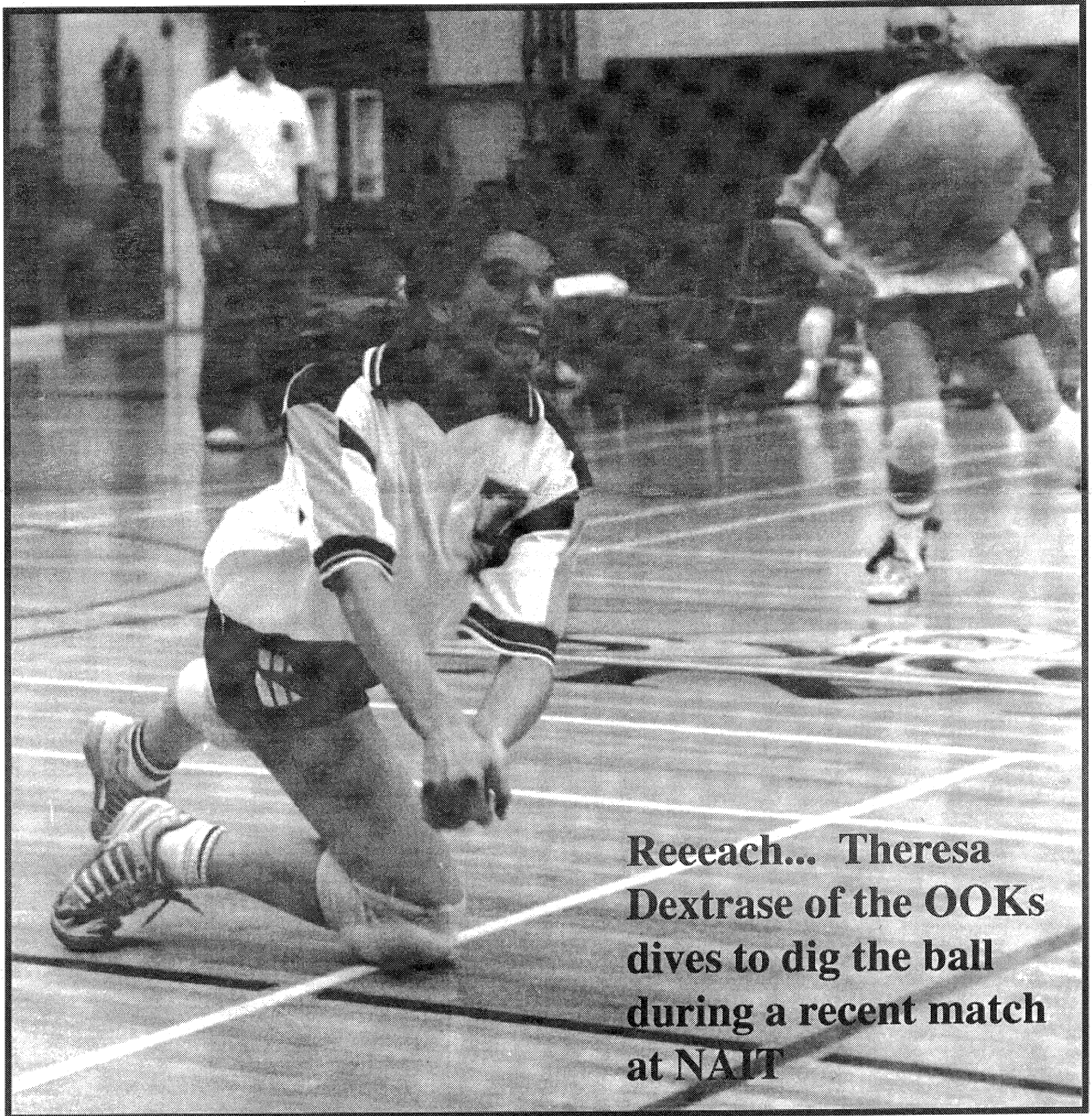

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Smoking Area Butted Out?

Are you a smoker? Do you enjoy your nicotine fix after you've eaten your dinner at the main cafeteria. If so, you are not alone, however you are also not welcome by some non-smoking students. A petition was sent in to the President's office a couple of weeks ago, asking for the main cafeteria to become a non-smoking area.

Currently smoking on campus is allowed in ventilated areas only. These areas are slowly being outlawed by non-smokers' petitioning NAIT administration. On July 1, 1993, two large areas, the Business Center Lounge and the North Cafetorium, were made smoke free.

The current policy at NAIT, in regards to smoking areas, will not be changed in this academic year. However, the policy is reviewed annually and may be changed at that time.

If this policy is changed how will it affect you? If you don't smoke you'll be able to eat in a smokeless environment. If you do smoke this will be another place that you will not be allowed to smoke in. With winter approaching quickly many students (and staff) will have to go outside to "light up." Or else the steadfast smoker can also try and find some area that is designated for smoking. These smoking areas are disappearing rapidly forcing many smokers to either reconsider their habit, or dare the hostile environment for a quick butt.

Congratulations To NAIT's Canada Scholars

Forty-nine NAIT students will be receiving a Canada Scholarship valued at \$2,500.

The aim of the Canada Scholarship in Technology is to reward academic excellence and to encourage more of Canada's most promising students to pursue technology studies and careers as technicians and technologists.

Available to Canadian Citizens or Permanent Residents who are planning to enter full-time studies in the first year of an eligible discipline such as: Engineering, Applied Sciences, Natural Sciences and Primary Industries. Students must be enrolled in 100% course load of which 60% must be eligible program. Mature students whose high school graduation average is more than 5 years old may be nominated after completion of the first semester providing the academic performance is judged to be of an outstanding nature. Twenty (20) first year NAIT students were selected.

The scholarships are to allocated equally between men and women.

First year students are selected on the basis of their combined average in the following Grade 12 subjects: English 30, Math 30, and priority is given to students who have completed two Level 30 Sciences - Science 30 is an acceptable Science. Students who have completed only one Level 30 Science are invited to apply. The minimum average requirement is an Honors standing. The number of scholarships

available is 53 therefore, not every applicant who meets the minimum requirement will be selected. The scholarship is renewable in the second year provided candidates maintained a 100% course load and obtained a first class standing or its equivalent, have no failures in any courses, and make-up exams are not considered. Twenty-nine (29) NAIT students renewed their scholarship this academic year.

The Canadian Red Cross Society, founded in 1896, is funded and supported by the voluntary services and the financial support of the Canadian people.

The society organized a blood drive on November 4th and 5th here at NAIT and received overwhelming donations. Giving

one unit of blood only took approximately 20 minutes and it takes about eight weeks to replace the red blood cells removed when making a donation.

Once a donation is made, tests are completed on your blood for signs of Hepatitis, Syphilis, AIDS virus, and other infectious diseases. If tests show your blood may pass any disease, it

will not be used.

The Canadian Red Cross Society campaigns continuously throughout Edmonton year round. Donations can be made on a periodic basis.

Hats off to all those individuals who not only donated their time, but also a life giving gift to The Canadian Red Cross Society.

'Average Starting Salaries', as well as information on covering letters, resumes, and employment standards.

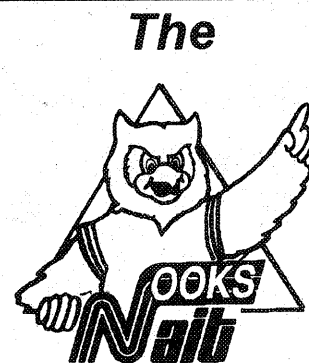

Academic Council

The NAIT Academic Council was to establish to look after the academic concerns of students and instructors. To give you an idea of what the Academic Council has done in the past, here are some of the many topics that were discussed: Student Feedback on Instruction; Student Rights and Responsibilities; Student Appeal Procedures; Student Conduct; Academic Regulations; Tuition Fees; and Scholarships, Bursaries, and Awards.

As you can see, there have been many topics discussed. Some of the topics that will be discussed this year include Academic Dishonesty, Student Feedback on Instruction, and English Competency. There will be other items up for discussion as the year progresses.

To help you out, an academic matter could deal with any of the following:

- standards and policies respecting the selection and admission of students
- courses and programs of instruction or training provided or to be improved by the Board
- academic awards.

This is just a guideline, there may be some other area that you feel is important, so just let someone on Academic Council (see below) know what you concern is, and we will see what we can do to help you.

Getting back to my first article (September 10, 1993) in which I mentioned Academic Dishonesty (Cheating and Plagiarism). The current disciplinary actions, according to the Academic Regulations of NAIT, for any student caught cheating, plagiarising, using fraud or deceit are as follows:

Post-secondary students have done postcard writing, letter writing, speaking at forums, letters to the editor and other peaceful protests. The results seem to be minimal.

Yet groups of younger students skip classes and get rowdy at the legislature and get press and government feedback.

What kind of message does this send? It says that this is the kind of action the government responds to.

It makes me regret all the postcards I've sent and forums I've attended. It makes me want to pick up a placard and start yelling slogans.

- 1) Mark penalties in course
- 2) Reprimand
- 3) Suspension
- 4) Withholding of grades and certification
- 5) TERMINATION/ EX-PULSION

There may be a new policy in place by the time mid-terms and finals are written this semester. The new policy might be more in line to what other Alberta Colleges and Universities have. According to some Academic Council members, NAIT's current policy might be a little more lax than other educational institutions. What do you think??

The Student Representatives on Academic Council are: Dean Andres (NAITSA Academic V.P.), Denis Babin (Finance), Edmund Duggan (Computer Engineering), Tim Forest (Graphic Communications, Westerra Campus), Chantal Saramaga (Civil Engineering, Plaza II), Troy Shostak (Marketing), and Brent Valentine (Computer Engineering). As Tim Forrest states, "One of the great things about the Academic Council this year is that we have student representation from a broad range of technologies. This hasn't always been the case in the past, and I think that we'll have a wider scope of opinion and perspective from which to draw ideas and solutions. This can only benefit the student body in making sure everyone is heard and represented on Academic Council."

President's Corner With Susan Tedder

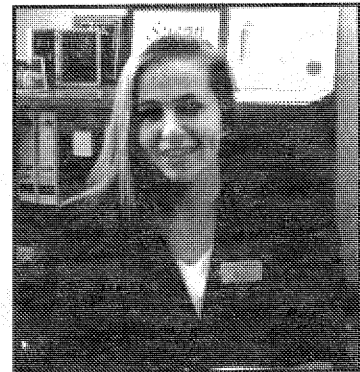
For at least the next couple of weeks Advanced Education and the Alberta Student Loan Repayments are going to be top priority for student associations across the province. Last Friday, the Minister for Advanced Education and Career Development - Jack W. Ady presented an interim report on the *Review of Ways and Means to Reduce Alberta Student Loan Defaults*. The Students Finance Board retained the firm of Deloitte and Touche to conduct this review and develop recommendations.

There are many areas in the report which cause me to be skeptical of the government. The Honourable Minister has stated that the report only gives recommendations and that nothing is set in stone, yet when

he strongly states that the banks need to be part of the system and should be involved in the risk, it doesn't take much to see that privatization is not far away for the Student Fiance Loans.

I feel the report has some good points and some drawbacks. I do believe that: the banks should have more responsibility in the risk sharing process, greater flexibility is needed, and the idea of implementing a prime-based lending and offering student borrowers the option of fixed or variable interest rate financing where the borrower can chose the repayment term and applicable interest rate.

Contrary to what all Student Associations have said the report doesn't support the income contingent repayment program, which we believe to be



the best system for students to repay their loan. It also suggests that consideration should be given to having educational institutions withhold a student's diploma/certificate/degree until evidence of loan consolidation is presented. My question is: how is a student suppose to get a job without their certification, in order to know how they will pay back their loan? If anyone has a solution, please let me know.

At the end of next week I will be in Calgary to sit in on the Advanced Education and Career Development's Budget Roundtable. A lot of options will be discussed as to the possible 20% reduction in funding over the next three years, if anyone has any points that they would like brought up please drop by so that we can discuss it.

Ahoy Students Abroad

SWAP. What is it? It is the "Students Work Abroad Programme". What does it have to do with you? Well, if you are interested in going overseas to travel and learn about different cultures then this program is for you.

The SWAP program started in 1976 as a part of the Canadian Federation of Students. It's purpose is not to place students in jobs of their choice. Instead it wants the students to learn and travel the globe, with jobs becoming of secondary importance. In fact, the students are left to find their own jobs and housing after a two-day rest and orientation.

For the 1994 program, SWAP offers 11 different countries as possible destinations. These include: Britain, France, Germany, Ireland, Finland, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, and The U.S.A. The two new programs are currently being finalized for the summer of 1994. The new programs are the Netherlands and Jamaica. Approximately 2000 students across Canada will take part in the program. The registration fees vary from country to country as do the lengths of stay.

The choices for any destination are quite varied in the SWAP Britain program. Students may work anywhere in London, Wales, Scotland, or Northern Ireland. Also, you may stay in Britain anywhere from 3 months to 2 years. If your stay is less than 4 months you qualify for tax exemption.

The SWAP Ireland program

allows students to work tax-free for any four month period year-round. It is recommended if you are considering this program that you do research beforehand. This research would help you to find potential job locations and housing before you entered the program. Students should try to line-up any job interviews due to Ireland's poor economy.

If these are not to your liking, perhaps you would consider working in Paris? Past participants have had various different jobs from waiting tables to operating hot-air balloon tours of the wine region. Registrants should be aware that French is the primary language. If you are not functional in French this course is not for you. These programs are not to help students to learn new languages, but to gain experience in a world market.

Most students in the SWAP France program are allowed to stay up to 3 months, however a new program is in the works to extend that deadline. An Internship Program with France is being established for 1994. This new program will allow students who can pre-arrange a job in France, that relates to their field, to work from 6 months up to 1 year.

In Finland, or "The Land of the Midnight Sun", SWAP actually places 10 applicants in jobs that are related to their fields. Another 30 students can be placed to live with Finnish families as English tutors. Due to the extreme difficulties of finding jobs for each applicant the deadline for application is set for January 15, 1994.

Another country where students can find jobs as English tutors is Japan. Applicants must be between the ages of 18-30 and currently residing in Canada. You don't have to be a student and you get better positioning if you have English as your first language. This is a year long problem and candidates should apply at least 8 weeks in advance of their departure date. Also, students are required by the Japanese government to show proof of a minimum of \$2000 in savings. This dollar value is considered a base minimum, because life in Japan can get very expensive.

A few thousand miles to the south lies 2 of the more popular locations: Australia and New Zealand. On top of the gorgeous scenery and the fabulous summers there is another incentive. After 1 year of traveling the outback, on your return flight you have options for stop-overs in many beautiful countries.

From the Pacific Rim back to Europe and Germany in particular. Germany offers many different job choices, however the German government requires a language test before letting students into their country. If you wish to improve your language skills, the Council on International Educational Exchange (CIEE) is working for you. The CIEE is setting up a program of German language instruction including either accommodation with a German family, or in a University residence. Details on this language program will be available at all Travel CUTS/Voyages Campus offices early in the new year.

The SWAP organization has several conditions that must be filled before the student will be accepted.

1. You must be a Canadian citizen, or a citizen of the country of choice with a valid passport.
2. Must purchase round-trip transportation through Travel CUTS/Voyages Campus.
3. Possess a valid 1993/1994 International Student Identity Card, if eligible.
4. Pay a registration fee which varies by destination. It is not refundable if the student cancels; but it is refunded if the student is

not accepted to SWAP.

5. Provide proof of minimum amount of personal funds that varies by country.

There are 2 Travel CUTS/Voyages Campus locations in Edmonton. You can contact a representative at either place if you want more information, or are considering applying. The phone numbers are 492-2592 and 488-8487.

On Saturday evening, the ladies defeated Grant MacEwan 81-72 at a very well attended game played at NAIT.

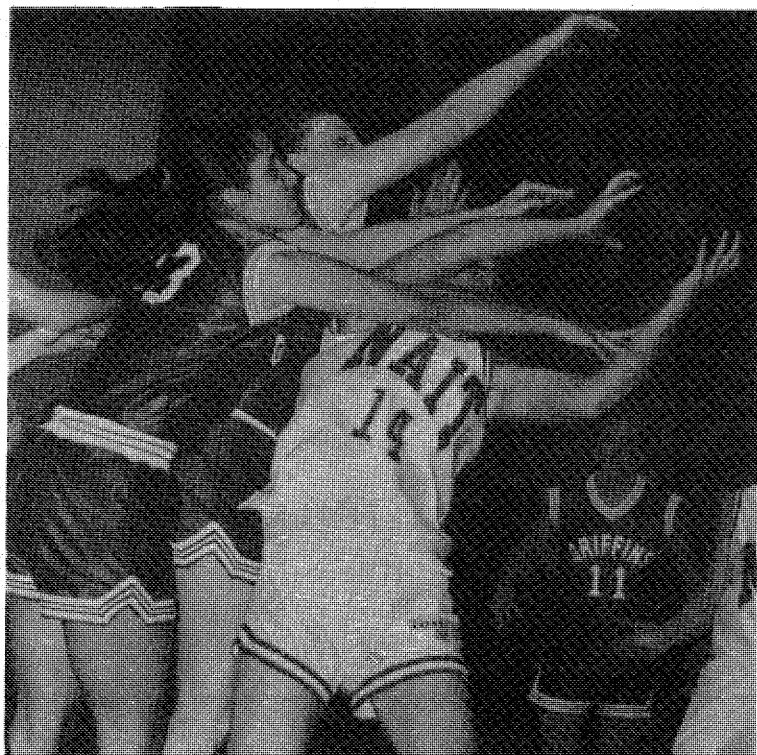
The team's offensive attack was

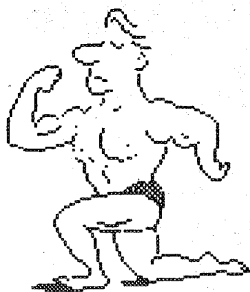
For GMCC, Jen Jenson led the way with 21 points, made mostly

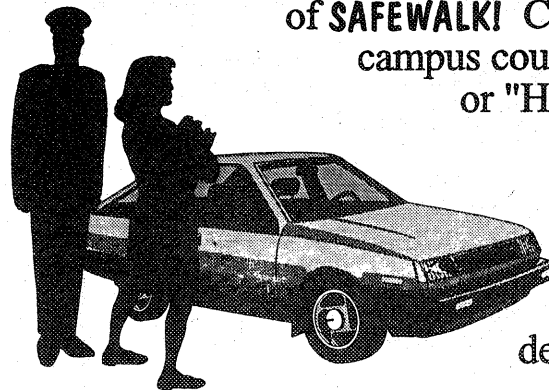

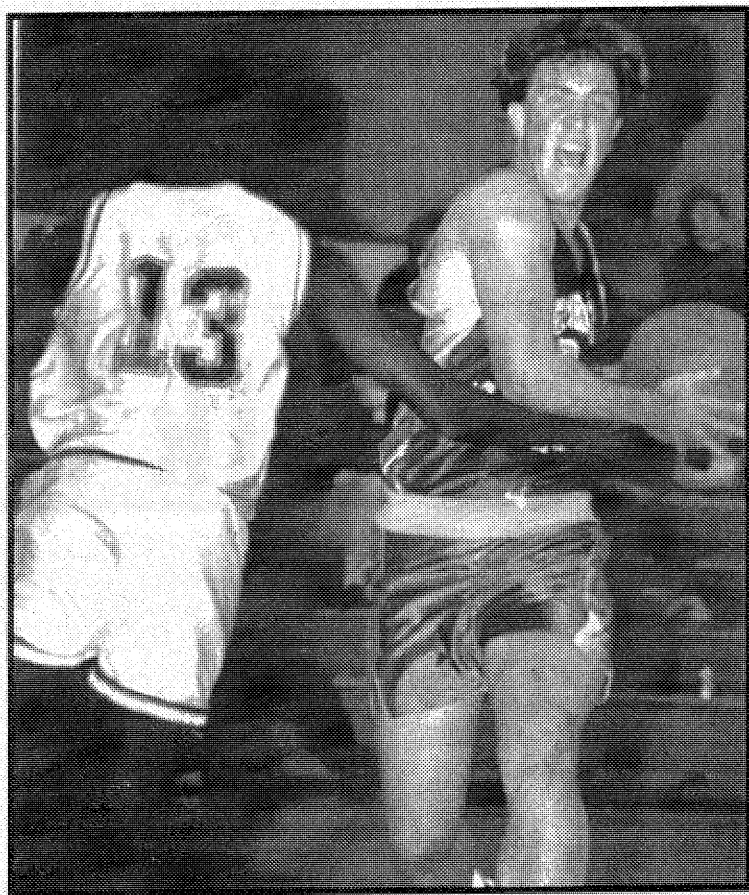
OOKs Men's Basketball Team Loses

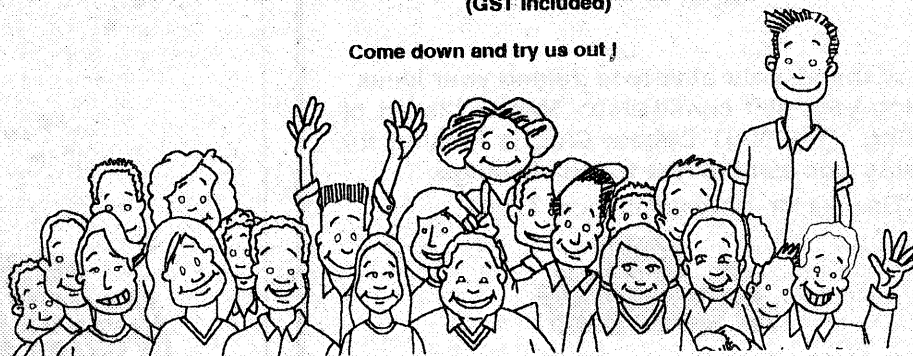

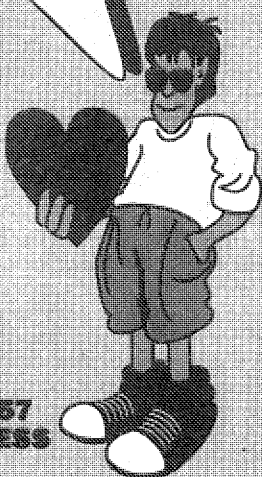

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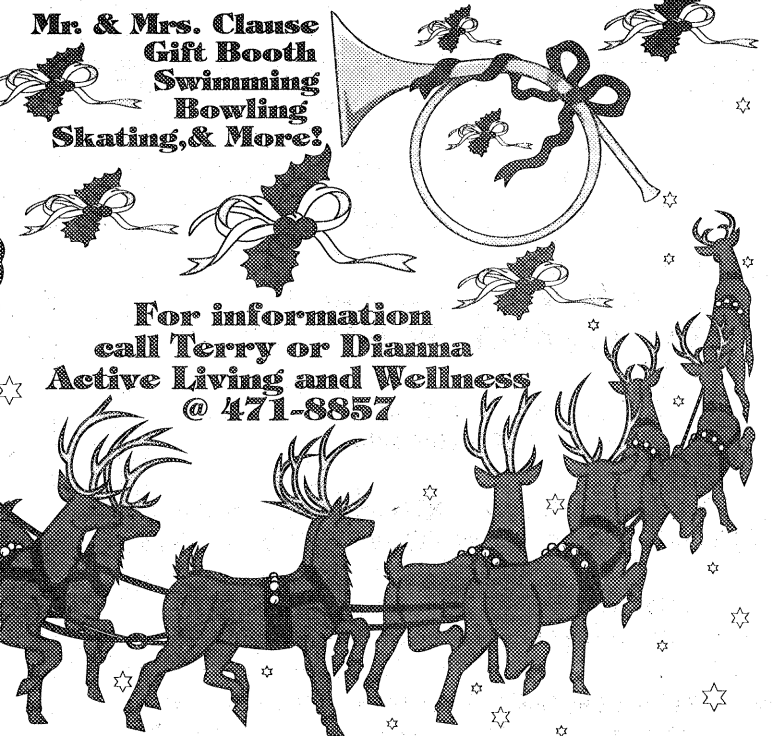
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NHL Predictions - Part I

Alberta and BC Colleges Duel in Cross-Country Running

Alberta finished second to B.C. in the 5th Annual Inter-Provincial Cross-Country Running meet held in Kelowna this weekend. Both the men and the women went down to defeat against a powerful B.C. crew.

The Alberta team was made up of the top runners from the ACAC Championship race held in Calgary (MRC) on October 23rd. NAIT placed two runners on the team, Allen Scharff and Mark Mulzet.

In the women's race, B.C. out-pointed Alberta by only 4 points (26-30). The top five runners counted for the position points. The race was won by Sandall Morrison of Selkirk College,

B.C. in 19:46 over the 5000 m course. Alberta's best runner, Adrienne Gradauer of SAIT, finished 2nd in 20:54.

In the men's 7800 m race, the strong B.C. team had half as many position points as Alberta. B.C. won handily 19-38 position points. The race was won by Mike Passmore for the second year in a row in 27:09. Mike is from Okanagan University College. Alberta's best runner was David Corbett of GMCC, finishing 2nd in 27:40.

NAIT's two men, Allen Scharff and Mark Muzlet, finished in 22nd and 27th in 30:58 and 32:02. The NAIT coach, John Reeves, also ran, finishing 37th

in 33:40.

This ends the Cross-Country Running season for 1993. This race was the highlight of the season and the one we like to do well in and key on, but we fell a little short this year, oh well, there's always another year - or is there another year!! If we have to cut back and student participation on this team doesn't improve, this may be the sport that was.

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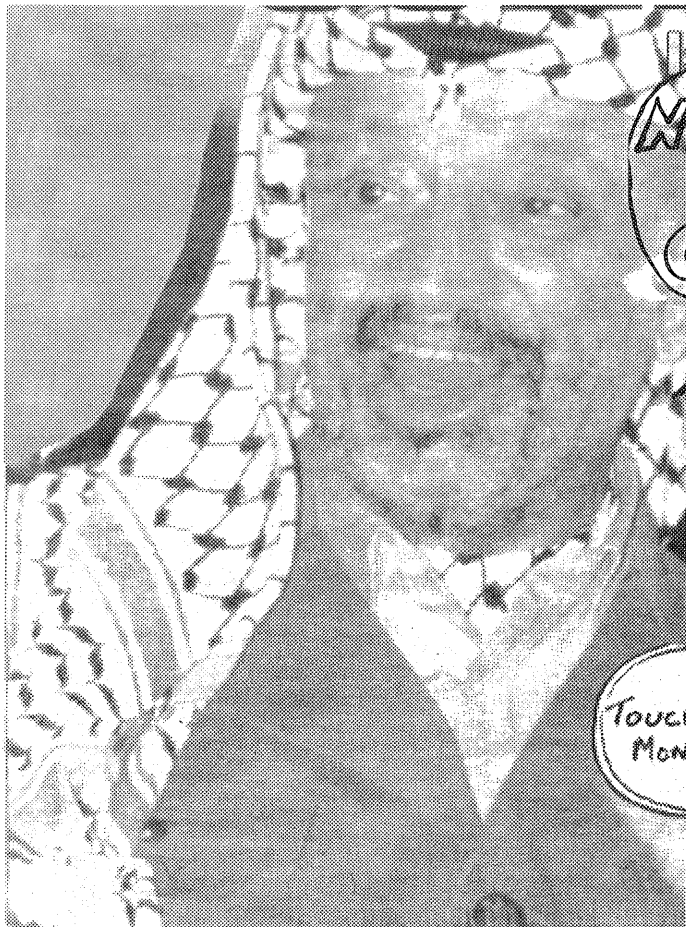

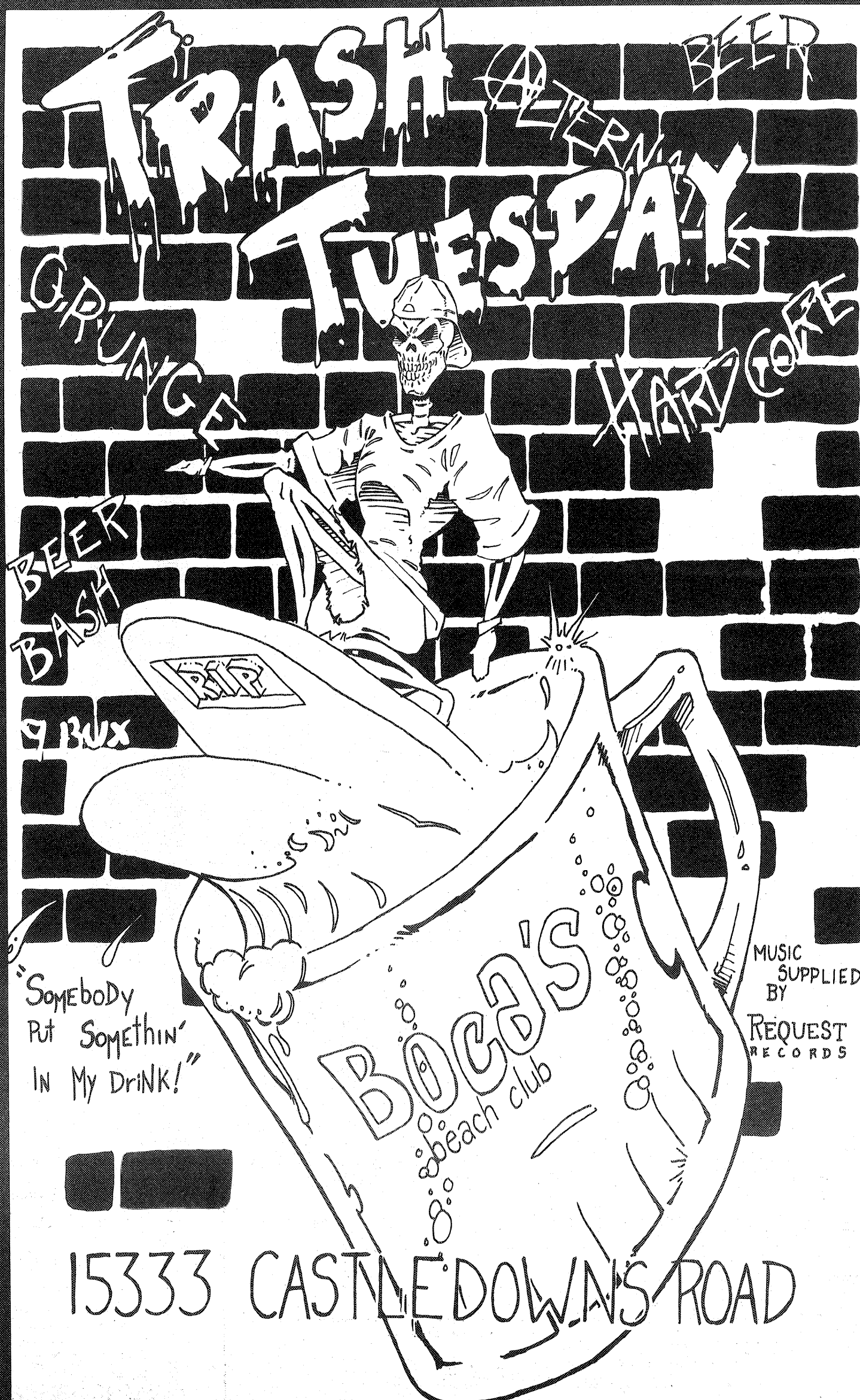

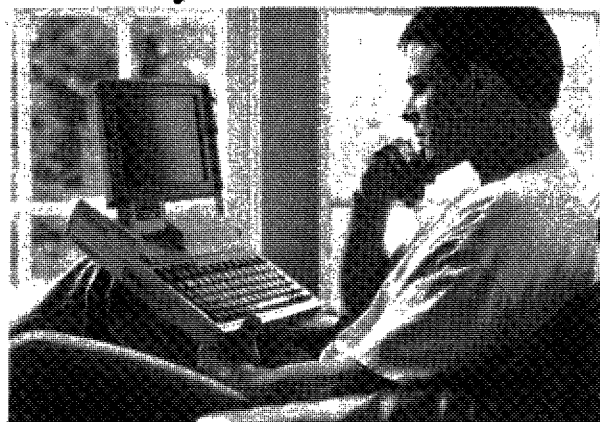
