

Deadline for entry forms next week

For the second year in a row, the NAIT Foundation is running its regular season Hockey Draft Sweepstakes with prizes a-plenty to be won. With \$91,285 worth of winnings available, the NAIT Foundation together with its sponsors will guarantee 318 winners over the course of the season.

For the uninitiated, here's how it works: Entrants select individual players from eighteen different groups shown on the official entry form as the ones they think will accumulate the most points over the regular season.

Entry forms can be found in the Edmonton Journal

until October 20 and should be mailed to or dropped off at the Journal, along with the entry fee of \$10.00.

The deadline for all entries is October 20. By mid to late November entrants can expect to receive their confirmations of the players they picked in the mail.

Then, beginning Sunday, November 15, current draft standings will be published in the Journal and prize flow will start.

The NAIT Foundation will be giving away ten prizes a week. The top weekly prize, a \$100.00 credit voucher for Safeway, is awarded to the Weekly Leader who is the entrant who has the most accumulated points from the start of the season.

Also available to be won are the Sharpshooters and the Movers and Shakers prizes. Each category has first, second, and third prizes consisting of Safeway credit vouchers worth \$75.00, \$50.00, and \$25.00 respectively.

Sharpshooter prizes are awarded to those who have the most goals that week while Movers and Shakers prizes go to those with the most points (goals and assists) for that week.

Finally, there are three random draws each week for a \$25.00 Safeway credit voucher.

At the end of the regular NHL season come the big prizes. The grand prize,

awarded to the entrant with most points for the entire regular season, is a 1993 Pontiac Sunbird SE Convertible with a retail value of \$23,915.

Second prize is a 1993 Pontiac Grand Am Coupe with a retail value of \$16,791 and third prize is a 1993 Asuna SE worth \$9,779.

Fourth prize is a Caribbean Cruise for two and fifth prize is a \$1000 Safeway credit voucher.

There are Safeway credit vouchers in varying amounts up to 85th place.

Also, not to be overlooked are the Bonus Leader prizes. On November 29, the entrant who has the most accumulated points up to and including that day will win a

seven day Caribbean cruise for two.

Bonus Leader prizes will be awarded on two additional dates which are January 24 and March 28.

An entrant is only eligible to win a Bonus Leader prize once.

With the vast number of prizes available to be won, the NAIT Foundation's Hockey Draft is a good bet. Their purpose is to raise money and create awareness and last year, the NAIT Foundation raised \$57,000 with all proceeds going directly to NAIT to support quality education. In this way, students at NAIT come out ahead whether they win a prize or not.

RTA concerned over thefts

A rash of thefts this September has the Radio and Television Arts department concerned and watchful. During the course of one month, over \$1000.00 worth of equipment has been stolen.

In the first instance on September 21, two Sennheiser microphones were taken from the radio booth. The brand new mikes were valued at \$400.00 each, says Jim Herron, RTA Program Head.

Later in September an Electro Voice microphone went missing from the radio

booth, this one valued at \$250.00.

In another instance, cash was stolen from a student's purse in the television newsroom.

Theft has not previously been a problem in the RTA department however Herron thinks the triggering factor may have been the recent removal of the south doors restricting access to the radio section. The removal of the doors was mandatory due to fire regulation but it also left the area less protected and more open to trespassers.

In an effort to reduce the likelihood of repeat robberies, staff and students are keeping watch and monitoring the situation.

After three months, everything is turned over to the NAIT Foundation, and sold at the beginning of the fall semester, so don't wait too long. Contact security with a description at 7477.



Most NAIT students probably don't know this, but last week was the national AIDS Awareness Week. Those that do, probably read it in *The Nugget* or saw the handful of posters in the main campus. Cast a vote for the Muni

As the rest of Canada ponders the constitutional question, Edmontonians are busy deliberating over their own civic future. The municipal election is fast approaching and with it comes the Airport Referendum. On October 19, Edmontonians will be called upon to elect a new mayor or reelect the old one and to answer the referendum question:

"Are you in favour of Bylaw 10205, the Edmonton Municipal Airport Referendum Bylaw?" Yes or No.

The trouble with this airport issue is it's so bloody confusing. First of all, the question is worded in such a way as to cause confusion. Just to set the record straight, yes means yes and no means no. That is to say, if you vote yes you are in favour of keeping scheduled passenger flights at the Muni. If you vote no you are in favour of consolidation at the International. It seems like a simple question but people did find it muddling at the advance polls last week.

Another cause of all this ambiguity is that both the Yes side and the No side have valid points and both sides are depending heavily on hypothetical situations to give credence to their arguments.

For example, as an argument for the no side, members of JET (Jobs, Economic Development, Tourism) say that the proposed merger of the two major Canadian airlines means it is very likely that the new single airline may choose to consolidate at one airport or the other, regardless of the outcome of the Edmonton municipal referendum. Kate Dykstra, cochair of JET says, "If the airline consolidates service at the municipal airport, Edmonton would lose

nonstop service to long-haul points. It means we become a feeder to Calgary."

Calgary! That's definitely a disagreeable thought but at the same time one should notice that her statement is only a possibility, a worst case scenario which should be considered but which needs to be balanced against what the yes side has to say.

The no side also predicts that Edmonton will gain new flights with consolidation at the International. Their prediction, based on a study done by a Boston firm, is that Edmonton can expect to gain 12 new flights. If the proposed airline merger goes through, a gain of 9 new flights can still be expected.

The yes side counters this speculative argument with some of their own speculation. Richard Covlin, a director for Air Services For Tomorrow, says there is no evidence that Edmonton would gain any new flights under consolidation. "There is not one airline that will say we'll have one more flight."

This is the troublesome part. Since both sides are attempting to predict the future (always a risky venture) and both sides are backed by separate, reputable, and expensive studies, voters have to try to decide who's more credible. Based on predictions alone, it's a tough call.

One thing is for sure though, and that is that job will be lost if consolidation goes through. According to Air Services For Tomorrow, approximately 800 jobs in and around the municipal airport will be lost, this figure being backed by a study done by SRI International. Although the no side may foretell of new jobs to be crated in the future, I remain convinced that in economically depressed times like these it is vital to hang on to jobs that actually exist in the here and now rather than "predicting" and waiting. This is one of the principal reasons, in my opinion, to favour the yes side.

As I said, this is a tough issue to decide. Even those "in the know" are divided on it. It is important then, to find out as many facts as possible and then get out and do that democratic thing. Cast a vote for the Muni!



ACTISEC concerned about FTEs and SFB

The first general meeting of the year for the Alberta College and Technical Institute Student Executive Council (ACTISEC) was held Sept. 26th and 27th in Grande Prairie. Two delegates from NAIT were in attendance, Brad Balkan, Academic VP and Shane Warawa, Activities VP, both of NAITSA.

The meeting explored all of the current educational issues affecting the students of Alberta. Agenda items included the looming two percent "clawback" in operating grants proposed for next year. (This means approximately two million dollars decrease in grants for NAIT next year, in current dollars. This does not even account for inflation.) As well, there are the proposed changes in the qualifications of FTE's (Full Time Enrolment-a.k.a. you, the student.) Currently, to be considered an FTE, you must take 60 percent of your yearly course load in one year. The proposed change is to make FTE's qualified at 80 percent. So what? Well, this affects the funding you receive from the Students

Fiance Board (SFB). Under current funding policies, the SFB only grants \$615 per month for any "single, no dependents" FTE's. Who can live on this? Hardly anyone, so you need to get a job. Now you have a job, but it is interfering with school, so you drop a few courses. Suddenly, you are no longer an FTE, no longer qualified to receive \$615 per month, and now you must work more. Seems like a vicious cycle. These are only some of the issues discussed.

The Growth and Development Committee explored different avenues in which ACTISEC could become more well known. As well, G and D is working hard on formulating a business plan. This plan would encompass everything from setting up an office and the hiring of a full time researcher, to keep the directorship abreast on current educational issues.

The weekend wrapped up with presentations being made by member institutes on their alcohol awareness programs. LCCSA walked away with top honors. The meeting then adjourned until Nov. 28 and 29 in Medicine Hat. Questions. See Brad or Shane in E133.

The Ooks next action is October 17 and 18 in Calgary where they will take on Mount Royal College and the SAIT Trojans.

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
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Huge game for Lady Ooks



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

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
