

United Way campaign may fall short

After more than a month of canvassing and special events, NAIT's United Way campaign drew to a close last Friday.

The campaign, which ran from October 6 to November 13, had reached 90 percent of its \$45,000 goal as of Friday, says campaign chairman Dave Hoy. But the final total has yet to be tallied since donors' pledge cards still continue to trickle in. Hoy says he is hopeful that at least another \$5,000 will be collected in pledges, putting the final total at just over the \$45,000 mark.

Numerous United Way fundraising activities have been going on around the main campus as well as the Westerra campus and Westwood in the past few weeks. The different events were all run by staff and volunteers. student According t.o Hov. "Volunteer response has been outstanding," and a volunteer recognition is planned later this month.

One of the most successful events held during this

campaign was MOGA (Most Outrageous Group Activity), put together by the Secretarial Office Administration students. It was held on November 10 at Westwood and raised \$3,620 for WIN House.

Another popular event was Buck a Cup,held at all NAIT campuses. Coffee drinkers were able to purchase a button for one dollar which entitled them to a full day of free coffee. NAIT President Stan Souch personally paid for all the coffee that day, and the total funds raised from that event

came to \$1800.

Other fundraising events included Walkabout Madness, dunk tanks at both Westerra and the main campus, mini-golf, and bead welding.

According to Hoy, special events such as these typically raise seven to eight thousand dollars on an annual basis. The remainder

of the funds raised at NAIT come from staff donations.

All money goes directly to the United Way, a non-profit organization which funds 44 different agencies in Edmonton.

Says Hoy, "The United Way is the one charitable cause the NAIT recognizes and supports I am confident we'll reach our goal."

Instrumentation-second year



COCA WEST '92, held at the Renford Inn on Whyte on November 13-15 was a blend of education and fun.


Delegates from across the Western provinces gathered in Edmonton to discuss new programming for campus activities.


At the Educational seminars, speakers not only gave input but wanted to receive input from the rest of the delegates. Everyone gained insight from members of different institutes.

General Council inconsistent on stripper issue

Earlier this school year, NAITSA's General Council voted to continue NAITSA's ban on free beer advertising in technology cabaret promotions despite the recent Alberta Liquor Control Board's decision to allow the distribution and advertising of free alcohol.

This decision did not come as a complete surprise. NAITSA has always had a policy of promoting responsible drinking and promoting free alcohol almost dictates overconsumption.

It was a surprise, however, when this same council decided last week to allow the promotion on campus of, of all things, strippers for technology cabarets.

It is incredulous that a post-secondary institution like NAIT would even consider polluting its walls with something as tacky as nude or semi-nude dancing advertisements.

While it is clear that the vast majority of the technology representatives feel that posters on our school walls promoting exotic dancers is appropriate for our school, one must wonder if this is really the image NAIT students want to project. That is, of course, the real issue here. Who really cares what goes on at these cabarets anyway?

Strippers, jugglers, virgin sacrifices; who cares? What people do in their spare time is really no concern of mine, or anyone else.

The point is that while no one is denying their fellow NAIT student their God given right to look at naked bodies, it does not make sense to tarnish our institute with posters (however tastefully done) that advertise NAIT students' pension towards these kinds of things.

It was this kind of thinking that went into the free beer decision. Free beer at cabarets were not banned only its advertisement. Yet, one must ask why should NAITSA continue with this policy. If strippers are OK, free beer certainly seems relatively tame.

General Council should reconsider this decision. We go to school at an institution of higher learning and our walls should reflect that.

President's Corner




Human-animal encounter


Dear Editor:


NAIT athletics to help Tiger's kids
