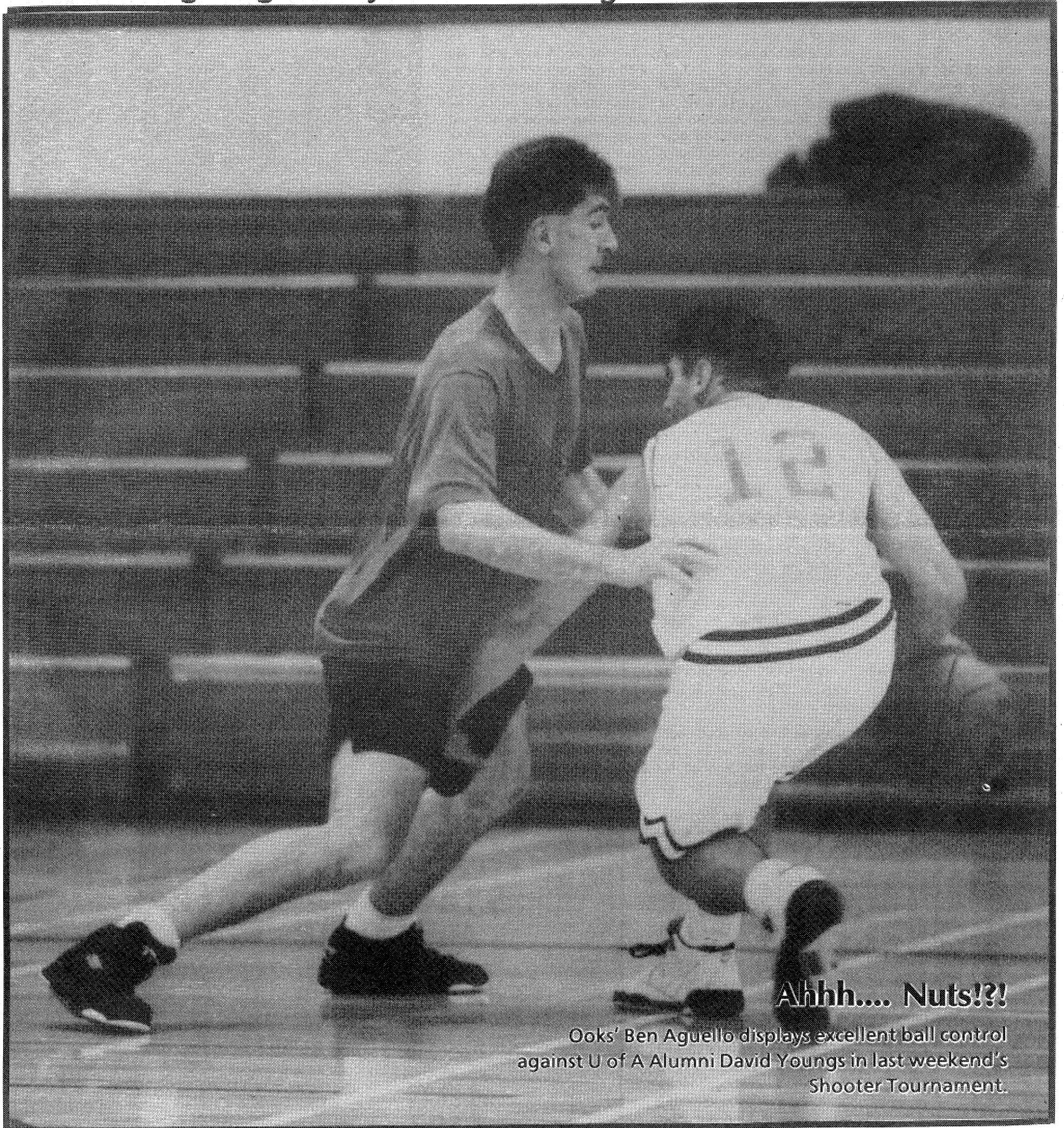

NAIT's Good Samaritan

Around the city she's being called "The Angel" and "The Good Samaritan". NAIT Business student Amanda Steenwinkle has recently gained notoriety in Edmonton because of her humane actions early one Sunday morning toward fellow NAIT student, Andre Sinclair.

It was 3:00 am on November 8 when Steenwinkle and a friend were traveling across the high level bridge on their way to have pizza at another friend's place. They noticed a car stopped in the left lane with its hazard lights on and the driver bent over the trunk, apparently in search of something, so they changed lanes in order to avoid the obstruction.

It was at this point that a red firebird driven by a drunk nineteen year old came screeching up from behind and smashed into the driver of the stopped car.

The driver, NAIT mechanics student Andre Sinclair, had a shattered leg and severed artery but

managed to drag himself over to the sidewalk before collapsing. Meanwhile, Steenwinkle jumped out of the car and flagged down a passing motorist to call police and an ambulance.

She then went to Sinclair, and, recalling a St. John's Ambulance course she had taken in elementary school, she tourniqueted his leg and tried to comfort him and keep him conscious until help arrived.

After the ambulance left with Sinclair, Steenwinkle went to a pay phone to call Sinclair's parents and then went straight to the U of A Hospital where she stayed with him until his parents arrived.

With the arrival of his family members, she took her departure and eventually made it to her friend's house to eat pizza.

Over the next three days Steenwinkle tried twice to visit Sinclair in the hospital but both times he was in surgery so she just left a note.

Sinclair and his family wanted to thank her for saving his life. But, not knowing how to contact her

or even her last name, they contacted police in an effort to locate her. Police said, amazingly enough, that they did not have her recorded as a witness, so the family called the *Journal* and asked them to do a small article on their situation in the hopes that Steenwinkle would see it and contact them.

The story made the front page of the *Journal* on November 18 and was also aired on local radio stations. Steenwinkle heard of this that morning and in the afternoon she went to visit the grateful Sinclair at the hospital. He gave her a gold pin in the shape of an angel as well as three red roses to show his appreciation.

Steenwinkle says she found the extensive media coverage overwhelming. She had expected maybe a reporter and a tape recorder but instead found numerous

microphones and TV cameras. "I felt like the Prime Minister!", she exclaimed.

Since then she says people have been approaching her

and asking, "Are you the Angel?"

Sinclair will be recuperating for the next few weeks and hopes to be back at NAIT in January.

7:30 am; Cooking technology students are in the kitchen doing the prep work for the dishes they will be making.

Cooking is a two year course that consists of several different sub-courses such as: pastries, international, cold dishes, pates, and appetizers.

The students spend approximately 23 days in each sub-course or department. They have a practical cooking exam once a week, which consists of making one or more of the dishes they prepared for practice during that week.

At the end of the 23 days they have a written exam and move on to the next sub-course.

As they move onto a new topic, the students are grouped with new people. This is a neat way to get to know everyone, and learn how to relate to all types of people. A friendly atmosphere reigns in the kitchen. The instructors take part in the jokes and stories that get bigger and better as time goes by.

The Cooking technology supplies the staff dining

room with food for their menu. There is nine different menus which rotate to ensure that the students cook a different part of each meal.

From 7:30 am until 9:30 Cooking students get everything ready to go for the lunch hour rush.

During the rush hours, students cook by the order and work the serving line. On a busy day the kitchen can get pretty hectic.

Cooking students have half an hour of theory per day, where they learn the background of cooking techniques, and styles

NAITSA executive disoriented

NAITSA President Dan Lachambre was away this week and it showed.

The NAITSA executive (without Lachambre) tried to amend General Council's famous motion of two weeks ago that allowed male strippers at technologies' cabarets so the motion would not preclude the stripper's sex, thus allowing female strippers.

A vote was finally called for an amendment that would allow both female and male strippers only if they were "semi-nude", but was defeated.

This is where the confusion starts.

Somehow, the impression was given by the acting chair, Academic V-P Brad Balkan, that a defeat of this amendment meant a change in NAITSA policy disallowing any type of stripping at technology functions.

This ruling is clearly out of order. Any group that adheres to *Robert's Rules of Order* (as NAITSA does) cannot rescind a motion made at a previous meeting based on a defeated

motion some time in the future.

Confused yet? Join the club.

Now no one is sure if Surveying can hold their planned cabaret with male semi-nude dancers. If they can't, who will pay the \$1,300 that Surveying has already shelled out based on Council's decision two weeks ago.

To make matters worse, Balkan and the rest of the executive have refused comment on the issue, leaving NAITSA's policy on the issue a completely incoherent hodgepodge.

What makes the "no comment" stand more puzzling is that the executive refuses even to clarify matters of record like if the amendment was indeed an amendment or a new motion. Why won't they say? Is this something to be arbitrarily decided when the minutes are written up? Surely not.

Even worse is the impression that the NAITSA executive never wanted strippers to be allowed in the first place. The executive has expressed themselves this way more than once. Yet, during the council meeting, the executive tried to deny that they were anti-stripper. This all leaves the stinking impression that the executive is possibly interpreting *Robert Rules of Order* to suit their own agenda.

The executive's damage control strategy on this issue is clear even if there policy is not. It is a "say nothing do nothing strategy" until Lachambre comes back. I have a feeling he won't be too happy.

Breaking the violent cycle

I can hardly believe it. Steve West is in the news again with more dangerously myopic ideas.

With the idea of "saving taxpayers money" West is trying to convince Alberta's judiciary system that young sex offenders don't really need treatment at the highly effective Phoenix program in Calgary, an eight bed facility that sees seriously disturbed juvenile sex offenders working with psychiatrists, psychologists, sex-addiction counselors and a pediatrician. Even though the program has a very high success rate, West is arguing that taxpayers can't afford the cost and that cheaper treatment inside a detention centre will do just as well.

Really? Well judges, youth workers, and psychologists sure don't think so. The statistics say that out of the sixty people treated at the Phoenix program, only four have gone on to be charged with new offenses. Says Dr. Philip Perry, a psychologist in charge of Wood's Homes who runs the Phoenix program, "For adults, you're lucky if you don't have 75 to 80 percent re-offending and before the courts."

That grim statistic proves the need for effective rehabilitation in young people as soon as a need is spotted.

But West remains staunchly opposed to the program because treatment there costs \$210.00 a day. He'd rather spend \$80.00 a day on a less effective program inside a young offenders centre.

In July he sent a letter to a judge who was about to sentence a youth to the Phoenix program, basically stating that the Solicitor General's department did not want to pay for the treatment. The judge was so angry he withdrew from the case.

Lawyer for the defence in that case, Bev Broadhurst, had this to say: "West is flat out refusing to pay for the treatment program which is absolutely vital to this kid. I really don't think he understand what he's dealing with... Left untreated, or left treated in the manner the Solicitor General is saying, that kid would have perhaps grown up to be a serial rapist."

I think that pretty much says it all. Any average IQ can figure out that the future costs for treatment of victims as well as incarceration costs for the offender, will ultimately be far higher than the cost of the Phoenix program.

The Phoenix program makes it possible to break the pattern of violence manifesting itself in these youths. Sure, we could save money now with a less expensive, and less effective treatment program but the future costs of repeat offenses completely outweigh any savings to be had.

Can taxpayers really afford that?

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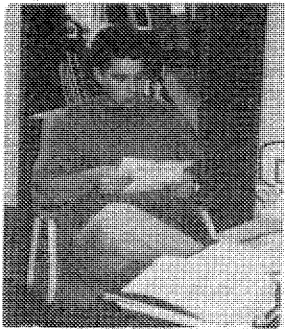

The painful part for the Oaks was the winning goal, which was scored with only 13 seconds left in overtime. It was the breakaway goal.

"We gave up the puck at their blue line twice in the third," explained NAIT rookie Tom Oloriz. "That led to their goals. The mental lapses definitely cost us - it was a bad loss."

Craig Hawryschuk, and Sandro Pisani scored for the Oaks. Alec Sheflo was tagged with the loss.

Saturday night was gut-check time for NAIT. After a string of three games where the Oaks won despite

themselves (both Augustana games) and lost because they couldn't stay focused (Thursday's game), NAIT came out with a solid effort and ended up with a 6-4 win.

Don Davidge put in a stellar performance between the pipes and kept his team in the game with several saves through heavy traffic.

"We got a great effort from the veterans right on down to the rookies," noted Davidge. "Everybody showed up - it was great to see."

Both teams played aggressively and caused numerous turnovers, resulting in a thrilling, fast-paced game. The reason the Oaks won was Davidge though. RDC didn't make any more defensive mistakes than NAIT, but Davidge made the key saves.

The winning goal was scored by Sandro Pisani, a speedy first year forward. He scored on a three on nothing, one of the few goals 'keeper Corey Jones had no chance on.

Defencemen Brent Harden, Darren Smith and Trevor McCallion found the twine for NAIT, as well as captain Dean Beattie and Jason Krueckl.

To those who followed my advice of taking Rob Brown in your pool this year - sorry.

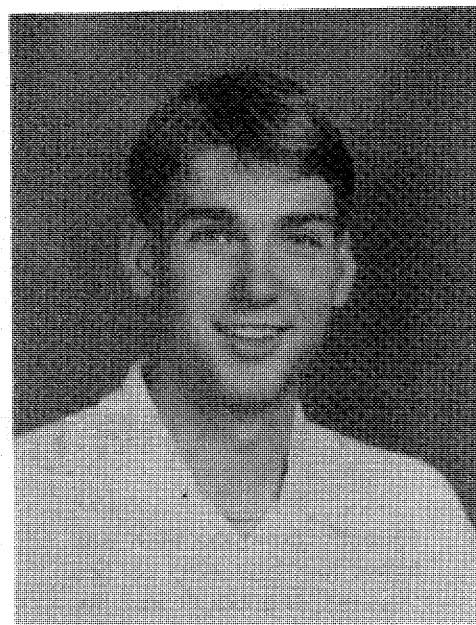

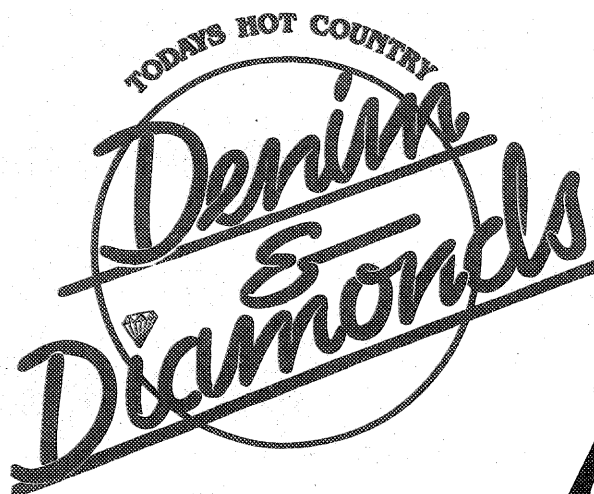

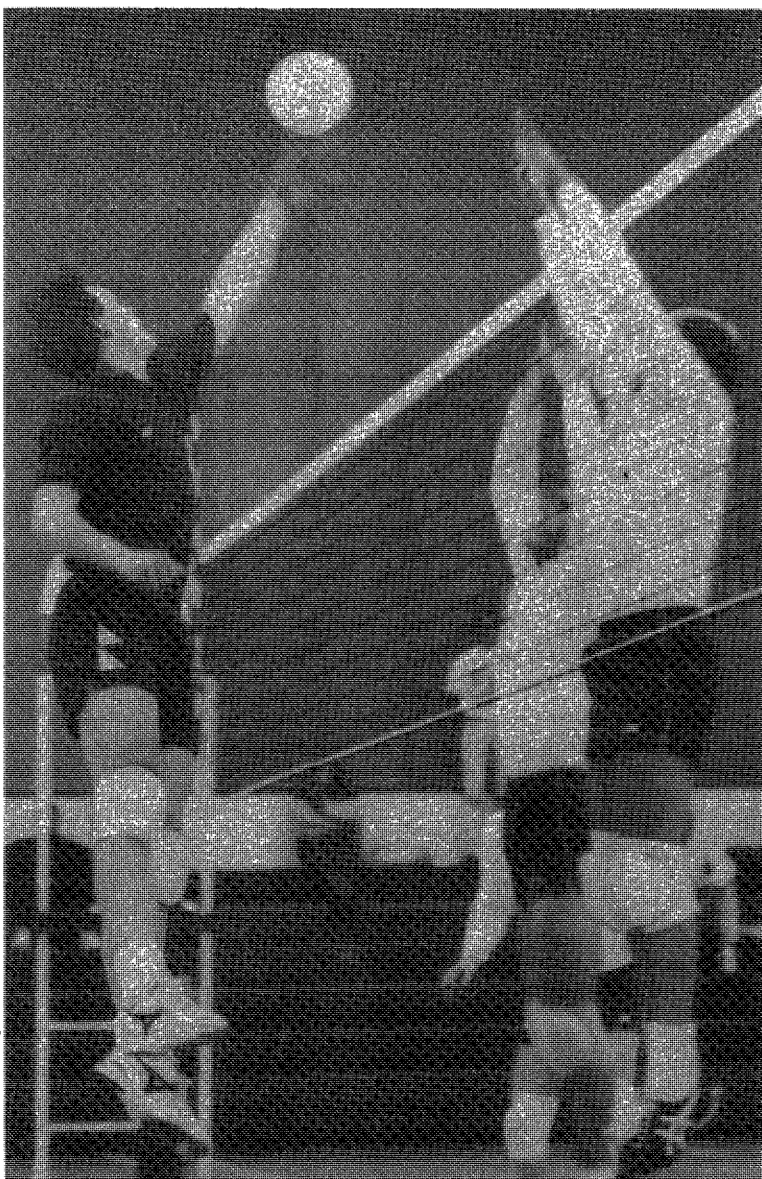

The men's volleyball team was down two sets to one to the worst team in ACAC volleyball, but none of the Oaks thought they'd lose.

knew."

ACAC volleyball is now finished until January, but NAIT will be one of the 32 teams in the North Am tourney at the U of A in two weeks time.

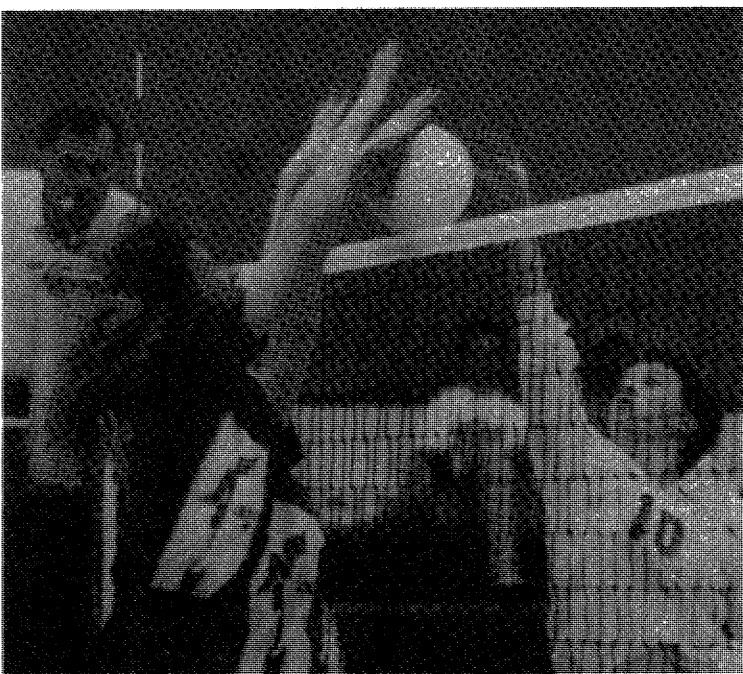

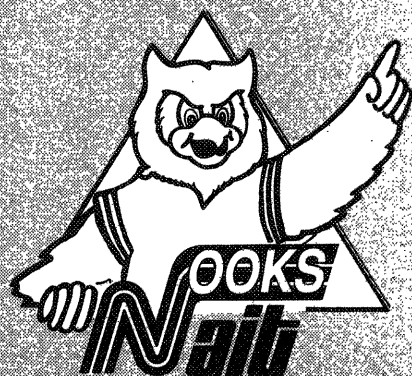

Spike Lee hits the mark

Right from the opening credits, where we see, yet again, the brutal Rodney King beating video interrupted every few seconds with a burning American flag image, you know that director Spike Lee plans on pulling no punches in his movie biography, *Malcolm X*.

Malcolm X was one of the most influential and radical black leaders of the 1960s until his assassination in 1965. While during his life, Malcolm X's popularity never grew much beyond the black Muslim movement in the United States, the increasingly strained race relations in North America has deservedly made Malcolm X an icon for the general population of the 90s.

Lee takes his time dealing with this mythical character. The movie is nearly three and a half hours long. Yet, Malcolm X was a complex character and Lee needs the time to do the character

justice. We see him evolve from a two bit drug addict hustler on the streets of Harlem to a devout and charismatic orator for the Nation of Islam, embracing their view of the diabolical nature of whites, to finally change into a pragmatic humanist.

The movie is often a string of orations that could easily fall into a preachy or condescending tone yet, Denzel Washington (Malcolm X), in a terrific performance, never lets this happen. The audience is transfixed to the message and the man.

The movie has a kind of docu-drama attitude. While many will be familiar with Malcolm X's views, the movie does provide new insights into the events that formed these views. Traumatic events such as the murder of his father at the hand of whites, his life in a white foster home and his treatment by whites in prison quite understandably radicalize him. He promotes a separate black nation based on Islam inside the United States saying that blacks and whites are completely incompatible.

As one can infer from the opening credits, Lee never glosses over Malcolm X's radicalism. At one point, Malcolm X openly gloats at the assassination of the white president, John Kennedy, and calls the pragmatic black leader, Martin Luther King Jr., a "House Nigger."

The final metamorphosis of Malcolm X occurs when he realizes the corrupt nature of The Nation of Islam and its leader, Elijah Muhammad. He repudiates The Nation of Islam but maintains his religion and takes a pilgrimage to Mecca. It is there that we see a more spiritual and less angry Malcolm. Yet, Malcolm X's break with Elijah Muhammad would not be so easy and eventually causes Malcolm's murder.

This is Lee's best work so far. He makes no compromises to those that would want to tone down the rhetoric. Nor does the movie lose its focus and degenerate into a redundant indictment against whites. Lee captures an extremely complex and controversial character with style and, perhaps more importantly, accuracy.

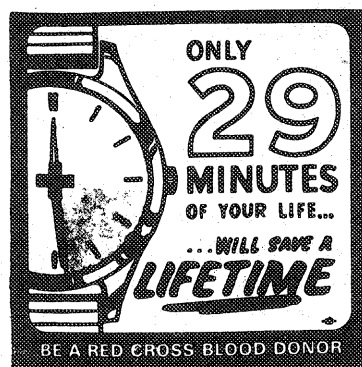

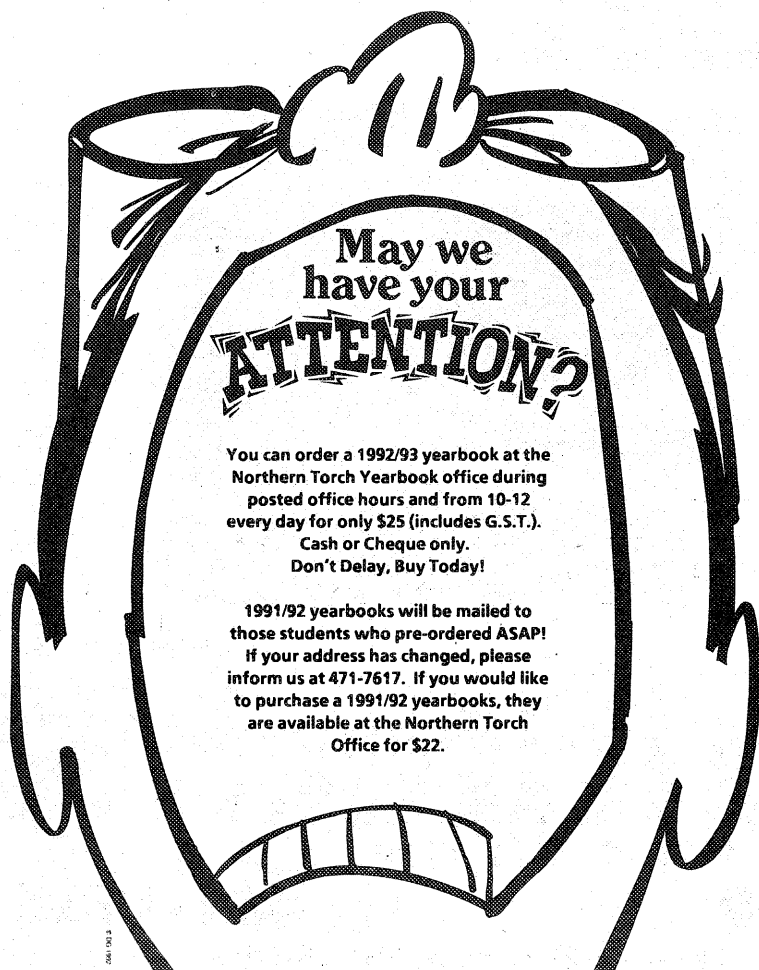

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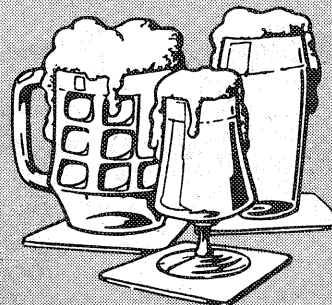
