Challenge Cup Week may be one of your last opportunities before midterms roll around, and


the **** hits the fan, to kick back and let it ride.

Autonomy Is The Only Answer

This week, the Publications Board plans to look at the not fewer than 38 guidelines that harness The Nugget. While it's true that some guidelines could be made more clear, the real problem with the guidelines is that they are too often used as a basis for improper interference with the paper by the NAITSA executive.

The latest example of this, aside from the firing of Tim Pasay, occurred last week when Communications Vice-President, Susanne Glenn, deemed parts of Bradley Smith's letter to the editor to be profane and inserted the absurd "Fword" replacement in those spots.

Only an extremely narrow interpretation of the profane would lead one to the conclusion that Smith's letter was offensive. The "F-word" was not used to disgust or affront, but to make a point; that it is ridiculous for the newspaper of a post-secondary institution to be unable to use the unedited "F-word" when it is appropriate or necessary to convey an idea. Perhaps what offended Glenn was not the "F-word", but Smith's complete lack of confidence in the NAITSA executive.

Clearly, no one wants The Nugget to get its material from bathroom walls, yet sometimes, the "F-word" is the most appropriate word to use. For example, the Ryerson Polytechnic newspaper used the "F-word" as its two word front page headline in response to imposed guidelines even more restrictive than The Nugget's. There, the word took on a political meaning that may have been missed if the "Fword" was not used. Surely, Ryerson and NAIT students alike understand this; very few would be genuinely offended.

It has been mentioned more than once that The Nugget would have wider student appeal if it was less subdued. Perhaps changing the guidelines would help in this endeavor, yet this is just addressing the symptoms of the problem and not the problem itself. The real problem is that the interpretation of the guidelines and ultimate editing powers lay within the NAITSA executive. If the editor chooses to critisize the NAITSA executive, the results will be a far less charitable interpretation of the guidelines if not outright

There isn't a respectable student newspaper in this country that would tolerate the degree of influence that this executive has on The Nugget. What The Nugget needs is not more guidelines, but an unbiased group to interpret the existing guidelines. The paper should be judged by students, picked at random or from General Council. Students should give the editor direction and not the NAITSA Communications Vice-President. For only when students take control of their newspaper will The Nugget be able to improve itself.



"I give you full marks for doing it," he said. "I wish one of our journalism students had suggested it."


The Dec. 4 issue of the




As President, free time is a valuable commodity. Much

Ooks Blank Vikings in Camrose

For the second straight week, the NAIT Ooks (15-2) -- with Don Davidge between the pipes -- recorded a shutout.

Davidge made 27 saves as the Ooks blanked the Augustana University College Vikings (5-11-1) 4-0 in ACAC hockey action at Camrose on Friday, January

Following a scoreless first period, Vince Boe netted his first of the season on a point shot at 6:31 of the middle

Despite having chances to tie the game, the Vikings could not hold off the Ooks in the third. Greg Geldart scored his seventh of the campaign on a shot from the blueline at 6:06 of the frame. Mark Souch then one timed his 16th goal of the season at the 8:49 mark. Mike Park then deked Brent Sheehan for his 11th of the campaign at 14:12 to complete the scoring.

The Ooks outshot the Vikings 37-27.

The Ooks ability to shut down an opposition's offense became evident a week earlier when the Ooks held the SAIT Trojans to only one goal in a pair of games at the NAIT Arena.

On Friday, January 17th, NAIT netminder Don Davidge made 25 saves as the Ooks blanked the Trojans 5-0.

Mike Park netted NAIT's only goal of the first, his seventh of the season, at 18:41. The middle stanza unfolded with Trevor McCallion and Randy Wong netting their first goals of the season at 2:52 and 9:42 respectively. Darren Perkins closed out the NAIT scoring with markers at 10:52 of the second and 10:53 of the third.

The Ooks did not let up or let loose in the third as the Trojans tumbled into a state unintelligent, undisciplined hockey. While the Trojans were taking penalties, the Ooks were netting powerplay goals. In the first fifteen minutes of the frame. Mike Park and Greg Geldart each tallied twice with Trojans doing time in the sin bin. Park then completed the hat trick with a pair seconds left in regulation play.

SAIT goaltender Eric Badzgon left the NAIT Arena with a higher goals against average after surrendering eight goals and blocking 41 shots.

The Kings (11-5) face Mount Royal on Thursday night while the Ooks travel to Camrose with fan bus in tow on Friday to meet Augustana at 8:00 p.m. The Ooks and the Vikings then square off at the NAIT Arena on Saturday night at 7:30 p.m.



The Ooks also managed to round out the day with eight second place finishes over Keyano College from Fort McMurray and Red Deer


NAIT's Erik Rebnord and Barry Saretsky finished undefeated, winning each of their individual events on the day.

The final ACAC swim meet of the year will take place March 14th in Fort McMurray.





away with nothing to show for their hard work.


We fought so hard and we felt we didn't gain anything from it. The feeling carried over the next night when we played Mount Royal and we lost to them, too."


It wasn't that bad of a time but I have a couple of questions about the night:
