

NAIT students interested in finding out more about career opportunities in their chosen field will soon have the chance to do just that.

This Tuesday, November 17, NAIT will be holding its annual career fair. Officially titled "Career Options," it runs from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm for one day only in the gymnasium and is open to all NAIT students.

Over 60 different companies are participating this year with booths set up in the gym. Businesses ranging from Scotiabank to Syncrude will be there and they are listed on the

gymnasium floor plan which is posted on bulletin boards around campus.

The whole idea is to provide NAIT students with the opportunity to familiarize themselves with the kinds of jobs that will be available to them once they graduate, as well as other job options that may be out there.

Students speak directly with potential employers and, although the emphasis is on getting information and gaining insight rather than securing a job, it sure doesn't hurt to establish contact with a company you think you might like to work for.

Also at the career fair students will receive a 144

page reference manual called "the NAIT Student's Guide to Job Search." This comprehensive manual provides information about each company who is participating in the fair, as well as sample application forms, sample interview questions, average starting salaries and the complete Job Seekers Handbook. It contains a wealth of information specifically designed to help NAIT students find jobs.

Career Options has always been a popular event, and for anyone serious about job search, it's an opportunity that shouldn't be missed.

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
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NAIT's long arm reaches Ontario

If you lived on Moose-Factory Island, Ont. and you wanted to become a Cable TV Technician, would you come to NAIT?

Probably not! However. the long arm of NAIT Continuing Education would reach you, if you did, in fact, live on Moosefactory Island!




Moose Factory Island, is a thriving community in northern Ontario, population of about 3,500. No roads lead to this picturesque development-- it is accessible only by air or train to the town of Moosonee, then by a 20 minute water-taxi ride (the taxi is in actuality an 18 foot canoe). The community has 1 hotel and 1 restaurant (which closes at about 8:00 pm), and as you can well imagine, there isn't much to do for entertainment during the evening hours. They do have cable TV, and that's why NAIT's Dick Wilson, Assistant Program Head for Telecommunications was there recently as an instructor, teaching the first module of a 30 week CATV program to 10 students. Until now, if anything went wrong with the Moose Factory cable system, parts would have to be shipped 1600 miles back and forth to and from Toronto for repair. It makes sense to have people living in the area who trained in the are maintenance of CATV equipment. But how did NAIT end up providing the training?


A while back, Allan Jolly, President of the Mocreebec Association (who owns the Cable system in Moosefactory), happened to pick up

a NAIT CATV Technician course brochure at a Canadian CABLE TV Association meeting. The enterprising members of the Moose Cree Band, who form the majority of this settlement, felt that if they were to train their own people, maintaining their own cable system would be a much more efficient way of handling repairs. Allan contacted Dick Wilson, and following 2 years of negotiations, NAIT was able to put together a course package specially designed to meet the needs of the Moose Factory community. And, they were very specific about their needs--the course schedule had to be arranged in such a way as to accommodate the hunting season! Although Dick found that in many ways their insular society paralleled ours, there are still some areas where they keep to the old traditions. That, too, is changing. Among the younger people, many now want to own their own homes, and there is a lot of activity in the area, centered around the building of new houses in a development off the Reserve.


When asked for his thoughts on the experience Dick said, "It was just great! I was a bit uneasy going in... then I was pleasantly surprised by how busy and hard-working the people are! Although the local hospital would be the largest employer, there's a thriving artistic community... tourists make day trips up there for bird watching... whale watching-- if I went back again I'd make time to do those things! As it was, the three weeks I spent there were pretty intense from a teaching standpoint."

All in all, the program promises to be a success-- it's a logical step for Moose Factory Island to become capable of maintaining their cable TV, and dollar-wise it makes even more sense to bring in people and equipment from NAIT to train students rather than send them out. Several of the Telecommunications instructors will have the Moose Factory experience during this school year. And plans may be in the works for additional training in the

Canada Post embarrassed

Canada Post must be suffering from acute embarrassment right about now, and if not, they should be.

Recently in Calgary, a man wanting to mail a tiny parcel went to two different postal outlets to have it weighed and priced. Although both outlets found the weight of the package to be 24 grams, the man was quoted two drastically different prices. The first outlet, Postal Station G at Market Mall, told him it would cost \$3.20 to mail his package; the second, a Shopper's Drug Mart postal outlet also in Market Mall, quoted him a price of only 42ϕ !

The Calgary Herald, upon hearing of this nonsense, decided to conduct a survey of eight different postal outlets to see if inconsistent mailing prices were commonplace.

Evidently they are. The Herald found extreme price variances from outlet to outlet and, even worse, was their discovery that prices at a single outlet for the same 24 gram package varied on different days!

The clerks at these outlets used all sorts of charts, gauges, and templates to verify the different prices they were

quoting. Apparently the only thing that was consistent at all the postal stations was that the weight of the package was 24 grams!

When confronted with the whole bungling situation, Canada Post Corporation's spokeswoman Teresa Williams could manage only a weak comeback: "It's something we are definitely concerned about. We are definitely going to get to the bottom of it."

Well, I should hope so! Even though this particular mess is coming out of Calgary, one has to wonder if similar botches happen here in Edmonton.

Considering that all eight of the postal stations surveyed in Calgary were completely disorganized, I suspect that Edmonton outlets may not be much better managed. And if that's the case, people have a right to be angry. Canada Post mailing prices are supposed to be standard. Most people, when sending off their Christmas parcels, don't shop around at different postal stations to compare prices. It is simply assumed that the price quoted will be uniform across the city. Clearly, they're not. Chances are the average consumer has been ripped off on more than one occasion by inept postal staff

Maybe Canada Post is at fault for failing to thoroughly train their staff, or it could be that the staff are just a bunch of incompetent halfwits in need of replacing.

Whatever the case, it is plain to see that the postal consumer had better be careful to shop and compare. The Christmas rush is coming so be warned: at Canada Post, customer service is sorely lacking.


1.) What is the kilowatt-hour cost of





Mustang Ken Brown put in a great performance despite the 13 - 1 score Saturday

How sweep it is. The hockey team ran it's record to 4-0 with consecutive wins over the expansion Concordia Mustangs last week. NAIT won Thursday at Northlands Coliseum by a 9-2 score and then ran up a 13-1 count Saturday here at NAIT.

Concordia's style - or rather, lack of it - showed the Mustangs inexperience and lack of talent. They had two problems against the Ooks - first, they were rarely in the right place in the right time. Secondly, when they finally figured out where they should be they didn't know what to do.

Both teams did one thing exceptionally well Saturday-they took undisciplined penalties all night long. The penalties didn't really affect the game though, as NAIT looked like it was on the power play all evening.

The Ooks scored on their first three shots Saturday, sending Mustang goalie Kyle Brown back to the corral. Karl Tiemstra replaced him as was outstanding. He surrendered ten goals but made at least as many

brilliant saves. Tiemstra robbed Ook forward Brad Fallis on a breakaway in the first period. Fallis got his revenge five minutes later though, converting a breakaway opportunity into a pretty goal. He feigned a shot, got Tiemstra to commit and then went to his backhand to give the Ooks a 4-0 lead.

Jason Krueckl scored three times and added to assists to lead NAIT's offense, which has scored 46 goals in only four games. None of the Ooks are putting much stock in the early season explosives, however impressive NAIT may look.

"It's gonna be close this year," cautioned Krueckl, referring to his team's main competition, SAIT and Mount Royal. "We've got to maintain a strong work ethic to be successful."

Another key to the Ooks success this year could be

defenceman Trevor McCallion, who appears to be emerging as NAIT's top offensive defenceman. He collected four assists on Saturday.

"I'm shooting the puck more and getting more ice time," said McCallion. "The coaches have shown some confidence in me. I haven't really changed my game from last year - I'm just shooting it from the blue line and the guys are putting it in the net."

Mike Park and Travis Koehn each had two goals Saturday. Craig Hawryschuk, Tom Oloriz, Dan Flaherty, Tim Olson and Eric Morrissette scored the others. Don Davidge picked up his second win of the season.

Thursday's scorers were Brent Harden (2), Hawyschuk (2), Park (2), Olson (2) and McCallion.

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


