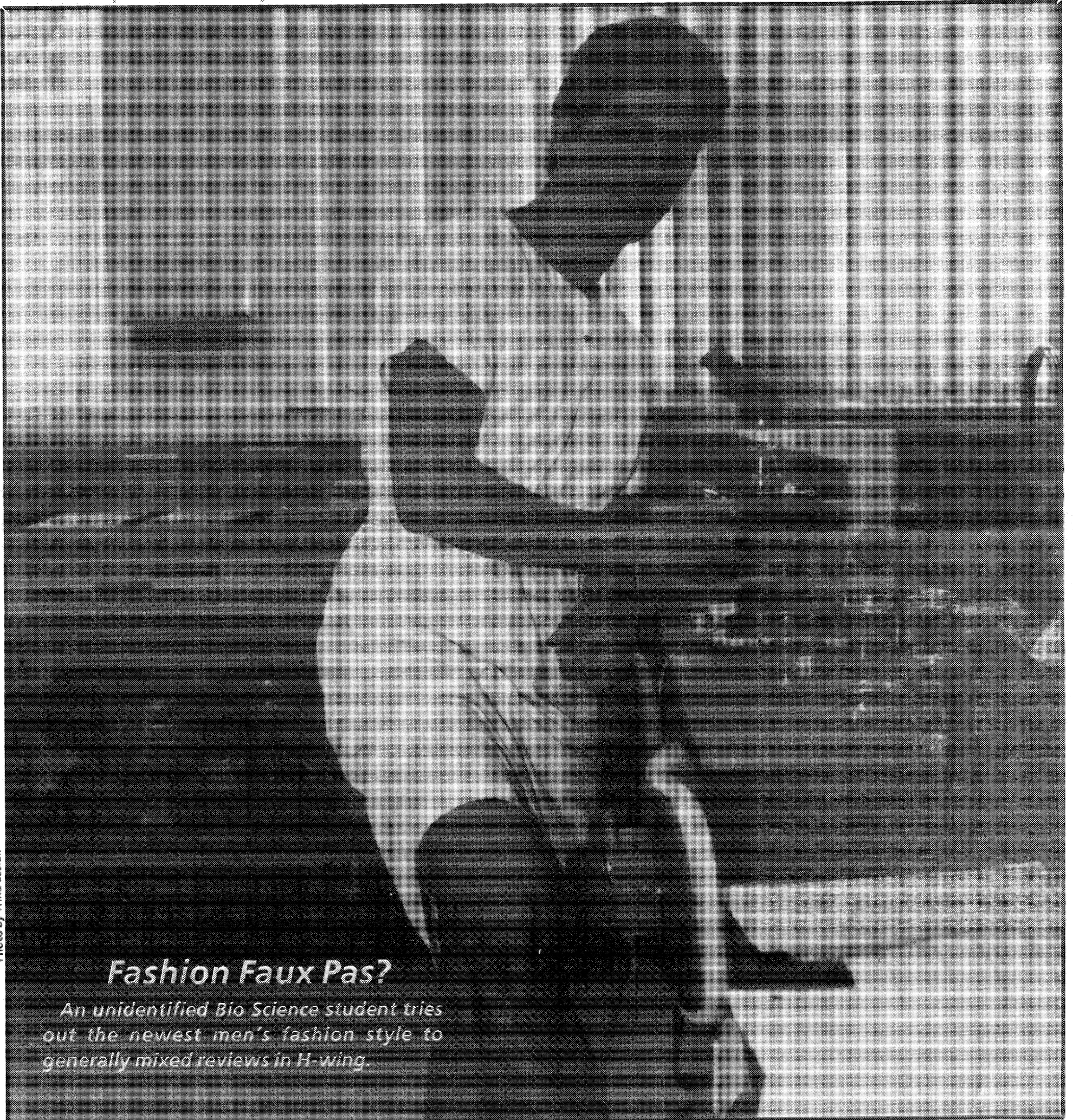

## Tech of the Week: Graphic Sign Arts

A small technology, Graphic Sign Arts consists of about twenty students. It is an eight month course, jam packed with everything from layout at an art room on main campus, to spray painting techniques at Patricia Campus.

Previously known as "Commercial Signwriting," the name change came about this year, due to the fact, that designing and layout isn't all done manually anymore. The use of computer graphics is now employed. Students learn computer designing approximately nine hours per week.

The students start off with

the basics, learning how to professionally letter. This involves extensive hours, and patience. After this comes learning layout.

Not only do the student design basic signs, limited by their own creativity, but, illuminated signs, and painting on vehicles is also included in the course description.

The students also take a business course for background. Graphic Sign Arts is not without some routine procedure though. Monitors are named from the class to remind other students to keep the shop cleaned up because a clean shop is a safe shop.

Working in conditions very close to those in the work force, the students

experience a taste of the real world. Their skills will take them mostly to commercial sign shops, or perhaps to in house sign shops that some of the bigger companies have. A few will go freelance, or start their own business.

An artistic talent is recommended, and Art 30 is a prerequisite. Drafting is also recommended to enter Graphic Sign Arts.

What interested the students?

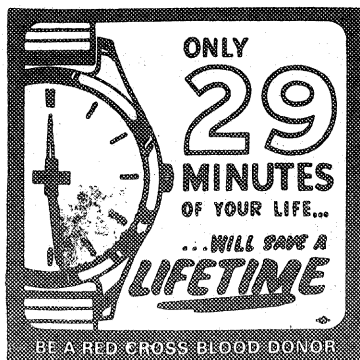

had initially set the 4:10 drinking policy at the nest because of fears NAIT would be liable if a student became intoxicated and then suffered injury while working with the heavy equipment that some technologies use.

Lachambre will be making the proposal at the next Board of Governors meeting on February 7.

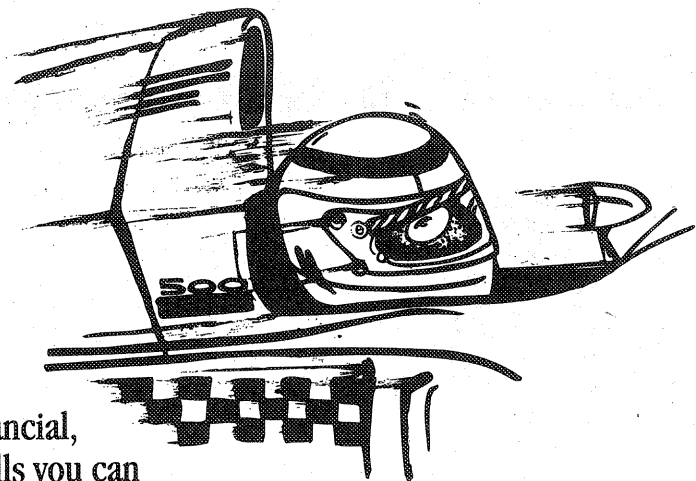

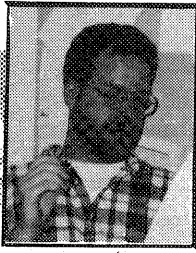

# Who really won the Gulf War?

It's almost two years to the day that the United Nations, led by the United States, bombed the bejeezus out of Bagdad, thus starting the conflict known by the misnomer; The Gulf War ("Massacre" would be perhaps a more accurate noun).

The US should not confront Iraq when it asserts its rights to keep defensive anti-air missiles or barely cross a questionable border with Kuwait. Knee jerk reactions to Iraq simply underline the Americans' inability to punish Saddam himself and show that perhaps all that trouble the UN went to two years ago, killing tens of thousand of Iraklis, perhaps just wasn't worth it.

I usually dedicate this column to various issues involving student concerns but since things are slow in this area, I want to focus on something important to students internally.

This is the eighth year that the NAIT Foundation has pursued this form of fundraising and a success it has been. Last year, the car raffle benefited NAIT to the total of over \$116,000.00 From this money comes new equipment and scholarships for students. By helping in the sale of raffle tickets, you are helping NAIT acquire up to date equipment for your use. Please realize that you are now receiving benefits

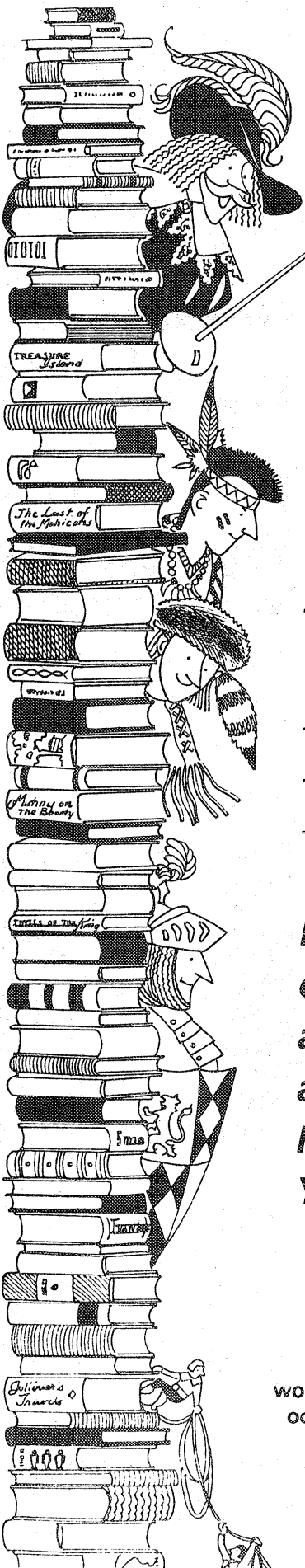

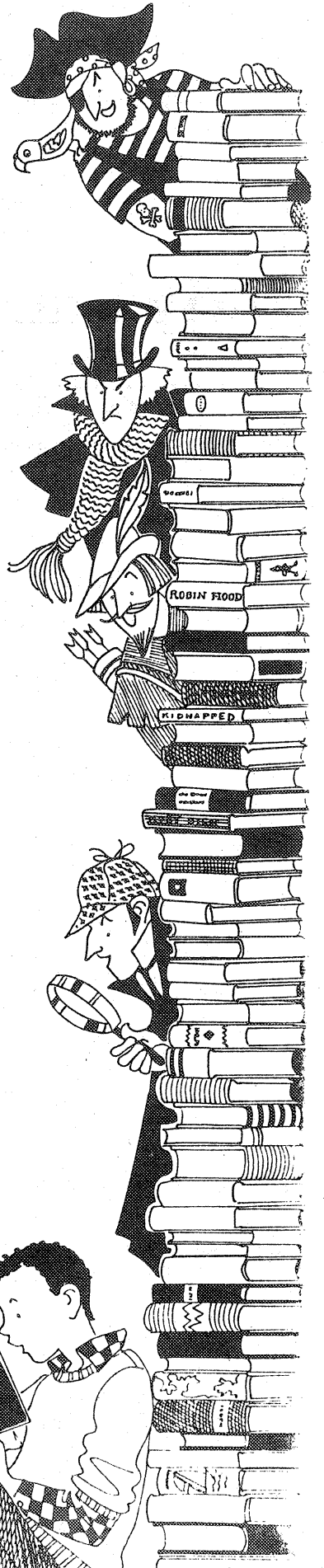

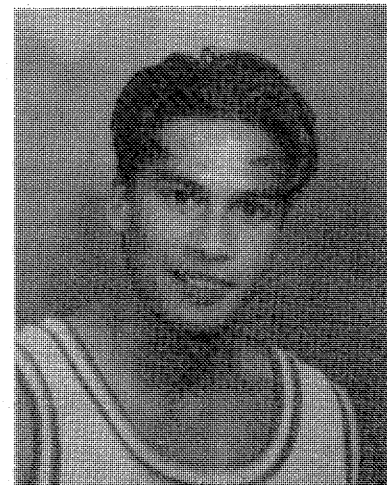

#### Student Awards Program

The purpose of the Student Awards Program is to encourage academic achievement and provide financial assistance to students who are in financial need.

Various types of awards, such as scholarships, bursaries and prizes are available to full-time students. The majority of awards are available to students who have completed their first year study and are enrolled in their second year. For the majority of awards, no application form is necessary. Candidates are selected upon recommendation of the Program Head. Selection of award winners usually takes place during the month of September and students normally receive their award by December 20th.

Some awards are administered outside of NAIT and require a special application form. Generally, selection is performed by the individual donors, and each award has a different application deadline. A list of these awards is published in the Student Awards Handbook which will be available in April.

There are some awards and bursaries which are administered by NAIT and require an application form. These awards are awarded on a competitive basis. Interested candidates must submit an application form. Application forms are available **after August 1, 1993**. The deadline for submitting a completed application is **September 30, 1993**.

Students who will be continuing their studies in the fall of 1993 and wish to apply for awards may obtain a copy of the Student Awards Handbook after April 15, 1993, at the Office of Student Awards and Financial Aid.

Hoy's squad is still trying to gain the maturity required to win games in the

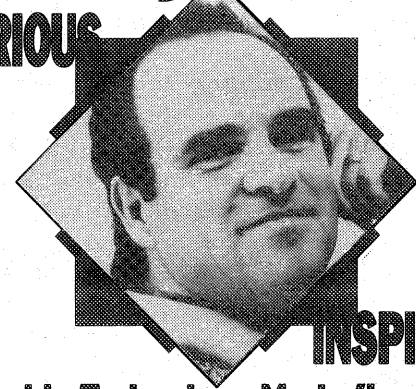

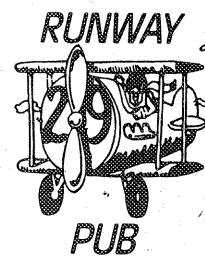

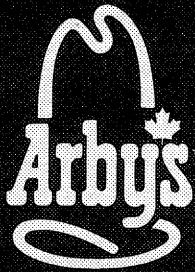
It's a sick system that subjects unwary viewers to a scantily clad, middle aged bald guy. I bet those sickies in programming were in league with Satan!

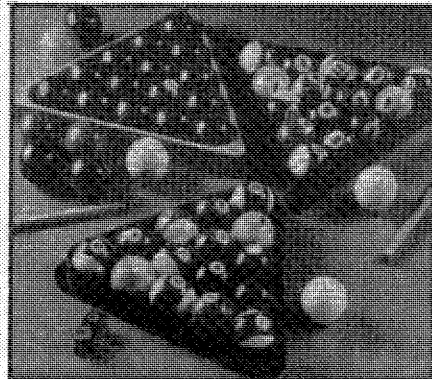

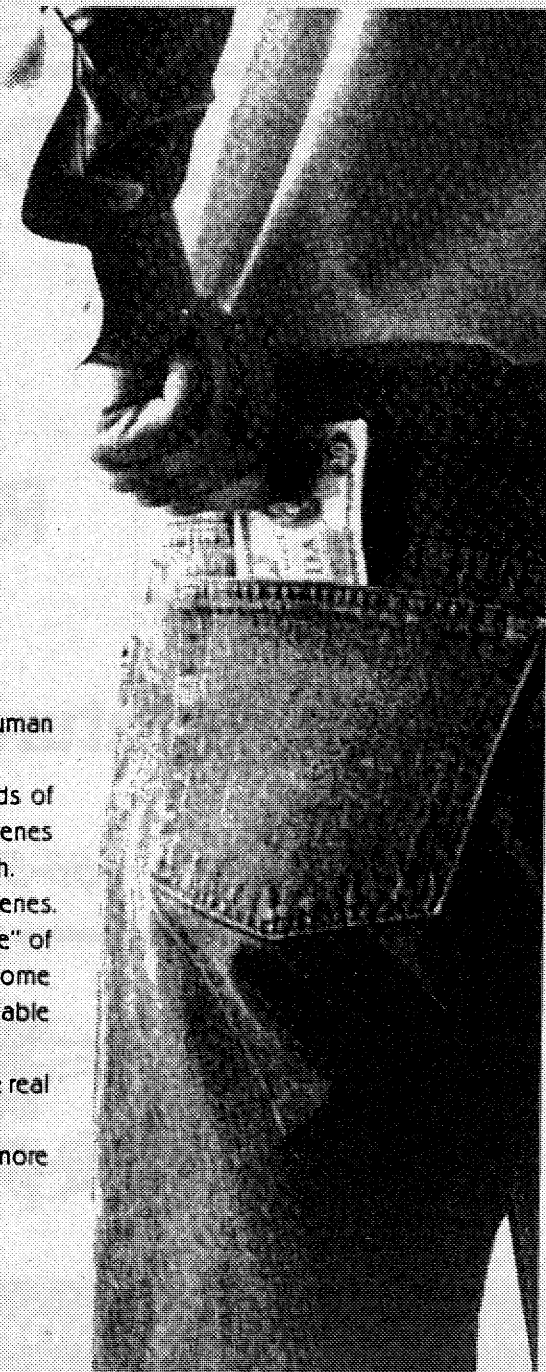

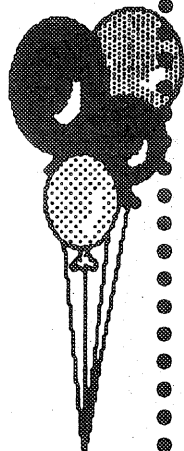
