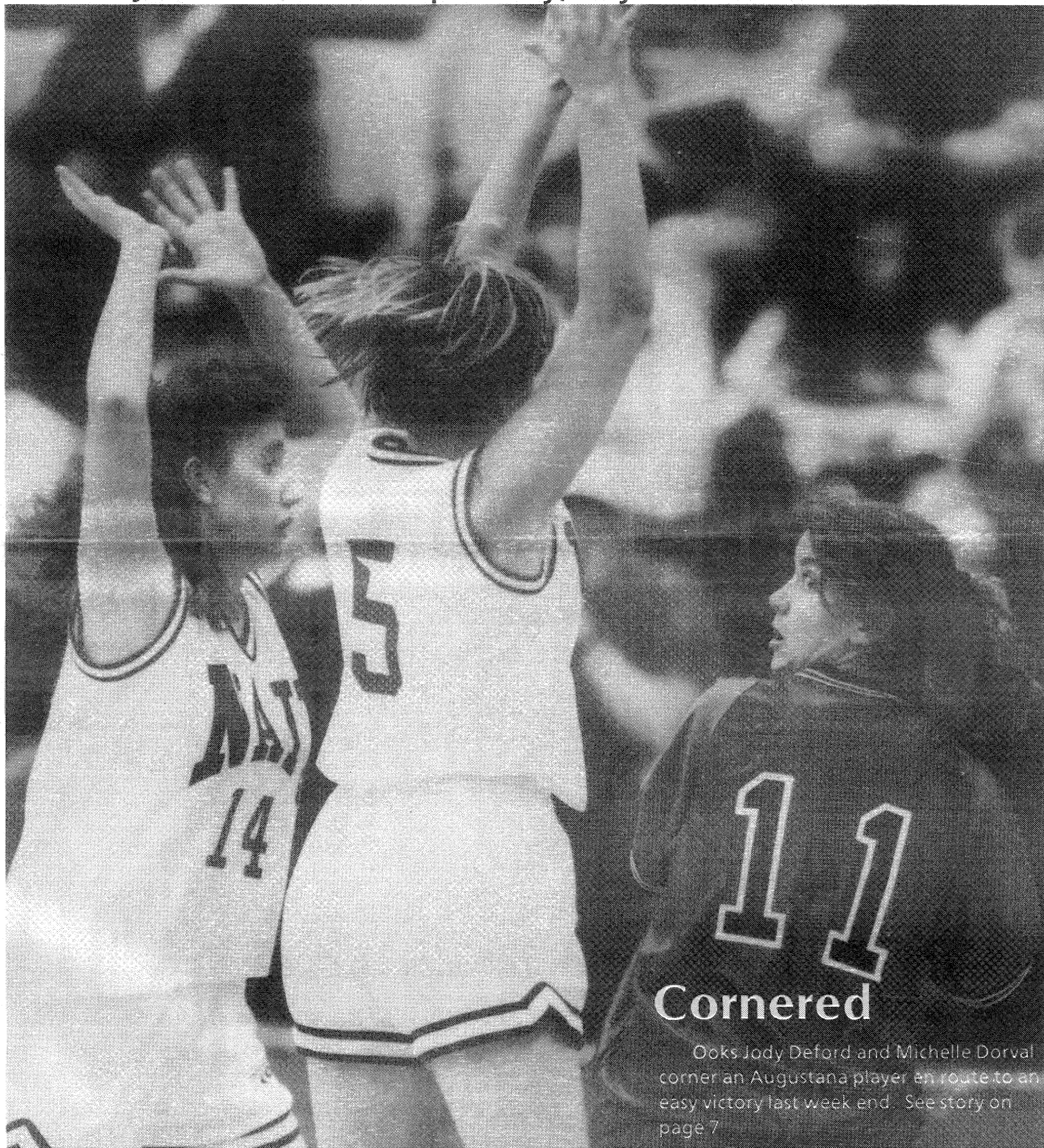

International Education, and Applied Research. When you hear the term you think of exchange students but, that is not all International Education is. Through International Education director Ken Ohashi, NAIT reaches across the globe.

Recently traveling to Thailand to commemorate the NAIT's linkage to Rajamangala Institute of Technology, (RIT). Mr. Ohashi feels twinning benefits NAIT through shared knowledge, enhanced international relationships and support of technological developments from both institutions; RIT being the most recent linkage NAIT has agreed to. NAIT is currently linked to institutes in 33 countries around the world.

That's not all to International Education and Applied Research. There are 90 instructors in different countries, and 21 contracts in twelve different countries. Through these contracts, NAIT helps underdeveloped countries advance technically. Projects locations include: Guayaguil, Lusaka, Zambia, and Swaziland and many more.

Made like business deals, cost recovery is essential to these contracts, since no money to support international education

comes from the government.

However, NAIT differs from many other institutions, in that International Education is not looked at as a source of income. A price tag could not be attached to the benefits that the institute, and participating individuals receive.

Exchange students fall into two categories: VISA students and contract students who come to NAIT, specifically to learn a certain trade which they can use and train others in their homeland. These students do not come into the quota, and a program is specifically designed to suit their needs. Because of the shortage of equipment, instructors come in after classes to teach them.

Through International Education and Applied Research, NAIT has a global reputation. Not only does continued work worldwide maintain this reputation, it also fulfills NAIT's mission to serve the needs of the economy, and maintain support for the private sector.

Ken Ohashi is excited NAIT's contributions, the possibilities are endless. Because of NAIT's movement's, it has become recognized worldwide.

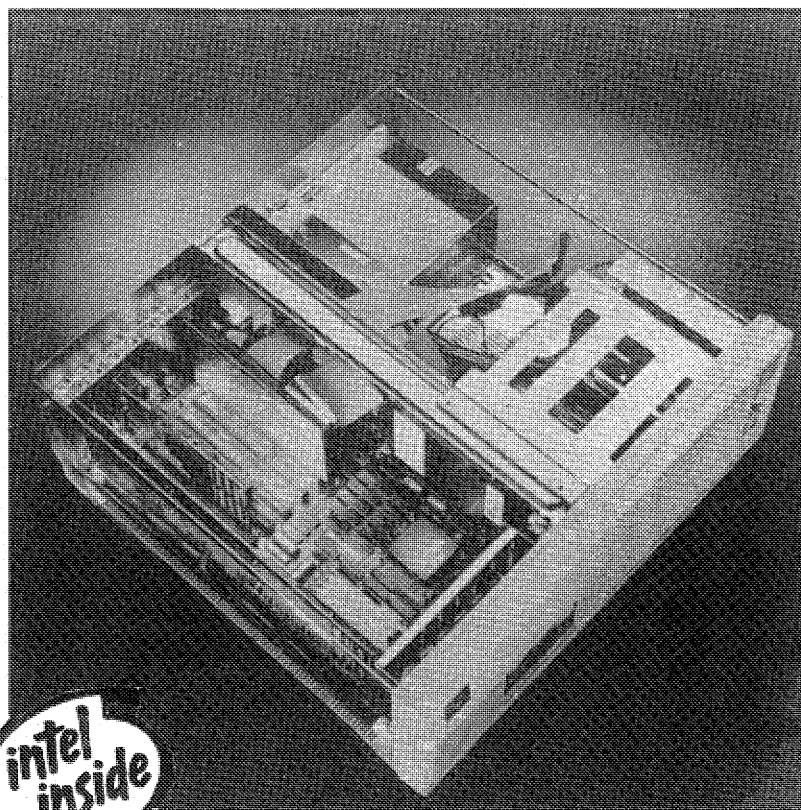

Not Sure How to Vote October 26?

Welcome to *The Nugget's* Constitutional feature. In the next page and a half, three NAIT students: David Harvey, Chris Nichols and Matthew Laundry, will point out the salient points of the Charlottetown Accord and try to convince you of their point of view.

YES

I must preface my arguments with two assumptions:

1. It is preferable to keep Quebec in Canada. Quebec and its French culture give Canada a cultural duality that makes us distinctive from other nations (i.e. the United States).

2. Canada is such a diverse country (culturally and geographically) that it can only be held together by compromise between competing forces.

With these assumptions in mind, it seems clear that these who urge a No vote on the Charlottetown Accord are losing sight of Canadian realities. Conversely, the accord tries to enshrine ideas of a very Canadian nature. In the accord's Social Charter, governments promise to maintain free and accessible medi-care and to provide post-secondary education at a reasonable cost. These are ideas that

make *Canadians* distinct, especially in North America.

Also for the first time, the idea of equality among the provinces will be encompassed in the constitution. The new Senate will be equally represented by all provinces by elected Senators. This is both a

the Senate does not have as much power as the House of Commons, yet in practice, because Senators will be elected just like Members of Parliament, it will be politically impossible for the Commons to ignore the legitimacy of the new Senate. Thus, the firm

projected population share of Canada (20-25). Furthermore, Canada has never been true to the principle of representation by population. Atlantic and rural areas have always been greatly over represented throughout our history. Furthermore, in light of Quebec's genuine concession on the Senate, the 25 percent proposal is not out of line.

Another criticism made, particularly by the Reform Party, is that the accord is too vague and will mean endless negotiations. Well, I'm afraid that this is an unavoidable aspect of any constitution. Look at the Charter of Rights. It has been ten years since its inception and we still are still not completely sure of its effects, yet I'm sure that a great majority of Canadians are glad to have it. Constitutions are not carved in stone. They must be flexible and change to fit the needs of their population.

Opposition to this accord

has taken many forms. Much of the No vote is a protest against Prime Minister Mulroney. Rarely will an opponent of the accord pass up the chance to call it, "Mulroney's Deal". It is not. This accord is the fruit of an unprecedented consensus of 17 groups. Never before have all premiers, the federal government, territorial and Native leaders come to an agreement on their roles in Confederation.

Canada was built on toleration and compromise. Yet, by voting No, people send a message that their region or special interest didn't get enough or gave away too much to another region or special interest group. The tragedy of a No vote is that this deal (unlike the Meech Lake Accord) is a compromise of all the regions. Yet, a No vote says that compromise isn't good enough and that does not bode well for such a diverse country as ours.

great gain for the West and a tremendous concession for Quebec. For the first time, Quebec has accepted equality of the provinces as opposed the equality of the "Two Founding Nations" (Quebec and the English Canada) position they had held since Confederation.

It is true that, on paper,

The constitutional referendum is fast approaching. By October 26 we must decide if the proposed amendments to the constitution are acceptable.

If one looks closely at the text of the Charlottetown Accord (CA), the flaws become painfully obvious. This article will present the common "yes" arguments and explain why these arguments are unacceptable. If our country is to successfully step into the future, Canadians must greet these changes with a resounding "No!" Here are four of the most common arguments:

1. Let's just get this constitutional thing over with.

The CA gives every province a veto on further changes to the Senate. This veto, in effect, freezes the powers of the Senate forever.

The Senate is supposed to be the chief protector of the small provinces at Ottawa. What we are deciding then, is how much protection the Senate will get for all time to come. This will affect how adequately we'll be able to earn a living in Alberta! If the Senate issue is not resolved on Oct. 26, Canada will not fall off the map. What's the big rush? We have to decide our future!

2. The Senate will be as effective as it has to be. It can stop tax increases can't it?

No. If the P.M. wants to increase the GST or any other taxes, the proposed Senate won't be able to do anything about it. The CA reads, "the Senate should not be able to block the routine flow of legislation relating to taxation, borrowing and appropriation." If the Senate rejected any bill, a joint sitting with the House of Commons would be

triggered. The H of C will have 337 votes. The Senate will have 62 votes. Because the H of C is dominated by Quebec and Ontario, they will be able to make

should get 106. We get 93, the same as Quebec, even though we have a million more people. The CA also guarantees Quebec 25% of the Commons forever, no

3. Quebec and Ontario have the largest populations - why shouldn't they get more votes?

The CA gives Quebec one MP for every 74,000 Quebecers. This means Alberta, with its present population, should get 34 seats. Getty settled for 28. The four western provinces

matter how much its proportion of the Canadian population shrinks.

4. Doesn't the CA finally recognize equality for ALL Canadians?

The Canada Clause in the CA reads, "Canadians are committed to racial and ethnic equality..." Maybe Canadians are committed to this equality, but the different levels of

government sure aren't. In addition to the three of nine Supreme Court judges given to Quebec the CA also guarantee aboriginal people extra seats on the Senate. Three premiers have said they'll guarantee aboriginal people extra seats on the Senate. Three premiers have said they'll guarantee women half of their province's Senate seats. Where does it end? Is this equality? What ever happened to winning a job on merit?

If this is the kind of Canada that our politicians want then every Canadian ought to be offended. The Charlottetown Accord makes a mockery of the values that Canadians hold. Equality is a universal right, but the Prime Minister and the premiers are putting forth a deal that offers nothing but inequality. The people of the land must let the politicians know that a bad deal is no deal. Vote NO.

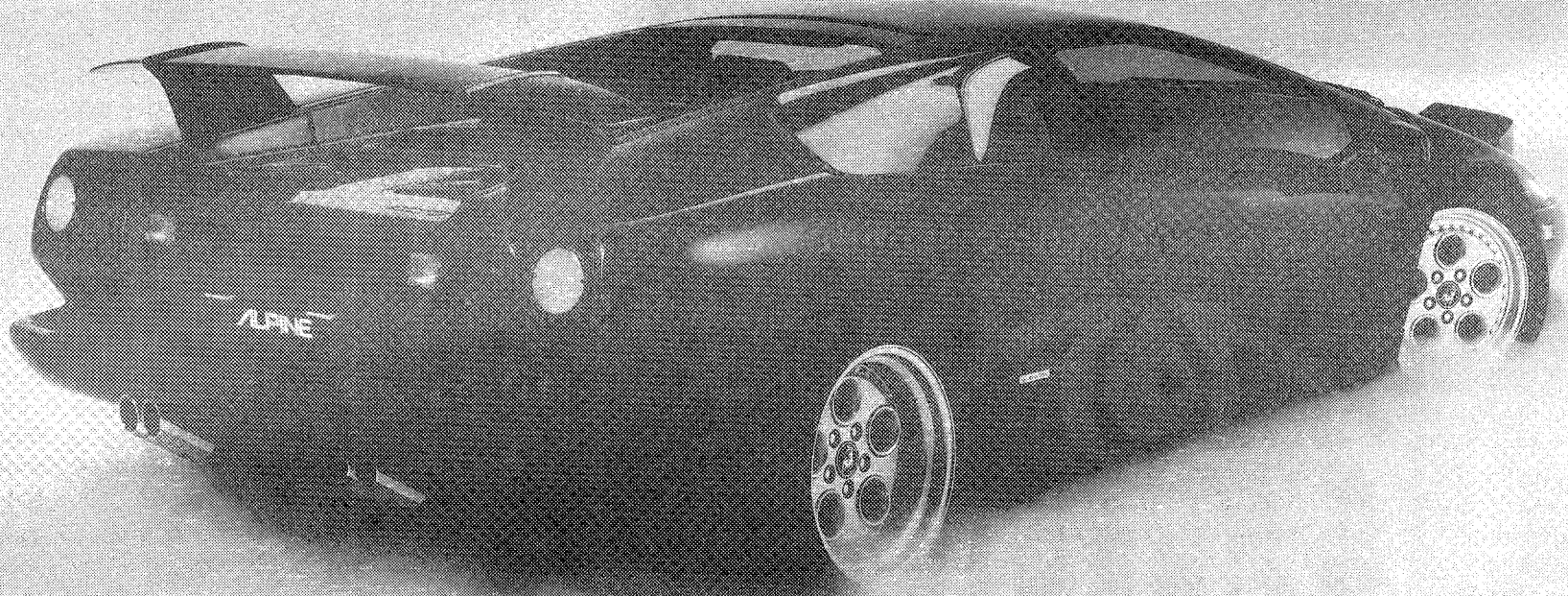

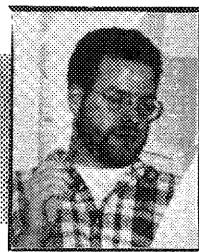

Media flocks to Reimer's side

In his recent book, *Birds of a Feather*, Allan Fotheringham explores the "incestuous" relationship between politicians and the press. He convincingly argues that they are not the "enemies" they make themselves out to be, but are, in fact, mutually dependent for success.

A clear example of this phenomenon is the recent mayoralty campaign. Since the campaign began, Bill Smith's candidacy was never taken seriously by the media. While it's true that Smith ran a rather ill advised and generally poor campaign, criticisms of incumbent mayor Jan Reimer were not treated with the seriousness that they perhaps deserved.

One example was when CBC Radio covered a banquet at which Smith outlined his economic plan for the city only to have his thunder stolen by the reporter who dedicated almost as much time in his report to discussing Smith's slight

tardiness.

Another example of the media's lighthearted view of Smith is when *The Journal's* John Geiger asked Smith the loaded question as to if he thought there was a "conspiracy" against him at the City Clerk's office.

While the media will argue that these are legitimate concerns, why didn't they go after Reimer with the same vigor? It's not like there wasn't enough ammunition. Yet, I heard very little criticism of Reimer's handling of the Highlands sewer debacle nor of her support for the closing of the municipal airport.

One may hypothesize, as Fotheringham might, that early on the media saw Reimer as an easy bet for re-election and therefore did not want to rain on her parade too much. To strike at Reimer at her most vulnerable time (especially to do so without other journalists) could easily alienate a reporter from the future City Hall administration; thus limiting one's access to information that would most certainly go to a more Reimer-friendly reporter. "If Reimer was going to win anyway, why rock the boat?" goes the logic.

Don't misunderstand this, Smith ran a terrible campaign and deserved to lose by a greater margin than he did. Yet, by sealing Smith's fate and crowning Reimer so uncritically, the media really did a disservice to everyone.
