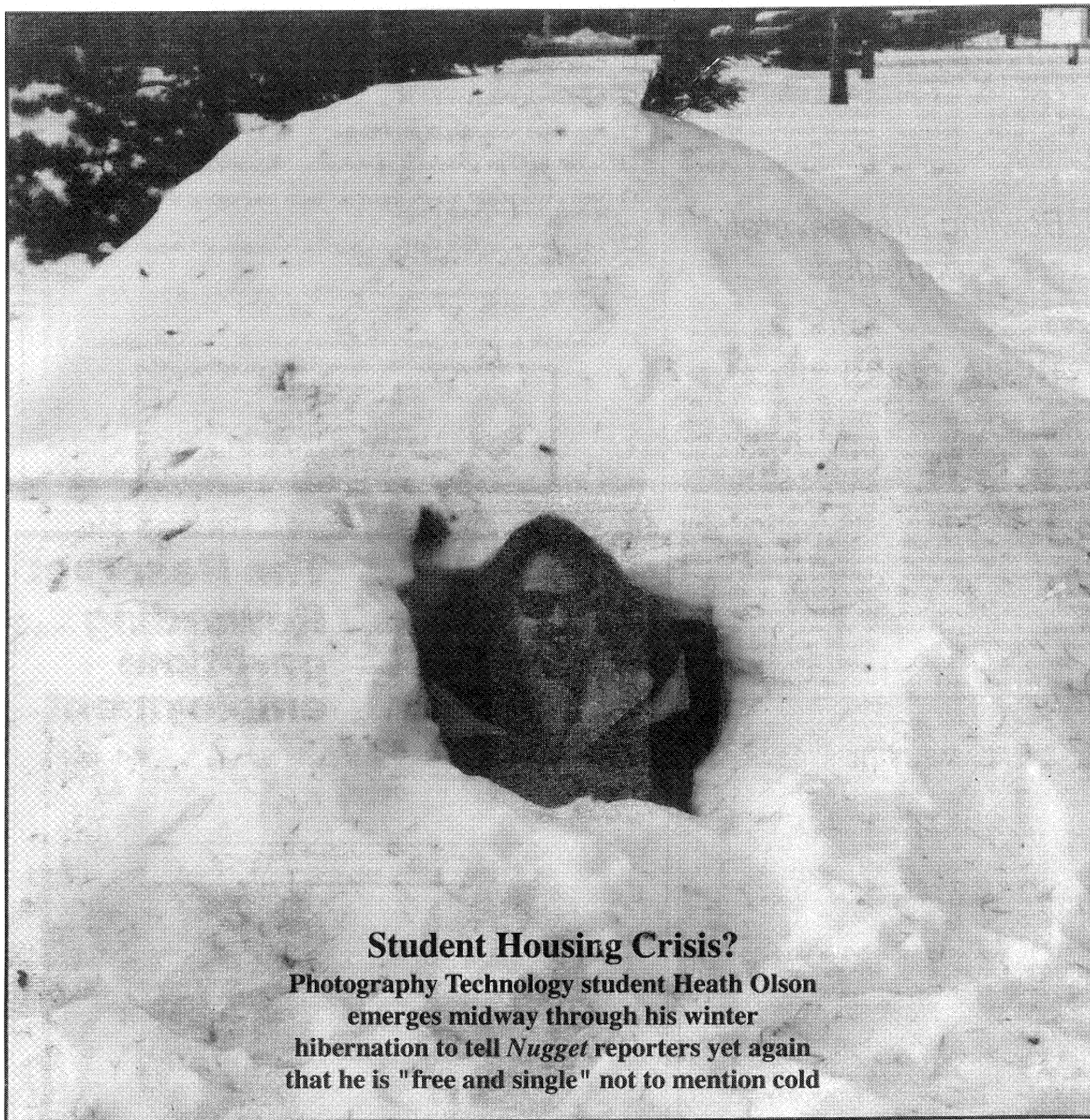

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# New Aboriginal club welcomed at institute

A small but enthusiastic group of founding members met on January 15 to begin planning activities for NAIT's first-ever Aboriginal Student Club.

Students agreed that a club, especially for Aboriginal students at NAIT, is long overdue. Students are often many miles from familiar cultural surroundings. Others noted that the NAIT campus is huge and it can be pretty intimidating for students more accustomed to small school facilities.

The first meeting produced many ideas for activities to plan an speakers

to invite including local dignitaries and leaders as well as respected Aboriginal national figures. Frequent visits by elders were emphasized as were cultural events, such as dancing demonstrations, an art show and craft displays.

Leadership duties will be shared, as NAIT students carry a heavy academic load. Ernie Hawke volunteered to be the initial spokesperson for the group. Hawke hails from the Buffalo Lake Metis Settlement and is in his final year of Business Management. "There is a great need for a club such as this here at

NAIT. Often we feel isolated and separate, and to come together with people who share the same interests is great," he says. Hawke urges all Aboriginal students at the Institute to get involved in the club.

The group meets every

second Friday in Room T213 at 12:15. As this time is not convenient for all students, a second group meets earlier at 11:15 in Room E103. Both groups are scheduled to meet on January 29 and new members are always welcome. Notices of

upcoming events, during school hours or on weekends and evening, making new friends with others from similar cultural backgrounds, and employment opportunities will also be enjoyed by members of the club.

## Bowling alley severely damaged

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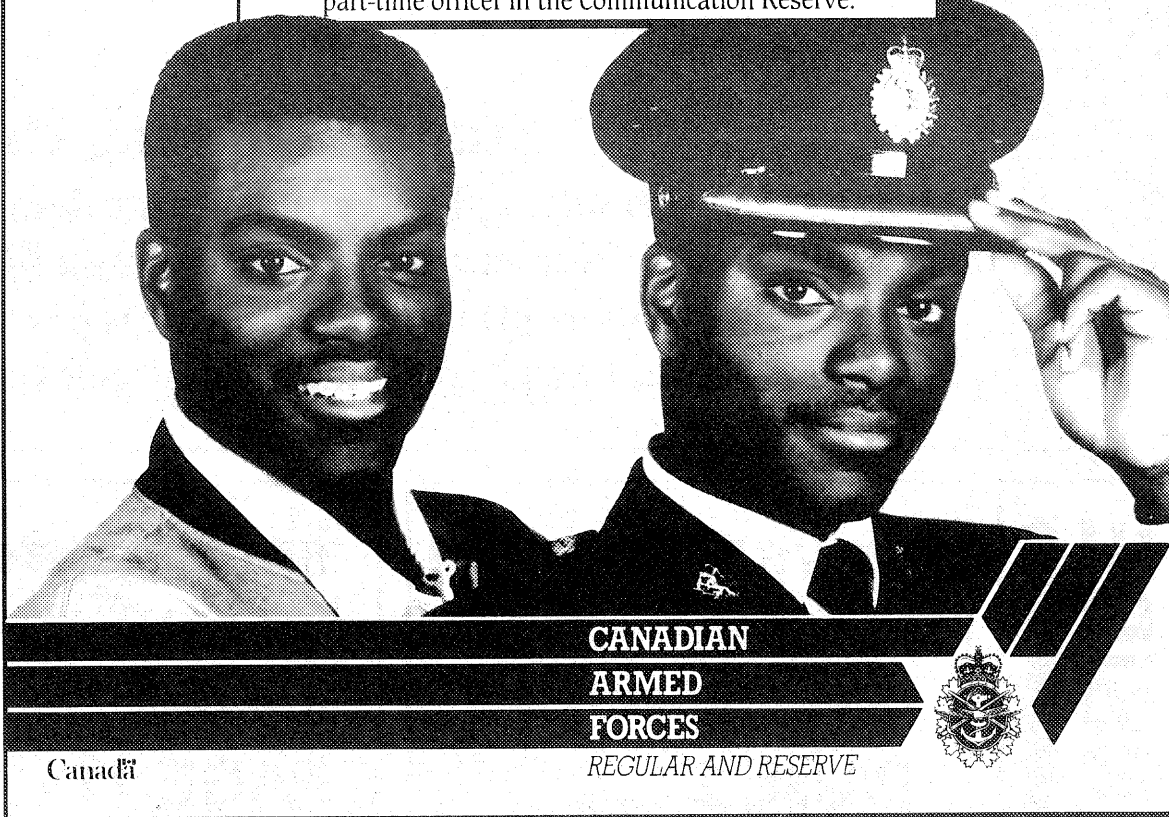

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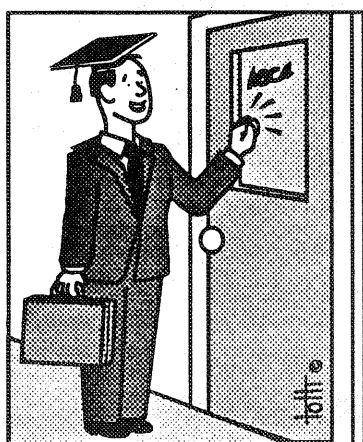
# Grads Need Job Search Skills

With unemployment levels projected to run at 10 percent or more for at least the next year, many 1993 graduates are headed straight from college or university to the school of hard knocks. Firms that once recruited dozens of students in specialized fields have now dramatically reduced or even frozen hiring. And, unfortunately, things might not improve for the class of 1994. Yet once the economy picks up, demographics indicate that in the medium to long term these graduates will be well positioned for good jobs.

If you're a student who doesn't want to fall between the cracks during the next few years, take note of what you can do to improve your odds of landing a job now.

Begin with the annual job fair or career fair held on your campus where employers from all sectors set up booths to inform students about their firms. Make no mistake, though it's called a fair, the firms attending mean business.

Being enthusiastic, well groomed, and businesslike are all assets. But in these tough times, they may not be enough. Be informed about industries or firms you are targeting - do preliminary research at your career placement office or library.



Also, make an effort to talk briefly, and one on one to the senior person at the booth. He or she can be influential when the firm is choosing candidates to interview. If the firms you wish to meet do not attend try to make contact another way.

Research done at the

career fair and from other sources will help you tailor your resume to the needs of your target employers. You'll be able to determine, for example, which ones value communications skills, computer skills, languages, technical background, presentation skills, or entrepreneurial initiative. Your resume should also include information on outside activities, such as clubs, sports, work on campus newspapers, and part time jobs. A student who can successfully balance these and do well academically shows good organizational and time management skills, as well as energy and intelligence.

All employers value leadership qualities. It will work in your favour if you have been elected to positions, organized groups, chaired meetings, or dealt with people outside the student body.

With your resume submitted to various employers, begin to prepare for interviews. Many campus

placement centre offer interview workshops. To gain experience, consider volunteering for mock interview sessions.

When it comes time for your real interviews, remember that how you say things can be as important as what you say. Be positive - if you had a patch of poor performance during school, take responsibility, don't blame others. Be concise. Read the body language of

your interviewer. If she checks her watch or shuffles notes, you've lost her move on. Be yourself. If you don't hear from the firm within a reasonable amount of time, follow up. This show initiative.

And remember, if all else fails, sometimes a unique approach works - like the student who advertised on a downtown billboard to get a marketing job and succeeded.

## Tech of the Week: Engineering Design & Drafting

A two year program, EDDT consists of five main areas of study; machine, electrical, civil, structural, and process design and drafting.

For the first year student, a general program provides background information needed to enter a second year option. The first year program includes courses such as basic math, communications, engineering application courses, and a basic business class. Unlike the other technologies at NAIT, EDDT doesn't learn to use the tools and equipment they design. Instead, it's more inclined

towards desk work.

In the past EDDT was done manually, now with CADD. Students use the computer to design and draft. They still do much of the work manually, however, because only the larger firms that can afford it use CADD. Blueprinting, for example, done manually takes up approximately 50 percent of program time.

EDDT students begin with lectures, and then the students verify it on CADD, layout the design, prove it on a model, and then complete the drawing for marks. "It's hard work; with one drawing a week, and up to five hours spent on each drawing!" says Ryan Holt, a first year EDDT student.

NAIT also offers something else to EDDT students. The technology has the most unique modeling course throughout Canada.

After graduation, EDDT students can expect to become Assistant Engineers. They will be mostly drafting, maybe some modeling, and work on CADD. They won't be doing any designing, because, although they have the background, they aren't qualified (don't have the degree attached) enough.

A multitude of available jobs and a pay rate ranging from \$1400 - \$2600 a month; This definitely seems worthwhile to look at as a career option.

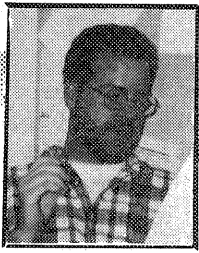

# Canada needs a labour strategy

As Canada's unemployment figure rises to eleven percent of the work force, a simple question comes to mind; Why?

Canada has a well educated population, an infrastructure in relatively good condition, and a national resource base that only a few countries can match.

Yet, the weak link in Canada's economic plan is just that; a plan. Canada has no labour strategy. Young Canadians still grow up with a 1960's vision of the labour force. Many enter university thinking that a university degree is an invitation to the middle class and are shocked when employers don't exactly fall over themselves to hire university graduates.

While many have the general skills for jobs in Commerce or Engineering, specialized skills remain in high demand.

This often leads the university graduates looking to a post graduate education for any hope of working in their field.

There must be a better way. Six years of post secondary education isn't the easiest, nor the cheapest way to educate the highly skilled workers we need.

Part of the answer to our dilemma is under our noses. Technical schools offer alot to both students and industry. Technical schools can concentrate on practical skills required by industry and condense a program to a manageable two years.

The shorter time required for a technical course makes it perhaps the only option for those thrown out of work in dying Canadian industries. Canada spends nearly all its money on unemployment income supports and not retraining. Yet, spending twice the present amount in support and retraining in a field short of labour is better than the status quo.

It is time our government actively promoted growing technical industries and actively advised young Canadians to pursue non traditional specific educations to achieve their goals in the changing market place.

But having said that, the fact is that jobs do still exist. *The Edmonton Journal* has recently taken it upon themselves to print various articles about NAIT graduates and what they're finding out there.

Some NAIT grads have been lucky enough to find full time, permanent employment. But the trend is apparently going towards more part time work and contract jobs.

This generation of students, widely spaced as it is, tends to have been brought up by a generation of parents who believe that a career means getting into a company at an entry level position, gradually working up to a senior position, and then retiring with a plaque (or a watch, or maybe bookends for long service).

This involves networking, that is, going out into industry and getting to know people; making cold calls and then making sure they don't forget you. It involves, in fact, all those things that most people don't want to do because it's so intimidating.

Those who ignore the workplace while in school and concentrate only on their studies may be in for a rude awakening upon graduation.

NAIT is an institution whose focus is on job placement. NAIT grads are in a position to grab those jobs that do exist, but it's crucial to realize the job hunt starts now.

Your dream of a pro-smoking lobby is already a reality in the form of the tobacco industry's collective advertising budge in excess

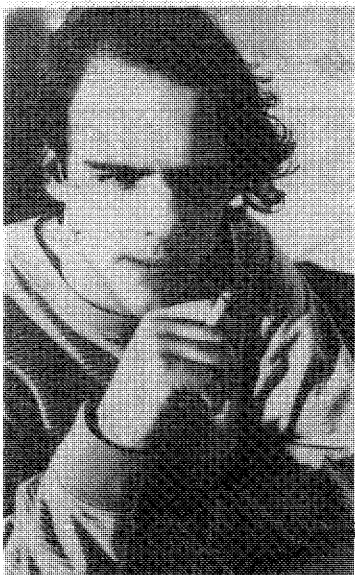

# Hockey Ooks back in first place

The NAIT Ooks (13-3-0) are tied for first place in the ACAC hockey standings with the Mount Royal College Cougars (13-5-0) following a pair of victories over the Concordia College Mustangs (1-17-0).

The Ooks moved into a share of top spot with an 11-1 triumph on Thursday at the Agricom and an 8-0 shutout victory on Saturday at the NAIT Arena. Wayne MacDonald led the way for the Ooks collecting four goals and four assists in the weekend series. In contrast, the Cougars split a weekend set with the Red Deer College Kings.

On Saturday, the Ooks recorded their third shutout of the season as they blanked the Mustangs 8-0.

In the first, the Ooks moved in front 2-0 as Jason Krueckl and Wayne MacDonald found the mark.

In the second, the Ooks widened the gap to 7-0. Dave

Midbo scored from the point before Craig Hawryschuk and Wayne MacDonald each added a pair of goals before the stanza's conclusion.

In the third, Hawryschuk capped the night's scoring by knocking in a rebound.

NAIT's Alec Sheflo and Don Davidge stopped 8 shots to record their first shared shutout of the season. At the other end, Concordia's Karl Tiemstra and Kyle Brown turned away 52 of 60 shots.

The Ooks defeated the Mustangs 11-1 at the Agricom on Thursday night.

On Thursday, the Ooks reached double digits for the sixth time this season.

In the first, the Ooks acquired a 2-0 lead on a fine individual effort by Jason Krueckl and a breakaway marker by Craig Hawryschuk.

In the second, the Ooks jumped in front 5-0 as Jason Krueckl capitalized on a crisp passing play. Mike Park one timed a shot into the twine, and Tim Olson

later turned on the red light.

In the third, the Ooks exploded for six goals. Wayne MacDonald increased NAIT's advantage to six goals before Chris Wakal broke Alec Sheflo's shutout bid. The Ooks then closed out the scoring on goals from Jason Krueckl, Dean Beattie, Tim Olson, Tom Oloriz, and Owen Korkie.

Alec Sheflo redirected 21 of 22 shots in the NAIT net while Karl Tiemstra blocked 51 of 62 drives in the CC crease.

The Ooks receive their first real test of the second

half when they meet the rejuvenated Augustana Vikings (10-7-0) in a home and home series. The Vikings have won four of five games since returning from Europe and are gunning for the playoff spot held by the SAIT Trojans after sweeping the Trojans in Calgary this past weekend. The Ooks travel to Camrose for an 8:00 p.m. match up on Friday and the Vikings invaded the NAIT Arena for a 7:30 p.m. contest on Saturday.
