

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
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Not My Department







The NAIT soccer OOKS kicked off their season over the weekend by trouncing their opponents by a combined score of 15-0. On saturday, the OOKS dominated the game in the first half scoring four times, then coasted to a 5-0 victory. Coach Graham Wood was happy with the team's impressive first half, but the team's less than brilliant second half was cause for concern. Wood said that he was happy about the total team effort, but that in the second half the OOKS let up defensively and started to play as individuals rather than as a team.

A trip downtown to Concordia College, however, was just what the OOKS needed to get their game plan down as their cross-town opponents were badly overmatched. NAIT won easily, hammering Concordia 10-0. Coach Wood termed sunday's victory a "good all around job" and was very satisfied with the weekend sweep. Wood noted, however, that Concordia was in its first year of ACAC play, and wasn't really expected to be a powerhouse.

The true test of the OOKS' true ability will no doubt come against Grant McEwan Community College. With the opening of a new campus and more students to draw from, McEwan will be a team to

beat, according to the OOKS' head coach. Coach Wood believes that it's no accident that both of Edmonton's major ACAC schools are strong when it comes to soccer. The wealth of local talent in competitive leagues gives both Grant McEwan and NAIT the edge over the rest of the ACAC.

by Augustana who edged out the University of Lethbridge by one position point. Mount Royal finished third followed by Red Deer.



Golden Bears Avenge Three Straight Losses

EDMONTON - The University of Alberta Golden Bears avenged three straight losses to the NAIT Ooks in the annual NAIT Blue Gold Classic with a 6-4 victory over the Ooks at the NAIT Arena on Sunday.

In the first, the U of A jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the first with goals from Scott McDonald, Paul Foisy, and Kirk Humphreys.

In the second, the Ooks cut the Bears lead to 5-3. Jamie Barnes, Dan Flaherty, and Peter Kasowski rallied NAIT with singles while Murray Bokenfohr and Scott McDonald found the mark for the U of A.

In the third, the teams exchanged goals with Archie Handel scoring for the Bears and Stacey Rayan countering for the Ooks.

The Bears outshot the Ooks 36-35. The Bears had the momentum heading into Sunday's game after scoring wins over the Augustana University College Vikings and the Red Deer College Kings.

On Friday, the Bears outlasted the Vikings in a 13-3 win. The Bears

led 4-3 following 40 minutes before exploding for nine third period goals in the Vikings first preseason game of 1993-94. Paul Strand and Kent Dochuk each completed the hat trick for the Bears. Mark Souch, a former Ook, tallied twice.

On Saturday, the Bears scored four powerplay goals en route to an 8-4 triumph over the Kings. Todd Goodwin sparked the Bears with three goals. Former NAIT forward Murray Bokenfohr also netted a pair for the U of A.

In contrast, the Ooks were an unknown commodity heading into the tournament finale as they split their first two games of the event.

On Friday, the Ooks dropped a 5-4 decision to the Kings in the coaching debut of Don Depoe.

Andrew Plumb netted a pair for the Kings including the winner at 8:28 of the third while Regan Harper, Rob Clark and Carey Causey added singles. Garet Filipchuk, Peter Kasowski, Owen Korkie, and Stacey Rayan replied for the Ooks. The two teams were tied at 1-1 following the first and at 3-3 following the second. The Kings outshot the Ooks 48-32.

On Saturday, the Ooks erased a 3-

0 deficit en route to a 5-4 victory over the Vikings.

Jay Lines led the way for the Ooks with a pair of goals and a pair of assists. Trevor McCallion, Jason Sorochan, and Peter Kasowski rounded out the NAIT attack with singles. Jason Collins netted two for the Vikings. Jay Robertson and Maury Jackson completed the AUC scoring.

Outshooting the Vikings 44-25, the Ooks trailed 2-0 after the first. The two teams were tied at 3-3 following the second.


In Sunday's other game, Ryan Keller tallied twice for RDC as the Kings edged the Vikings 3-1.







Hemp - Nature's Perfect Gift

"Only after the last tree has been cut down, only after the last river has been poisoned, only after the last fish has been caught, only then will you find money cannot be eaten."

Cree Prophecy

In 1938 before it was outlawed cannabis hemp, also known as marijuana, was described by Mechanical Engineering Magazine as "The Most Profitable and Desirable Crop That Can Be Grown" and by Popular Mechanics as "A New Billion Dollar

Crop". Versatility makes hemp such a desirable crop, every part of the plant can be utilized. The stems, once separated into fiber and hurds are used for textiles, paper, pulp, plastics, and energy production. The seeds are used for food and oil while the flowers are utilized for medicinal and recreational use. Even the roots are of value in anchoring soil against erosion.

Hemp fibre is the strongest, most durable natural fibre known to man. Hemp was the fabric of choice for thousands of years for rope, sails, clothing and fine linen and fabrics. This is because hemp is softer and warmer than cotton and has three times it's tensile strength.

Hurds are the remains of hemp stems once the fibre is removed. Since 1937, about half of the forests in the world have been cut down to make paper. Hemp hurds are 77% cellulose which makes hemp the ideal choice to replace the harvesting of trees for

pulp and paper. USDA Bulletin No. 404 states that over a 20 year period one acre of hemp produces the equivalent to 4.1 acres of trees. It is interesting to note that using hemp for paper not only saves trees

can be used to form construction panelling effectively replacing dry wall and plywood. Cellulose is a basic chemical feedstock and can be used by the chemical industry to produce a wide variety of materials

but also uses only 1/4 to 1/7 as many sulphur based chemicals and avoids the dioxin contamination of rivers by using hydrogen peroxide instead of chlorine bleach.

The cellulose from hemp has many uses other than paper. It

including such items as PVC pipe, nylon and rayon which are all currently produced from petrochemical feedstocks. Cellulose can be used to replace fossil fuels through biomass. Biomass is simply the production of energy from

renewable plant sources. Carbon rich biomass is burned for energy directly, or undergoes pyrolysis "cracking" using technology currently employed by the petroleum industry to produce fuel oils. With existing technology this biomass conversion process can be adjusted to produce charcoal, fuel oils and process steam, methanol as well as chemicals important to industry such as acetone, ethyl acetate, tar, pitch and creosote. Biomass is also less expensive than fossil fuels especially once environmental costs are figured in.

The seeds and oil of the hemp plant are an excellent source of nutrition. They are high in protein and are among the lowest in saturated fats. They also contain the highest amount of essential fatty acids of any plant. These fatty acids are responsible for the bodies immune response and have been used to treat a variety of health problems such as cancer, kidney degeneration, as well as immune deficiency. Hemp seeds and oil contain very little THC so there is no danger of getting stoned from eating hemp bread.

Hemp flowers have traditionally been used for medicinal and recreational uses. THC is the active ingredient that produces the "high" from marijuana but there are also over 60 other compounds with therapeutic potential in hemp. Some of the major therapeutic uses of hemp include the treatment of asthma, glaucoma, epilepsy, and tumours. As well as a pain reliever and a muscle relaxant, it is also excellent for use with arthritis, muscle spasms, and as a replacement for

valium type drugs for sleep and relaxation. It has been used as a relief for nausea most notably in cases of cancer treatment involving chemotherapy, as an added side effect the "munchies" help these patients avoid excessive weight loss due to lost appetite. Hemp is also a traditional remedy taken to lessen menstrual cramps and is one of the most effective, safest medicines for migraine relief.

In Hemp we find one of natures most perfect gifts. Hemp yields useful items from every part of the plant, is the best hope to save our forests, and is a viable, ecologically preferable alternative to fossil fuels. It has enormous potential to heal as a medicine for a wide variety of ills. It also promises economic benefits as an extremely profitable crop. Unfortunately this wonder plant is still illegal regardless of it's potential benefits.

If you would like to find out more about hemp, including the real reasons it was outlawed I suggest you buy a copy of THE EMPEROR WEARS NO CLOTHES by Jack Herer, it was my primary source of information for this article. It is available at Earth's General Store located on Whyte Avenue between 108th and 109th streets.
