
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



#### **Convicted Murderers to Walk**

arren Allmand, the **Commons Justice** Committee Chairmen is calling for reduced sentencing for first degree murderers. His plan calls for the maximum sentence of 25 years without parole to be changed to 15 years without parole. He also states the high cost of keeping inmates in jail in these money pinching times as a reason, explaining that the burden to taxpayers is not worth our time. He believes that most people convicted of first degree murder are one time offenders, who were coerced into committing the crime through sheer strain of emotion, and have no intention of doing it again.

The discussion was brought up amidst a growing furore over a loophole created when Allmand was the Solicitor General in 1976. During this time, while the death penalty was being removed and the 25 year sentence was being brought in, an unforeseen loophole was created where murderers could apply for a 40% reduction of their sentences. Allmond plans to introduce a bill for the 15 year sentences as a replacement for the old legislation.

Opponents to this deal are growing rapidly. Many point out the case of Daniel Gingras as an example. Gingras was serving a life sentence for second degree

murder at the Edmonton Max in 1987. After escaping while on a shopping trip to West Edmonton Mall, he went on a murdering spree, killing two people. He was recaptured six weeks later. Obviously, people point out, in situations like this, the 15 year bill would accomplish nothing but tragedy if implemented. They want Allmond to weigh the cost of even one life if a murderer is released after only 15 years behind bars.

Les Woodward, father of Wanda Woodward, one of the Gingras victims told the Edmonton Sun: "It costs \$97,000 a year to keep these people in jail. How much does a piece of rope cost?"

# **Deadly Debt for West Edmonton Mall**

he world's largest shop ping mall could one day have one of the world's largest debts. Edmonton's biggest tourist attraction is in big trouble.

The Ghermezian family is pushing the mall deeper into debt every year. It has a city tax debt of 11.1 million that increases by 100,000 a month. Another 10 million in 94 taxes will be due in

The mall's big financial supporters are feeling anxious. Twenty-two different lenders formed a group to provide a 300 million mortgage for the mall. And plus that debt, the mall also owes the Bank of Montreal 12 million and the Alberta Treasury Branch 100 million.

The Ghermezian family

might lose their pride and joy if the lenders decide to wrestle control of the mall away from them.

Lorne Braithwaite, president and chief executive officer of Cambridge own 34 shopping malls across Canada including Millwoods, Town Centre, Heritage, South Gate and 30% of Edmonton Centre.

If the mall did go up for sale, Cambridge would look at improving it. They would convert some of the hard-to-lease space into condominiums for example.

West Ed has many empty stores despite its popularity. Part of this could be due to the rent. Mall rents may vary from as low as \$15 a square foot to \$85 a square foot in prime areas.

Nader Ghermezian says the mall has a present net cash flow

of more than 45 million, and that 84% of the money went to servicing the debt.

West Edmonton Mall needs about 100 million in renovations to make it more appealing to tenants and customers. And that money could only come if the mall could be sold for around 300 to 400 million dollars.

West Edmonton Mall lenders have to decide what to do. They could leave the Ghermezians in charge. They could seize control and get someone else to manage the place or they could seize and sell the mall.

Alberta's biggest tourist attraction is in jeopardy. It's giant amusement park will no longer be filled with joyful screams of children unless someone steps in to save our

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# **Teale to Face Trial** Without Prelim

ntario Attorney General Marion Boyd will send Paul Teale to trial on two counts of murder without a preliminary hearing. Ms. Boyd called on her not often used authority to prefer an indictment on Teale.

But she won't tell anybody why, until next Tuesday at least, when the preliminary hearing was to take place. That's when the Crown will put their reason for the change of normal procedure in front of the judge.

Teale's lawyer, Ken Murray was "astounded they would do this on the eve of the preliminary hearing...my immediate reaction is that it denies him the right to a fair trial". However, it is the right of the Attorney General to call off the preliminary hearing in special cases, and it would be a hard fought legal battle to overturn the ruling.

Paul Teale is on trial for the murders of teenagers Kristen

French and Leslie Mahafey. His estranged wife, Karla Teale went to trial last year on the same charges. She was convicted on both counts. None of the trial details were released, in Canada, officially at least, so Paul would get a fair trial. Some people think that this is the reason for the exemption of the prelim. The Crown is thought to be worried about leakage to the American press, like the problem with his

# **Save The Tigers**

very child knows who the "King of the Jungle' is. The tiger has stalked the pages of many books as an invincible, power ful yet beautiful animal. But soon it will only stalk the pages of history.

The Bengal tigers that roam India's forests, and five other tiger species in Asia are in grave danger of becoming extinct. You might be thinking to yourself that this is just another silly scam and that the tigers aren't in real danger. But the reality is that in less than 100 years the number of wild tigers has dropped from 100,000 to less than 5000.

At an international conference in New Delhi last month, India's environment minister convinced nine of the fourteen "tiger range" states to join in establishing the Global Tiger Forum. This organization will coordinate measures to fight poaching and to preserve the tiger habitats.

China was among the countries that refused to attend the conference. Probably because they're mostly to blame. China and Taiwan have been identified as the main culprits in an underground trade market for tiger parts.

Ever since the days of the Maharajah's tiger hunts, the tigers' main enemies have been trophy hunters. But poachers now pose a new threat to the tigers existence.

Tiger hunting was banned in India and surrounding area almost 25 years ago. But poachers no longer are after the tigers' skin as in the past. They're being targeted for the skull, bones, whiskers, sinews and the blood. Tiger trophies are no longer important. There are booming markets for tiger parts to be used in ancient Chinese medicines and positions.

In Hong Kong and China and in Chinatowns across Europe and


North America the Chinese do a steady trade in tiger wines, tiger balms and tiger pills. The tigers lose their lives to pamper the vanity of human beings. These tiger products are supposed to treat rheumatism, restore energy, treat typhoid fever and enhance sexual prawns.

Asian governments are implementing measures to catch and punish tiger poachers but the people are willing to take risks.

You train long hours to develop and tone those muscles required to do what God has given you the talent to do. But have you ever wondered what it would be like to not be able to use a part of your body??

Through all my years of training I never gave it a second thought, that I would be ready to perform when called upon. Until a simple incident like severely pulled ligaments on the exterior of my foot, put me on crutches for 1 week+(not sure yet may be longer)

To put it bluntly this last week has been physically and mentally challenging. I have had to plan where I was going to go, how I was going to get there. whether or not I had access, think about how many steps or doors there were, or whether or not I should even attempt going.

Prior to this incident I never gave where I was going or how I would get there a second though. I always knew I could go where I wanted, when I wanted in as short of time as I wanted.


For those of you who have experienced what I'm talking about, you can relate to how much energy it actually takes out of you to get yourself around. For those of you that have never experienced such a thing. I don't wish it upon anyone.

To share some these experiences, this is what you can

Heavy doors, lots of steps, gravel, uneven sidewalks with cracks, people not aware of you and the fact you are struggling to get through a door, exhaustion after you have only cructched 50 feet, people not getting out of your way - they want you to feel normal but what they do not realize is that you are fatiguing as they make this mental decision, shaky tired muscles and priceless looks.

I don't want to make this sound humorous or belittling nor do I want people to feel sorry for those of us that must use crutches, wheelchair or motorized carts to get around.

Many of my close friends, know that I will try and live my life as if I had no injury. As they say "I do stupid things." Well to me they aren't stupid, like going down stairs so I can get a book to study or work on the computer. But as it was so elegantly pointed out to me, "yes Renata you need to do these things, but you can't do it like you use to." To give you an example I timed myself how long it takes me to go down 10 steps first time 3 min. towards the end of the week, 1.0 minute (that's on my butt) another min.



to figure out how I was going to carry a book and use my crutches without losing my balance or dropping the book (I still can't do

Hopping sure helps providing there is a clear path and a wall or chair to grab when your muscles decide to scream out in pain because they are not fit to carry all of your weight. Oh and I forgot to mention what its like to get hot food or a drink to another destination - providing you can get to it and open or pour it, with out dropping or breaking a pot, glass or plate in the process. Oh, and how about going to the bathroom (no one can help you there unless they are real loyal) or taking a shower. (Baths are a little easier) but my knees are scraped - God didn't design us to walk on are knees, all is not lost though I can still drive, but I drive a standard, so I had to borrow the company van and it costs more to run.

Now that I have shared this experience with you, your probably wondering what's your point? My point is this; I will heal through proper therapy and ultrasound. But what about those who won't because of permanent

Earlier this year one of our fellow students was in an accident (tobogganing) that has left him paralyzed. He likely won't walk again. He will have to learn basic life skills all over again. Things we take for granted. Ask your parents what it was like the first time we could walk, run and be carefree?? Neil hang in there big guy, I know you can do it.

To Gordon Smith (Instructor Bus. Tower) and others: Wow!! You are truly a spirit of strength that many of us should learn from. This incident really is a character builder.

I want to take this opportunity to thank my friends on campus who have helped me adjust. Thank you, to all of you who didn't get on the elevator

right away, after I had been waiting to get on. You had the courtesy to realize I had been waiting. To those of you who took that extra few seconds ot get the door out of your busy schedules. You helped me stay on my schedule. A special thanks to Donna (student) in leadership for your thoughtfulness in ensuring I was comfortable (Craig thanks for the use of your bag).

To Lynn, Troy, Ed, and Group members, thank you for making me laugh and for putting up with me whining. (I guess I wasn't to bad). Thank you for your help. I promise I will not talk on the phone, walk outside and carry something in my hands all at once again.

A very special thank you to my mom (who happens to be trained in orthopedic nursing) for laughing at me and making me stay disciplined to not just walk on my sore foot regardless of the consequences. Above all allowing me to vent my frustration at not being able to do the things I could normally. And of course your patience and the TLC sock (I got the message) I will not forget.

And Neil if you get this paper Hang in there, we are all pulling for you.

A special thanks to the NAIT staff and instructors for your understanding. The motorized cart was fun. No I don't have a license to drive one. Beep! Beep!

# **Letter to** the Editor

RE: Letter from Elaine Soetaert in the March 31 NUGGET.

s. Soetaert offered the following quote from Vanier Institute, "in fact there are about 1/2 as many

births to teen moms today as there were 20 years ago" as some sort of rebut to Julie Matthews quote in an earlier Nugget, "during the past two decades teen pregnancy rates and STD cases have increased." It appears Ms. Soetaert thinks these quotes are somehow mutually exclusive. They are not. A rudimentary understanding of English language (or a quick look in any dictionary) would clearly indicate "birth" and "pregnancy" are not synonyms. Neither are "rate" and "number". It is probable both these quotes are true: that teen pregnancy rates are up and the number of births to teen moms is down.

Minimal critical thought offers at least these 3 possibilities:

- 1) Changing Demographics:
- the teen pregnancy rate is up (as a proportion of total teen population) but the number of births is down because there are fewer teenagers than there were 20 years ago.
- 2) Abortion as birth control: - the teen pregnancy rate is up and the birthrate of teen moms is down because many pregnant teens choose to terminate the life of the fetus before it is born (there were over 100,000 abortions in Canada last year).
- 3) Some combination of the above, or other possibilities not obvious to me.

In any case, Ms. Soertaert would be well advised to he" Ms. Soeraert says she is an instructor at NAIT - I hope she does not offer instruction in language or critical thought.

OBS! JOBS! JOBS! The **Annual NAIT Promotional** Management Awards Banquet, April 21, 1994, can do as much as land a job for a student.



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

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
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
