Tuition raised 12 percent

Students planning to attend NAIT this fall had better get ready to cough up more money for tuition.

The news comes after the last Board of Governors meeting last Tuesday. The tuition and budget portions were held privately. In the meeting, it was decided that tuition fees for the upcoming year would be increased by \$106.50 bringing the total cost of tuition and student association fees up from \$887.50 to \$994.00 for 1993/94. The fee hike is the maximum amount allowable by law.

The reason for the fee hike according to Ivor Richardson, Vice President of Administrative Services, is the shortage of government funding. Richardson says the provincial government has indicated that NAIT cannot expect any grant increases for the upcoming year. The best NAIT can hope for is a grant freeze, but there is speculation that a grant reduction is possible. It may take up to six weeks until the Board is notified about the grant situation.

Also contributing to the fee increase is the Department of Advanced Education's fee policy. The objective of the fee policy is to increase student tuition fees yearly until students are paying 20 percent

of the education bill. Presently, students are paying 9 percent.

Richardson says he is not aware of how the government arrived at the 20 percent figure but says they may have been looking at inter-provincial comparisons. "Compared to other parts of Canada, NAIT fees still appear to be a relatively economical package, comparatively speaking."

In addition to tuition increases, NAIT has been cutting costs since the first grant reduction in 87/88. According to Richardson, in an effort to maintain accessibility to students, "sometimes people think nothing goes on behind the scenes to cut costs [but] in the background, a tremendous amount of effort goes in trying to reduce costs."

Richardson cited NAIT's decrease in power and natural gas usage as examples of some of the cost cutting techniques NAIT has been implementing over the past few years. The decrease in natural gas usage has been accomplished by improving insulation and by the use of a building management control system which monitors heat usage and control show much is put in.

Other cost cutting measures have included reducing management, reduced support costs, and charging for services to outsiders.

Says Richardson, "I notice that a number of institutions have an-

nounced a maximum fee increase for this year. It's a pattern that's happening in post-secondary institutions this year."

Board of Governors students rep Dave Murray says, "As a student, I dislike it. One of the problems I see as a student is that tuition will always rise [and I] question whether financial aid will also rise." Murray says that in his capacity as a member of the B of G he must consider the best interests of the institution. On the student side of things he can voice the concerns of students but on the board side he must consider the government grant freeze or possible reduction. "It is important to realize that tuition will continue to rise because the cost of doing business for NAIT will increase... maybe in five years the cost [of tuition] will be \$2000. A scary thought."

NAIT President Stan Souch was unavailable for comment.

Student Loans: Not Free Money

If you are completing or have completed your program and you are not returning to NAIT within six months you are required to pay your student loan. It is your responsibility to contact the bank which has processed your loan within six months after you graduate or cease full time studies. The bank will consolidate your student loans, i.e. combine your Canada and Alberta student loans in one sum and you will make one payment. Below is an example of a repayment schedule:

Interest Rate: July 1, 1993 - July 1, 1994 - 9.5%

Principal	Repayment Period (Months)	Monthly Payment
\$1,000	12	\$87.68
\$5,000	60 5/YRS	\$105.61
\$10,000	114.9 9.5/YRS	\$129.40
\$20,000	114	\$258.80
\$25,000	114	\$323.50

Exact terms of repayment must be discussed with the loans officer at the bank. The quicker you repay your student loan the less interest you will have to pay. If you encounter difficulty in repaying your student loan because of unemployment or illness you may be eligible for assistance under the **Interest Relief Program**.

Both the federal and provincial government have established an Interest Relief Program to help unemployed graduates and individuals who are temporarily disabled. Application forms for interest relief are available at the bank and must be made through the bank. Several factors do enter into a person's eligibility and the criteria are described on the application form. Should your application be accepted, you will be informed of the period of relief. During the interest free period, you will not be required to make payments on the principal amounts of your loans and the Government of Alberta and the Government of Canada will assume interest payment.

Upon termination of the interest free period, you must either apply again for an extension or commence repayment of the loans under the original arrangement. The length of the original repayment period will be extended by the length of the interest free period.

What are the consequences of not repaying your student loan?? If you do not visit the loans officer at the bank which has processed your student loan within six months of completing your program, your loan will be in default and sent to a Collection Agency. Defaulting on your student loan will affect your credit rating, future student loans for education purposes may be denied, and your income tax return will be withheld.

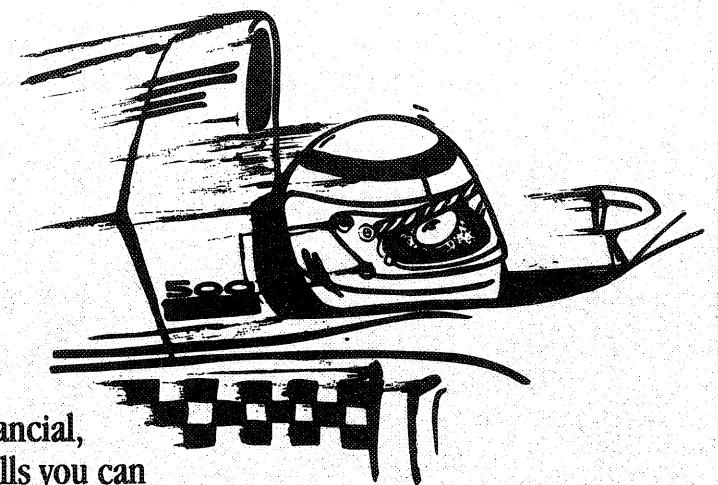

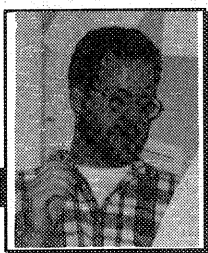

Tuition hike hypocritical

Last Tuesday, an education at NAIT very quietly and quickly became more difficult to achieve.

During an in camera (i.e. closed to students and the general public) session of the NAIT Board of Governors, the Board deliberated for an entire half an hour before voting to increase next year's tuition by twelve percent.

This is the third consecutive year that the Board has increased tuition by the maximum amount allowable by provincial law (\$100 plus the rate of inflation).

Every year, the Board blames less government funding for the greater burden placed on the students. Yet, this year particularly, the Board's excuses ring hollow. Despite the crisis in finances, the Board continues to host expensive banquets at the Hotel MacDonald (what's wrong with the staff dining room anyway?) and, late last year, the Board (unlike SAIT's Board) decided to break the freeze on the administration staff's salaries and retroactively awarded a three percent increase.

While NAIT has, for the most part, maintained quality and has been rather effective with its fundraising, particularly with the NAIT Foundation, one must wonder why tuition is raised by the maximum allowable by law every year. While it's understandable that tuition may increase, why so much so fast? It is especially considering the fact that this increase was

approved before the Board was even aware how much, if any, the government's grant to NAIT would be reduced this year.

It is the provincial government's policy to raise tuition's to levels equal to twenty percent of the students' education expenses. This would put NAIT tuition up to a prohibitive \$2000. Yet, by the Board's large tuition hikes it is becoming clear that the Board is not as opposed to this policy as they would like NAIT students to believe.

The underlying assumption in the government's and, so it would seem, the Board's policy is that students are not paying their fair share of the education bill.

This view is not only offensive but hypocritical. If NAIT tuition was \$2000, how many potential students would be unable or unwilling to get an education? Already, many students, especially at universities, will be paying back student loans until they are well into their forties. This is clearly unjust. Education is a right in this and any other just society. It is not a privilege for those who can afford it. Yet, the generation that is still enjoying the benefits of the relatively low tuitions of the 1960s and 1970s (when tuitions were nowhere near the 20 percent level) is telling this generation that it's not pulling its share of the load!!

Albertan students associations are now organizing for the next provincial election to get voters to "vote for education" and put an end to some of the unenlightened thinking that went into the government's 20 percent tuition policy. Yet, NAIT students only need to look as far as our own boardrooms to find examples of the same backwardness that we are fighting on a provincial level. Only when NAIT students quit relying on the non-existent benevolence of the Board and get serious about keeping tuition levels low and begin to protest hikes with instruments like petitions will the Board recognize the seriousness of our situation.

Maybe then we could dream of a mere five percent increase!

- 2) Friday (or last day of classes that

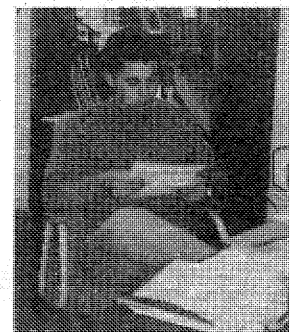
week) 3:00 pm - midnight

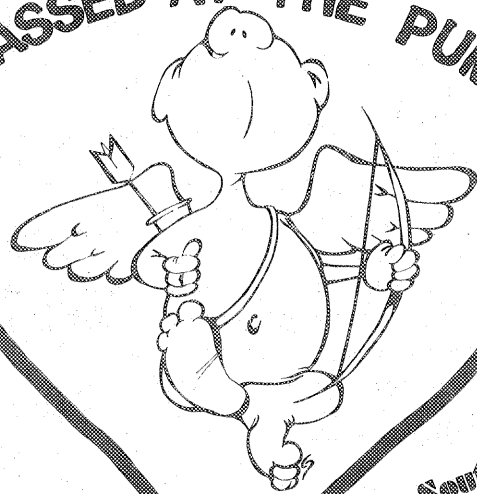

Vikings end Ooks winning streak

Despite some inattentive play, the NAIT Ooks (14-4-0) moved into sole possession of first place in the ACAC after a weekend split with the Augustana University College Vikings (11-8-0). The Mount Royal College Cougars (13-5-0) who were idle this past weekend are now in second place two points behind the Ooks.

After four games against weaker competition, the Ooks were in for a reality check against the Augustana Vikings. The Vikings humbled the Ooks 5-3 in Camrose on Friday night to break NAIT's six game winning streak and stayed with the Ooks for the good portion of the game in a 6-2 loss on Saturday night at the NAIT Arena.

On Saturday, the Ooks scored four times in the second period as they

defeated the Vikings 6-2 and kept their perfect home record intact.

In the first, the Ooks and Vikings had numerous opportunities to score. The Ooks acquired a 1-0 advantage as Jason Krueckl capitalized from close range. The Vikings then pulled even as Mike Bowie found the mark.

In the second, the Ooks moved ahead 3-1 on goals by Tim Olson and Dan Flaherty. The Vikings cut the lead to 3-2 on Greg Sawatsky's goal from a sharp angle before the Ooks widened the margin to four as Trevor McCallion and Craig Hawryschuk bent the twine.

In the third, NAIT captain Dean Beattie capitalized on a powerplay opportunity to make the final 6-2.

Between the pipes, AUC's Creedence Doi redirected 26 of 32 shots while NAIT's Alec Sheflo turned away 23 of 25

shots.

On Friday, the Ooks surrendered a pair of short handed goals en route to a 5-3 loss at the hands of the Vikings in Camrose.

In the first, the teams traded markers as AUC's Jay Robertson redirected the puck into the net and NAIT's Craig Hawryschuk found the five hole.

In the second, the squads exchanged goals again as Kirk Humphries found the mark for the Vikings and Mike Park completed the wrap around.

In the third, the Ooks

gained the lead with 43 seconds gone in the frame as Dean Beattie made no mistake on the short side. The Vikings then took control with goals from Kent Todd and Dean Holien. Jay Robertson sealed the victory for the Vikings with an empty net goal with three seconds left on the clock.

In goal, Creedence Doi of the Vikings stopped 25 of 28 while Alec Sheflo of the Ooks blocked 29 of 33.

The road to the playoffs doesn't get any easier for the Ooks this weekend. NAIT meets the Red Deer College

Kings (10-6-1) in a home and home set. The Kings will be eager to stay with Augustana and SAIT in the fight for the final two playoff spots. The Kings tied one and lost one in a two game set with the SAIT Trojans this past week.

So far the Ooks and the Kings have split their season series with each team winning once at home. On Saturday, the Ooks host the Kings in a 7:30 p.m. match in the NAIT Arena. On Sunday, the Ooks travel to Red Deer to meet the Kings in a 5:30 p.m. start at the Centrium.

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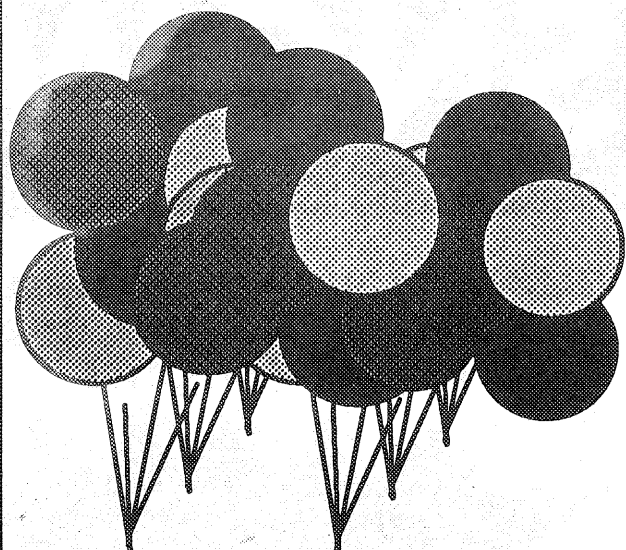
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Blues win alumni tourney

Melnyk completed the hat trick as the Golds nipped the Whites 6-5 and Murray Melnyk tallied twice as the Blues edged the Whites 7-5.



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



