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








Mandel Mesmerizes NAIT

New Fire Alarm System

By the end of September, NAIT's new fire alarm system should be verified and in operation.

The new system features the audible and visual alarms along with voice announcements to help facilitate evacuation.

Unlike the old system, NAIT's new fire system includes new walls and automatically closing doors that would form a separation between buildings during a fire. Now adjacent buildings do not necessarily have to be evacuated. People in these buildings would simply hear a gong-like alarm to alert them to the condition in the building next to them.

The system has the ability to broadcast announcements by the Fire Fighting commanders or other officials which override automatic signals and instructions.

There may be tests of the system which will be preceded by an announcement over the loudspeaker system.

Should NAITSA join the Canadian Federation of Students? Last week, the issue was brought to the General Council by the NAITSA executive.

The Canadian Federation of Students, a national student lobby group, has been trying to recruit more schools to increase the organization's size and

This summer, CFS talked to the NAITSA executive about the benefits of CFS membership. As a member of CFS, NAITSA would have a share of a national voice needed to protect students' rights.

However, after all this pressure, the NAITSA executive remained unimpressed. There are many reasons for not being impressed. None the least of

these is the \$36,000 yearly fee.

Yet, to its credit, the NAITSA executive took the issue to General Council. The executive was not under any obligation to do so. If they had not, no one would have known about the CFS recruitment drive and NAITSA would never have even considered membership.

But, the issue was brought to General Council. At the meeting the executive recommended rejecting CFS. A short letter was read from CFS in support of its organization, yet no one was invited to make a presentation to General Council. In fact, the executive showed deep reservations about that very possibility. They believed that certain CFS representatives could convince the Council to join CFS.

The executive had asked the Council to vote immediately so it could inform other schools of NAITSA's response. Despite the fact that all its information came from the NAITSA executive, the Council obliged. It voted unanimously not to join

Throughout the meeting, the executive's implicit message was clear, "Trust us, we know more about

this than you."

The executive undoubtedly knows a lot about the CFS issue, but this in no way excuses the General Council from not trying to obtain more information. At the very least they should have asked for some information from a CFS representative.

This whole issue questions the role of General Council. Is it merely the executive's rubber stamp because each technology's representative doesn't have the time that the executive have to evaluate himself or herself on student issues? If the General Council does more than ratify executive recommendations, then perhaps it should be a little less "trusting".

NAITSA Passes Up on CFS

Last week, after this summer's recruitment drive, the NAITSA General Council voted unanimously not to join Canadian Federation of Students.

CFS is by far the largest national student lobby group. It claims to have much influence in government circles that has resulted in student tax credits and smaller cuts education that would not have otherwise occured without CFS. Furthermore, it is postsecondary student's only national voice.

"No way will we get tied into CFS right now," stated NAITSA President Chris Horne.

Among his concerns is the growing political nature of CFS. It has become involved in nonacademic issues like abortion and the Persian Gulf war.

Horne fears that the radical faction in CFS, that advocates actions like "Students throwing macaroni at John Gogo," the Minister of Advanced Education, has taken control.

Horne also feels that if Alberta's technical institutes and small colleges joined CFS, this would mean the, "possible destruction of ACTISEC (The Alberta College and Technical Institute Student Executive Council)."

When asked about this, Horne expressed his concern that the council would not understand the political relevance what a CFS representative would have said.

Furthermore, when speaking about a particular representative, he said that, "he could sell eggs to a chicken."

Nevertheless, Horne has not rejected CFS altogether. He is confident that soon ACTISEC will be stabilized, and sooner or later, CFS will become politically more When palatable. speaking of the future, Horne stated, "next year we might be a year closer to joining CFS."

These "impression-able colleges" would be unduly influenced by CFS. If these colleges saw their future in CFS, this would render ACTISEC redundant. Without a provincial organization, Horne said that NAIT students would have less influence at the level that deals most with education.

Horne also stated that clearly, "ACTISEC has to establish itself first,' before NAITSA would again consider joining

CFS was not invited to the General Council meeting last week.

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

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



The CRTC (Canadian Radio & Television Commission) Canadian content rules... if these requirements are not met, FM radio play of a song is limited to 19 times per week.


