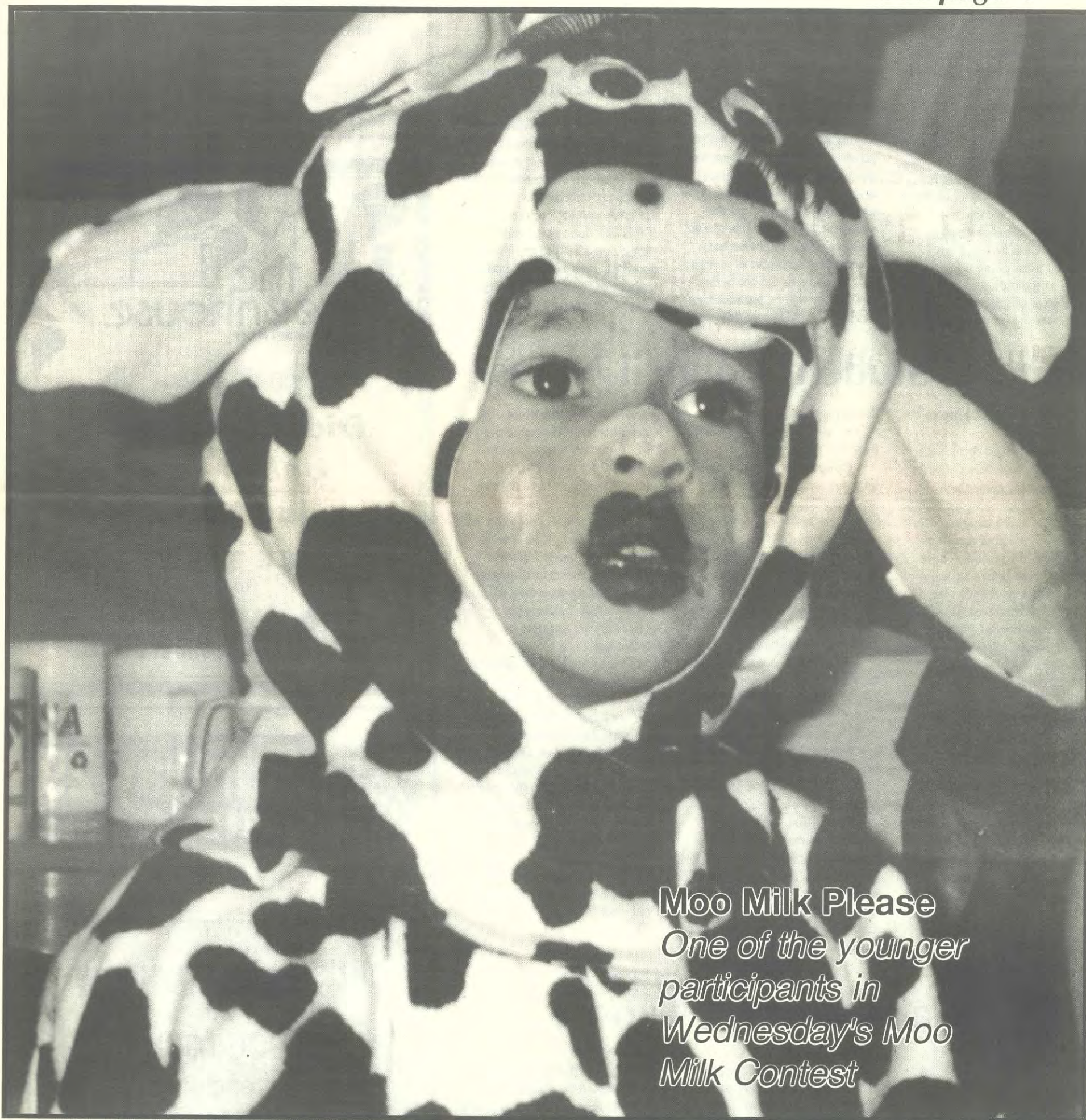

General Student Council Notes

The big news from last week's student council meeting came from NAITSA president Susan Tedder. She arrived at the meeting after attending a group of meetings over a four-day period. These meetings were done to discuss the possible cuts that can be made at educational institutes across the province. At these meetings there were 150 people trying to find ways to cut \$250-300 million dollars from the education budget.

After this news, Susan also told the council what was being done to protest these cuts. A massive rally will take place on the Legislative grounds December 7, 1993 at 6:00 PM. This rally will not only encompass students from the 3 main educational campuses here in Edmonton, but students from all over the province of organized labor are going to show support. There is going to be an estimated gathering of 10-15 thousand people at

the Leg. grounds.

NAITSA will not officially back this rally.

Other notes from the council included a new member to the academic council. After Troy Shostak won the election for the Administrative VP position, a seat was left vacant on the academic council. Michelle Doerksen, who incidentally also ran for the Administrative VP position, was voted in as the new academic council member.

Also, if you donated blood at the recent Blood Donor Clinic, you have to visit the NAITSA office. NAITSA is asking you to come in and place your technology beside your name on their form. This is so that Tech. charity points can be distributed as quickly as possible.

In addition, for students involved on the general student council, an appreciation night has been set up. The appreciation night was set up by NAITSA for those students who volunteer their time to represent other students. The event will take

place at the Molson House, on December 7, 1993 around 6:30 PM. A motion was passed to give \$330 for pizza so the students wouldn't have to bring their own food.

Only active technologies are invited to attend. If your tech. reps have not handed in their information sheets or if they are in bad standing then they are not invited. Only 2 tickets per technology are going to be handed out.

Finally, a plea for donations to an inner-city school was tendered. The plea is for any T-shirts or other clothing that could be given. There is going to be a party for the kids on December 6, 1993. If anyone is interested in going along to help distribute to the kids they should contact Athletics VP Neil Cantin in the NAITSA office.

The next General Student Council takes place on Tuesday, December 7.



Nugget Editor Resigns

In a major shakeup at the Nugget, Editor-in-chief Carolyn Sitter has left the newspaper, ending the chain of events that began last week. Last Wednesday, Communications VP Kevin Minaker suspended Sitter for unspecified reasons pending a meeting of the Publications Board on Dec. 2. At the time, Sitter had just left for B.C., and was unaware of the decision. After hearing of her suspension, the Editor was silent for the rest of the weekend. On Tuesday of

this week, however, that silence was broken. Sitter submitted her resignation without a hearing, ending her tenure as Editor-in-Chief after only 11 issues.

Sitter cited differing philosophies as the determining factor. "Kevin (Minaker) and I had different management styles. I couldn't work in an office where there was a conflict between myself and my employer."

Sitter is not the only editor to leave the Nugget in a controversial way. In 1992, Tim Pasay was axed and replaced by

Dave Harvey, Sitter's predecessor.

The shakeup does not end with the Editor. Because of the unexpected vacancy at the top, staff have begun the shuffle of positions. Former Entertainment editor Trevor Wince takes over as acting editor-in-chief. Contributor Gunther G. Grunwald takes over the Entertainment reins on an interim basis. Look for more shuffles in the new year as the Nugget lineup is finalized for the rest of the year.

Alcohol Awareness Week

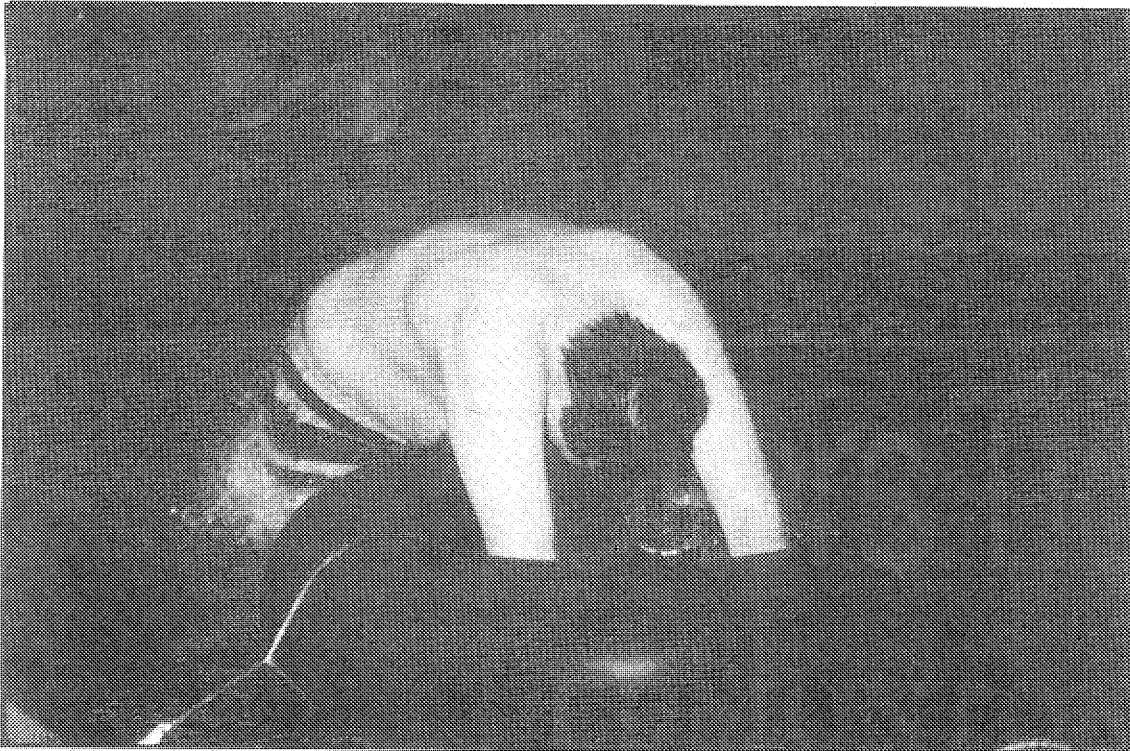

"Do you agree with the government's move to privatize ALCB's?"



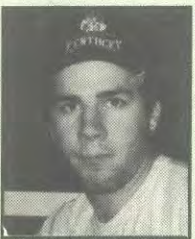

NAIT's cooking students prepared the excellent buffet, and served it in style. The students worked very hard and it paid off. The food was excellent and it added to the experience.

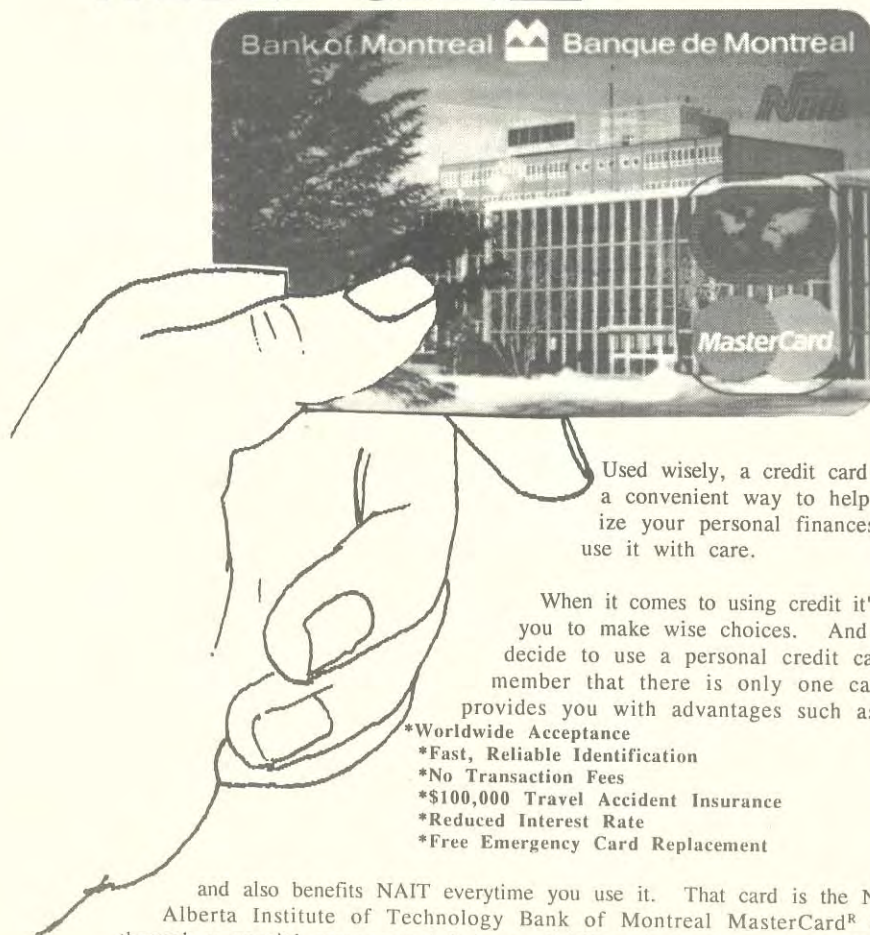

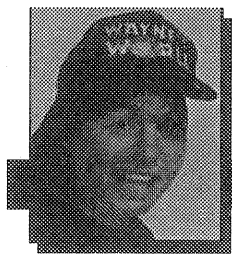

OOKS at Northlands Coliseum

The NAIT Ooks and the Concordia College Thunder continue their cross-town rivalry with a pair of games this weekend. The two teams meet at Northlands Coliseum on Friday, December 3rd at 7:00 p.m. and at the NAIT Arena on Saturday, December 4th at 7:30 p.m.

The series will mark the first time the teams meet during the regular season. The teams split a pair of preseason games with the Thunder upsetting the Ooks 7-1 on Thursday, October 7th, and the Ooks rebounding with a 6-4 win on Thursday, October 14th. The Thunder has a number of quality players on the team including former Tri-City American (WHL) Frank Esposito and former Penticton Knight (BCJHL) Mike Tavoroli. Tavoroli currently leads the Thunder with 22 points in 10 games.

The Ooks (5-4-1) enter the set after showing signs of promise against the Mount Royal College Cougars in a weekend series at Calgary.

Without the Grande Prairie games, the Ooks have a record of three wins, four losses, and one tie.

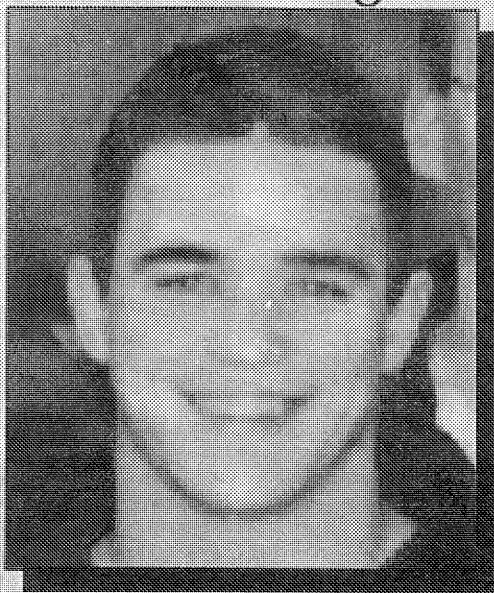

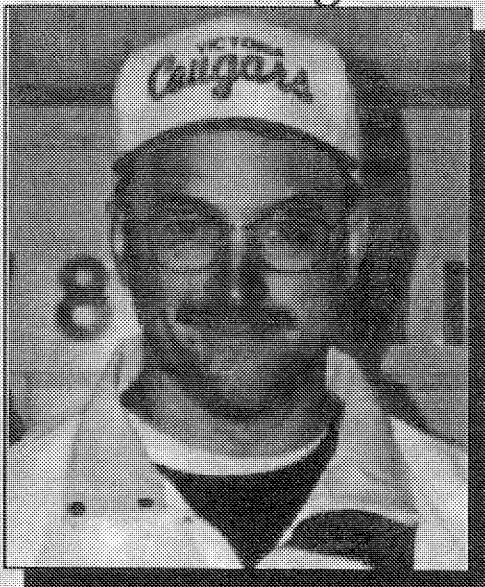

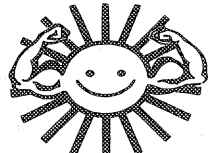
Paul Briske

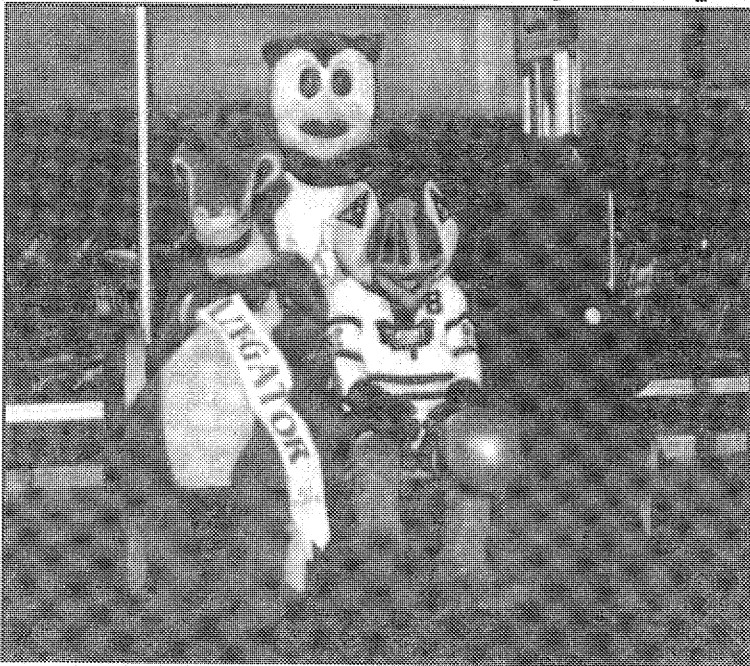
