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Net education funding decreased

The Provincial Government has announced this week that grant rates for schools, municipalities, and post-secondary institutions will hold a zero percent increase for 1993/94; a net decrease in funding after infla-

tion is considered.

The news comes as no surprise to Administrative Vice President of Services, Ivor Richardson. Although Richardson does not yet know exactly what the impact will be, he says NAIT has been preparing for this for the past two years and will be able to maintain pro-

gramming for the coming fiscal year (93/94). Richardson adds that Administration will be using the period from now until next fall to plan for 1994/95 because there is every reason to believe that 94/95 will not be any better than this year and it may be worse.

As far as contract negotiations

with the NAIT Academic Staff Association (NASA) go, Richardson says he can't comment because talks take place in a negotiating environment, however he did say that there is no staff curtailment expected.

NAITSA President, Dan Lachambre says he expected the

grant freeze but is disappointed nonetheless. "It shows a lack of commitment from the Provincial Government again. Unfortunately, institutes have to increase their tuition and yet the Student Finance Board is not making finances any more accessible to students. The results equals inaccessibility."

Student cooks to compete in culinary competition

Six of NAIT's Commercial Cooking Technology's best chefs will be traveling to Toronto in May to compete in the prestigious Taste of Canada Culinary Competition.

A Taste of Canada is an international competition held every four years, and is somewhat akin to the Culinary Olympics in Frankfurt, Germany. Teams from all over the world as well as several Canadian teams will be vying for the gold medal over two days of gourmet competition.

Teams consist of five members, but NAIT's team is not taking any chances, and is bringing along a sixth member as an alternate. Students who are on the team had to compete within their technology just to be selected. NAIT's chosen few are: Denise Kelly, Tracy Hilgartner, Troy Lymburner, Brad Pipella, Candace Merckens, and Joan Yates.

The competition is in two parts. Part one consists of a five part cold food display in which each member will be required to prepare one part.

The categories include entrees, hors d'oeuvres, cold buffet platter, restaurant platter and pastry.

According to Troy Lymburner, team member, the cold food display must stand up to hours of inspection and therefore will not be eaten.

It is for this reason that part two of the competition, the hot food display, is included.

Competitors in the hot food portion are given a list of groceries that they'll be required to work with.

From that, they must create a menu for a three course meal within four to five hours.

They are then given three and a half hours to prepare the meal for service. This meal, which is eaten, is judged on appearance, taste, temperature, originality, use of allotted groceries, and appropriate quantities.

Says Lymburner, "The hot food competition is included to see if these *schmucks* can really cook."

First place in the competition will earn the winning team a gold medal and the opportunity to compete in the World Student Culinary Olympics in Singapore in '94. Second place wins a silver medal and third gets the bronze.

Lymburner says that just being selected to compete in A Taste of Canada is a career boost, and winning a medal would be very prestigious.

Program Head Graham Toope says the trip is funded through the NAIT Foundation in recognition of all the work Commercial Cooking does in the Carnival Cruise.

Student savings *should be flexible*

College students should choose secure investments rather than the risky stock market for their summer earnings. The prudent course is to make sure the money is there when you need it.

While one investing axiom advises, "A big risk is the key to a big gain," another maxim preaches restraint: "Never risk what you can't afford to lose." The second is smarter.

Wannabe tycoons on campuses like to boast about the killings they made on the market. Ignored in the impressive tales are their more frequent wipeouts.

Some students seem to be most prone to quick-hit investments of the crash and burn variety. In contrast, some student see investing their earnings as more chore than challenge, and choose caution.

In seeking a parking place for summer earnings that you'll need before the end of the school year, there are two overriding considerations: safety and the amount of interest.

That translates into flexibility. You want to put your money where it will receive the highest reward but can be cashed in quickly.

Mutual funds are problematic. The value of your equity investment gyrates with the stock market. It calls for good timing in getting out or you may wind up with less than you put in. Besides, there might be a front-end "load" or commission.

Money market funds, on the other hand, provide a decent return in these days of dipsey-doodling interest rates and can be cashed in within two days. Canada Savings bonds are solid, cashable three

months after purchase but better suited to long-term investment.

Guaranteed Investment Certificates (GICs) from banks or trust companies usually proved a return a shade higher than government bonds but are locked in for a specific period.

The trick, then, is to take your summer savings and stagger the placement of GICs. If you have \$5,000 you might put \$2,500 into a 30-day GIC, the other half into a 60-day GIC, and keep on rotating them so that some cash is available any month.

Before you decide who should get your money, shop around for the best interest rate. An extra half percent on \$5,000 over a year buys a good text book or dinner for two after exams.

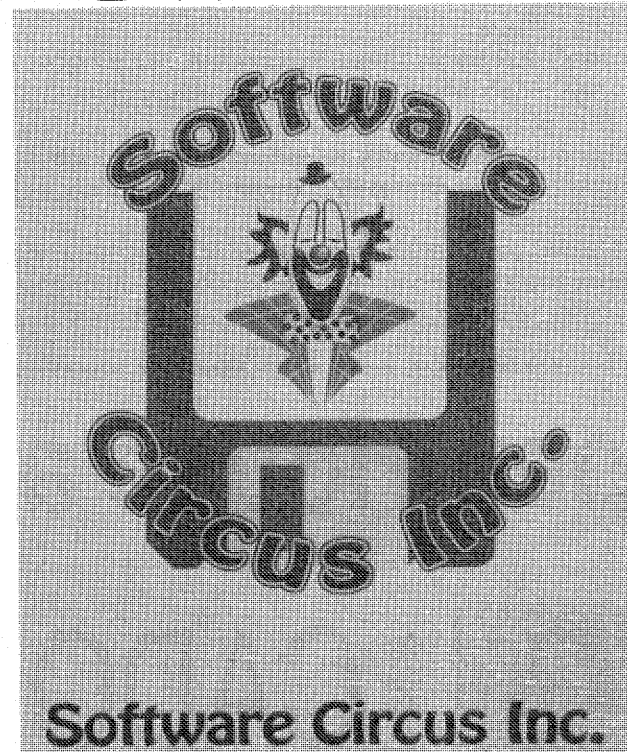
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So much for student apathy —

All of those people (myself included) who have, at one time or another, accused NAIT students of "student apathy" are eating a big slice of humble pie this week after a record **nineteen** students threw caution into the wind, risking electoral humiliation, and became candidates for the NAIT Board of Governors and the NAITSA executive.

The number of candidates alone is enough to look forward to the campaign and the accompanying efforts to stand out from the crowd.

Yet, this year, the use of paper has been banned for the duration of the campaign, forcing candidates to do more than have slick posters or a nice smile if they want to grab the student body's collective attention.

All this has lead me to hope beyond hope that this year will be different. This year, the candidates will actually define and debate what they see as the issues most important to students and NAITSA. This year will be different!

Well no, not quite.

It seems that NAITSA's "no paper campaign" is exactly that; no *paper*

allowed. Candidates can, if they choose to (and they undoubtedly will), place as many non-paper posters as their budget will dictate. Part of the reasons for the no paper campaign was to foster more originality from the candidates campaign and to lessen the tremendous amount of paper used (wasted?) for campaign posters that tell the electorate nothing about the candidate except his or her name, what position he or she is running for, and maybe what he or she looks like.

However, by allowing non-paper posters, the spirit of the no paper policy is broken. How much more environmentally friendly is it to waste, say, thirty bed sheets than 150 pounds of paper and how imaginative is it to simply substitute some other writing surface for paper?

Of course, NAITSA must experiment with its campaign rules. The no paper campaign could be one of the best things to ever happen to NAITSA. Students may actually debate among themselves the important issues like the lack of education funding or no drinking in The Nest in the afternoon. Conversely, the campaign could, and still may, go over like a wet fart in church, having the candidate with the most friends winning simply because the others could not or would not make themselves known.

Experimentation with the rules is important. Heaven knows, it couldn't make the campaign any less enthralling. Yet, by only going half way and allowing non-paper posters, NAITSA won't really learn if a no poster campaign will work or not, and this experiment may become yet another meaningless "the-best-poster-wins" campaign.

When the age limit of juveniles was just recently lowered to sixteen from eighteen, I was a little concerned, thinking that it might be too harsh having such young people tried at an adult level. But, lately my opinion has changed.

Over the last couple of months, there has been an ever increasing amount of child crime.

A couple of weeks ago, two ten year olds took a toddler from a mall, murdered him and proceeded to go home as if nothing out of the ordinary had just taken place.

Also in the news, a fourteen year old opened fire at his home in Halton city because he was mad at his parents' discipline tactics; rather a drastic rebellion over being grounded.

This week, a child of eleven boasted of over 100 car thefts and several other break and enters. But, because the Young Offenders Act allows only charges to be laid against youths aged 12 years or older, he

can't be legally punished. Is there something wrong with this picture?

All this adds up to one statement. Children are becoming more involved in crime and feeling little or no remorse for the deeds they do.

Society lowered the age for youths to be tried in adult court, hoping that this would deter youth crime with more severe punishments. Really, if juveniles are committing crimes as bad as adults then aren't we bound to give as serious punishments.

But what about those ten and eleven year old children that have murdered and are protected from the law. Obviously there is some mental instability if they can murder and feel as if they did nothing wrong. Shouldn't they be punished also? Perhaps there is psychological treatment for such young people, but if they are that far gone at ten, how will they act at thirty?

Should we protect child criminals and pay for rehabilitation with our tax dollars? Actually, no I don't think so. Adult rehabilitation isn't working so well; look at all the crimes committed by inmates on parole. Sure, they've had longer to develop a criminal attitude, but children, with a criminal mind set, at 10 must have the attitude already to commit murder.

I'm not suggesting the electric chair for children. I'm just saying that society doesn't condone murder by anyone, so why should we protect children?

If they can handle the crime they should be able to handle the punishment.

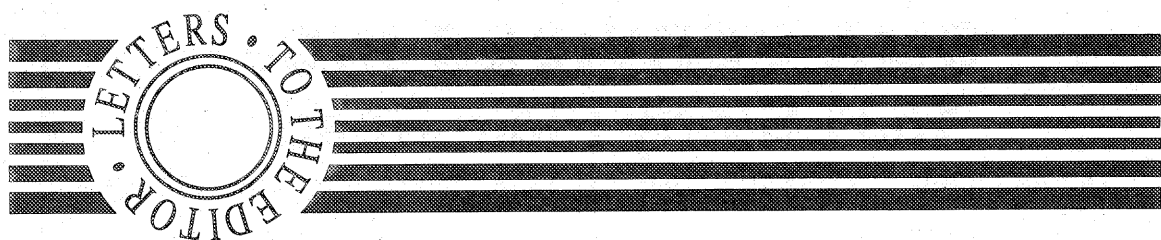
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Just a thought

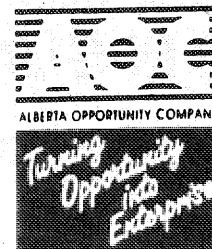

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NAIT curlers win silver-bronze

A gutsy performance by the NAIT ladies and mixed curling team enabled them to capture the silver and bronze medals respectively in the 1993 ACAC Curling Championship.

The ladies team, skipped by Jean Ellert, took the powerful GMCC team to last rock before losing 8-6.

The mixed lost their semi final game to GPRC but rebounded to beat LLC 7-3.

A total of 133 games were played this year in ACAC play. The two regionals hosted by NAIT and AUC to determine Provincial qualifiers after 103 games played. Another 30 were played in the Provincials hosted by SAIT. When the pebble was gone, the 1992-93 curling champions were: Men - AUC, Mixed - SAIT, and Ladies - GMCC.

Jean and her team of Jayne Heck, Jawa Kolot and Donna Thompson finished third in regional play with a 5-5 record. They went 1-2 in Provincial round robin and forced second place AUC in the semis. Trailing 7-1 after five ends they made a sensational comeback, culminating their drive by stealing one in the 10th for a 9-8 victory. On the final they trailed GMCC 4-0 and 7-4 but mounted charges to only trailing 7-6 after eight. After giving GMCC one they were run out of rocks losing 8-6.

The mixed team of Paul Briske, Michelle Mix, Todd Olson, and

Laureen Rau struggled and battled all year and were rewarded for their efforts with a bronze medal. They finished with a 5-8 record in the regionals and required a play off game against AUC just to nail down fourth spot. In the Provincial round robin they finished first with a 2-1 record. In the semis they lost 9-2 to GPRC but rebounded to beat LLC 7-3 for the bronze.

For the men's team who finished first in the regionals with a effect 12-0 record and looked unbeatable, the Provincials turned out to be another story. For skip Chris Hossall, last year's Provincial Junior Men's champion and teammates Thomas Stroa, Dana Sorensen and Kevin Marks, the Provincials turned out to be a pure struggle. They finished fourth in round robin play with a 1-2 record. Confident that they could recapture their early season form in the playoffs, evaporated quickly as AUC beat them 8-1 in the semis and GPRC edged them 6-5 for the bronze.

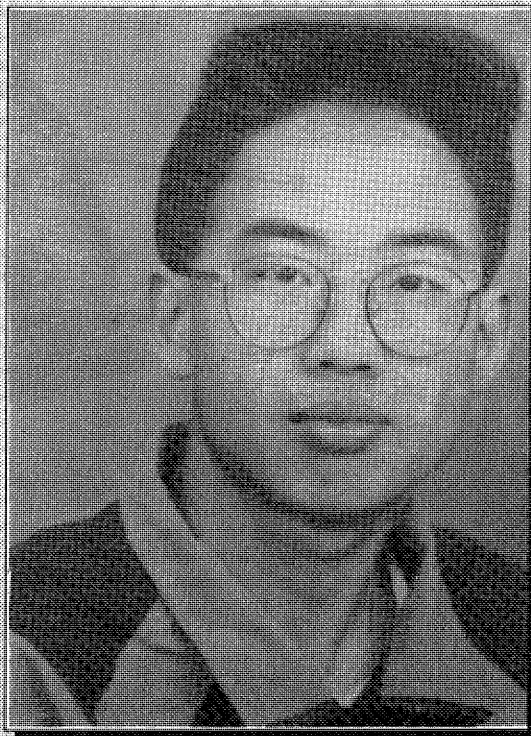

"It's always a learning experience (losing), no matter which sport it is" he said. "But it's still tough on a guy mentally."

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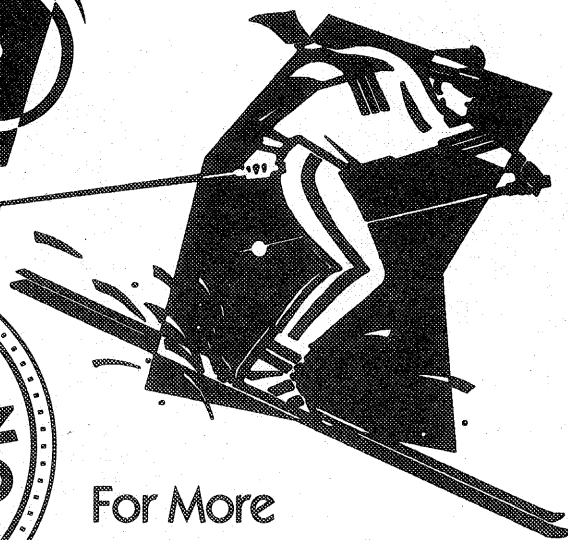
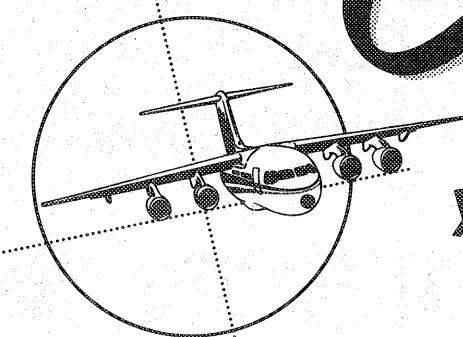
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Simply the best Ooks clinch team title

"It's the fostering of a team spirit that works for us" noted Bosworth. "It's not just one player that can win it for us, it's everybody. We're only as good as our weakest link."

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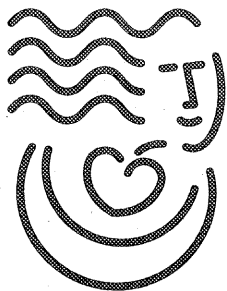
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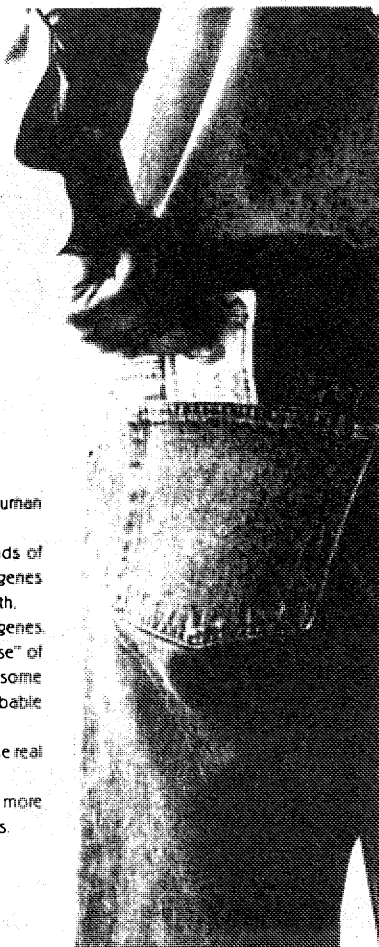
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Perverse tongues: appendages up and down

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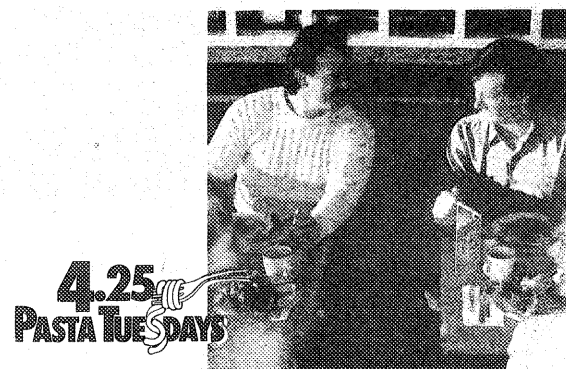

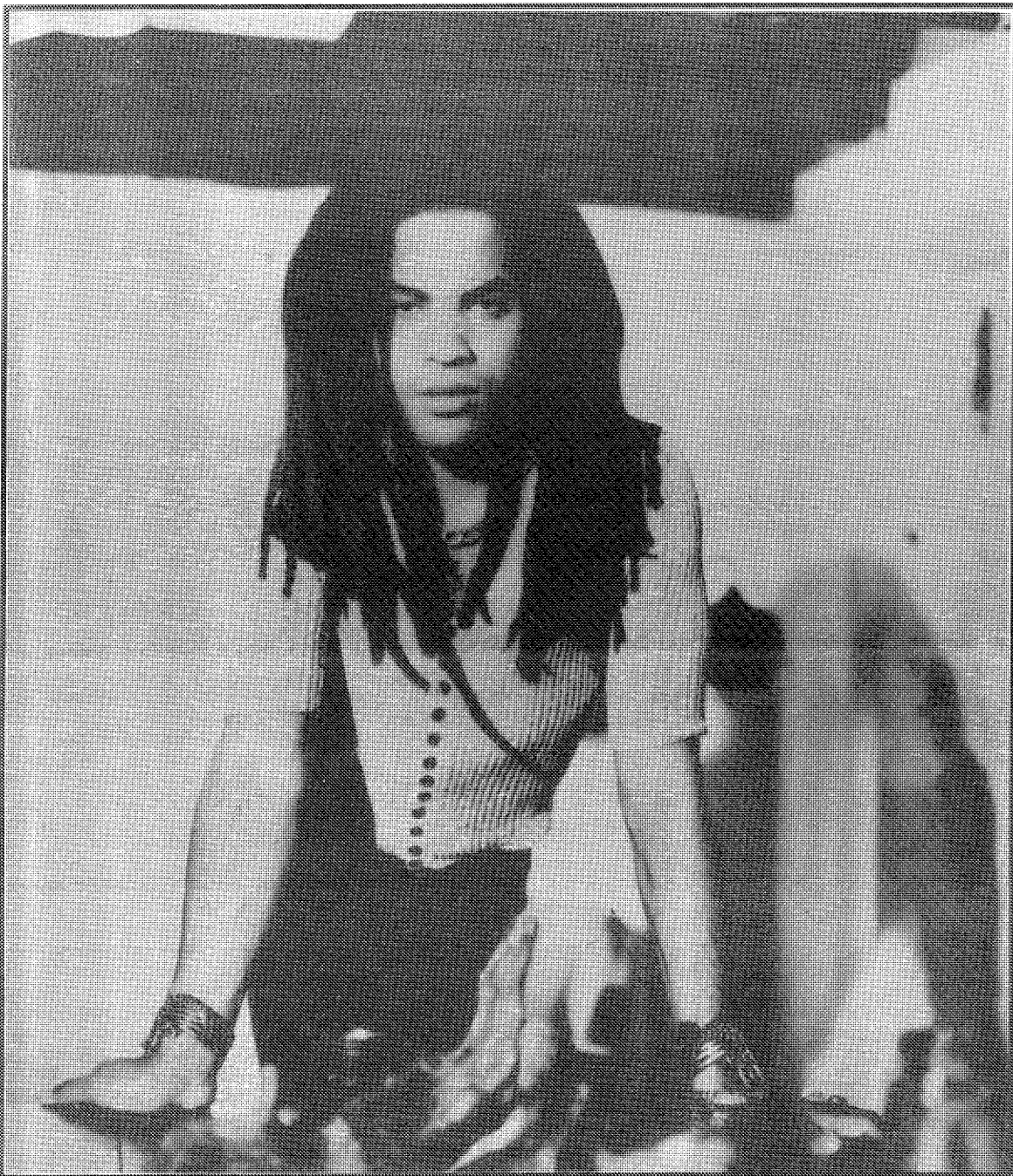

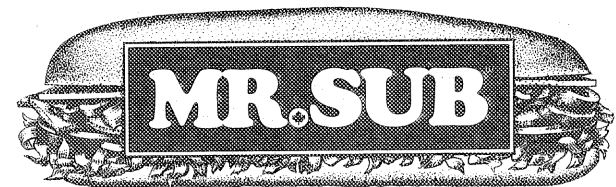

But, if you're ever in close contact with aliens, keep a hand clumped

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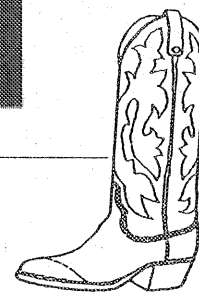
