Academic Council

This group is required by the Technical Institutes Act and exists chiefly to advise the Board of Governors on academic matters. These include programs of instruction, academic awards, and standards and policy respecting the selection and admission of students. In practice, the Board may refer any matter it wishes to the Academic Council, and the Council may make any recommendation it chooses to the Board.

NAIT's Academic council consists of 21 members:

- the President - who is the chair

- three chief academic officers

- seven members of the academic staff (elected by their association)

- seven members of the student association (elected by their association)

- the registrar

- one member appointed by the board

- one member of the support staff.

Their terms of office

may vary.

Meetings of Academic Council typically occur on the second Monday of each month, and, with the permission of the Chairman, any member the Institute community may attend. Any such member who wishes to make a representation Council must do so in writing to Chairman at least five days before a meeting.

Designated Driver Program

In the launching of the S.U.D.S. Squad Campaign, Roxanne Beaubien, 1990-91 NAITSA President, presented sweatshirts to the Board of Governors Chairman, Jim Shaw; Dr. Souch, President of NAIT; and 1991-92 NAITSA President Chris Horne in April, 1991.

Responsible use of alcohol is an important topic on post-secondary campuses across Canada. Many universities and colleges establishing programs to promote awareness, discussion, education on the subject of alcohol use. Some post-secondary institutions such as the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAII) are striving to educate their students before unfortunate situations occur.

This is the objective of the S.U.D.S. Squad (Students Understanding Drinking Sensibly). In 1987, staff and students at NAIT established the NAIT Alcohol and Drug Awareness Committee. The committee has used a variety of campaigns to promote responsible alcohol use to the NAIT student body including speakers, displays, and entertainment activities.

By 1990, NAIT had developed a series of successful programs to educate and raise awareness responsible drinking, constantly striving to become more visible on campus. Last year, the Committee changed their name to the NAIT S.U.D.S. Squad and developed a new ongoing project called the S.U.D.S. Squad Designated Driver Program, sponsored by Molson Breweries.

The Designated Driver program will be used in the student lounge (The Nest) and at all NAIT Student Association (NAITSA) sponsored functions (Rock 'n Talks and Cabarets). All student clubs on campus will be strongly encouraged to use the program at their

functions. Each table or group will select a designated driver. Once the driver is selected, he/she will be given a S.U.D.S. Squad bracelet by the serving staff which entitles them to complimentary nonalcoholic beverages for the evening. bracelet is designed so that it cannot be refastened if it is removed. This ensures that the bracelet is not taken off one person and placed on another individual who may have been drinking.

Posters will also be displayed in The Nest, at NAIT and student club events to show that the Designated Driver Program is available. The posters will be used to promote Alcohol Awareness Week and other S.U.D.S. Squad Activities. S.U.D.S. Squad Sweatshirts will be used as giveaways for promotion of the program.

The Designated Driver Program works in several ways. First, alcohol servers 'bartenders' and 'wait' staff will wear buttons with the S.U.D.S. Squad Designated Driver logo to show patrons that the program is available. These buttons will also be used for promotional purposes during Alcohol Awareness Week and Registration.

NAIT's New Fire Alarm System

The installation of NAIT's new, state-ofthe-art fire alarm system has advanced over the summer, to the point where it is almost ready for service.

The new fire alarm has been installed on the main campus buildings only. The and information instructions below apply to those buildings only. Buildings not affected are: Westwood Campus, Patricia Trades Campus, the Trailers, Medical Technologies Annex, Westerra Campus and the Distribution Centre.

As of this last week of August, the detecting devices, pull stations, annunciation panels, control panels, speakers, horns, conduit wiring installed in all affected buildings, with the exception of the Activities Centre (S). Some installation work remains on less visible such parts. ventilation and sprinkler systems. The Activities Centre is scheduled to be during completed September. The central

command centres, including graphic displays and emergency voice communication facilities, will be installed and connected in later in the fall.

Currently, the system is being verified by the consulting engineers and the contractors as required by the Alberta Building code. Every detection device must be proven by simulation of the normal triggering action to send a signal via its zone control panel to all the alarm speakers and horns in the zone. The verification alarm sound is the peculiar, rythmic, rasping noise many have heard. The sound is being suppressed as much as possible. By the last week of August, most of the building zones will be verified, with Engineering Technologies Annex (L), Continuing Education Centre (K), the Mechanical Trades (N), Annex Trades Industrial Building (V), in progress. Following later in September will be the verification of M e c h a n i c a l Technologies Annex (B), the Services Building (C) and the Activities Centre (S).

The fire alarm zones are being turned over to NAIT and placed in interim service as they are being verified building by building. Watch for removal of the "Not In Service" signs from the pull stations; announcements should appear through "PROFS" and other NAIT publications. When they are in interim service, a fire alarm will be sounded as a loud whooping noise. When the alarm is sounded, the building should be evacuated per normal procedures. Further information will be made available concerning the audible alarm in its final form when the system is completed later in the fall.

Arrangements are being made to inform the Fire Wardens, in more detail, of the interim and permanent capabilities of the system.





The Ooks are now setting their sights on the pre-season schedule which has just been released.


The traditional intersquad game goes at the NAIT Arena on Friday, September 6th at 4:30 p.m.






