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Leo LeClerc Scholarship

On October 28, NAIT held a fundraising dinner in honor of Leo LeClerc. The \$100/plate dinner was to help raise money for the Leo LeClerc scholarship fund. More than 300 people attended the dinner to pay respect to one of Edmonton's most outstanding contributors.

Leo LeClerc has been involved with business, government, sports, media, and community service for more than 4 decades. His involvement has helped thousands of people in many positive and significant ways.

The Leo LeClerc Scholarship Endowment Fund is expected to grow to at least \$250,000. The fund will be managed by the

NAIT foundation, on which Leo LeClerc has sat on for the past 7 years. The interest generated by this fund will be directed towards scholarships and bursaries for full-time students enrolled in NAIT's diploma and certificate programs. The interest from the fund will provide approximately 35 scholarships worth \$500 each.

A couple of years ago, the government cut the matching policy for scholarships. This meant that a great number of students would not be able to receive monetary assistance. The Leo LeClerc Fund was created to help those students whom the government cuts affected.

At the fund-raiser dinner, which was attended by such noteworthy Edmontonians as Glen Sather, a

check was presented to Leo LeClerc. The check was given by the Board of Governors' Chairperson J. R. Shaw, and Foundation Chairperson Grant Fairley, for \$150,000. The fund is expected to exceed \$250,000 by the end of this academic year.

The Engineering Technology Scholarship Foundation of Alberta offered the "Clayton Milroy Memorial Scholarship" to NAIT engineering students to no avail.

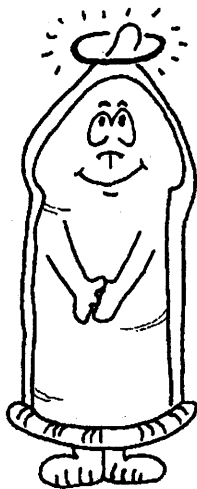
Not one student applied. "ETSFA" offers this scholarship to institutes on a rotating basis. This year NAIT was the chosen institute.

Parking options are as follows:

Day permits are available to full-time students for designated NAIT parking zones. Parking is available for \$19/month + GST for stalls with no 2\$/day/entry.

Academic Council

The purpose of this column is to inform you about the various Academic Regulations that apply at NAIT. Over the year, I hope to give you a deeper insight as to what courses of action are available to you (in regard to programs of instruction), expected student behaviour, results of breaking any academic regulations, and how the regulations are established.

If you have a problem with a specific course, or instructor, what is your course of action? First of all, you must talk to the specific instructor to clear up any possible misunderstanding. If that does not clear up your concern, the next step is to see the Assistant Program Head, or the Program Head. You can also seek

advice from a Student Counsellor. The Counselling Centre is located in O117.

In regard to Student Feedback on Instruction, this can occur in one of two ways. The Program Head can initiate the feedback, or the instructor can initiate the feedback.

The Program Heads initiate feedback when they perceive that there may be a problem with the quality of instruction, or a formal (signed) complaint is submitted by a student/students. The Program Head has some discretion, with formal complaints, to avoid collecting feedback on any frivolous complaints.

Instructor-initiated feedbacks should be gathered at least once a semester per course by the instructor. The instructor may select which class to get feedback

from.

The Student Feedback on Instruction is designed to give the Instructors, their Program Heads and NAIT an idea of the quality of instruction the students are receiving. If improvements are needed, then a course of action will be taken to make the necessary adjustments.

If you should have any questions in regard to Academic matters, please contact any of the following Academic Council Student Representatives: Dean Andres (Academic V.P. NAITSA), Denis Babin (Finance); Edmund Duggan (Computer Engineering), Tim Forrest (Graphic Communications, Westerra), Chantal Saramaga (Civil Engineering, Plaza 2), Troy Shostak (Marketing), and Brent Valentine (Computer Engineering).

The Rape Issue...

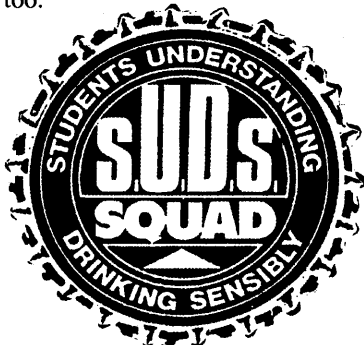
Dear Editor,

Last week you read about the Deloitte and Touche report on the Student Loan Repayment program. Well, this week Advanced Education has stated that we (the students) and tax payers are looking at a 20%+ cutback to the whole system!!


The only real positive remark I've heard this week in regards to the issue is that the students have a say in where these cuts will be coming from. November 18 - 20, Dr. Souch, myself, and various other administrators and student presidents from across the province will be meeting in Calgary with the Minister to discuss in a roundtable format the possible cuts. The workbook that we were all given before going outlines a number of points:

- Defining the Scope
 - Range of publicly funded programs and services
 - Students' contributions to adult learning
- Restructuring
 - Post-secondary system
 - Student financial assistance
- Getting the Most out of the Money Spent
 - Options for institutions to consider
 - = salaries and benefits
 - = teaching work loads
 - = use of technology and distance education
 - = support and administrative services in institutions and the department
 - Accountability requirements

The year-by-year deficit reduction targets are set to be: \$700 million in 1994-95, \$1 BILLION in 1995-96, and \$800 million in 1996-97!!! We can not sit back and watch as our education and the future of advanced education slips away on us. The government needs to hear OUR voice.

Do we rally and protest like the high school students did or do we continue to remain optimistic in the hopes that the provincial government will see the light and cut advanced education no more than any other sector at 15%??

Answer: Look here next week!

General Council Notes

Electronic Engineering Rep. David Bassie caused quite an uproar at the past student council meeting after the council voted on the election committee. The committee is set up for the upcoming bi-election, in case any problems arise. The students voted in were Alison Cathcart, David Bassie, and Denis Babin. Also, three students were asked to volunteer to be on the counting committee to tally votes. Edmund Duggan, Jo-anne Mankaw, and Michele Thorpe quickly volunteered.

The Electronics request had many tempers flaring from other members of the student council. The request was:

- 2, 14.4 modems \$460
- 2, Basic year 1 Tool set \$120

- Large cutter & needle nose pliers \$15
- Drill Bit Set \$25
- Nut driver Set \$15
- Complete Ratchet Set \$35
- Stubby length screwdriver in standard size \$20
- Basic Solder station with controllable heat iron \$90
- Solder/desolder set \$400 (approx.)
- Jigsaw mental cutting blades \$125
- Basic high power solder iron \$19
- 3/8" hand drill \$50
- Fridge \$480
- Coffee maker \$90

The tools are necessary for the workshop labs, while the modems are to go to the Datacom labs. These tools are needed for the engineering students who have to work in these labs. The fridge and coffee maker were for the Electronics Society Office.

The addition of the fridge and coffee maker was what caused the uproar amongst the other tech. reps. Several technologies lined up to tell David Basie what they thought of his request for a fridge and coffee maker. In the end there was no motion put forward. The only allowable motion is one that is put in the "positive." Since no one could put forward a "positive" motion, the request was dropped.

Kevin Minaker, Communications VP, put forward another motion for The Nugget. The newspaper needs a second production computer to help meet the printers' deadline. Kevin asked for a: 14" color monitor, 8 Meg RAM, 160 Meg Hard drive, 68040 Processor with a M-0132 keyboard. The total cost of this set up is \$2236 and would be taken out of The Nugget advertising fund.

After that the 4 candidates for the Administrative VP position were each given up to 2 minutes to address the student council. They introduced themselves to the council, but were not allowed to begin campaigning.

A notice was given for December 7, which is going to be the general council appreciation night. It was also brought up that technologies that get their liquor licenses must get them through NAITSA. Also, if you are interested in holding any school functions or graduations, the Regency Hotel has expressed an interest in hearing from you.

From Athletics VP Neil Canton came some good news about the United Way drive. The fundraiser is at about 98% of its goal.

On Thursday 186 pints were donated, and on Friday 146 pints were also "volunteered" from students for the blood donor clinic. Neil also mentioned that all intramural reps. should check their boxes, and that the results from The Blood Donor challenge cup may be delayed for some technologies.

Lastly, if you require extra copies of any transcripts, you should contact Aileen Perreault in the NAITSA office. Also, all tech reps who have had any cabarets must hand in their financial statements. The statements can be found in the back of your tech rep handbook.

The next student council will take place on November 23 at 4:30 PM in H005.

Response To Reagan

Dear Editor,
In response to your editorial 'I Remember Reagan' in the November 12 issue of The Nugget, I feel the viewpoints you have expressed on free trade in North America are representative of the majority of people in Canada, but are perhaps a bit misinformed.

In your article you suggest that the province of Ontario has lost over 100,000 jobs because of free trade between Canada and the United States. I would like to point out that the government in Ontario and trade barriers between our own provinces are what has led to the loss of a majority of these jobs.

The NDP government in Ontario has increased taxes levied against small businesses and has also made it mandatory for employers to pay for their workers provincial health care coverage. For small businesses, this has meant an unacceptable increase in operating costs, and usually results in the lay off of one or two employees just so it can stay in business. As a small business owner in Ontario once

told me, he could move out of province and his operating costs would drop by 25%. An even more alarming statistic is that he could move his business into the United States and watch his operating costs drop by 40%. This has led me to the inevitable conclusion that it is not free trade that has led to job losses in this country, but rather that economic and taxation policies of our own governments has forced companies to move into what is now a much more accessible and agreeable market, which incidentally has ten times as many consumers as our own.

Our governments have even succeeded in decreasing the consumer base in our own country. For instance, Big Rock Breweries in Calgary, began selling its product in California, and has enjoyed a tremendous boost in sales ever since. As a matter of fact, thanks to inter-provincial trade barriers, Big Rock can sell its beer anywhere it wants to, except for any other province beside the one it resides in. So, the brewery may even be selling beer in places like Japan,

but can not sell any beer in BC, or Saskatchewan or anywhere else in Canada except Alberta in the name of job protection (?).

I think the reason why our politicians do not bother to tell us about these interesting points for the mere fact that every major political party before the October election has had a hand in creating these conditions over the last twenty years. As Mr. Wince pointed out, the province of Ontario voted Liberal in the October Federal election, but not because of the Tory policy of free trade, but rather that the provincial NDP government has been handed notice that it is not welcome. I think we can expect more of the same when the next Ontario provincial election is held.

I would like to say that I believe free trade itself is not flawed. I believe it was done for the best interest of Canada. Now that it has been implemented, businesses in Canada will have to become more competitive. It is time for our governments to realize that they must become more competitive in order to

attract businesses to stay in Canada. They have had the luxury of governing a closed market for too long, and now they may actually have to work in order to create conditions which will nurture the growth of businesses, not only in Canada, but will allow businesses to expand into other markets. This is what is best for business, and will ultimately be a benefit to every Canadian.

"Yes, new instructors are right out of the field. So they know what to teach us and what not to. They do provide up-to-date information."



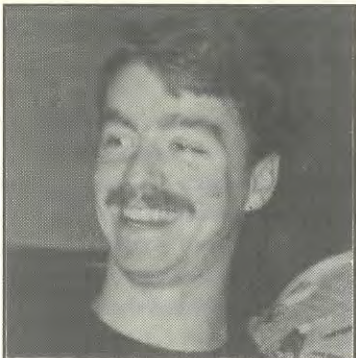

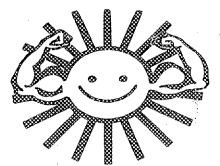
Nowhere in my job description does it say I have to be all smiley and positive about the OOKS, nor does it say what I should comment on. So basically, I can

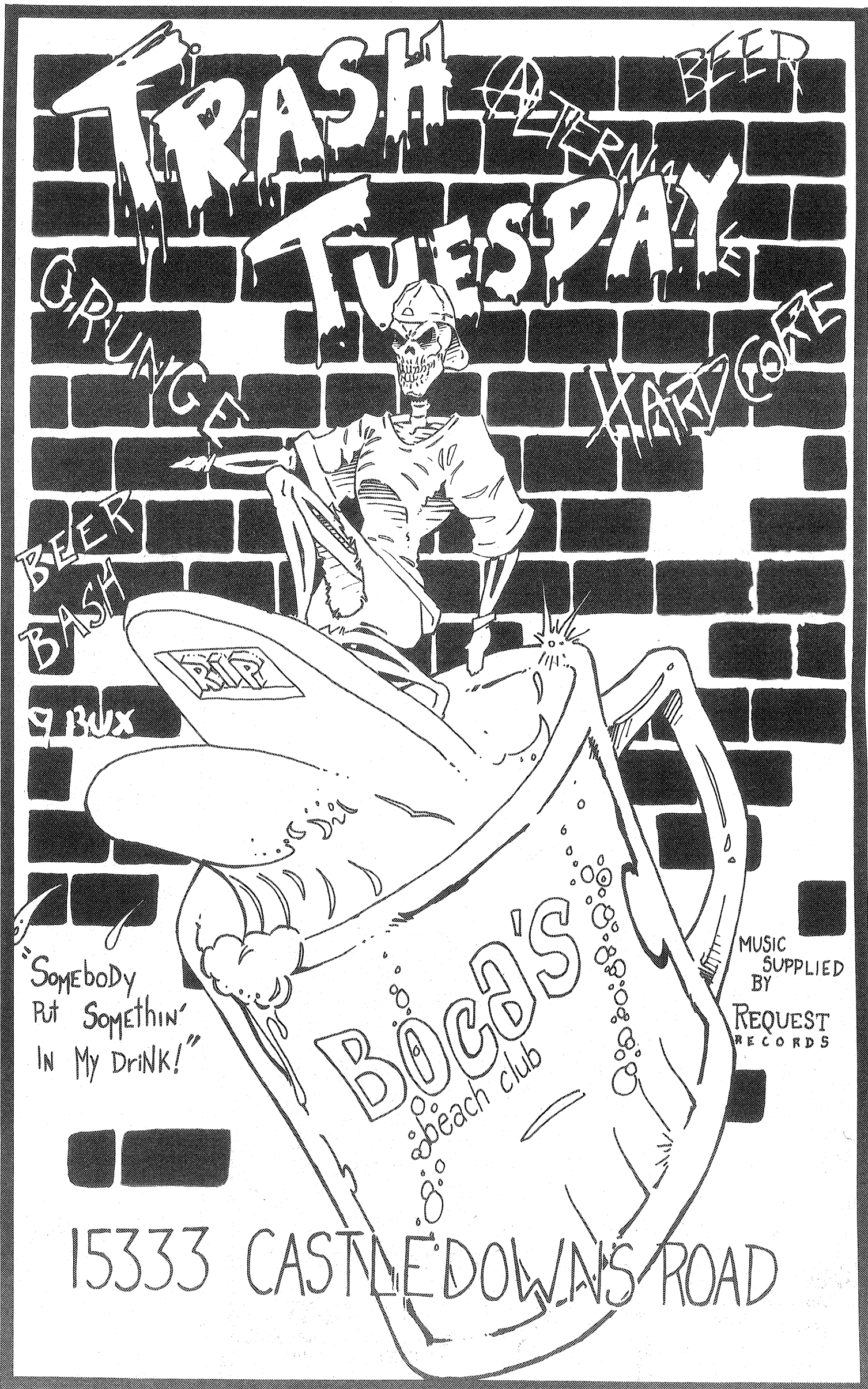
Floorcovering Instructor Wins World Title
