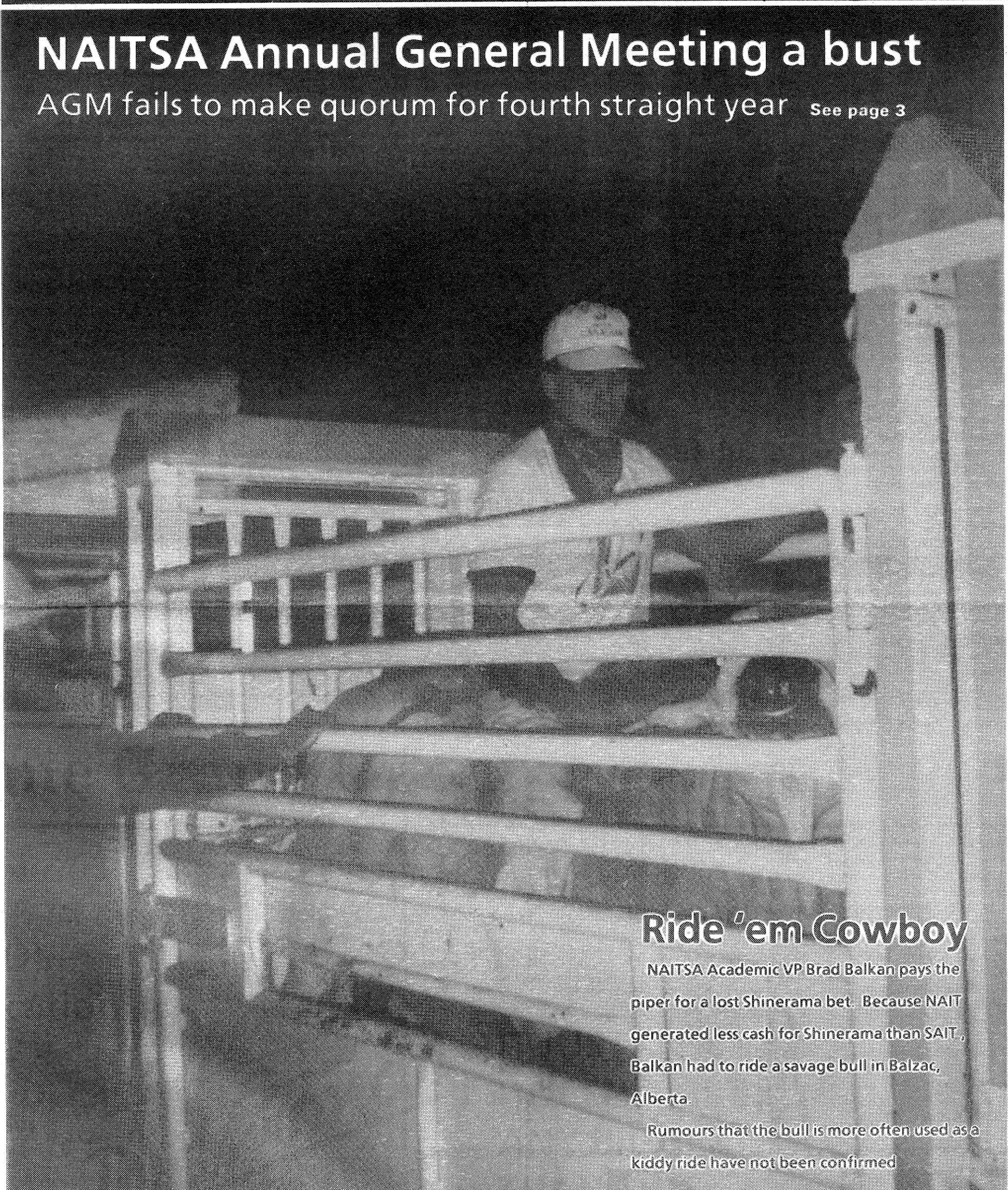

## Know your deductions for tax time

Don't envy those rich students who took the summer off to work on their tans and tennis. Those poor souls won't be able to write off the expenses of moving to their summer job against their income tax.

Okay, it's small solace if you have to slave all summer at a manual job to keep you in the halls of academe. But at least Ottawa shows some heart in giving you ways to reduce your income tax.

Probably the most advantageous is the moving expense allowance--if you relocate at least 40 kilometers from your school habitation to your summer job or start a business, you get to write off those costs against your summer income when you file your tax return.

The allowable traveling costs including transportation and storage of household goods, the hit from canceling an unexpired lease, and--if you own a house or condo--the selling

providing you will have income from scholarships, fellowships, research grants or similar awards that will be reported on your income tax return.

You have to report as

**... you can deduct the moving expenses providing you have income ...**

costs, such as the mortgage penalty, legal fees and real estate commission.

In addition, when you move back to school (to attend full-time) in September, you can deduct the moving expenses

income only those scholarships, bursaries or research grants that amount to more than \$500. If you're super smart and collect, say, \$3,000 in scholarships you have to report only \$2,500.

Full-time students at a post-secondary school receive

tax credits for tuition fees. At tax return time, you deduct from federal tax 17 percent of your tuition fees--which includes library, lab or exam fees but not room and board if in residence. You also get an "education credit" of 17 percent of \$60 for every month in school, or \$10.20 a month.

The tuition fees and education credits you can claim are laid out on Form T2202A you receive from your institution. The form pro-rates the amounts on a calendar year basis for income tax purposes.

The bottom line, though, is that you have to earn money to get the deductions and tax credits. No work, no happy returns.

For many students who were not able to find summer

jobs this year, the tuition and education credits can be transferred to your spouse, parent or grandparent. So although, you cannot take advantage of the tax credits, a family member may save some taxes because of you.

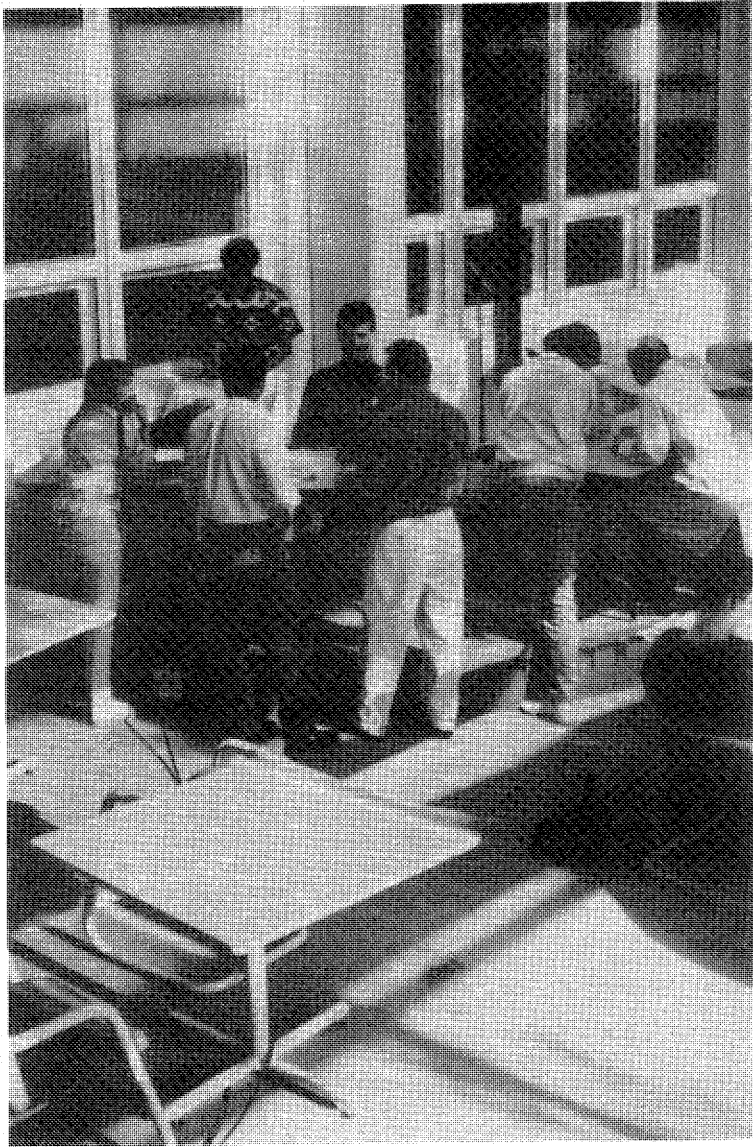

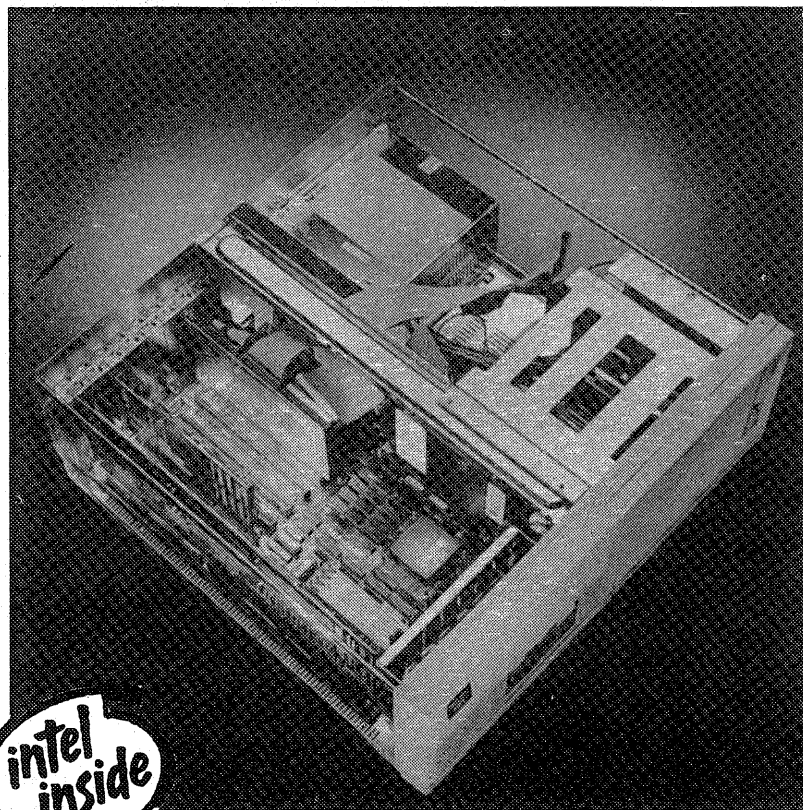

The people have spoken. The Charlottetown Accord received a resounding No from six provinces, effectively killing the deal.

Well, what now?

We certainly can expect very little constitutional rumblings from Ottawa for the short to medium term. There isn't a politician in the land that wants to come within a light year of this no-win issue. Yet, while the No vote has postponed further constitutional discussions, political forces that have kept this country on the constitutional brink for so long have not disappeared. Native, Quebec and Western feeling of alienation remain strong and cannot be ignored forever. Assuming the Natives remain relatively passive, another attempt to "renew federalism" can be put off until the next Quebec election in two years; an election sure to be

fought on Quebec sovereignty.

There are, however, a few advantages to this "cooling off" period. Firstly, the most unpopular Prime Minister in our country's history will most certainly be turfed either by his caucus or the electorate. Brian Mulroney stirred up this constitutional mess in 1987 with his ambition to get Quebec to sign the 1982 constitution through the ill fated Meech Lake Accord. Mulroney has shown that he is patently incapable of uniting this country and we desperately need someone who can.

Secondly, perhaps this constitutional break will show Canadians that constitutional wrangling just isn't that important. A country isn't made from the paper of its constitution, but it is made from people, ideas and hard work. We shouldn't expect a constitution to guarantee lower taxes, establish national day care centers or satisfy our every want. We all need a more realistic view of the impact of legal texts, distinct society clauses and Triple E senates.

In the mean time, Canadians should enjoy this constitutional hiatus. I know I will. Hopefully, in a few years, Canada will have a leader with a national vision deserving of our trust and perhaps Canadian's constitutional expectations will be more realistic and more conducive to ending this epic once and for all.

City Council is presently receiving a breath of fresh air (or an ill wind depending on where you sit) in the form of one Tooker Gomberg. One of Edmonton's five new aldermen, the off-beat Gomberg is most definitely a horse of a different colour. Just two weeks after the municipal election he's already managed to stir up controversy and rile up some of the respected old coots sitting on council.

Some people don't like him (they haven't reached the point of hatred yet, but not to worry, they will) while others think he's manna from heaven. It's a bit early to tell how effective he'll actually be, but it's absolutely certain he'll liven things up at City Hall. Unusual seems to be his nature.

For example, I thought he really should have worn a tie to be sworn in, but I have to respect someone who stands up for his principles like that and doesn't knuckle under to pressure. He's the voice of dissent, he sticks out like a sore thumb, and he doesn't care.

I think City Hall is going to be an interesting place for the next three years.

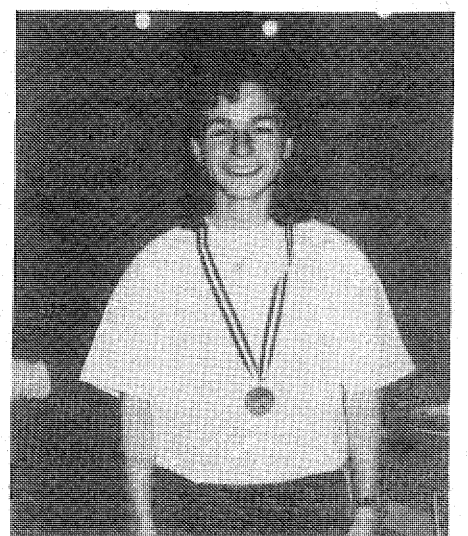

This is the fourth year of the championships and this is the fourth year in a row that the Alberta team has been victorious.

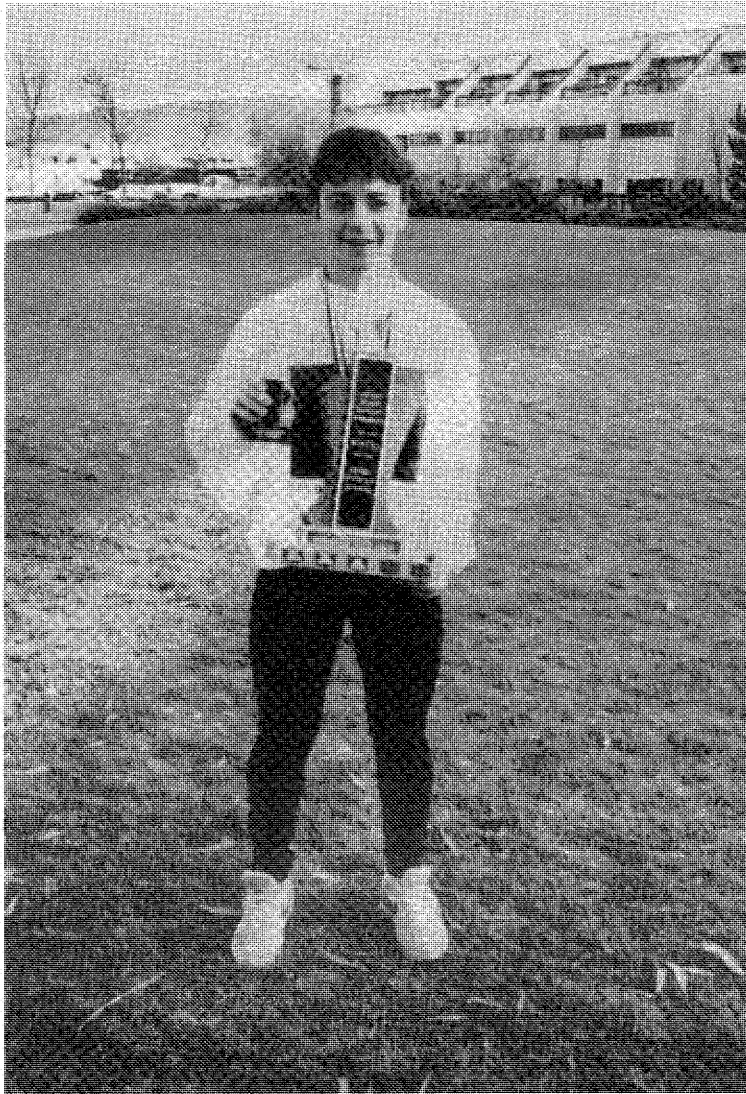
The men's and women's teams were selected from the top runners from the ACAC championships held last weekend.

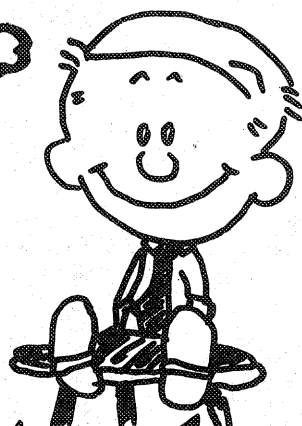

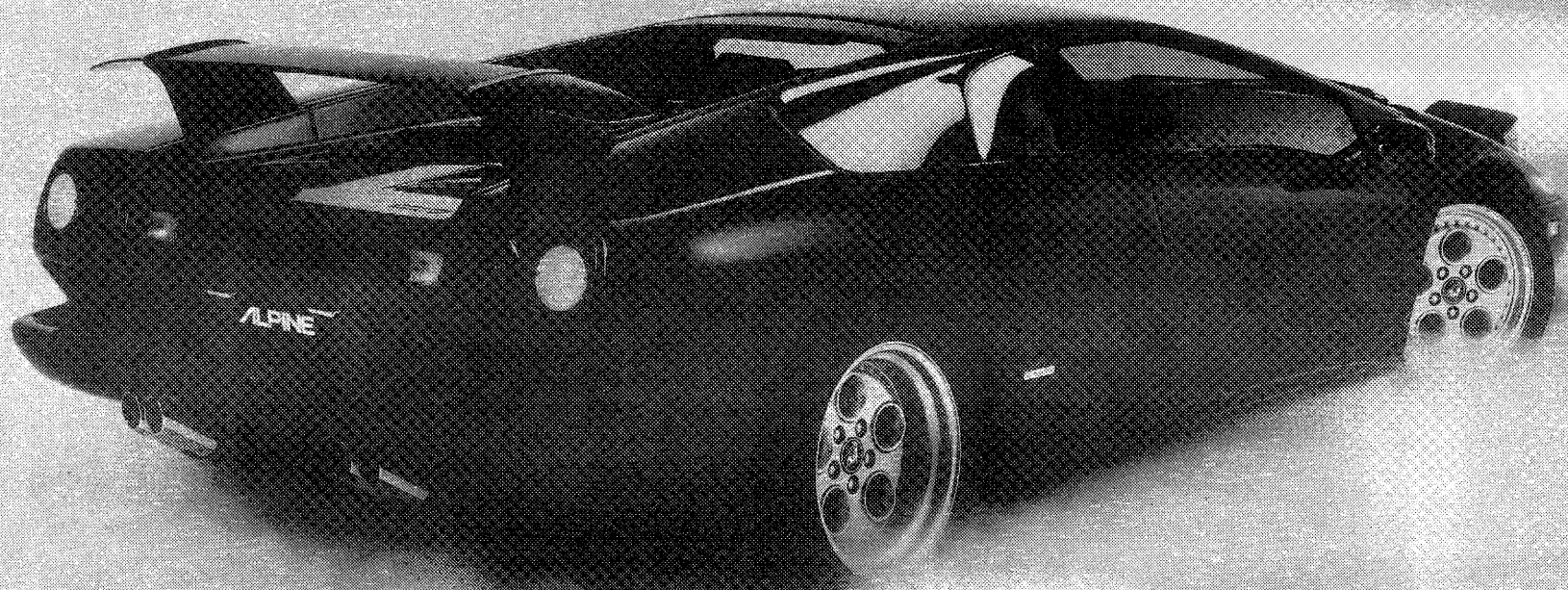

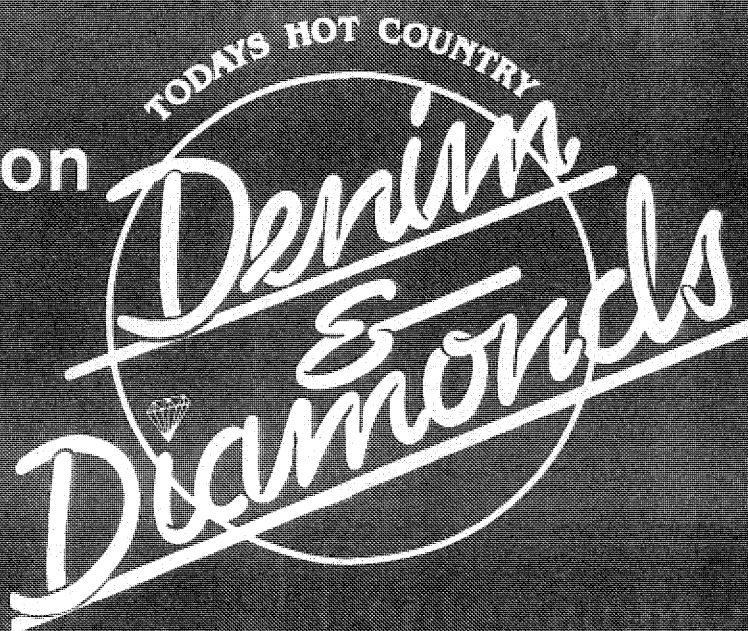
