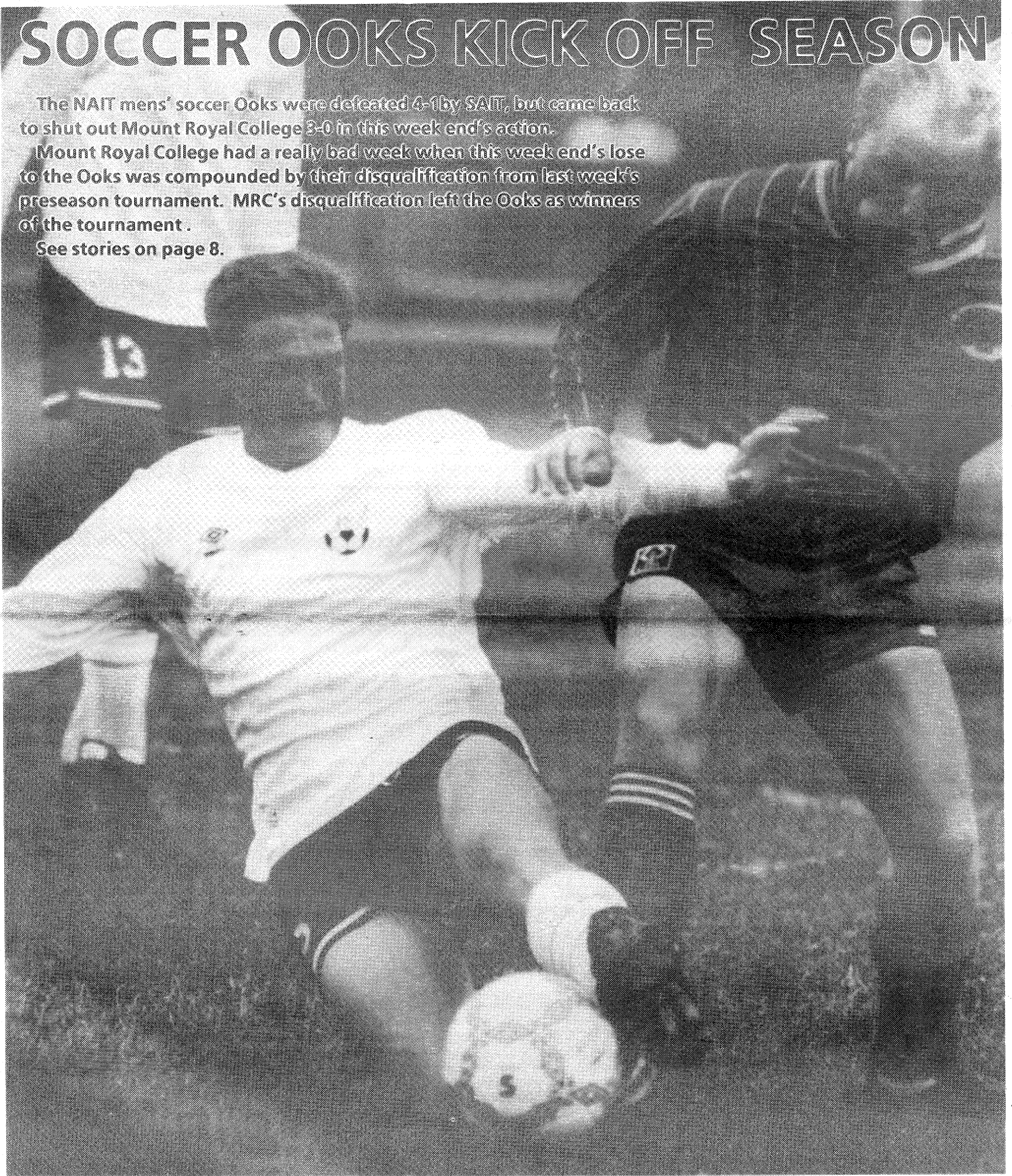

Mulroney's simplistic rhetoric won't cut it

Canada's constitutional referendum campaign is less than two weeks old and it is already clear that the "Yes" forces (i.e. those in agreement with the August accord) are in for a rougher ride than they had probably expected.

Despite having most of the political elites on side, excluding Reform party leader Preston Manning, Prime Minister Brian Mulroney and the "Yes" side are encountering considerable popular opposition to their proposals.

Many Canadians feel that the proposed deal decentralizes federal powers to such an extreme that it renders the country ungovernable. Conversely, many Quebecers believe that the elected and equal new Senate would lessen Quebec's significance in confederation and thus endanger francophones' cultural and economic aspirations. Still others think that a guaranteed 25 percent representation for Quebec in Parliament is fundamentally undemocratic.

These are all legitimate criticisms of the accord, yet to counter these arguments Mulroney and constitutional Affairs Minister Joe Clark have resorted to scare tactics, saying that a "No" vote would split up the country and cause complete economic and political chaos. Even more distasteful is the

government's attempt to paint those that plan to vote "No" as "UnCanadians", a thinly veiled word meaning traitor.

Unfortunately, the media has swallowed the government argument hook, line and sinker. Every opponent of the deal that is allowed air time on either CTV or CBC is sure to go through the humiliating questions about his or her patriotism by some supposedly unbiased interviewer.

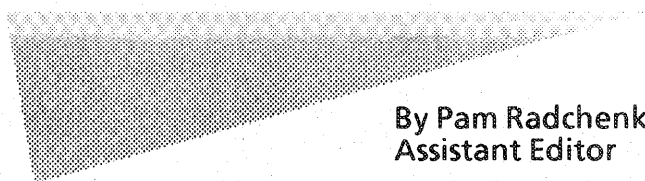
While there are definite reasons to fear the consequences of a "No", it is disgraceful that Canadians are being asked to vote for the single most defining document in our country on a strictly negative basis. Shouldn't Canadians have something to vote for instead of voting against the apprehensive future that a "No" vote may bring?

However, the government refuses to emphasize the positive aspects of the deal simply because those aspects vary so widely from region to region. For example, the "Triple E" Senate is something that provinces like Alberta have long fought for. Yet, what is positive in Alberta is a reason for rejecting the accord in Quebec, thus the government's reluctance to actually discuss the agreement and instead opt for simplistic rhetoric.

Canada is such an expansive and diverse country that we can only be held together by compromise. Perhaps the government should give us all, as Canadians, the credit for understanding this one Canadian truism.

Is this the right compromise? Well, that's for a free and democratic national discussion to decide. Hopefully, Clark and Mulroney will soon realize this and stop trying to split the country into "Canadian" and "UnCanadian" factions. Only then will Canadians get on with the business of putting together a truly national consensus.

But, there was also the other half. Those people who were

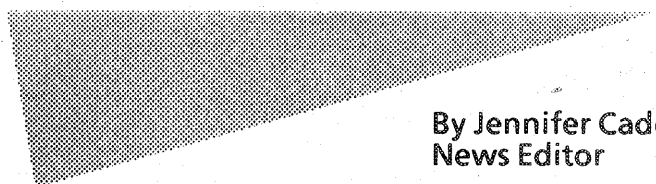

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

About mid-November of last year, a friend of mine approached me with a look of despair. "What am I gonna do now?" he asked. "I just received a notice of audit from the Student's Finance Board."

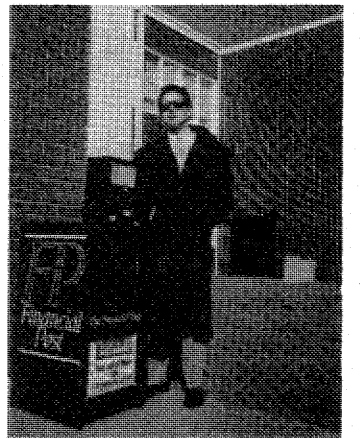
The reason he was so scared was that, like most students, he had "played" with some numbers on his student loan application. He went on mumbling about how the Student Finance Board could demand immediate full repayment and/or never issue him another loan for the balance of his education. This is true. Lying on an application is illegal and morally wrong, but what is a student to do? Can you blame them? Certainly not! If the government indexed their loans to today's living costs, then cheating would not be necessary.

In 1983, a single student

living away from home received a maximum of \$610/month. Today, that same student would receive a maximum of \$615/month. Due to inflation, that's a 27 percent decrease or \$229 decrease per month in funding.

Grants, scholarships, fellowships and bursaries have decreased 36 percent or \$51 million in the province of Alberta since Getty took office. These are just two of the reasons food banks have seen increasing numbers of students in their lineups in the past few years.

The *Student Aid Discussion Paper* of the Alberta Liberal Caucus states that Albertans must continually remind the government that it is unacceptable that students are forced to such survival tactics due to inadequate or unavailable student aid.



Until the government does a serious overhaul on the student finance system, the list of problems will continually increase.

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McNally Library rededicated

On Monday, September 14, the McNally Library was officially rededicated with a brass plaque commemorating the man for whom it was named, G. Fred McNally.

Mr. McNally was a very influential man in the area of education and vocational training. He was Deputy Minister of Education in the province of Alberta from 1935 to 1946, Chancellor of the University of Alberta from 1946 to 1952 and Chairman of the National Technical and Vocational Training Advisory Committee for more than twenty years.

The original NAIT Library, which was located directly south of the main courtyard, was dedicated in his name on May 27, 1963. After nearly thirty years and a location change, a rededication was in order. Present at the ceremony were, among others, Dr. Stan Souch, President of NAIT, James R. Shore, Chairman of the NAIT Board of Governors, Jack McNally and Betty Love, son and daughter of G. Fred McNally respectively and a number of relatives.

As the McNally Library moves forward with its technological advances in book cataloging and retrieval, one can only imagine where the McNally Library will be in another thirty years.

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Smoking ban delayed

NAIT is going to become a smoke free institute, but not for another ten months, says Jim Berg, Vice President of Student and Staff Services. Not until July 1, 1993 will smoking be prohibited on the main campus.

Once this policy change is in place, the only indoor areas where staff and students will be permitted to smoke will be The Nest and in the staff dining room. The

only other exception will be events such as Rock 'N Talks, where special permission for smoking will be granted.

The main reason for this decision is NAIT's outdated ventilation system. Smoke is circulated inside the building instead of being filtered outside.

NAIT's air quality was the subject of numerous complaints to the President's office and the Joint Worksite Health and Safety Committee. Earlier this

year the President's Advisory and Review Committee (PARC) met with the Health and Safety Committee to examine the issue.

After discussion amongst themselves as well as consultation with NAIT staff and NAITSA, it was unanimously agreed that smoking at NAIT should be banned.

The Health and Safety Committee recommended

the new policy go into effect as of August 1, 1992, but the final decision was left up to NAIT President, Dr. Souch who delayed the ban to allow full discussion.

According to Berg, the year-long delay in implementing the new policy was primarily to make sure that everyone already at NAIT, as well as those considering attending, would

be informed and aware of the smoking regulations. Furthermore, NAIT administration wanted to give staff time to participate in smoking cessation programs.

Dorothy Chapman, head of Health Services, says that NAIT may be offering the same programs focused specifically on students in the New Year.

The Ice Ooks could be in tough this year in ACAC hockey action. Coach Perry Pearn will be without NAIT's all-time leading scorer, Greg Geldart, who is at the training camp of the Canadian National Team. The Ooks will also be without the scoring punch of Mark Souch, who notched 22 goals and 21 assists in action last year. Souch is now taking Business at the U of A and will play for the Bears this winter. All told, the Blue and Gold will be missing 74 goals and 209 points from their top five departed scorers.

"Obviously there's somewhat of a void, but we have some new players that can score," said Pearn. "Krueckl played with us until Christmas last year and scored about a goal a game (10-5-15 in 12 games). Tim Olsen and Travis Koehn can also put the puck in the net."

But aside from the offensive problems facing the Canadian Colleges champions, a certain void is left on defence. Randy Wong, the Ooks' rock-solid backliner for the past four years, has graduated. He was respected by his teammates not only for his steady defensive play, but also for his determination.

Wong played through the entire '91-'92 season with a crippling back injury that sometimes left him unable to get out of bed in the morning. The 1990 NAIT Outstanding Male Athlete played inspired hockey and was a chief factor in his team's success.

"Anytime you lose a veteran the caliber of Randy there's going to be a skill void. We're going to miss both his playing ability and his leadership. Some people like Darren Smith, Brent Harden and Shaun Hebert are going to have to step forward and assume some of the leadership. I think on the weekend they proved they're ready to do this."

Returning to the Ooks this year on defence will be Hebert, Smith and Harden. Herbert can be a ball of fire

on the ice when he want to be. Nobody in college hockey hits harder than this ACAC second team all-star.

All-Conference goaltender Don Davidge will be back between the pipes for NAIT this year. Last season he staked out a league best 1.63 goals-against average and set an ACAC record with five shutouts. Davidge's partner from last year will be returning too. Alec Sheffo saw the lion's share of work in the playoffs last year and was voted Most Valuable Goalie in the Nationals. Former Memorial Cup finalist Cam Moon has decided to forego hockey this season. However, the RTA student will be a colour analyst for the Wetaskiwin Icemen on CJOI, 1440 on you AM dial.

The men's soccer team played its first two regular season games last weekend. The Ooks lost to SAIT 4-1 on Saturday but rebounded for a 3-0 win over Mount Royal on Sunday.

NAIT came out flat against the Trojans, a team that they beat in the preseason. Kevin Pilon scored the lone goal for the Ooks.

"SAIT came out strong against us and we just didn't match their effort," remarked Graham Wood, NAIT's coach. "They deserved to win, no question."

On Sunday Wood's team responded with a completely different effort. They took

the play to Mount Royal this time, not being as complacent as they were in the SAIT game.

"The boys played a smart game. It was like night and day in terms of effort."

Captain Sheldon Kenneth had two goals and Laszlo Vandornyik had a marker as the Ooks improved their record to 1-1. The team scored all of their goals in the first half and played a strong defensive game in the second half to keep the shutout intact.

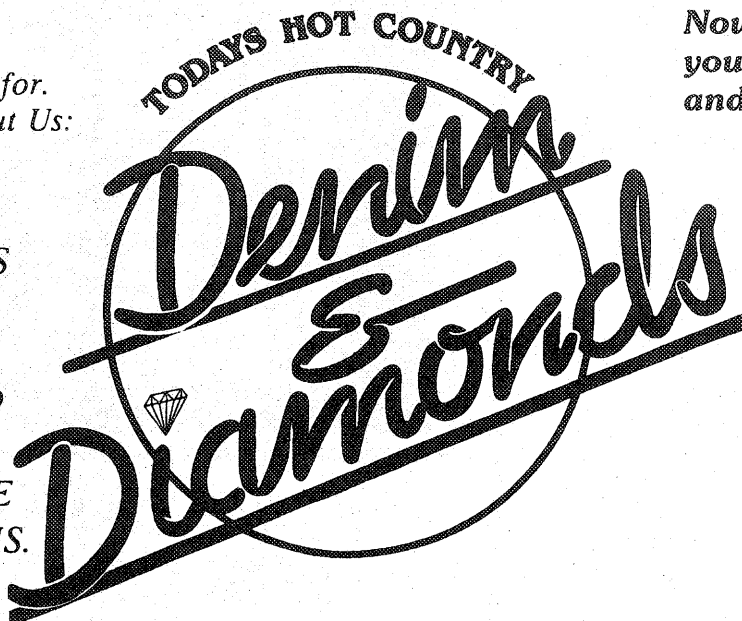

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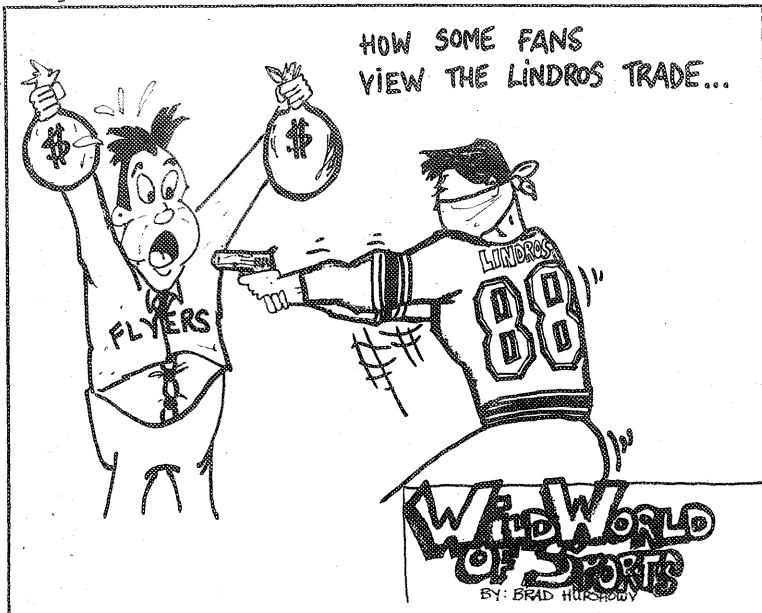
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Lindros is worth the bucks

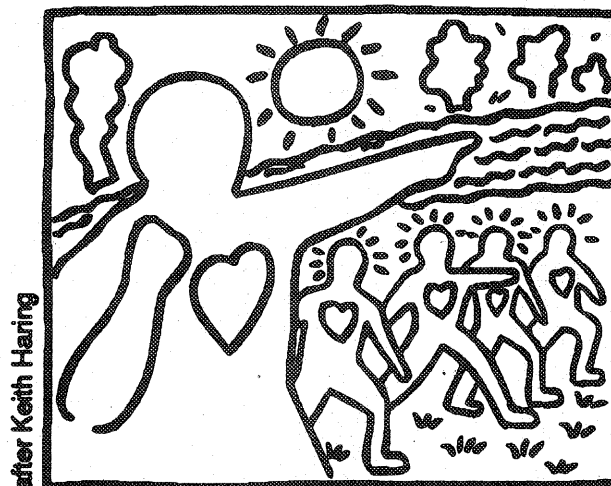

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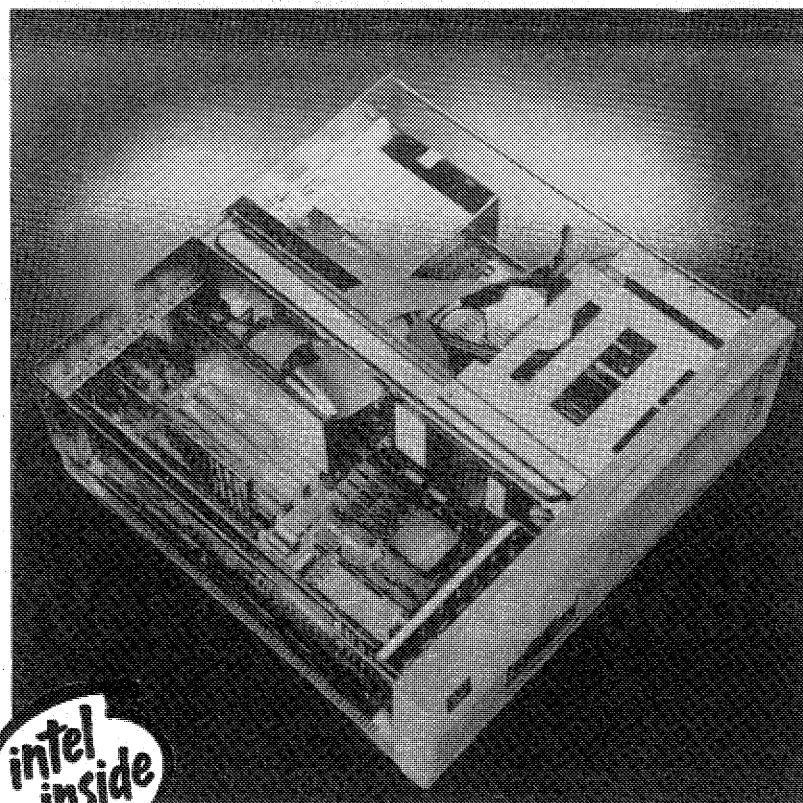
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
