All Aboard the SS Benefit NAIT

On February 22, 1992, 400 guests will experience "a world of pagodas, teahouses, and cherry blossoms" as the SS Benefit NAIT sails to Japan.

This is NAIT's fourth annual dinner and auction which raises funds for the NAIT Foundation. This is important because all the money raised is put back into the school.

This event is also important in terms of including the involvement of more than 100 people including many NAIT students who are able to practice their skills.

Regarding funds raised, money is used for scholarships, bursaries, specialized equipment, campus development, and other activities aimed at improving the quality of education for NAIT students.

The Nugget talked to Sabine Brasok, Media Relations Coordinator and Publicity Chairman, who described the event and students' involvement.

Japan was chosen for this year's destination because NAIT is twinned with the post-secondary institute, "Ao Yama Technical Institute," in Hokkaido, Japan.

NAIT's Japan will be created in the south lobby, and the cafeteria will be transformed into the interior of the ship.

All of this requires vast amounts of work and a great deal is being done by NAIT students.

Apparel Design has created 52 kimonos.

Architecture technology is building props. NAIT's graduating chefs will be preparing the seven course meal. Radio and Television Arts is doing the lighting, and Woodworking and Carpentry is providing a public utilities building (that's a fancy term for an outhouse).

Brasok feels good about student involvement as "it gives students an opportunity to practice their skills."

NAITSA is also providing one of the items to be auctioned. NAITSA's president, on behalf of the students' association, is providing a handcrafted chest full of student

accessories.

Brasok is "pleased to see students involved especially since funds raised benefit the students."

This event is extremely high class, and NAIT is doing all that it can to provide an authentic setting.

It has even chosen a mascot for the event: a Daruma doll. This is a Japanese doll with the following purpose. When an objective is identified, you paint one of the doll's eyes. The other eye is only painted after the objective is completed.

On the night of the benefit, one eye will be painted. It is hoped that by the end of the evening the objectives of the SS Benefit will have been achieved so the other eye can be painted.

Increasing enrollment, reduced space, government funding cutbacks are reasons why the SS Benefit sails every year. And each year it is a success as Brasok confirmed "there is tremendous support for the event and lots of internal and external support from the community."

A Sensational Tabloid Speaks Out

Last week, The Nugget received a letter from David McKinstry who accused The Nugget of turning the paper into a "sensational tabloid." He further stated that The Nugget's sometimes "confrontational" attitude towards the NAITSA executive was inappropriate and unwarranted.

He suggests that The Nugget should quit challenging the executive about its policies because these decisions have been sanctioned by the entire student body through the NAITSA elections.

This is indeed a very broad interpretation of a student mandate. Consider the fact that only 794 out of 7000 full time students voted. Furthermore, no first year students at NAIT, like myself, could have voted last year. Thus, only around 400 students that are enrolled this year even bothered to vote either for or against this executive. It's not the executive's fault that so few voted, yet the fact remains that

they are without what one would call a "blistering" mandate from the students.

Yet, more to the point, if a newspaper is to protect the interests of the students, it must publish dissent from the policies of the executive. The right to dissent, that is the right to a free press, is essential to any democracy. Yet, if I am to understand McKinstry, he says that students have given up those rights once the executive is elected. Would he have any problem with Mulroney taking over the CBC and silencing his critics. After all, if The Nugget staff "in no way have the right to act independently without fear of repercussion" then why should the CBC.

The Nugget should be responsible to students and not the executive. As it presently stands, an unscrupulous executive could silence the paper and turn The Nugget into a newsletter of upcoming events full of praise of NAITSA policy. No one wants that. Even now, The Nugget is working with the executive to make the paper more autonomous from the executive, that is responsible to a board of full time students who would have the power to hire and fire.

I'm sorry that McKinstry finds the paper "sensational" and "overstepping the boundaries of good taste." Yet, taste is very subjective. If we were to publish a paper that was not indanger of offending anyone, I doubt most people would find it either informative or interesting. If this makes The Nugget sensational or even immoral, then so be it. Yet, I think it just makes The Nugget a good student newspaper.



Horne's Report from Senate Hearings

NAITSA's president Chris Horne attended the Calgary conference on institutional reform, specifically dealing with the Triple E Senate.

Horne's own conclusion is that Canada's senate will become "elected, equitable with compromise, and these two will bring about efficiency."

At the conference, Horne sensed a strong desire by people for change. However, the feels that "people are not going to get change unless they compromise." Horne believes that a compromise will give Canada an equitable Senate and Quebec a veto right in the House of Commons.

Horne discovered that there is a willingness to gather together a crosssection of Canadians to discuss possible reforms to the senate and other government institutions.

Horne was one of 240 people who attended the conference. Although there was not anything specific on the agenda regarding postsecondary education, Horne

feels that the future of the country is in its youth, and "youths need to be represented."

Horne says that one of the precepts of the Triple E Senate may have to be altered. The term "equal" will have to change into equity. As Horne stated, "an equal senate just won't happen; equity will." Horne explained further "equitable includes regions as well as populations; whereby Quebec and Ontario would not dominate the senate."

The term elected is safe as there was a clear majority to have the position of Senator an elected one. Here the only problem Horne cites is the problem in implementing it. .

"When would you have elections?" Everyone at the conference expressed different opinions, and no specific answer was found.

The term "efficient" was a given. The consensus was clear to have a Senate with effective powers in order to represent provincial interests, and special interest groups.

The format the conference took was it separated people into workshops where people

would propose topics as well as discuss assigned ones.

Horne thought the workshops were "excellent and a key element in the success of the conference." It was in the workshops where Horne realized the importance of the need to compromise.

After discussion in the workshop, the participants would converse and discuss ideas in a large forum. Horne felt the forums stifled discussion, as people were more reserved in regards to speaking out against special interest groups.

Horne feels his presence at the conference made a difference. He feels personally he has a "greater understanding of Canada and the cultural mosaic that is embodies into it."

Horne also recommends that students get more involved and educated on the subject to try and make a difference. He suggests talking to your federal elected representative because it is only if they hear from you that they are able to represent you. He felt the conference was successful yet the battle is not over.



Mike, from Retailing, agreed "it wouldn't hurt" to get him to the pool. He especially liked the idea of the hot tub being coed.



The NAIT curling teams, determined to uphold NAIT's tradition and match last vear's impressive showing, passed stage one and two with flying colors. They posted an overall 19-10 record on the season and all qualified for the provincial playoffs. At this point, the Ooks have competed in two regional tournaments: the first was hosted by Lakeland College in Vermilion on November 22-23rd, and the second one took place at Grant MacEwan on January 31 - February 1st. A total of 46 games were played in the fall regionals and 47 games were completed in the winter meet, as seven Alberta colleges battled in the roundrobin format to determine the provincial qualifiers. The top four teams from each division (men's, ladies', mixed) will compete in the provincial tournament, which is scheduled for February 29 - March 1st in Camrose.

NAIT ladies squad were

determined to give NAIT it's third consecutive ACAC championship win. The team, which is made up of Terry Peterson, Jean Ellere, Renee Bussiere and Jana Kolot, was unhappy with their play in the fall regionals but still finished with a 3-1 record. Still not firing on all cylinders, they doubled their record in the winter meet, finishing first with a 6-2 record.

The NAIT men's team, consisting of Tim Schneider, John Mulyk, Paul Sorensen, and Kevin Marks, struggled in the regionals and had to scratch away for every victory. Their 5-3 record placed them third - behind Lakeland College and SAIT in one of the most competitive fields ever. The '92 championship will definitely be a toss-up in this category.

Graduation and injuries forced the Ooks to start a completely new lineup in the winter regional tournament for NAIT's mixed team. It didn't seem to matter as the two squads produced identical 4-2 records, placing





These scholarships. worth \$1000 per athlete, are awarded to students who are Alberta residents enrolled in full-time study, a member of the specified team and are maintaining satisfactory academic achievement. This sounds fine for the basketball, volleyball, badminton and men's soccer team. But, the hockey team is not eligible for the Condon Scholarships this year because they won't be competing in a national championship.

The hockey Ooks are leading the ACAC (Alberta College Athletic Conference) with a 19 - 2 record on the regular season and they won't be competing in a national championship. Why? Because there isn't a national championship in hockey anymore. So, no national competition, no athletic scholarship.

I don't know about you, but as a student, a \$1000 is a heck of a lot of money. But the money issue is most likely only part of the setback for the players. These guys want to keep their season going past the ACAC playoffs. They deserve the right to be able to compete against other talented colleges in the country. To date, the Ooks have captured an unprecedented. five national titles. Who knows if they'll ever get another chance to prove their worth and ability at a national level?

The Canadian Colleges Athletic Association (CCAA) is the national governing body for men's and women's college sport in Canada. They stipulate that at least three provinces must be willing to compete against one another in order for the competition to be considered a "national championship". This is the problem: there aren't enough provinces who are willing (for some reason or another) to take part in a National competition.

It's pathetic and the Ooks should obviously be deeply frustrated. It's hard on the players and coaches and it's also difficult for the fans. We're all deprived of being a part of a continued winning hockey tradition here at NAIT.

This is not good for college hockey in Canada. It's wrong and the bottom line is we all lose out in the end.

The NAIT Ooks (19-2) swept a pair of games from the Red Deer College Kings (14-7) to clinch first place in the ACAC regular season standings with four games left in the campaign.

On Thursday, February 6th, the Ooks edged the Red Deer College Kings 4-3 in overtime at Red Deer.

In the first, the Kings jumped out in front on Dave Soukoroff's powerplay marker at 3:55. The Ooks bounced back as Kevin Lovig notched his fifth and sixth goals of the season at 6:14 and 12:22 respectively.

In the second, the Kings tied the contest at 2-2 as Erin Ginnell found the net at 7:38 while the Ooks were killing a penalty.

In the third, the Ooks received even strength goals from Dean Beattie (10th) at 5:46 and Greg Geldart (9th) at 15:13 to complete a season sweep of the Kings.







Black-Eyed Man **Cowboy Junkies GE/BMG Music**




