NAIT May Go Nonsmoking Next Year

NAIT could be on its way to becoming a smoke free environment as early as September, 1992.

This would mean that the only places a person could smoke would be the Nest and the staff dining lounge.

The reason for a nonsmoking policy is clarified by Jim Berg, Vice President of student and staff services. The problem lies in the ventilation system. Smoke cannot be properly vented out of the institute, rather it circulates in areas where it shouldn't be. Berg stresses that dollars should be spent for educational purposes rather than specialty building maintenance.

"Given the problems of poor ventilation, high costs to remedy improving circulation, and numerous complaints" Berg suggested a smoke free environment to the Health and Safety Committee. However, he talks about phasing this in and it is up to the committee to decide if this is acceptable.

Susanne Glenn, VP Communications, feels certain that NAIT is going nonsmoking. "The question right now is whether this

policy is done in stages or all at once."

Glenn states, "it is a matter of economics." She feels that NAIT's response is "proactive rather than reactive."

Glenn also discusses the health of staff members. Specifically, she mentioned the cashiers in the Cafetorium in the V-Wing who are "forced to stand out in the smoke for long periods of time."

Another concern says Glenn is the "lack of study space, and the smoke if not properly ventilated is not conducive to studying."

Glenn is the student representative for the Health and Safety Committee and she will be asking the General Council for feedback on this issue. It is her responsibility to make a recommendation on this issue to the committee. Glenn states "I will vote in a way that reflects students."

However, she has just one vote. She will present her recommendations to the committee, but they may or may not be followed through.

Will NAIT go smoke free?

Nelson Kennedy, Co-chairman of the Joint Worksite Health and Safety Committee said that "they haven't reached a consistent conclusion yet."

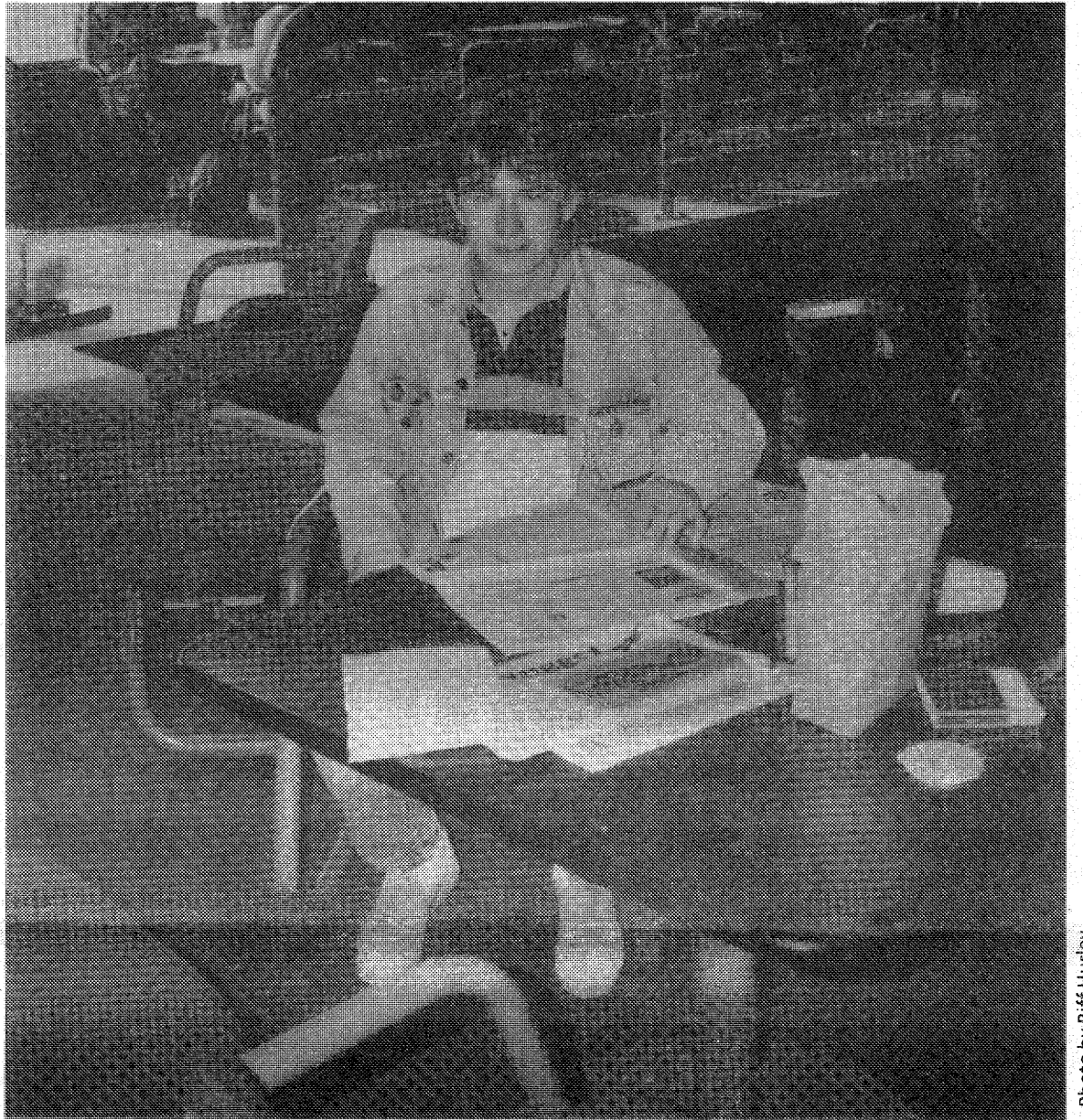

Student Leader Calls Budget "A Joke"

The headlines shout of a \$1 billion tax break. Mazankowski "wants a budget that will deliver a strong bottom line: one that supports the well-being of Canadians..." The question to be asked is how "well-being" is defined.

Students are Canadians but is their well-being supported by the government.

The response to this is mixed. First the good things:

The government will eliminate the 3% guarantee

fee on loans and increase the limits on loans to needy students

This issue of dropping what is known as the "administrative fee" was pursued by the Canadian Federation of Students. The CFS actively lobbied the government and held a large rally in September in support of banning the 3% fee.

The budget will provide an \$80.00 education credit for each month of full time study. This replaces the current education credit of \$60.00.

This \$80.00 credit will

also apply to disabled students enrolled in post secondary institutes on a part time basis in an "attempt to improve their educational opportunities."

The limit on the total amount of tuition on education credits which can be transferred to another taxpayer is now \$680.00. This is an increase of \$80.00.

These initiatives have been praised by students and academic leaders.

Unfortunately, it is rare when good news is not followed by bad.

The grace periods on student loans is no more

Starting with the new loan guarantees for 1992-1993, the six month post-graduation interest subsidy will be eliminated. Although students have six months to make their first payment, interest will be charged from the date students leave school.

So, where does this leave Canadian students?

According to Sandeep Dhir, Alberta Representative for CFS who, on behalf of all post secondary students, went down to Ottawa to meet with the Minister regarding abolishing the 3% fee, "the budget is

a joke."

Dhir, who is also the President for Mount Royal Student Association, states, "the government hasn't dealt with the real problem." He said, "it's just like giving shoes to the homeless, whereby their feet are warm, but they are still homeless."

This issue is very real to Dhir who told *The Nugget* last Christmas that 300 Mount Royal students had to visit the food bank.

Dhir feels the "government doesn't care about the value of education." He supports this

Where Was NAITSA?

Where was NAITSA? Sandeep Dhir asked me this question, and I was left speechless.

Dhir's question was specific regarding the involvement of NAITSA in the new federal budget released last week. He wanted to know why NAITSA wasn't involved and what do the constitutional conferences that Chris Horne has been attending have to do with benefiting students?

Briefly, Sandeep Dhir is heavily involved in the Canadian Federation of Students. The CFS is the largest national student lobby group and their efforts have resulted in student tax credits, and most recently the elimination of the 3% administration fee on student loans.

I decided to check this out. Why wasn't our student council more actively involved in voicing student concerns to the federal government. Especially since Don Mazankowski's budget speech stated, "In preparing the budget, I listened carefully to Canadians, ... to workers, students, ... and Canada's youth." He goes on to say "I received hundreds of letters...."

The CFS can account for over 4000 letters I was told by Dhir, but it is sad to think that possibly not one letter was sent from NAIT.

Now I don't mean to knock NAITSA. They reviewed

joining CFS with the General Council and the vote was unanimous not to join.

This is not the problem. The real underlying issue here is that we as a collective body did nothing to help students via the budget. At least, I am unaware of any attempts by students to lobby the government in an attempt to provide students with tax credits, etc..

I am really trying to say that it is nice to know that there is a CFS and I would like to thank them for all the hard work they have done on behalf of all Canadian students.

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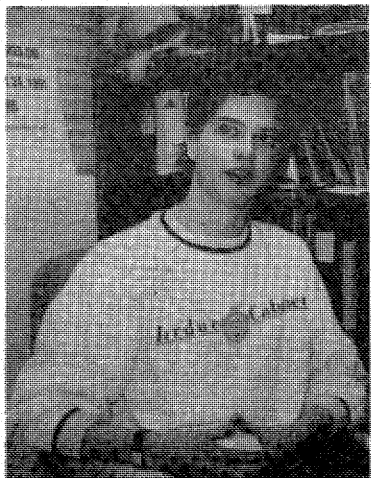

- These steps represent the regular process to be taken, but alternate routes may be investigated with the help of your Student's Association.

Re: "Teacher Evaluation Forms"

reviewed by the program head and anonymous results are in turn given to the instructor in question. If there are numerous complaints of a similar nature, the program head will investigate it further and, if viable, the results are put in the instructor's file. This leads into the "cleaning house" part of the letter. First off, NAIT has numerous quality instructors, but unfortunately, the "poorer"

instructors stand out (every institute faces this problem). When NAIT faces restructuring, it is generally the instructors with the poor file, not the length of employment, that get dismissed.

A group of Heavy Duty Mechanics also gave their comments on the subject.

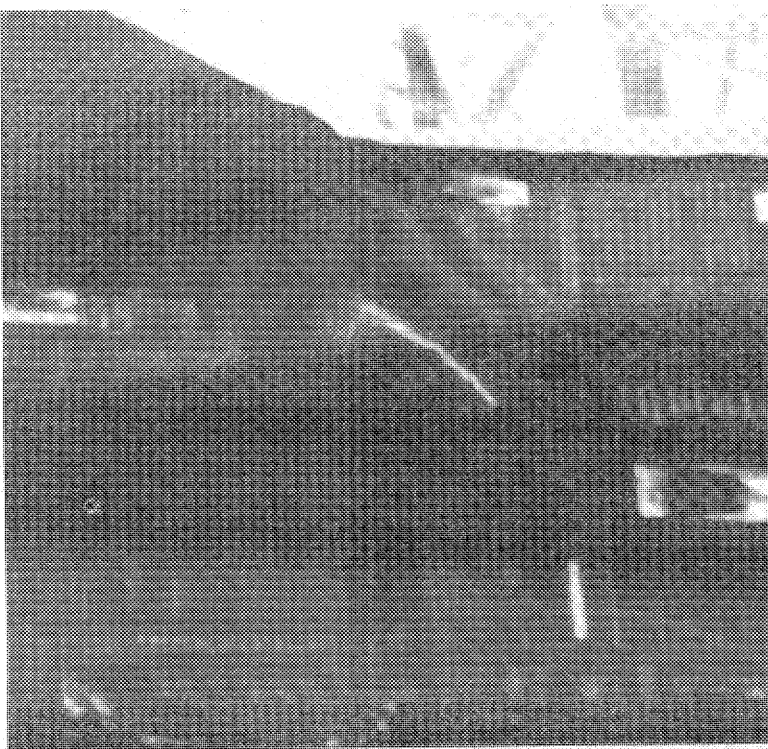
Brian put it simply, "no go." He also mentioned that it is okay to smoke outside in the summer, but not in the winter.

Local Blood Donor Clinic Planned

The Canadian Red Cross Society will be holding a mobile blood donor clinic at NAIT, North Lobby (West end near main cafeteria), 11762 - 106 Street, Edmonton, on Thursday and Friday, March 19 and 20, 1992 from 9:30 A.M. to 2:30 p.m..

More than 240 mobile blood donor clinics are held each year throughout Northern Alberta. The blood collected at mobile clinics helps to ensure the Red Cross is able to provide an adequate supply of blood and blood products to hospitals in our region.

The Red Cross is expecting 175 people to attend each day. Persons 17

years of age and older, weighing over 100 pounds and in good health are encouraged to take just 40 minutes of their time to save a life. Please eat a full meal prior to donating. No appointment is necessary. New donors are requested to bring identification.

The mobile blood donor clinic is being sponsored by NAITSA.

Each year, the Red Cross must collect 71,100 units of blood in Northern Alberta just to meet the needs of the hospitals. Have you saved a life lately?

view with the statistic that the federal government has not increased funding to the provincial government since 1986; however tuition has increased by 121% and books by 83%.

"Students are underfunded and their concerns were not met in this budget" says Dhir who would like to see the real issues concerning students dealt

with. Some of these concerns involve the lack of government funding and the growing inaccessibility of education.

Although Dhir considers the budget a "travesty", there have been some positive concessions. The students and the education system have been recognized and the federal government is listening.

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General Council Notes

It's that time once again. Another General Council meeting was held on March 3rd.

There was a second reading on changing the student membership fees for NAITSA to \$97.00. It must undergo one more reading since it deals with a change in the NAITSA constitution.

The motion to donate \$1000.00 to Hire A Student was passed. This was given the thumbs-up by Dan Lachambre, VP Academic, who feels this is a good way for students to help other students.

Next, the council discussed the "receptionist proposal." As Horne told the council, a receptionist is needed to help take "the load off of Student Services." Presently, NAITSA relies heavily on the secretary in Student Services.

The two motions required for enactment are 1) Be it resolved that NAITSA pass \$6,138.45 from the building fund to set up a receptionist station within NAITSA offices and 2) Be it resolved that NAITSA hire a part-time receptionist.

Although the first motion was passed, the second has been tabled until the next council meeting when the executive can present figures on working hours and the hourly wage.

The smoking issue was tackled next. Susanne Glenn, VP Communications, sits on the Joint Worksite Health and Safety

Committee. She asked the council for their feedback on the issue of making NAIT smoke-free. Glenn wants to represent the students to the committee and present student's recommendations to the committee. If any students have comments on this issue, please submit them to Glenn before March 18th.

One of the concerns brought up by a council member was what will happen to the Rock 'N' Talks. Will smoking be allowed?

Chris Horne said that he "would like to see Rock'N' Talks remain smoking."

A \$200.00 increase in pay for the executive council was brought up by Chris Horne. Horne would like to see the increase as an effort "to not block anyone from running for council."

This discussion has been held over until next meeting as the General Council would like more information regarding all the benefits supplied to the executive.

Nominations are now open for NAITSA. Please note there is only advance polling on Thursday for Westerra students.

"Sorry" says Susanne Glenn to Plaza II students. She extends an apology for any blame placed on students regarding the escalators in Plaza II. It seems the escalators themselves are dying. The estimated cost to replace these escalators is \$7 million dollars.

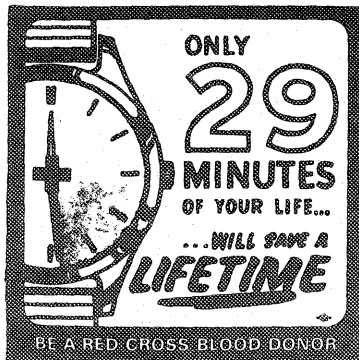
Mike Jenkins appearing at the Tower Lounge on March 5th and Dean Austin at Westwood on March 10th.

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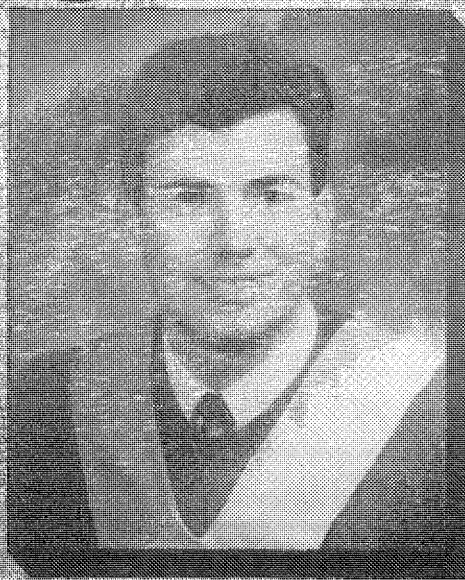
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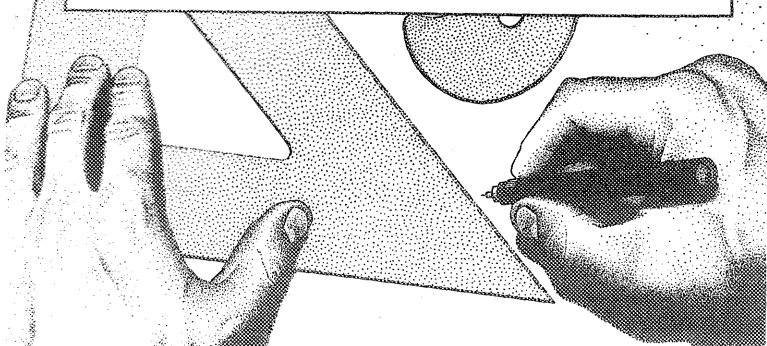

"It's hard to foster a team game in an individual sport like badminton, but everybody I put in played well and did the job."

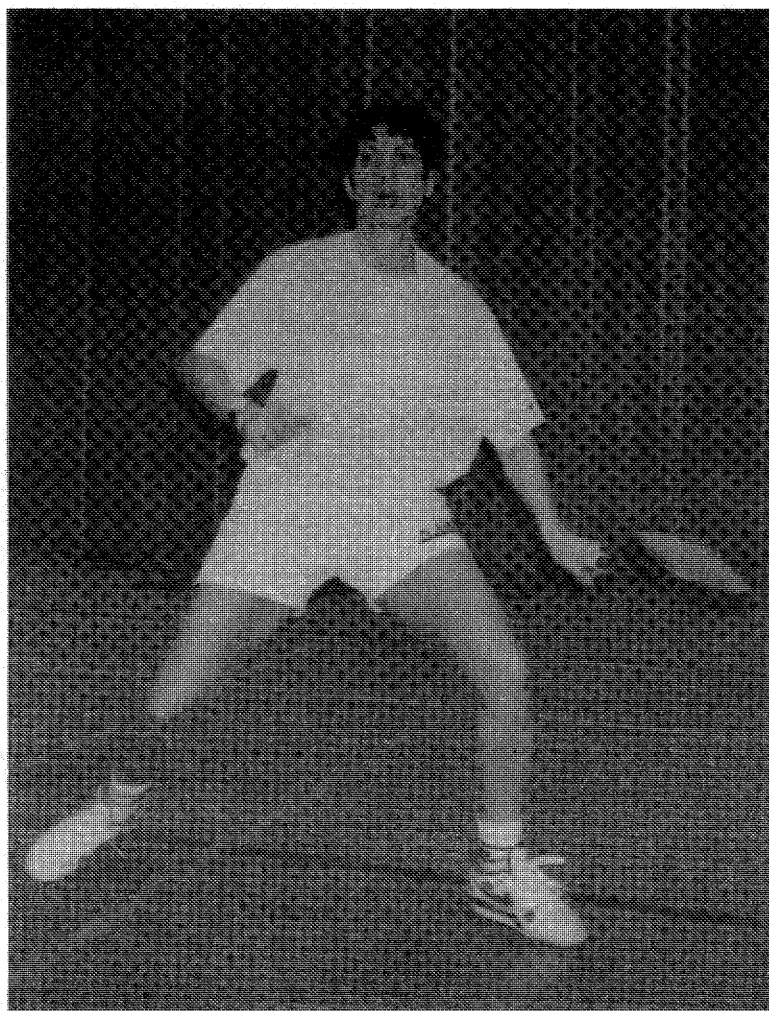

Sheryl Poon and Corinne Nielsen also put in strong performances.

NAIT struggled throughout the year but finally managed to work their way into the fourth and final playoff spot.

Red Deer was expected to beat the Oaks, but as Farmer admits, it's still disheartening to exit postseason play as abruptly as his Oaks did.

"As a whole, I feel a bit deflated after a game and series like this. Our girls came out flat but that was largely due to the number of serious injuries they had."

Lorraine Culham injured

her knee during Sunday's match-up which definitely hurt the Oaks' chances of coming away with any type of success on the night. Culham is a multidimensional player who is rugged and aggressive.

With the season now over, Farmer looks back on his coaching stint here at NAIT with a positive attitude. The V-ball coach is not expected to return next year, but can take solace in the fact that he is leaving the team in a better position than when he came in '88.

"We were seventh overall that first year. Then we worked up to fifth overall the following season and this year we finished fourth in the league."

Farmer feels that the volleyball program is in a positive position now. He strongly believes the Oaks should be proud of their efforts.

As for the season, Farmer says, "Well, you can't come up big for every match. And even though we wore our hearts on our sleeves tonight, you just can't win them all."

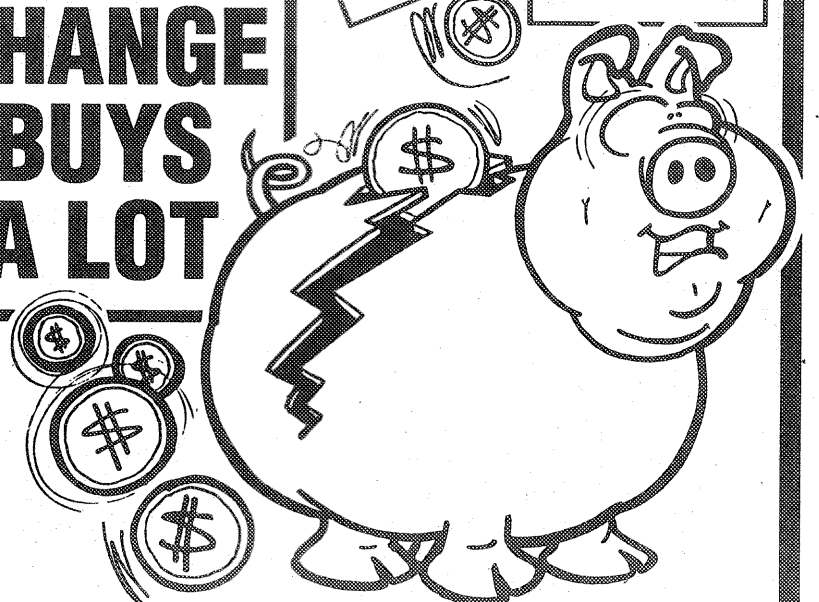


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Baseball Stoooped in Tradition Too Long

As the saga of the Seattle Mariners continues, one thing becomes evident -- baseball is still in the dark ages.

A few years ago, Al Campanis, formerly of the Dodgers made a statement that blacks do not have the ability to make it off the field in baseball. While the statement deservedly cost Campanis his job, the statement did little to change baseball's attitudes.

Since Frank Robinson's breakthrough into the managing ranks in the 1970's, black managers have come and gone. Today, Cito Gaston of the Jays and Hal McRae of the Royals are the only black skippers in the major leagues.

Similarly, the owners of major league baseball want to keep their boys' club private. As a result, some

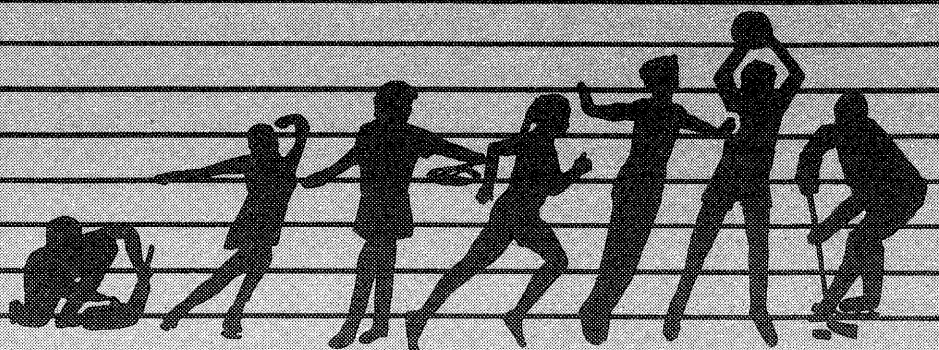

NAIT Goalie Joins Winning Tradition

For Cam Moon, playing with the NAIT Ooks hockey team has been an unexpected but welcome surprise. Cam started the Radio and Television Arts program in January on an educational contract from the Saskatoon Blades of the Western Hockey League. He chose the NAIT program because of its excellent reputation in Western Canada.

Cam's arrival at NAIT coincided with the injury to goalie Alec Sheflo, making Moon a valuable commodity for coach Perry Pearn. Cam got his first taste of ACAC hockey in a

next six in Edmonton, followed by a move to Fort MacMurray. There, he played for the Oil Barons of the Alberta Junior Hockey League.

"That was a turning point. I was 17 years old, still going to high school when I moved away from home."

After an outstanding Midget season, the Fort Mac experience was a major disappointment for the young goalie. He was traded to the St. Albert Saints midway through the season. He didn't see any ice time with his new team and came close to quitting his favorite sport altogether.

"I thought if this is what it's all about then I want no part of it."

Before Cam could make a decision regarding his career he got an invitation to play for Nipiwani in the Saskatchewan Junior League. He accepted. Moon realized that a move to the SJHL would be the best move

game against the SAIT Trojans, NAIT prevailed, 8-1. He soon realized how disciplined a Pearn-coached team could be.

"I hardly saw any shots that game," said Moon. "The guys were playing great in front of me - they deserve all the credit. Perry's got a great system going."

Not all of the teams Cam has played for have been this tight defensively though. Playing for the Blades and Medicine Hat Tigers in the WHL, Cam usually faced two to three times as many shots than he's seen at NAIT so far. But as crazy as it sounds, he never minded the action in the WHL.

Cam explains. "When I was four or five years old and living in Kamloops, I would go to the games. That was probably one of the biggest influences in my life - going to junior hockey games. The rink was always full and the fans were always passionate. From then on I knew what I wanted - to play in the Western League."

Cam went on to play his first four years of hockey in Kamloops, his

possible. He knew he would receive enough ice time and more exposure in his new league, which, he hoped, would lead him to his dream of playing in the WHL.

Sure enough, Cam went to a WHL camp and hooked on with the Blades. He attributes the jump to the WHL to his experiences in the SJHL.

"I needed a chance to develop more as a player and the SJHL provided me with enough ice time to get better. It's a high quality league and I was playing for a good team. That makes all the difference in the world. Playing in front of a good team always makes you look better.

Cam was ecstatic after making the Blades.

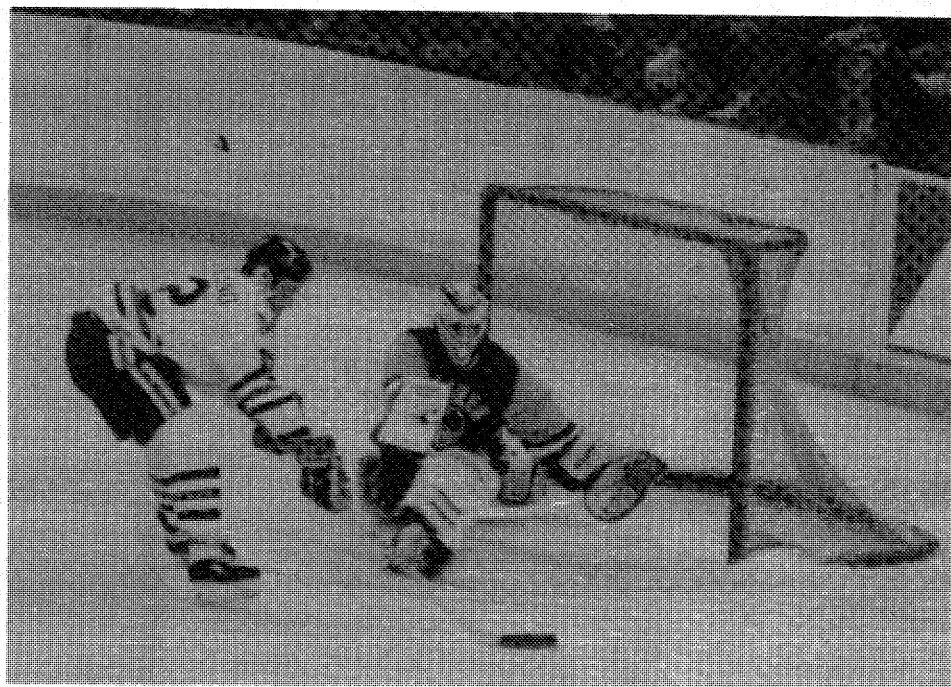
"Going to Saskatoon was the biggest thrill," he explained, a smile flitting across his face as he remembered his experiences there. "I don't think I could have had any more fun. Good bunch of guys. You make friendships there that will last forever." He paused and then added, "You do everything together. You're on the ice together and sticking up for one another which is probably the biggest thing. You know who's going to be there when the chips are down."

Cam has only been at NAIT two months, but already his great demeanor has won him many new

To find a reason for the Ooks success over the years, Cam believes one need look no further than the coach, Perry Pearn.

"Perry's been here a long time and has put a lot of banners (ACAC, CCAA championships) on the wall. I think that makes everybody work a little harder, so we can make our own mark. This team goes hard from start to finish and I think that's a reflexion of the tradition and of Perry Pearn as a coach."

Pearn played Moon in five regular season games and the keeper put together a 4-0-0 record with a solid 1.87 GAA. But with Sheflo back from injury, the Ooks now have three excellent



friends on the team. However, the hockey Ooks are defending more than each other when they skate onto the ice - they're defending the tradition of excellence at their school.

Moon elaborates. "There's a heavy tradition here with winning. When you talk to other players around the league they know about the tradition and they're kind of intimidated."

Moon proved himself with the Saskatoon Blades of the Western Hockey League.

"There are not a lot of stars here, but every guy is on the ice working hard. The depth on this team is so great that there isn't a drop from the first line through the fourth. This team is capable of winning it all this year - if we play Perry Pearn hockey."

Cam Moon might not see any action as the NAIT Ooks try to claim their billionth ACAC hockey title, but Cam's story can teach everyone something. Remember his life long dream to play in the WHL? Once he achieved that goal, how did he feel to learn he wasn't good enough for the N.H.L.?

"Sometimes these things don't work out. But, if you give it your best shot then you're never upset and you never have to look back."

Give it your best shot. Hmm... That's a philosophy a lot of people should adopt. Live and learn.

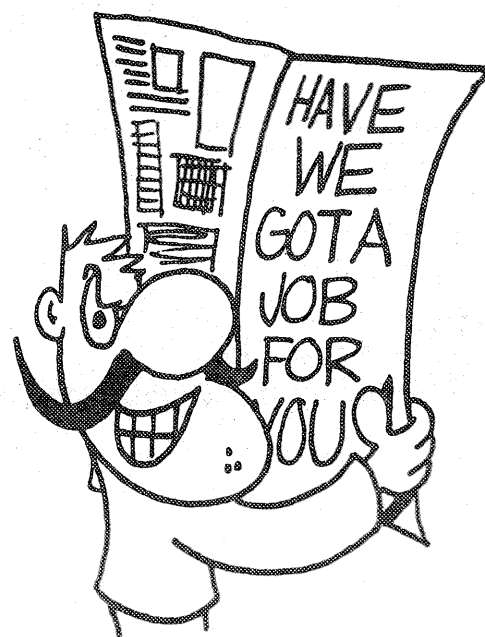

You'll be more effective if you speak directly to the people with hiring authority. You're also apt to learn more about the company's needs and upcoming opportunities.

You're entire job campaign should be personal. Call prospects on the phone and address your cover letter to the person you spoke with.

Be persistent in tracking each of your initial contacts. At the close of your cover letter, let them know you intend to call later to discuss your application. It is interesting that thank-you letters have been found to have the highest correlation between those people looking for work and those who get offers.

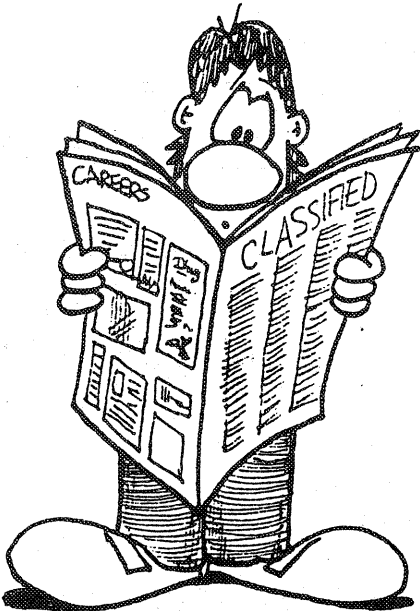
Use your research before the interview to help you select the organizations with which you wish to obtain employment. After the interview, use it to help in your decision about employment when you have received a job offer or offers.

Hockey Nationals Coming to NAIT

In an effort to revive hockey at a national level in the CCAA, NAIT will be hosting the CCAA Hockey Cup from March 25th through the 29th.

The host NAIT Oaks are the most successful hockey team in CCAA history and will be one of the favorites due to their past success at nationals. The Oaks have captured an unprecedented five CCAA National Championships (1981-82, 1984-85, 1985-86, 1988-89, 1989-90) and are looking forward to winning the CCAA Championship Bowl a sixth time.

In addition to finishing first in the recently

completed ACAC regular season, the Oaks scored victories over the University of Alberta Golden Bears, University of Saskatchewan Huskies, and the University of Manitoba Bisons in posting a record of five wins and one loss against teams from the Canada West during the 1991-92 campaign.

The second contender will be the defending Ontario Colleges Athletic Association Division I champions, the Georgian College Grizzlies of Barrie, Ontario. The Grizzlies have been one of the most consistent OCAA teams over the past five years and currently have a record of twelve wins, three losses, and one tie.

The third contender for the CCAA Championship Bowl will emerge from the ACAC playoffs. The CCAA champions of 1976-77, 1978-79, and 1979-80, the Red Deer College Kings (16-9-0), finished second in the ACAC regular season and won the Red Deer Elks College Classic in January -- a tournament which featured four CIAU teams. The CCAA champions of 1980-81, the SAIT Trojans (16-9-0) completed the ACAC regular season in third place and scored victories over the University of Regina Cougars and the University of Lethbridge Pronghorns in action at the Red Deer Elks College Classic only to lose to the Kings in the tournament final. The CCAA champions

of 1987-88, the Mount Royal College Cougars (13-11-1) placed fourth in the ACAC regular season and could make the grade.

On the first three days of nationals, the round robin portion of the tournament will take place with NAIT meeting the ACAC representative on Wednesday, Georgian taking on the ACAC representative on Thursday, and NAIT battling Georgian on Friday. All round robin games are 7:00 p.m. starts.

On Saturday, March 28th, the 2nd and 3rd place teams would meet at 7:00 p.m. to earn a berth in the championship final at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, March 29th.

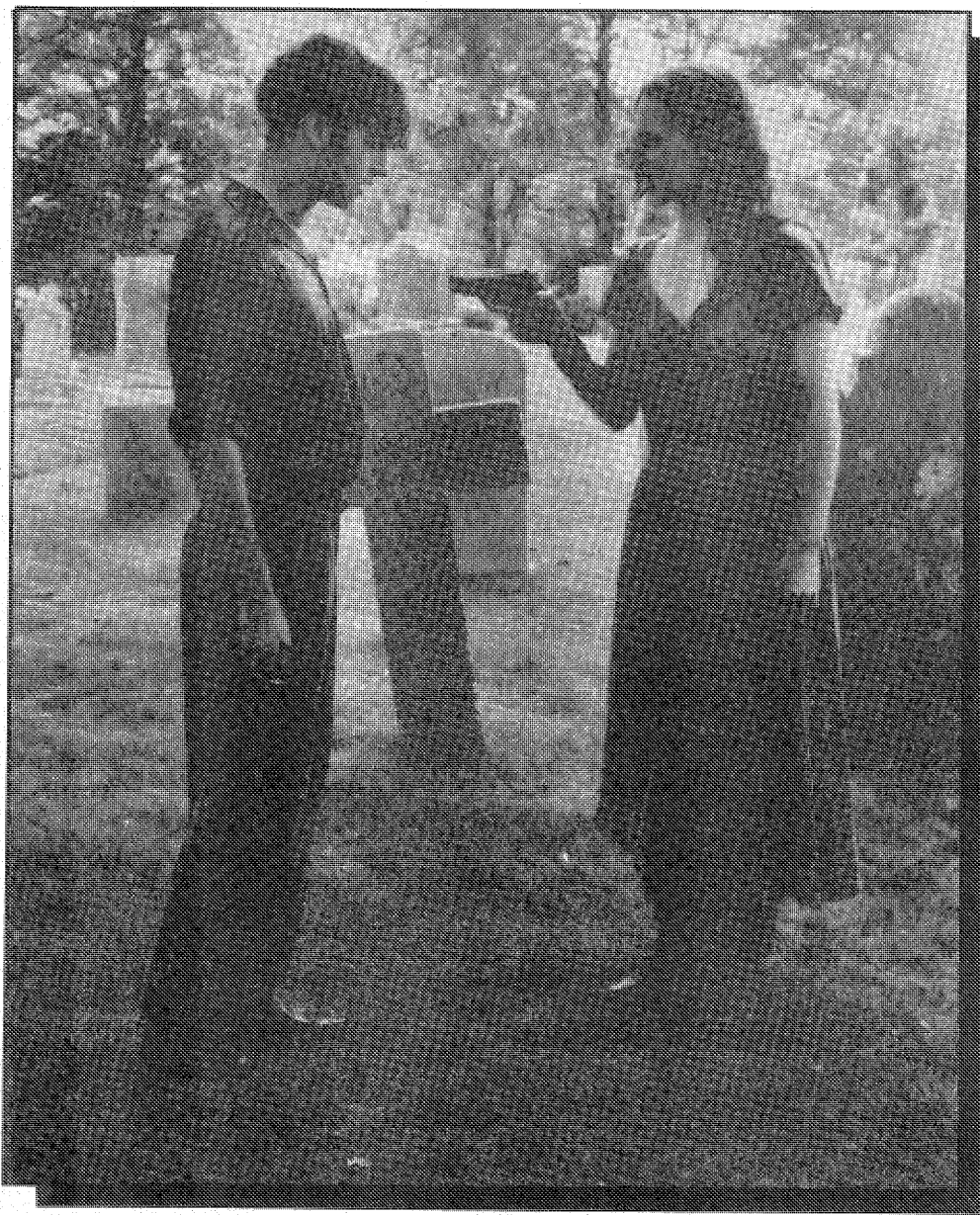

When I first heard about this movie, I thought it would be a cheap ripoff of Lynch's *Wild at Heart*, but I was pleasantly surprised. In fact, this movie, directed by Bruce McDonald of *Roadkill* fame, was well-written, well-directed, well-shot, and had a damn good soundtrack to boot.

The story starts out in a small town in northern Ontario the end of the line
