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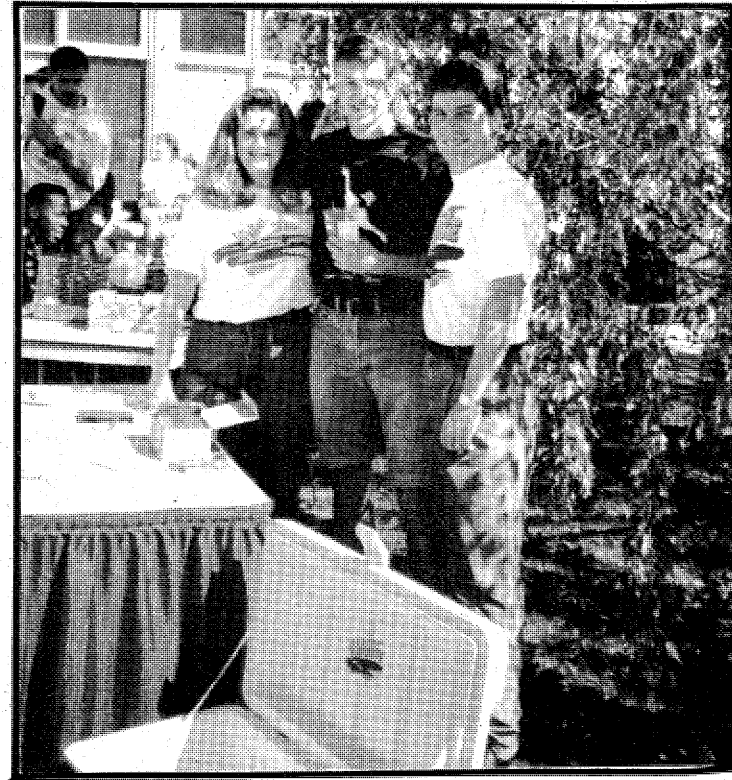

A person slandered in "The Nugget" would literally be at the mercy of the readers. Individuals at NAIT have no mass-media voice, and therefore, no means of defence. They could suffer undue confrontations without the means to resolve them, not to mention a damaged reputation.

Printing libel would be equally devastating for "The Nugget". Financially, we are as responsible for our statements as any major newspaper, but on a permanent level. Our reputation is considerably more fragile. One misrepresented story could sink the entire staff until the new school year.

These ethical considerations are serious and important, but they are much like the rules about cheating on exams. If you keep them in mind, there won't be any problems. This leads me to my final topic: The submissions I would like to see come flooding over my desk from you, the students.

I believe "The Nugget" should reflect the views and opinions of the student body, mainly through the direct publishing of their views. Don't be afraid to get creative, or even a little weird, with any subject on your mind. I dare you.

Title your letters "Letters to the Editor", and submit them to The Nugget newspaper office, E-128 with your name and student ID number.

Remember: From Student Rights, part A.1.3. "Student shall have the right to freedom of expression and opinion..." and A.1.6. "Students shall have the right to an autonomous student press." NAIT Student Handbook

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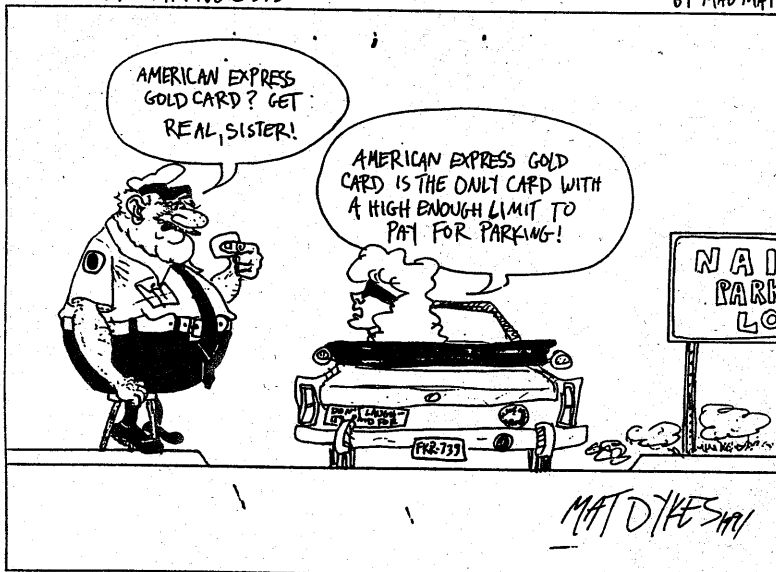

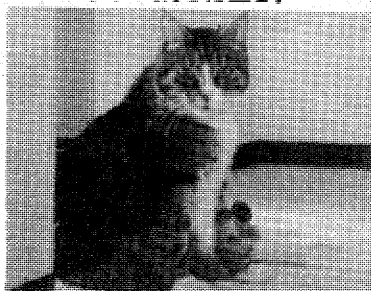

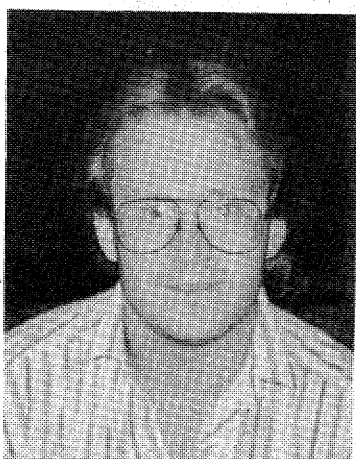
What do you think about the parking situation at NAIT?

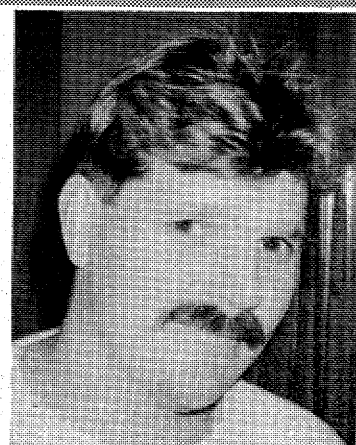

Orientation '91 was an almost disorienting extravaganza of food and entertainment.

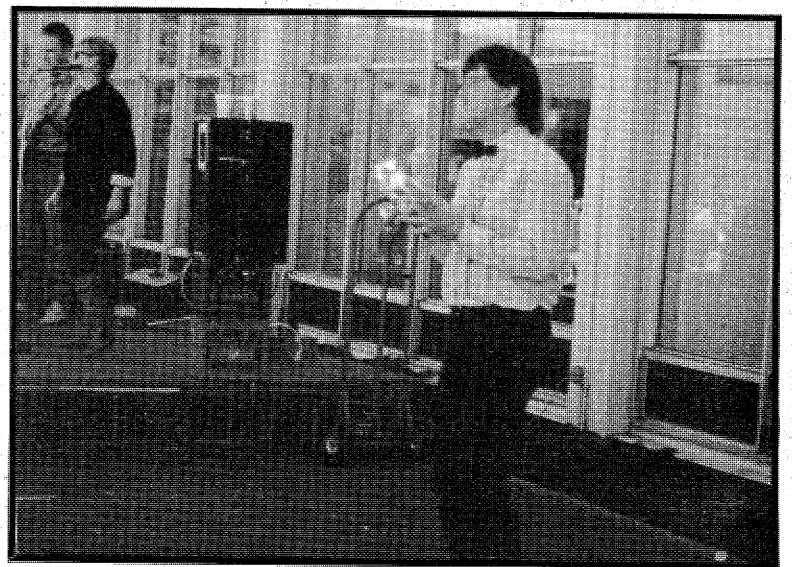
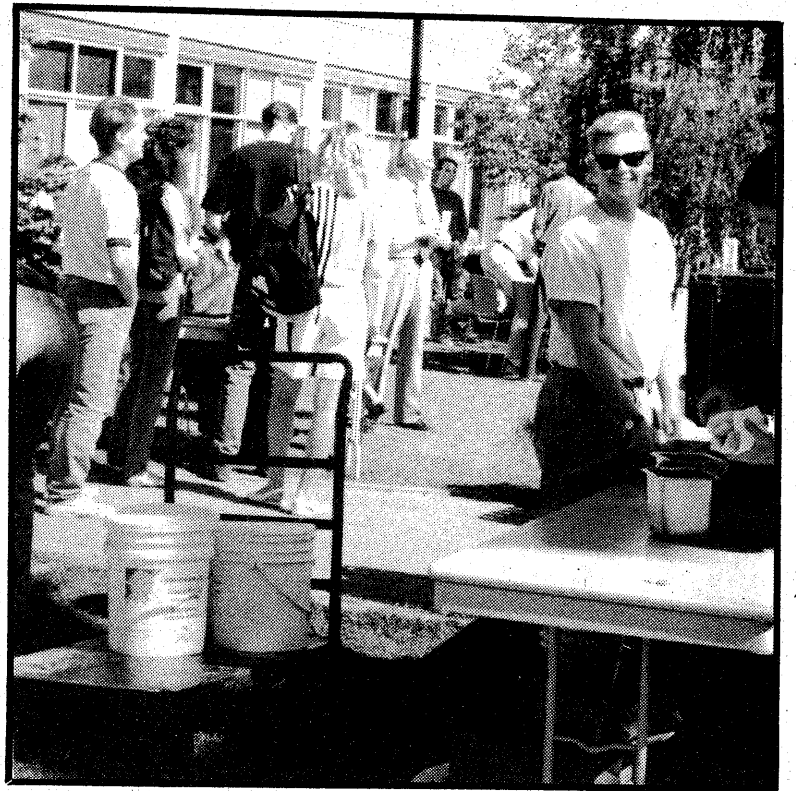

Parking Fees Increase Over 50%

NAIT students were surprised when they returned to school last week and found that parking costs had increased between 58% and 100%.

Dick Maertens-Pool, NAIT Manager of Safety and Security, said that when cost of regular maintenance, major repairs and operational costs were reviewed in the spring of 1991 it was decided that fees would have to be increased.

Several proposals were submitted to

administration with the highest cost being \$38/month for scramble parking with power. Maertens-Pool said, "this amount would allow us to do all necessary maintenance and we could set away sufficient funds to replace the parkade in 30 years." The 20 year old parkade has an expected life of 50 years.

Students were also angry that parking lots C and K (pay per entry lots) doubled from \$1.00 to \$2.00. Maertens-Pool said that, "in 1987 there was a proposal to increase these lots from

\$1.00 to \$1.50. However, we did not want to be dealing with change at the parking booths so the amount remained unchanged." 1987 was the last price increase for other parking areas.

Another point that students are questioning is what happened to the free parking on 117 avenue and 117A avenue. Over the summer these 2 roads were purchased by NAIT from the City. NAIT saw these roads as a way to generate funds so they were used to expand Lot S.

Administration gave students until Wednesday, September 11 to park on these two streets without a parking permit. After this date students will be tagged and towed. A primary cause of price increases this year has been provincial government cuts to post-secondary institutions for parking lot construction and maintenance. Chris Horne, NAITSA President, feels that, "the government should turn its priorities back to Alberta's future...the students." He

continued to say that this sharp increase just furthers the financial burden of students and reflects the government's lessening commitment to education.

Maertens-Pool was unsure as to whether the students would face this kind of increase next year. The increases in the past were in 1984 and 1987. Horne's final comment on the subject was, "NAITSA realizes NAIT's increased budget our restraints but students cannot continue to foot the bill through auxiliary fees."

Shinerama Media Kickoff a Success



Shinerama kicked off its 1991 campaign with a media luncheon at Molson House on Tuesday, September 10. Shirley Anne Hannah, the Grant MacEwan Community College Shinerama Director, lead the audience through a series of speeches.

John Cruickshank, Vice President of

Student Services at GMCC, read Mayor Jan Reimer's Proclamation. This reading officially made September 13 and 14 Shinerama Days in Edmonton.

Wendy Knight, A Cystic Fibrosis adult, explained what life is like for her and other victims of CF. Next Debra Milne, President of Edmonton Chapter of the Canadian CF Foundation told the

crowds that because of the money raised from past Shinerama efforts the life expectancy of a child with CF has gone from 4 years (1960) to 30 years today.

Dan Lachambre, NAITSA Academic VP wrapped up the events by thanking the sponsors and by saying that the students of Edmonton are going to do their best to raise \$25,000 goal set by the three schools.

Council Notes

It was a full house at General Council meeting of the academic year. Everyone collected their copy of Robert's Rules of Order, and proceeded to tackle a fairly large and important agenda.

Firstly, Academic Vice President Dan Lachambre brought up the fact that there were three student vacancies on the Academic Council. This council gives students a direct voice outside NAITSA to talk to the administration. Dave Murray and Ryan Prociuk were quickly elected.

As you can see, there is still one seat left. If you're interested, talk to Dan Lachambre at the NAITSA office.

Communications VP Susanne Glenn then expressed her concern over the past use of pop bins on campus. Last year, some bins were allotted to some technologies as a source of extra cash. However, many pop cans laid uncollected last year. She would like to avoid a similar situation this year, so she asked technology reps. how interested they were in this program.

The reps. exhibited extraordinary enthusiasm, yet Glen warned that this year, any bins not being collected will be allocated to other technologies.

The Tech. Charity Prize was discussed by Dan Lachambre. Like other years, a prize of \$1000 will be offered to whatever technology raises the most per capita for a charity. Secretarial had the biggest pockets last year.

The President, Chris Horne, then rose to speak to the executive's growing concern over NAITSA's membership in the student lobby group, The Canadian Federation of Students. The executive relayed concerns over CFS's tendency to take stands on non-student issues, like the Persian Gulf War.

The executive also expressed a reluctance to pay the \$36,000 CFS membership fee. The executive believed that they were not getting enough action for the money.

NAITSA does belong to an Alberta body of technical students called ACTISEC (Alberta Colleges and Technical Institutes Student Executive Council). NAITSA is a leading member of this group. NAITSA's fees for this provincial lobby group \$2,900.

After reading a short letter from CFS Horne said that he believed that NAITSA's future lay in ACTISEC and not CFS. The President then entertained a motion for NAITSA to leave CFS during 1991-1992. The motion was

so moved by Architecture and seconded by Civil Engineering. The motion passed unanimously with only Mechanical Engineering abstaining.

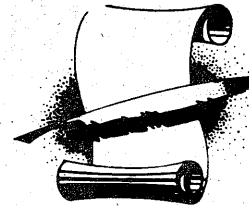
Finally, Chris Horne informed council that administration plans to remove tables at the end of F, G, and H wings due to vandalism. Only seats around the windows will remain come Christmas time.

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Blame The Bureaucrats

This week, 110 000 federal civil servants are striking over the government's plans to cap wages for the next three years.

Employees were supposed to have their wages frozen this year and then increased three per cent in the subsequent years.

The schen. was first announced in the federal budget over five months ago, and since then the government has refused to negotiate these figures.

Considering that Canada has an inflation rate twice as high as Ottawa's most generous wage

increase, it's not surprising that the union is willing to strike. The offer, in real terms, means a wage decrease to a workforce whose majority membership earns between \$20 000-\$30 000.

The government argues that the country is in rough shape and civil servants should feel the recessionary pinch just like the rest of us. Obviously, they're right. However, is this the way to implement harsh cuts?

The federal public servant's union, the Public Service Alliance of Canada, realizes that Canada has been mired in tough economic times. The union would

understand a hard bargaining position on the government's side. Yet, understandably, the union cannot accept a harsh wage agreement that is simply dictated to them.

The union has consistently shown a desire for a negotiated settlement, yet, the government's strategy has been to stubbornly refuse to move even slightly.

Thus, considering the government's position, it's not surprising we're in the midst of a strike. It's hard to believe that the government has not anticipated the union's response to the budget. Similarly, it's not hard to foresee the government's actions,

considering both the effects the strike has on government's power to force the union back to work.

The government hopes that this strike will give the image of a government straightening its own house and setting an example for private sector wage settlements. Yet, this image will come at the cost of our inconvenience.

The present package is a good point to start negotiations. Yet, the government's refusal to negotiate betrays its arrogance towards its employees and has caused a strike that was avoidable.

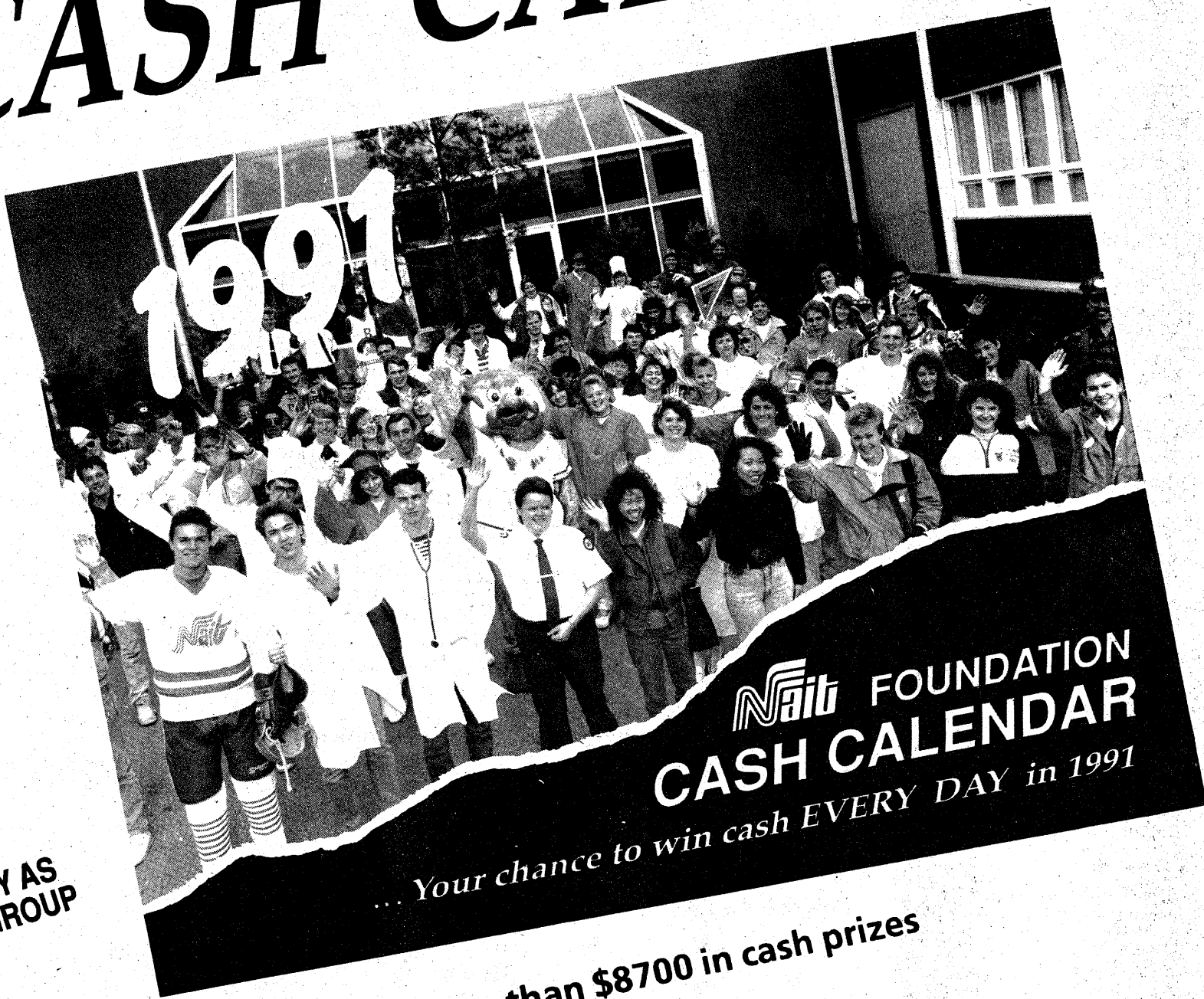

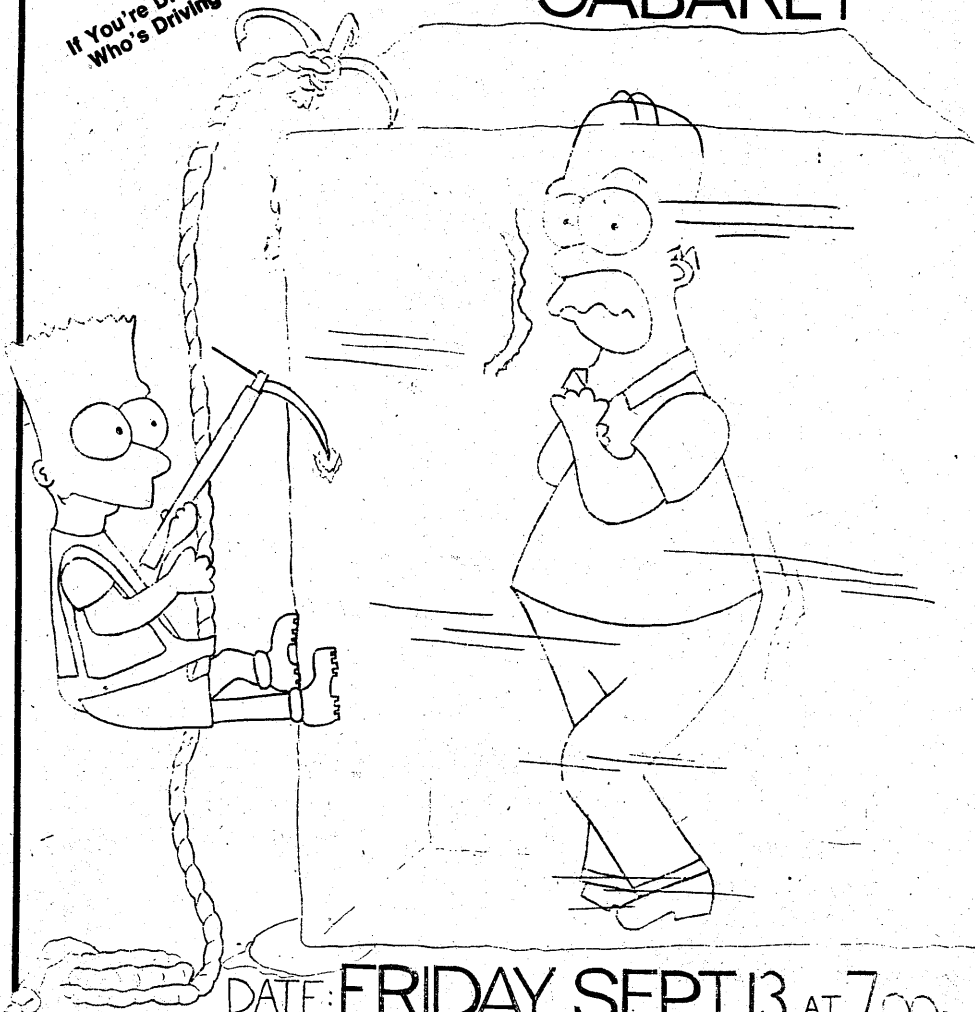

Pearn Returns -- CCAA'S Most Successful Hockey Coach Back in the Saddle

The NAIT Ooks first game of the preseason is less than a week away, and the team will be well prepared under the guidance of Perry Pearn.

After spending a year as an assistant coach with Canada's Olympic Team, Pearn was on the outside looking in when the last spot on the coaching staff for the upcoming season was filled by Terry Crisp. However, the Stettler

native is looking forward to returning to the ACAC wars as coach of the Ooks and feels the experience will improve his technique. "You grow in every coaching experience. Last year, working as an assistant coach has mellowed me a bit in some of the things I do, but will probably make me hard-nosed about forcing issues that I know now are even more important."

In his twelve seasons as Ooks head coach, Perry has directed NAIT to five national titles and five league titles. The success also led to a pair of assignments as an assistant coach with Team Canada at the World Junior Hockey Championships during the holiday season. Although there were many positives about the experience including a pair of gold

medals, Coach Pearn is relieved that the Viking Cup in Camrose is on the agenda this year. "It makes the second half of any season very tough to come back to and be ready for."

Pearn faces his first test of the preseason on Tuesday when the Ooks battle the Traders at Jubilee Arena in Fort Saskatchewan.

The Ooks then see their first action at the NAIT Arena on Friday,

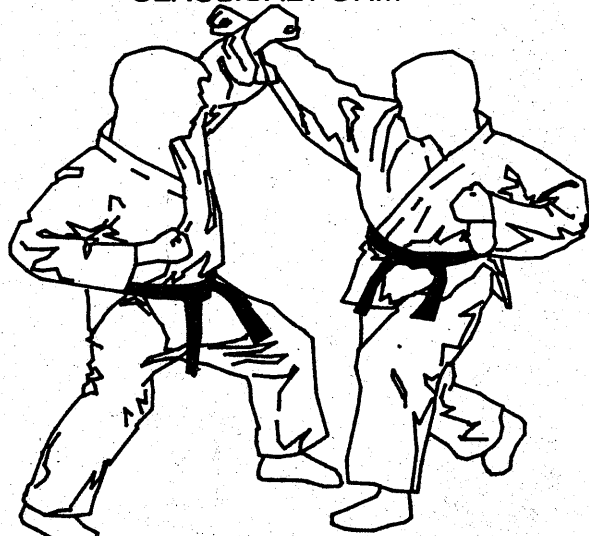

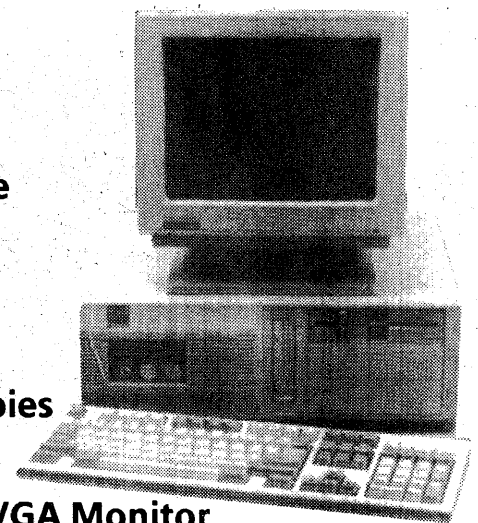

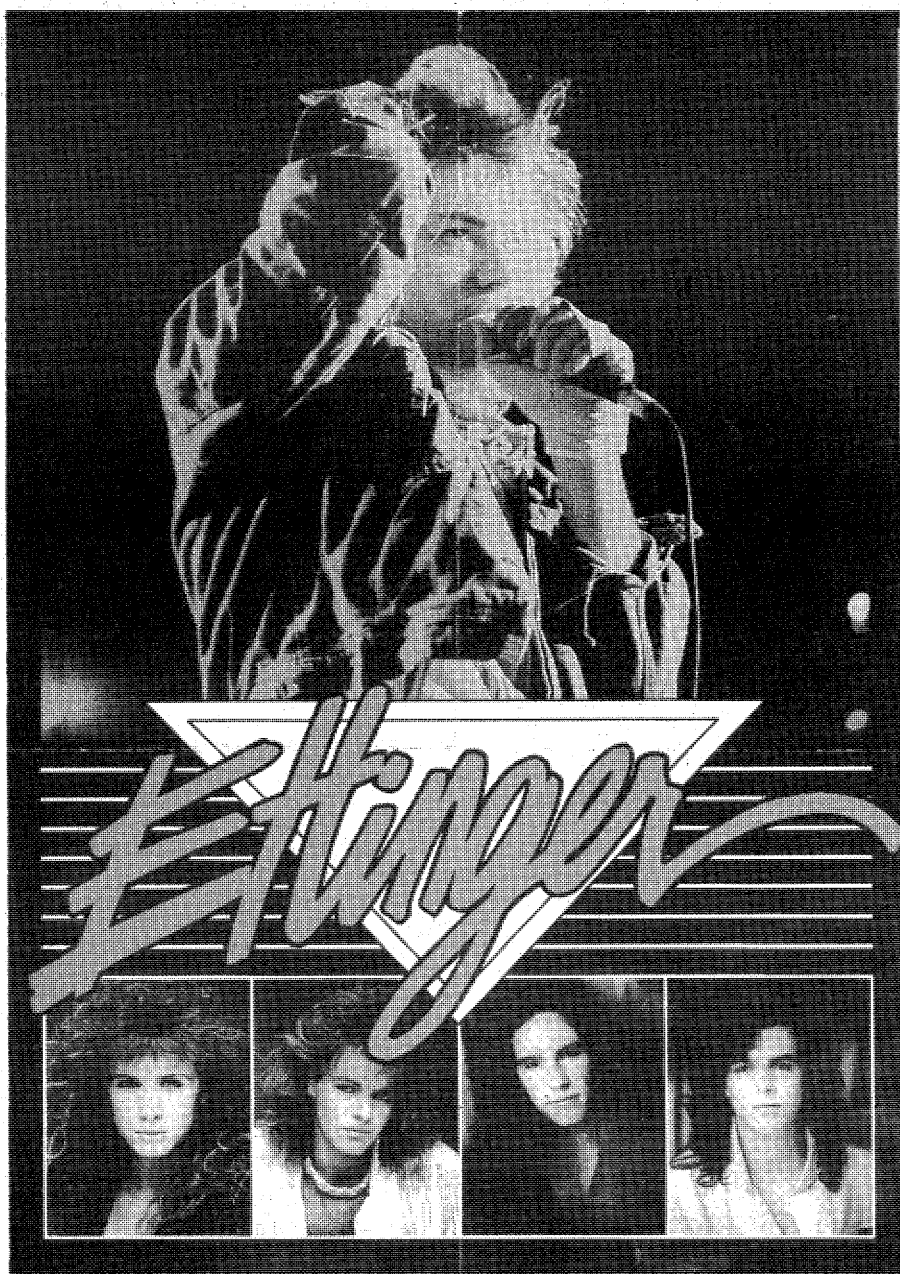
