One such individual is Mario Houle. Born in an industrial area of Montreal,

Houle first encountered industrial damage at an early age - Houle had asthma as a child, a condition which disappeared when he moved with his family to the country.

Years later in life, Houle was once again confronted with environmental questions. In 1983 he began a walk across Canada. He trudged through the prairies, slept under the stars, and looked into the eyes of a bald eagle. "At this time I realized what nature had to offer and I realized it was worth preserving. I fell in love with nature. Now I work for her."

Today, Houle is an environmentalist working out of the Jasper area. A founding member of the Jasper Ecological Resource Centre, he is involved in environmental projects that will hopefully strengthen ecological efforts in Canada's national parks.

However, the project at hand is international in scope. Houle is coordinating Green Light to Rio 92, a tour throughout North, Central and South America, a tour which will bring environmental knowledge to the people of the American continents. The destination

of the tour is Rio de Janeiro, the site of the United Nations Conference on Development and the Environment. The purpose of the tour is to promote the conference and educate people about the world's desperate environmental situation.

The official unveiling will be at 12:15 p.m. on Monday, November 4 in the main lobby at NAIT.

Edmonton Digs Composting

You don't have to leave home to recycle.

While most of your recyclables have to be carted to the bottle depot or the Goodwill, up to 40 per cent of what you throw away could be recycled right in your own kitchen and backyard. All you need is a composter.

EcoCity Society is making it easier to start composting right away. The Edmonton environmental group is offering composters at bargain prices - \$35 for wooden ones made by staff in the EcoCity office, \$50 for plastic models and \$65 for worm composters for apartment dwellers.

Having problems with your composter? Need some advice? Call the composting hotline at 429-3659 for a telephone consultation.

If that doesn't set things right, the Composter Doctor will make a house call. Yup, he or she will arrive in white coat, on a bicycle decked out to carry the tools of the trade - pitchfork, plastic bags of manure, leaves - "whatever it takes to get it (the composter) back on track," says Tooker Gomberg of

EcoCity. House calls cost about \$15, which includes the on-site consultation and the remedies.

It's all part of EcoCity Society's Home Composting Project. The aim is to get 7,000 composters out to Edmonton householders by the end of the summer of '92. There were 350 requests for composters in the project's opening weeks.

It's modeled after "a very successful project in Ontario," where provincial funding reduced the cost of composters to homeowners.

This shows that if "it's easy and cheap, people will do it," Gomberg says. "People are keen on composting. The only big thing was spending \$100 on a composter."

The entire project has been budgeted at \$650,000. So far the group has obtained \$90,000 in federal funds for Phase One, which runs until late September. Funding for the remaining two phases has not been secured yet. Gomberg says municipal and provincial support is being sought.

Besides providing low-priced composters, EcoCity is

taking its project "one step further," he says, and putting a lot of effort into education. Mindful that a foul-smelling composter will put the neighbours off, the group wants to help make composting a positive experience for everyone.

The group took its message - and a few composters - to the North Country Fair in late spring. Campers at the site along Lesser Slave Lake were asked to save and turn in compostable matter.

"We collected all the compostable stuff from the food concessions," Gomberg says. "We reduced the amount of garbage by about 80 per cent." The group also raffled off the composters.

The Edmonton Folk Festival and other summertime gatherings provided more venues to spread the word - that composting is an easy and effective way to reduce garbage output and the Home Composting Project will cut the cost and provide information.

Deforestation

Deforestation is occurring in most parts of the world still containing large forests. The rain forests of Sarawak, Borneo and Brazil are being cut or burned by multinational companies for a variety of uses or by indigenous peoples to create grazing land. In the rain forests of Brazil the deforested land converted to cattle farming land becomes non-productive after 2 or 3 years. In South East Asia the indigenous peoples are being dispossessed and their cultures destroyed. Flooding in the Ganges Delta (Bengal) has been attributed to deforestation in the Himalayas.

Much criticism has been leveled at Canadian forest practices and the industry itself now admits that past reforestation efforts have been exceedingly poor. Environmentalists in B.C. are fighting to save the last

5% of old growth which is unfortunately also the most profitable to industrialists. Old growth is the habitat of several endangered species which require vast areas to survive (e.g. the grey owl, the marbled murrelet, the bald eagle and the grizzly). Alberta has increased its forest industry by 4 to 5 times in the past 4 years with no increase in personnel in the Department of Forestry, Lands and Wildlife, which is responsible for regulating the industry. The largest Forest Management Agreement (FMA) ever signed was to the Alberta-Pacific mill near Athabasca at 61,000 square kilometres, last August. Daishowa is in a long dispute with the Lubicon band over disputed territory and is also logging in the Wood Buffalo National park. Reforestation is not mandatory in national parks as it is on other crown lands.













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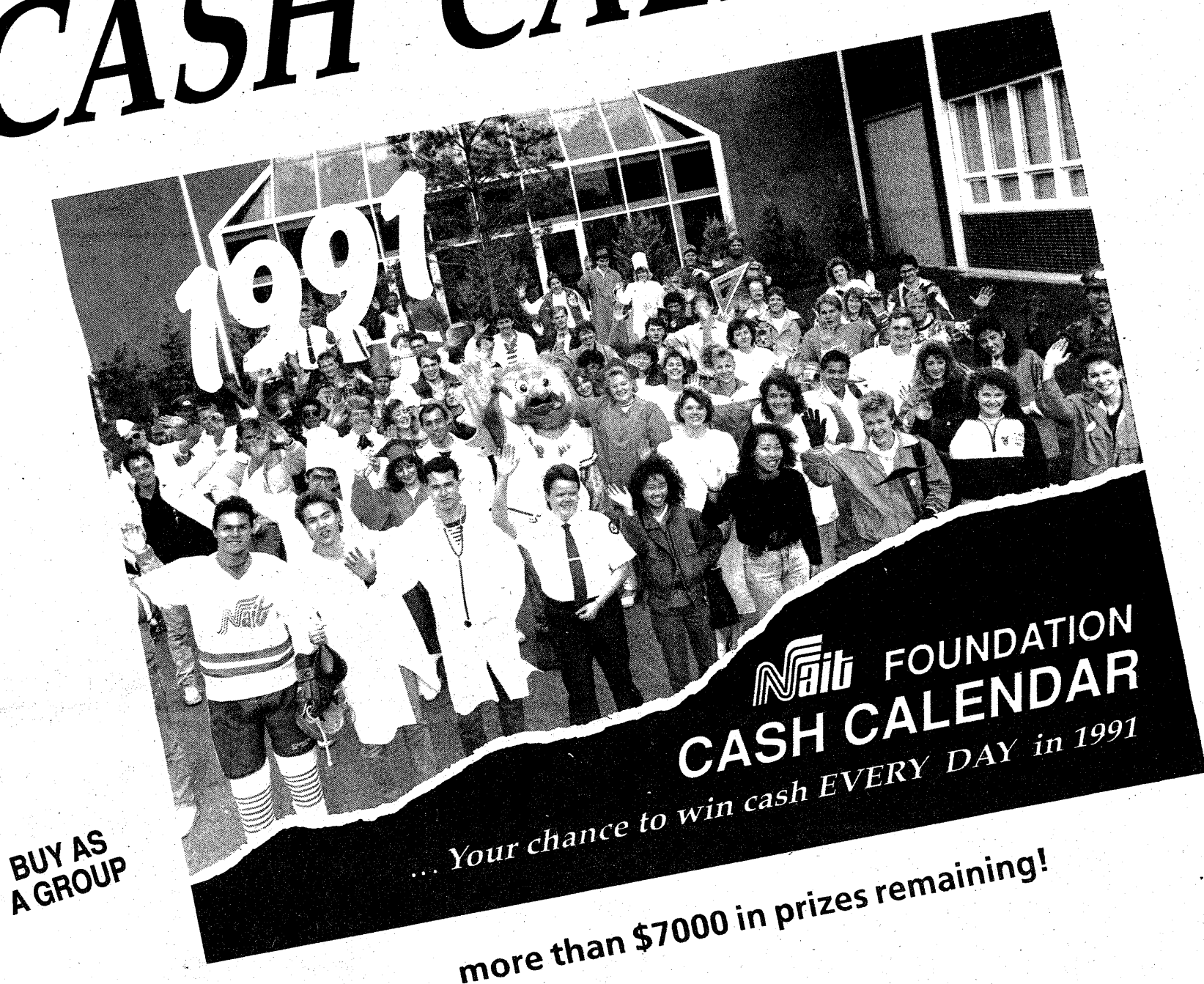


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Bears Rule? You've Got To Be Kidding

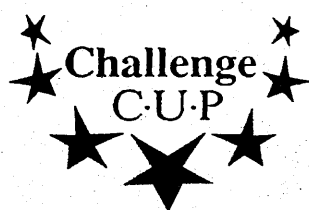

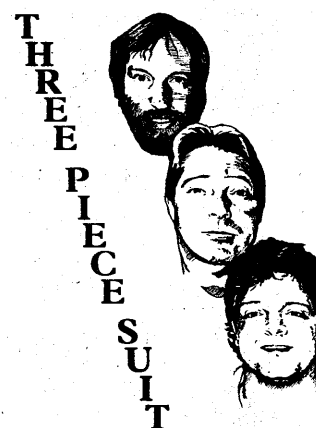
On Sunday, October 20th, Darren Perkins' six point performance sparked the Ooks to a 10-1 win over the Wolves.

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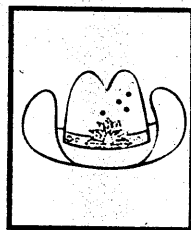

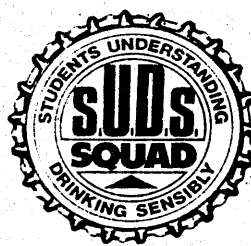

Some people say a good home remedy for a common cold is chicken soup, but have you ever noticed that there really isn't any good home remedies for being out of your gourd?

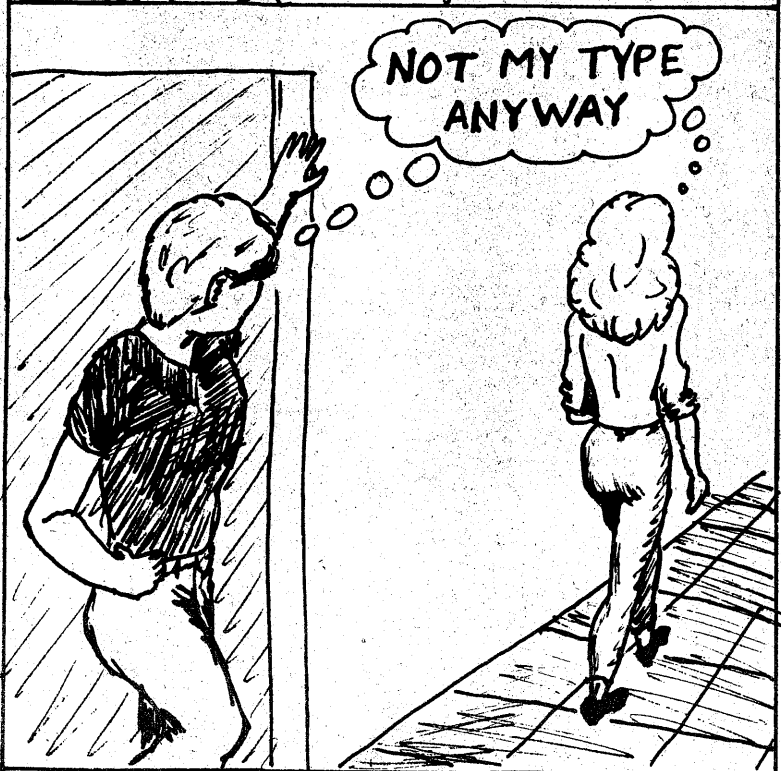
