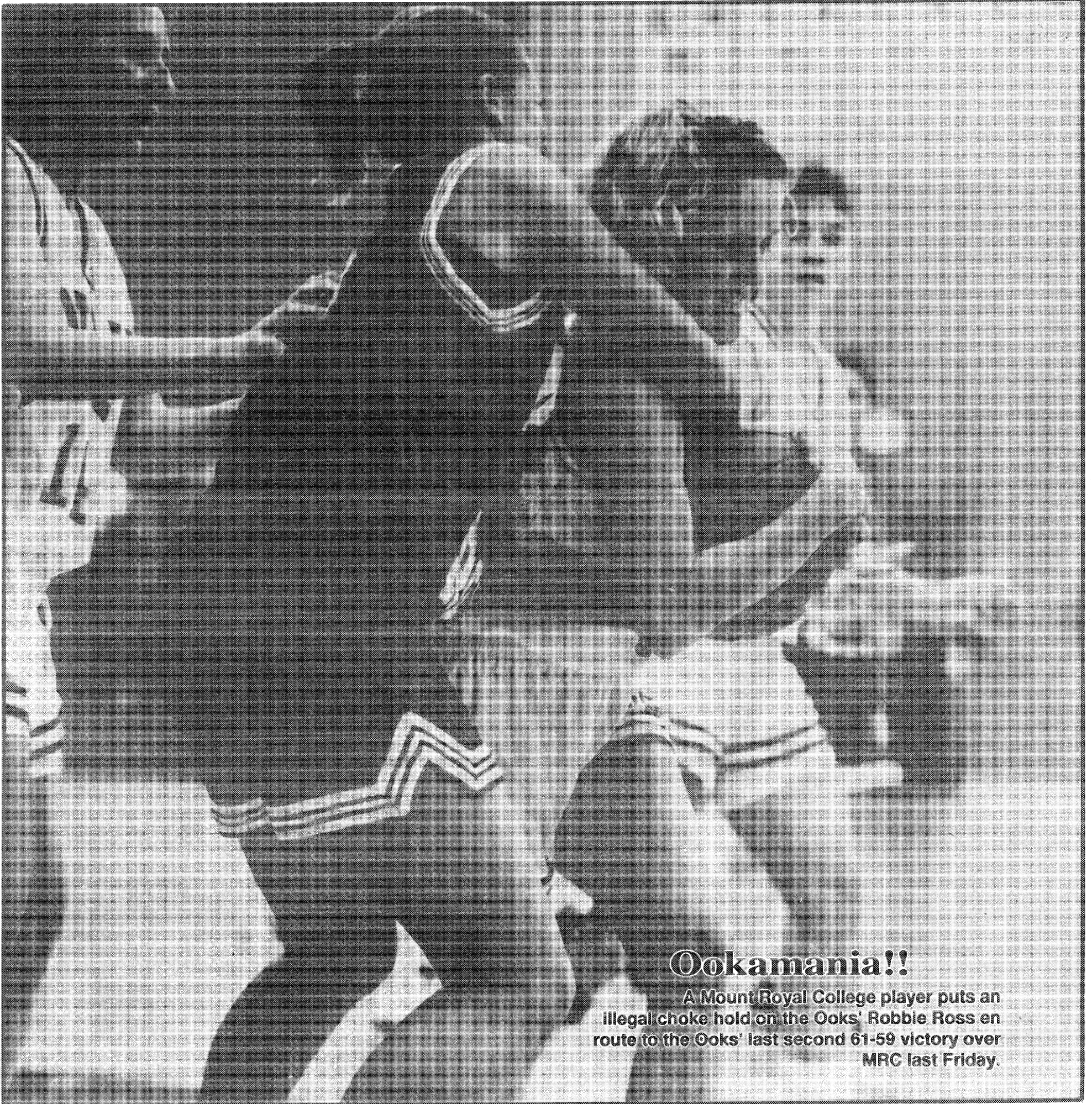

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Student seat on B of G left vacant

NAIT's Board of Governors will have to do without half its allowed student representation, despite the fact that tuition increases for fall enrollment will be on the agenda at the next meeting in February.

The Board of Governors, who make all decisions regarding tuition fee increases is made up of sixteen members. Twelve of

those members are government appointees answering to Minister of Education, Jack Ady; two are NAIT staff representatives. One student representative, Taras Kaznisty, has recently resigned due to personal reasons, leaving a vacancy on the Board.

General Council defeated a motion at the last council meeting, held on January 19, that would appoint a student representative to fill the currently vacant position.

Instead, Council passed a motion to leave the position vacant until a new representative is elected in March.

Although some students feel that maximum student representation in NAIT's most powerful board is essential. NAITSA President Dan Lachambre says that Council's decision was a realistic one. "I'd like to be able to show the Board how serious students are toward their education, but at the

same time it's the most realistic approach."

Dave Murray, who is the Board of Governors remaining student representative, also feels that Council's decision to leave the position vacant was a good idea. "The problem is that General Council has to feel comfortable enough that I'm doing a good job meeting my responsibilities and they have to make the realization that it's better to have a voice or vote from a student

member who's well informed than it is to have a vote from a student member who doesn't know." "Too many ifs".

Student representatives to the Board of Governors will be elected in March and although the usual term of office would run from May '93 to May '94, one representative will be required to begin his or her term in March, in order to fill the vacancy as quickly as possible.

Stripper Issue Resolved... Finally

The stripper issue is finally dead. At this week's General Council meeting the original motion to allow exotic dancers as entertainment at NAIT cabarets was defeated overwhelmingly. The second vote on the issue was held, according to the NAITSA Executive, to obtain a true reflection of students' feelings on the matter. Apparently most students thought strippers at cabarets was a bad idea, with just three tech supporting it.

Surveying technology's Ladies Night Cabaret will still go ahead because their cabaret was proposed and approved before Council voted against exotic dancer

entertainment.

Other happenings at General council this week included a proposal from Academic VP Brad Balkan that would prohibit posters and leaflets to be used in NAITSA election campaigns.

Balkan says the benefits of his proposed "no paper campaign" would be two fold. It would force candidates to get out and make themselves known to students thus giving students a better perception of who the candidates are and what they stand for. As well it would be the environmentally correct thing to do. As it stands now, NAITSA policy allows each candidate to distribute 100 posters around NAIT. After elections last year, Balkan says they took down 700

posters and hauled them out in 14 huge garbage bags. A motion to approve the no-paper campaign will be put before Council at the next meeting.

Balkan also proposed a constitutional change that would see an election committee formed with the purpose of resolving any disputes that may arise between candidates at the annual NAITSA elections. The committee would be made up of three students at large, the NAITSA President, and the Chief Returning Officer. The idea was well received by Council and passed the first reading. Because it is a constitutional change, it must go through three readings before being entrenched in NAITSA's constitution.

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Gateway should not bow to pressure

Last week, the University of Alberta student newspaper, *The Gateway*, suffered the consequences for publishing a cartoon critical of Israel's policy towards the Palestinians in the occupied territories.

In the cartoon, the virgin Mary and baby Jesus are confronted by a modern day Israeli soldier. The soldier says, "First we had to shoot three wise guys trying to cross the river Jordan, and now we find you having an unauthorized gathering past curfew! Lady, you don't even own this house do you? Shlomo! Bring out the bulldozer!!" The title reads, "What if Jesus was born in 1992?"

The Gateway was promptly deluged with complaints from everyone from the Jewish Students' Association to the U of A Board of Governors to the local MP and MLA for, among other things, anti-Semitism.

While it is true that the cartoon is a little ham-fisted, particularly with its "Shlomo!" reference, it clearly tries to evoke sympathy for the Palestinians by putting their

situation in moral terms understandable to most North Americans.

This, in my opinion, is a valid analogy. Israeli policy persecutes the Palestinians as unwanted squatters. Similarly, in the Western tradition, Christ is probably the most well known example of one who suffered unjust persecution and it is a regrettable fact (yet a fact nonetheless) that it was the actions of the threatened Jewish elite of the time that played a major role in this persecution. While this is certainly no reason to hate all Jews, the cartoon does draw a parallelism between Christ and the Palestinians and thus makes a very effective criticism of Israeli policy.

Obviously, there are many who will disagree or even be offended by this argument. Yet, isn't it the role of universities, particularly university newspapers, to examine and discuss all kinds of issues and ideas regardless of their political correctness or potential to offend? Furthermore, in a modern liberal democratic society, no group or individual should be immune from criticism. Nor should newspapers stifle legitimate criticisms in the interests of avoiding misplaced charges of racism or intolerance.

Of course, *The Gateway*, like all newspapers, does not hold a monopoly on the truth and thus must be prepared to publish challenges to its stance. Yet, I hope the paper won't allow itself to be bullied by those with their respective sacred cows and continue to question common assumptions regardless of the offense that is invariably taken.

Dear Sir,

I am writing this letter because it seems that most of the students I talk with are unaware of the proposed non-smoking environment which NAIT administration intends to implement on July 1, 1993.

It is only about 18 months since NAIT students, academic staff, and support staff were polled with regard to smoking. All groups voted in majority to maintain the status quo, and not further reduce smoking areas. Most people I speak with seem to think there is no problem with things the way they are. No one is even talking about it; it's not an issue. Where is the pressure coming from to do this? Is administration reacting to a small but well-organized fanatical non-smoking group? It appears so. Where does this end? I smell kerosene whenever a 737 leaves the municipal airport. Should we demand those aircraft be required to shut off fuel during departures? The New England Journal of Medicine reported a link between cancer and caffeine. Should we banish coffee, soft drinks and chocolate bars from NAIT premises? Just try eliminating coffee from NAIT's premises for just one day, and see how many happy people there are at NAIT.

Can NAIT ad-ministration not see the huge number of people who are going to be mad as hell at the implementation of a total no smoking policy at NAIT? I decided to take in some NAIT men's basketball action last Saturday afternoon. Knowing that the Ooks had been pummeled by Mount Royal the night before, I figured that they would come out against the SAIT Trojans with ferocious intensity.

Intensity, yes. Scoring power, no

The Trojans jumped out to an early lead, and the Ooks were never able to close the gap. SAIT played tough defence, and was able to cause a plethora of turnovers, which it promptly converted into easy baskets.

The score was 38 to 20 in favor of SAIT after the first half.

NAIT's woes continued in the second half. An intense Trojan defence, combined with an anemic Ouk offence, allowed SAIT to pull away. The game ended 71 to 48 in favor of the visiting Trojans.

James Clark lead the Trojans in scoring with 26 points, including four 3-pointers. Mark Kennedy had 14 points for the Ooks, with Ernest Serwadda and Richard Jory chipping in with 12 points each. Both teams shot 43% from the floor.

NAIT was 18 for 42, while their Calgary counterparts

shot 23 for 53.

SAIT was also 4 for 15 from 3-point range, while NAIT was 0 for 7 from downtown.

Even though the Ooks were out-shot, out-rebounded and out-hustled, there was some good news. The team on Saturday was much improved over the squad on the floor at the beginning of the season. The goose-egg in

the Ooks' win column will not stand the test of time. Saturday afternoon was simply a lost cause.

NAIT's next home game is this Saturday versus Augustana. Be there to support your team.

As the season reaches its mid point, the Lady Ooks find themselves with a 4 wins - 4 losses record and right in the middle of a battle that should go right down to the wire to decide the four playoff spots.

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Ooks Throttle Wolves

Returning veteran Craig Hawryschuk collected 11 points on four goals and seven assists as the Ooks thumped the Grande Prairie Regional College Wolves 13-0 on Friday and 10-3 on Saturday in Grande Prairie.

With the pair of wins, the Ooks move to within two points of the first place Mount Royal College Cougars who dropped two to the Augustana University College Vikings this weekend.

On Friday night in the 13-0 triumph, Alec Sheffo redirected 16 shots as the Ooks recorded their second shutout of the season.

In the first, the Ooks jumped out to a 3-0 advantage as Mike Park found the five hole at 4:43, Tim Olson knocked in a rebound at 11:53 and Sandro Pisani capitalized on a powerplay opportunity at 11:52.

In the second, the Ooks widened the gap to 8-0 as Owen Korkie slid in the biscuit from close range at 3:10, Tom Oloriz bent the twine at 3:40, Shaun Hebert took advantage of a goal mouth scramble at 7:11, Trevor Kenyon found the mark at 7:58, and Jason Krueckl deked the netminder at 18:59.

In the third, the Ooks completed the scoring with five goals. Craig Hawryschuk and Mike Park made no mistake tapping in rebounds at 9:20 and 10:47 respectively. The Ooks then padded the lead with goals from Travis Koehn at 14:17, Tim Olson at 16:37, and Craig Hawryschuk at 19:12.

The Ooks outshot the Wolves 64 to 16. Alec Sheffo went all the way in the Ooks crease while Steve Glendinning and Jeremy Warring shared the netminding duties for the Wolves.

On Saturday afternoon in the 10-3 triumph, the Ooks reached doubled digits for the fifth time season.

Once again, the Ooks dominated the shots on goal department. The Grande Prairie tandem of Steve Glendinning and Jeremy Warring faced 72 shots while NAIT's Don Davidge was tested 15 times.

ON THE BENCH

The Ooks play the Concordia College Mustangs in a home and homer series this week. The two teams meet on Thursday night at 7:30 p.m. in the Agricom and then on Saturday evening at 7:30 p.m. in the NAIT Arena. Saturday's game will be the first game for NAIT coach Perry Pearn behind the Ooks bench at home since winning a gold medal with Team Canada at the World Junior Championships in Gavle, Sweden earlier this month.
