Nest Manager Fired

The NAITSA executive decided last week to relieve the manager of the Nest, Gord Matthews, of his duties.

In a written press release, the executive stated that this decision was made only after "a thorough review of the manager's responsibilities and performance" and that the decision "was based on

sound business reasoning and is in the best interest of the Nest, NAITSA, and the students."

In an interview, NAITSA President, Chris Horne, said that financial problems were not a factor in Matthews' dismissal.

Presently, discounting depreciation, the Nest is breaking even.

However, Horne did say

that the Nest was operating at a less than expected level. The Nest has traditionally lost some money, but it's clear that NAITSA would like to at least lessen what has become an increasing burden.

Horne was quick to add that despite these changes, the primary mandate of the Nest will still be to provide a service to students.

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Serious Times Require Serious Measures

It has been a sad fact that for the past twenty years, what was known as student activism has been replaced by a lethargic narcissism in the minds of nearly all students.

A perfect example of this is right here at NAIT.

When the Board of Governors voted to raise tuition as a part of the government's plan to hike fees to almost three times the present rate, what did students do? Amazingly, just like with most other issues, we did literally nothing.

I have two theories as to why this is so.

Firstly, many student issues do not affect students in an obvious manner. To take the tuition example again, an extra \$100 isn't going to be terribly significant to me in my final

education bill. This has made it too easy for students to ignore the fact that, at the present rate, an education at NAIT will soon be beyond the means of many prospective students.

Secondly, students, especially here at NAIT, show a distinct uneasiness at the prospect of challenging authority. Very few students here do not fear the label "trouble maker." Such a label would be a catastrophe for the average career obsessed NAIT student.

Fortunately, there are signs that this distasteful trend is coming to an end. Government cuts are finally becoming a tangible part of students' lives and students are finally fighting back. In recent protests against cutbacks, U of A students have chained themselves to tables in a library and are now organizing their annual march on the legislature.

Students are realizing that education has reached a critical point. A decade of calm discussions with government has done very little. Our future efforts need to be reinforced by actions that reflect the seriousness of our situation.

Some greet this radicalization with disdain if not outright embarrassment. Yet serious times require serious measures and a few radical incidents could be what finally grabs the government's attention and helps Albertans avoid either a substandard or elitist educational system.

German Example for Technical Schools

The unveiling of the Federal budget by Finance Minister Don Mazankowski last week showed a slight flicker of hope for students of post-secondary educational institutions. After examination of the budget, however, this flicker fizzled to nothing but a smokescreen. Yes, the 3 1/2% "administration fee" was abolished and the education deductions for students was increased from \$60 to \$80 per month of attendance at a recognized institution, but don't think for a minute that this will lighten the financial burden. Take, for example, the \$103 tuition increase, the most allowable by law, which is nothing but a precursor to more increases until students will eventually be shouldering 20% of the cost of their post-secondary education, which has become government policy.

With the economy in a recession, the likes of which hasn't been seen since the "dirty 30's", Canadian tax laws which protect big business and multinational corporations and punish the majority of citizens, and a prehistoric government which thinks the only way to dig its way out of an horrific

debt is to cut social programs to those who really need them, things look pretty bleak. It may be time for the nearsighted politicians to look at countries that have come from the ashes of war to become world leaders in technology, trade and business. A prime example is Germany.

Now what does Germany have to do with the problems of the average student at NAIT. A lot.

In Germany, 20 billion deutschmarks (DM) are spent every year on the trades and apprenticeship programs. This works out to \$15 billion Canadian. The German government realizes that a strong economy starts with a population secure in its employment. This money, however, does not come only from the government. Strangely enough, corporations, labor unions and government work together to keep the economy strong. Companies like Ford of Germany and Siemens ensure that their employees are well trained and that training continues as technology becomes more complex.

The money spent on technical schools in Germany works out to about eight times that of the total Canadian budget for technical institutes. This translates into better trained technicians and more jobs for more technically oriented positions.

Skeptics may say that "Germany has a much larger population." True, but even if Canada's population is 1/4 that of Germany's, that still works out to 50% less per capita. When will the Canadian government realize that, to keep an economy stable, diversification of industry is necessary, and expert training for the population is absolutely essential.

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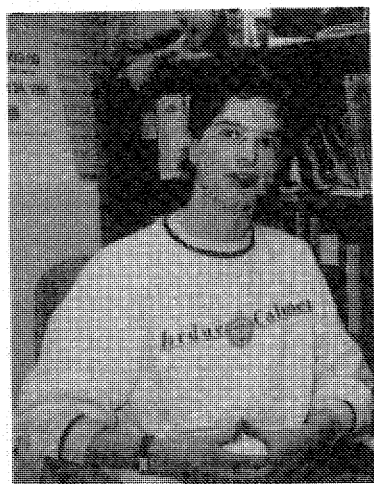

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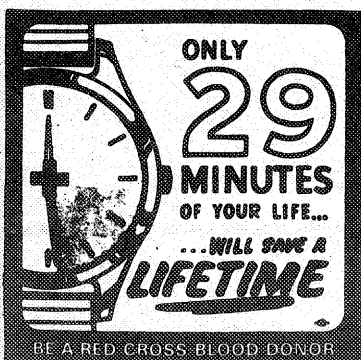
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NAIT Teams are a Success

Intramural entry forms are available from Athletics V.P., Shane Warawa, in E-133H in the NAITSA offices.



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



Hockey Ooks in ACAC Final

The NAIT Ooks advanced to the ACAC best of five final with a 7-1 victory over the Mount Royal College Cougars to win the best of five ACAC semi-final series three games to none.

In the first, the Ooks chased MRC goaltender Randy Beekhuizen from the contest with three goals. Wayne Manley netted his second of the playoffs with a glove side shot at the 1:27 mark. Darren Perkins then scored on a screen shot from the point at 9:19 and a slapshot from the circle at 15:18.

In the second, the Cougars -- with Ken Weiss between the pipes -- closed to within two on Pete Berthelsen's marker at 13:03. The Ooks regrouped and acquired a 5-1 advantage before period's

end on Greg Geldart's third of the playoffs at 15:24 and Wayne Manley's third of the post-season at 16:19.

In the third, Kevin Lovig and Randy Wong of the Ooks netted shorthanded goals at 9:32 and 14:04 respectively to seal the victory.

NAIT's Don Davidge blocked 18 of 19 shots while MRC's duo of Beekhuizen and Weiss stopped 44 of 51 shots.


After the sweep, NAIT assistant coach Randy Repchuk noted the team is coming together at the right time with Nationals less than three weeks away. "We played some of our best hockey in the series and haven't peaked yet."

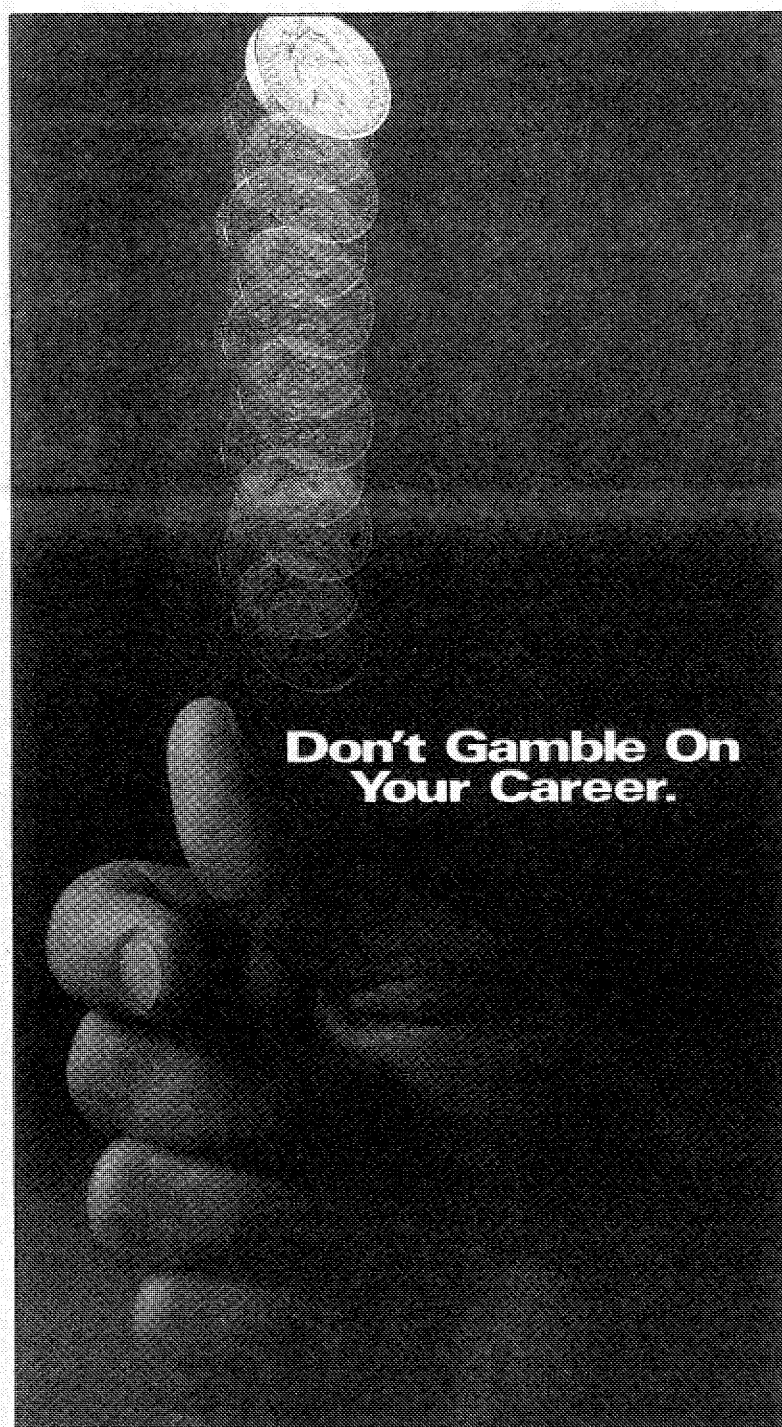
The Ooks will now meet the SAIT Trojans in the best of five ACAC final. The first two games of the series will go at the NAIT Arena on Friday, March 13th, at 7:30

p.m. and Saturday, March 14th at 2:30 p.m.

In the other semi final series, the SAIT Trojans scored a 4-3 overtime win over the Red Deer College Kings in the fifth and deciding game to advance to the ACAC final for the second year in a row. The Kings forced a fifth game after downing the Trojans 6-3 on Thursday, March 5th, and 6-4 on Friday, March 6th to tie the best of five at two games apiece after trailing the series two games to none.
