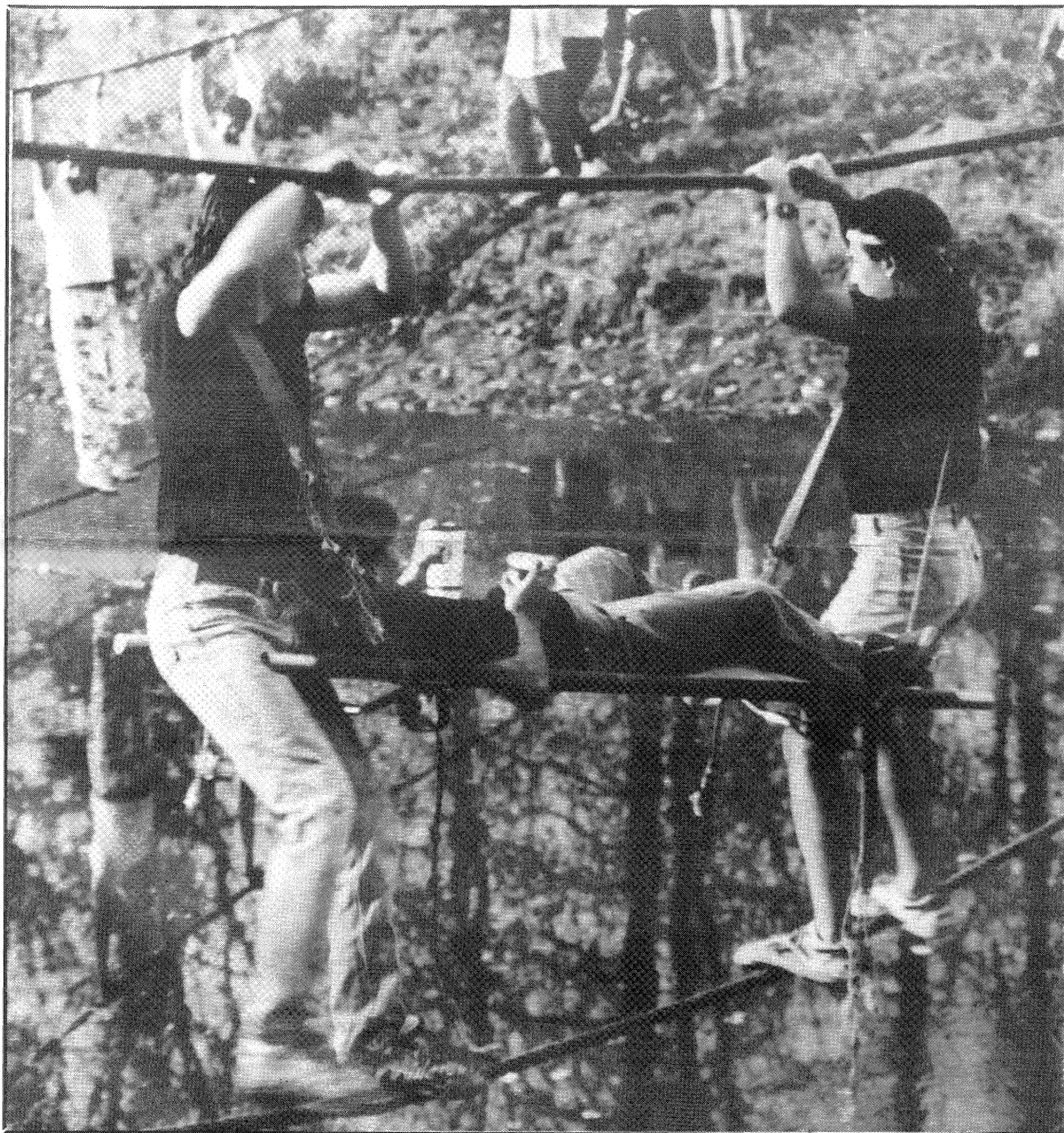

## No more fear, no more ignorance

It's time to recognize what may be the future number one killer of students.

That right, AIDS.

We all read pamphlets in doctors' offices, and we have watched program after program on T.V., so why are some people still ignorant of the facts?

The facts are:

### What is AIDS?

-AIDS stands for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.  
-It breaks down a part of the Body's immune system, leaving a person vulnerable to a variety of life-threatening illnesses. It is caused by a virus.

### Who gets AIDS?

Anyone infected with the AIDS virus might develop AIDS.

#### Transmission: How do people get AIDS?

People do NOT get AIDS in day-to-day, casual contact with family, friends, workmates, unless...

-that contact involves sexual encounters or the sharing of IV drugs with an infected person.

The virus that cause AIDS lives in certain body fluids, especially blood and semen.

There are four known ways the virus is transmitted:

1. Sexual intercourse (definitely through vaginal and anal intercourse; possibly through oral intercourse.)
2. Shared use of needles for IV drug use (an possibly the use of professional tattoo needles.)
3. Transfusion of blood or blood products infected with the AIDS virus (blood donations in Canada are now screened and infection is rare.)
4. From an infected mother to an infant in the womb, during the birthing process or in breast milk.

### Who is most at risk?

- Those with multiple sex partners.
- Bisexual and homosexual men.
- Those whose sex partners are bisexual or who have had homosexual contacts since 1980 (when AIDS probably first occurred in Canada.)
- Those who use IV drugs and share needles.
- Those whose partners use IV drugs.
- Those who come from areas where the disease is widespread.

### How is AIDS diagnosed?

- A physical examination and a number of test are needed to diagnose AIDS
- The AIDS antibody test (HIV) does not diagnose AIDS...it shows that the virus has entered a person's blood stream.

### You CANNOT get AIDS from:

- donating blood
- insect bites
- swimming pools
- a hug or handshake
- a sneeze or a cough
- toilet seats
- shared food or kitchen utensils
- water fountains
- a shared cigarette
- sitting beside someone on a bus or in school

### Is it easy to get AIDS?

No it is NOT.

AIDS is not as contagious as the 'flu', for example.

The blood or semen from an infected person has to get into another person's blood stream for the infection spread. Extensive study of families of AIDS patients have found not one case of disease spread through everyday contact. Families eat, bathe, share bathrooms, cloths and kitchenware together. Yet not one case of AIDS has been transmitted from parent to child (except in pregnancy) or from child to parent.

### Is contact with an infected person safe?

Casual, nonsexual contact is safe. The virus from an infected person has to get into another person's blood stream for the infection to spread.

### How can I protect myself and my partner against AIDS and other STD's?

- Abstain from any casual sexual activity.
- Do not share IV needles or tattoo needles under any circumstances. (It is probably best not to share razors to

toothbrushes with an infected person.)

-Do not allow semen, vaginal secretions, blood, urine or feces of an infected person to enter your body.

-Use condoms for all types of intercourse.

-If you do not know whether a sexual partner is infected, follow risk reduction guidelines. Remember, you cannot tell by looking at someone whether he or she has been infected.

### What is the HIV test? What does positive mean?

-The blood sample indicates antibodies to the virus are present.

-The person has been infected with the AIDS virus and antibodies have been produced.

-Most people with AIDS antibodies have active virus in their bodies. The person must assume he or she is capable of passing the virus to others under correct circumstances for transmission.

-There may be a number of false positives.

### What does negative mean?

-The person has not been infected with AIDS virus.

-Contact has been made with the virus but the person has not become infected.

-The person has been infected but not yet produced antibodies. Some people will produce antibodies in 2-8 weeks, some 6 months or more, some never.

### Who should ask for a test?

If you are not in a high risk group and are not showing symptoms of an AIDS related illness, testing is not necessary. Ask your doctor if you suspect you have been infected.

**Is there any cure or treatment for AIDS (HIV infection)?** Some drugs have been developed to reduce the pain, and damage to the immune system, however, these drugs are not a cure. Although AIDS is now being considered a more long-term disease, it is NOT less fatal.

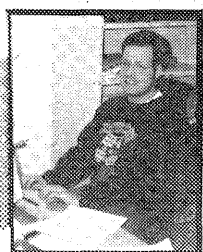

# And justice for few

The murder of Constable Ezio Faraone was big news back in June of 1990. Society reacted with sheer outrage at this catastrophe and the media had a field day.

The men responsible for the murder, Jerry Crews and Albert Poulston.

The courts showed no mercy for their heinous crime. They were sentenced to life imprisonment without eligibility for parole for 25 years, and 20 years, respectively. Had it been legal, I'm sure they would have been drawn and quartered. Society was that mad.

I agree that the sentences were appropriate, considering the nature of the crime, but I have to wonder if the penalty dealt to these men would have been anywhere near as severe had Faraone been an ordinary joe who was a salesman or a janitor instead of a cop. I doubt it.

Innocent people are the victims of unprovoked violent attacks all the time, right here in Edmonton. Murders are steady, almost routine. But apparently it depends on what one did for a living that determines the value of one's life. If a cop is killed, the media is all over the story, presenting it from every conceivable angle to an eager audience, who eats it up and wants blood for revenge. The courts will always impose the stiffest penalties--you can count on that--for this is no

that advances the greater good of all the nation, perhaps its time to think about what's best for our own special interest group; students.

If one sifts through the convoluted *Charlottetown Accord*, one will find one little post secondary education gem. A clause of the *Social and Economic Union* section of the accord, reads:

The policy objectives in the provision on the social union would include...providing high-quality primary and secondary education to all residents of Canada and ensuring them reasonable access to post secondary education.

Unfortunately, if the accord becomes enshrined in the constitution (a less and less likely possibility) it would almost certainly be white, male, upper middle class judges deciding what constitutes "reasonable access" to education. Yet, some constitutional commitment to education would be better for students than our present pathetic underfunded situation.

Would this clause carry students to the educational Promised Land? I doubt it. But it couldn't hurt.

ordinary murder. It is the murder of a cop.

Conversely, if a man loses control of his temper and murders his wife, or his neighbor, or some similar insignificant person, society reacts with a casual 'oh, too bad' attitude, if they notice at all.

Newspapers *might* devote a paragraph to the story and it's even possible one *might* hear a little about it on the six o'clock news. The courts may impose a prison term but since the victim was not a police related person, judges feel no urgent need to be harsh. Sentences of five years or less are not uncommon in these cases.

This is mind boggling injustice. I don't consider a cop to be any more valuable as a human being than the guy who wheels my groceries out to the car for me. I must be in the minority in my beliefs though, because it was just this weekend that the Ezio Faraone story was plastered all over the front page of *The Journal* (again) two years and then some after the crime.

The focus of their story this time was an in depth analysis of one of the perpetrators of the murder. Enough already! I'd be willing to wager that if Ezio Faraone had been a supermarket bag boy, the readers of *The Journal* would not have been fed details of his murderer's life for Sunday brunch.

Make no mistake, I don't mean to suggest that Ezio Faraone's murder shouldn't have been a big deal. Some publicity is not a bad thing and his was certainly one of the senseless murders that society despises. What I object to is the preferred treatment his case is afforded simply because of his occupation, as well as the near-saint status that has been bestowed upon him after his death. This implies that a person is only as good as his (or her) job title and frankly, I think that's garbage.

### Board member rebuts

Dear Editor:

In light of the article and editorial on the Board of Governors (Re: B of G continues funding banquet, p.3; and B of G comments reflect arrogance, p.6: October 1, 1992), I find it impossible not to comment on them.

The Board's decision to hold a reception to honour those NAIT employees who have served the Institute for 15 or 25 years or those who may be retiring from NAIT, is a good business decision.

It shows that the Board, the employer, recognizes the contribution and loyalty of these employees because it is their conviction that failure to so would cause a break down of the team or community atmosphere in the company. Would we not be arrogant not to recognize the employee's contribution? It should be noted that we, unlike other colleges formally recognize just the three groups of employee service. Other colleges recognize their employee's service at 5, 10, 15, 20, and

25 years. Is that not a bit extravagant?

You implied that the decision to have the reception at the Hotel Macdonald was too extravagant. My question to you is: Does not a prestigious career deserve to be celebrated at a prestigious place? In confirming the final guest list, Stephanie Wilson received many compliments from guests as to the location. Many were honored to have the reception at the Hotel Macdonald. If you were to shop around, you would find that the cost of renting part of the hotel is the same as other places that are available.

You also expressed great concerns over the spendthrift decisions of the Board. In actual fact, the total cost to run the Board of Governors

is 1/5 of one percent of the total cost to provide essential and nonessential services to students. This has come about by decisions made by the Board not to pay expenses of member's spouse to attend conferences and to hold the annual Board Retreat in town, which reduces the cost for things like hotels, travel, etc. Also, some Board members remit their honorariums back to the Board account. NAIT's Board of Governors is considered to be the most efficiently run board in Alberta by many people in the Advance Education system.

Like the cost efficiency of running the Board, the members of the Board of Governors also try to make the Institute more cost efficient. The members

Commitment to education has decreased considerably over the last several years. That's no secret. What is a secret is the makeup and mandate of Advanced Education Minister John

Gogo's newest committee-- "The Consultative Group on Strategic Options." Their task? to compile a plan to overhaul the post-secondary education system.

The extent of this "overhaul" is uncertain, but considering Gogo's latest remarks, it could be drastic. He stated that "While coping with serious financial restraint, the post-secondary system will be expected to respond in innovative and flexible ways to such issues and pressures as increasing enrollment demand, research and technology

transfer and complex capital infrastructure."

Last year Gogo also suggested that universities and colleges should eliminate entire programs due to funding restraints. This approach is far from progressive, in fact, it's a step backwards. Once again, students are faced with less and less accessibility to the education of their choice.

How the government can restructure the education system when their own systems are failing is beyond me.

November 4 marks the day that Gogo will be introducing some of the committee's ideas on restructuring to institute officials. The results will be interesting.

## General Council Notes

The second NAIT General Council meeting of the year was held on September 29th.

It was brought up at the last meeting that there are not enough microwaves available for student use at NAIT. There are only two on hand; one in the Tower and the other in the North Cafetorium.

NAITSA President Dan Lachambre obtained a quote for three industrial models costing \$198.00 each plus GST. These would be located in the main cafeteria, the Plaza II cafeteria, and the Westerra cafeteria.

Because the total cost is over \$600.00, it had to be

approved by General Council. The motion was passed.

The last remaining vacancy on the Academic Council was occupied. Heather Davidson, a second year Accounting student. She spoke to Council and expressed a strong interest in the position.

A number of different artists will submit logo designs with quotes. After examining all the designs, General Council will select the most popular.

The next General Council meeting will be held on October 13th.

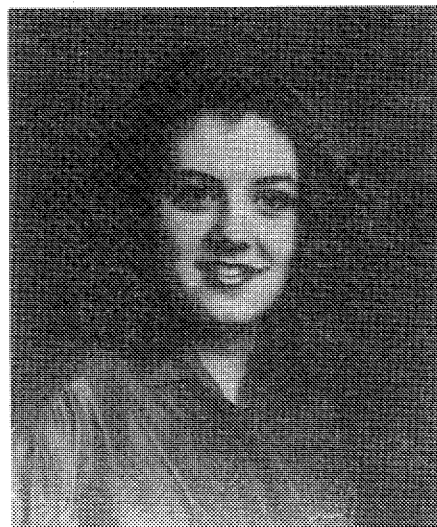

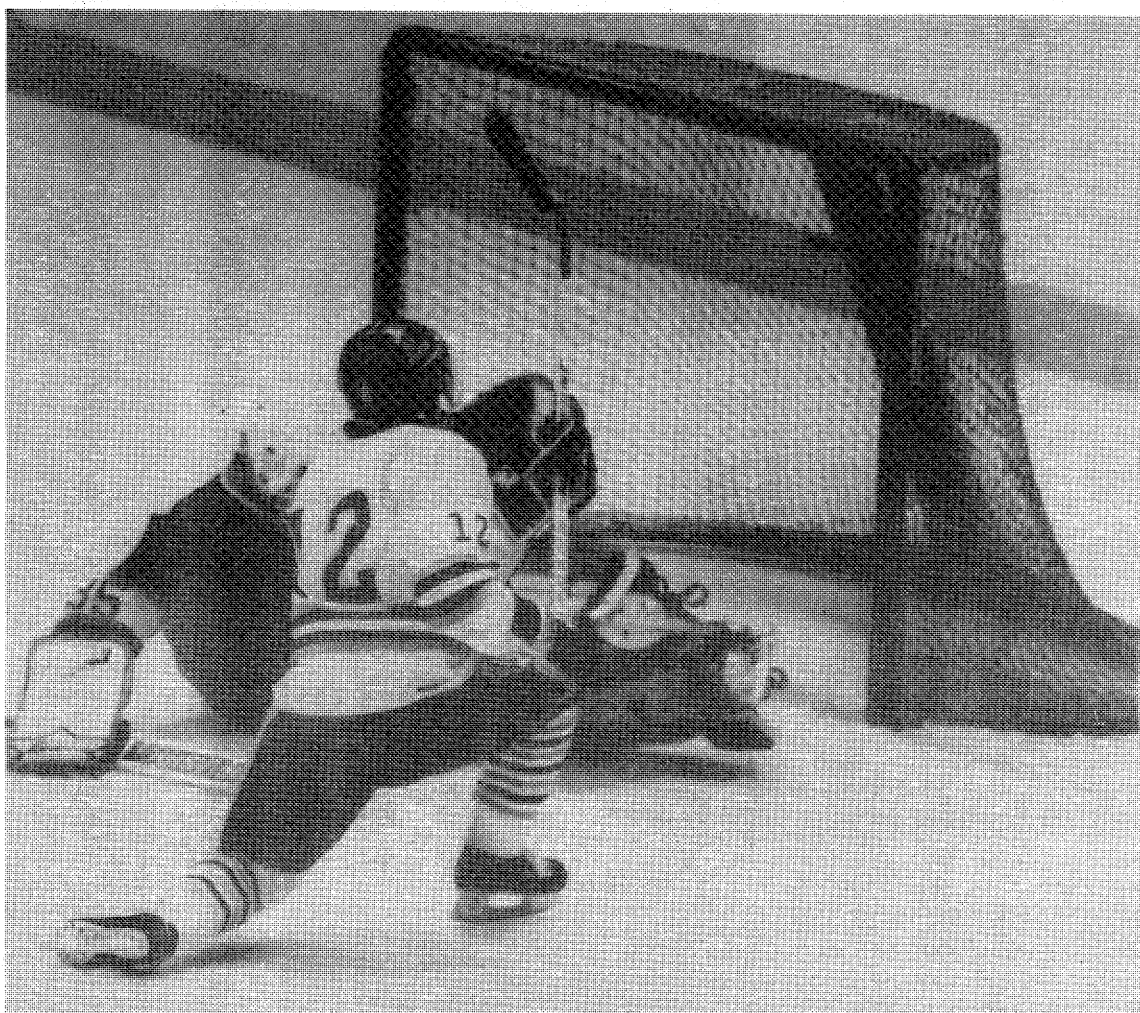

# Miami Vice meets 18<sup>th</sup> century America

Review: *Last Of The Mohicans*

The *Last of the Mohicans*, combined with the talents of a stellar cast and a backdrop of some of the most beautiful American mountain scenery, is one of the best

action/adventure films ever created. This film was directed by Michael Mann. He is best known for his work in creating and producing the hit TV show, *Miami Vice*. This film is one that he has wanted to do since he was a child. Based on the first of

five books by James Fenimore Cooper, this film, quite simply, is a labor of love.

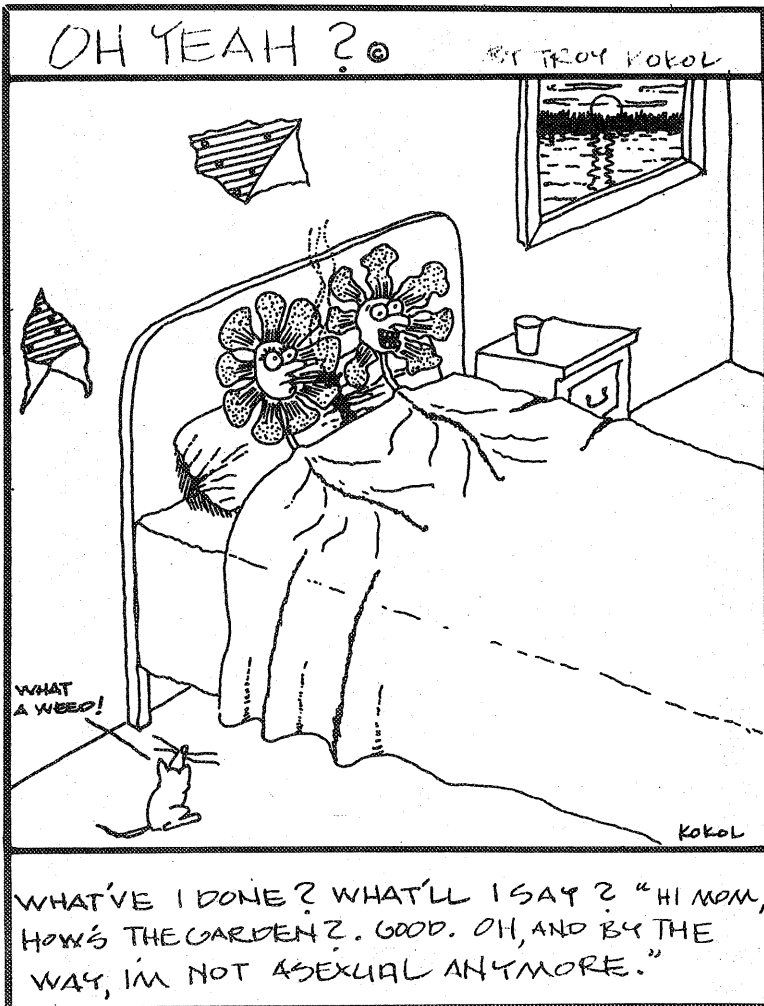
The story is set in America in 1757, where a war between the French and British colonists is raging. We meet Hawkeye, our hero, played by Daniel Day Lewis. Hawkeye and his adopted native family get involved with the war, siding with the British. Hawkeye here meets Cora Munro, the daughter of the commanding English officer. She is played brilliantly by Madeline Stowe. Cora and Hawkeye become lovers, despite the fact that they come from two vastly different cultures.

After the battle is lost to the French, a Huron native named Magua has a personal vendetta against the British, and brutally attempts to wreak revenge on Munro and his two daughters. Hawkeye and his colleagues strive to protect Cora and her sister from Magua's vengeance.

The story is a classic adventure, the stuff that schoolboys read in simpler times, rather than the rubbish that is produced by prime time television. Maybe Michael Mann used his TV experience as a contrast to his work done here.

What's more, all the history captured in this film is accurate. One of the most fascinating features is that natives and settlers in this time and region not only got along very well, but mixed their cultures as well. We see settlers and natives wearing native styles of dress, but with the flair of the European fashions at the time. Colonist settlers has to rely on their native counterparts to defend themselves against other colonists that had native allies of their own. Also worth noting is the difficulty the cast and crew had finding unspoiled wilderness for the film. In 1757, where America was mostly untamed wilderness that stretched out for hundreds of miles, the crew found only 20 square miles that resembled such splendor. Cast and crew, with the exception of few modern conveniences, lived very much like the settlers of the time they were portraying. This is method acting at its best. In a way, this film saddened me. It hurt to discover that so much beauty had been lost to land developers. I also wonder what life would be like now if some colonist leaders had not been so proud to forcefully assimilate their culture on the natives and frontiersmen of the time.

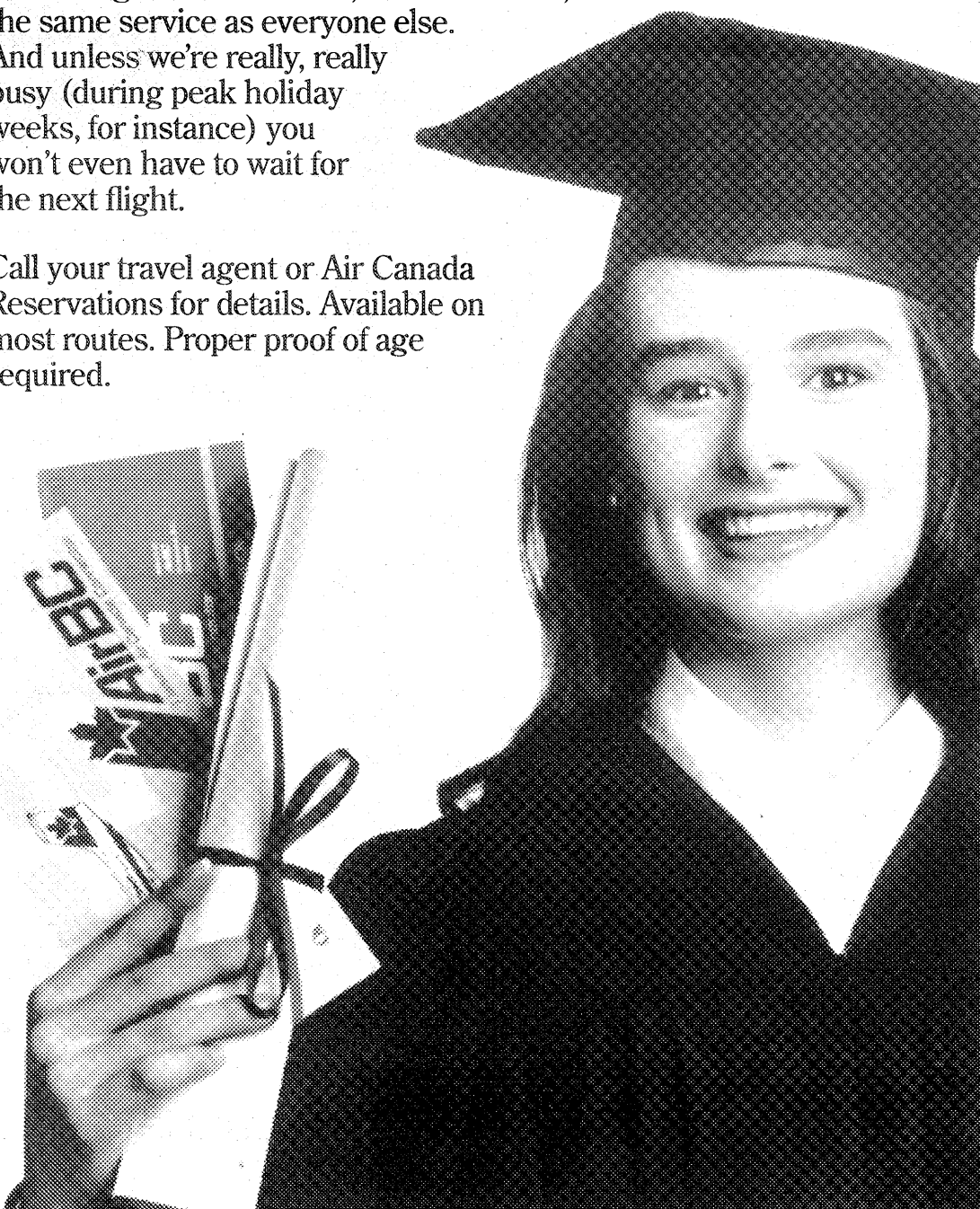

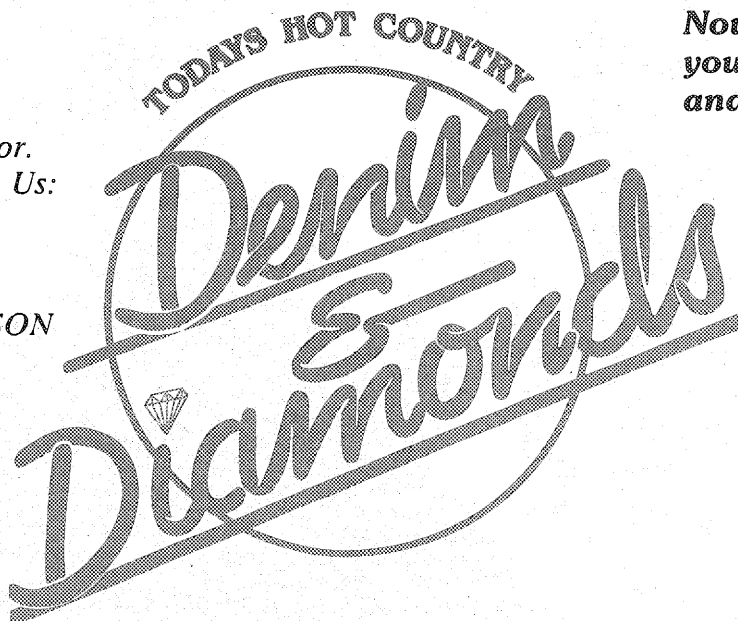
