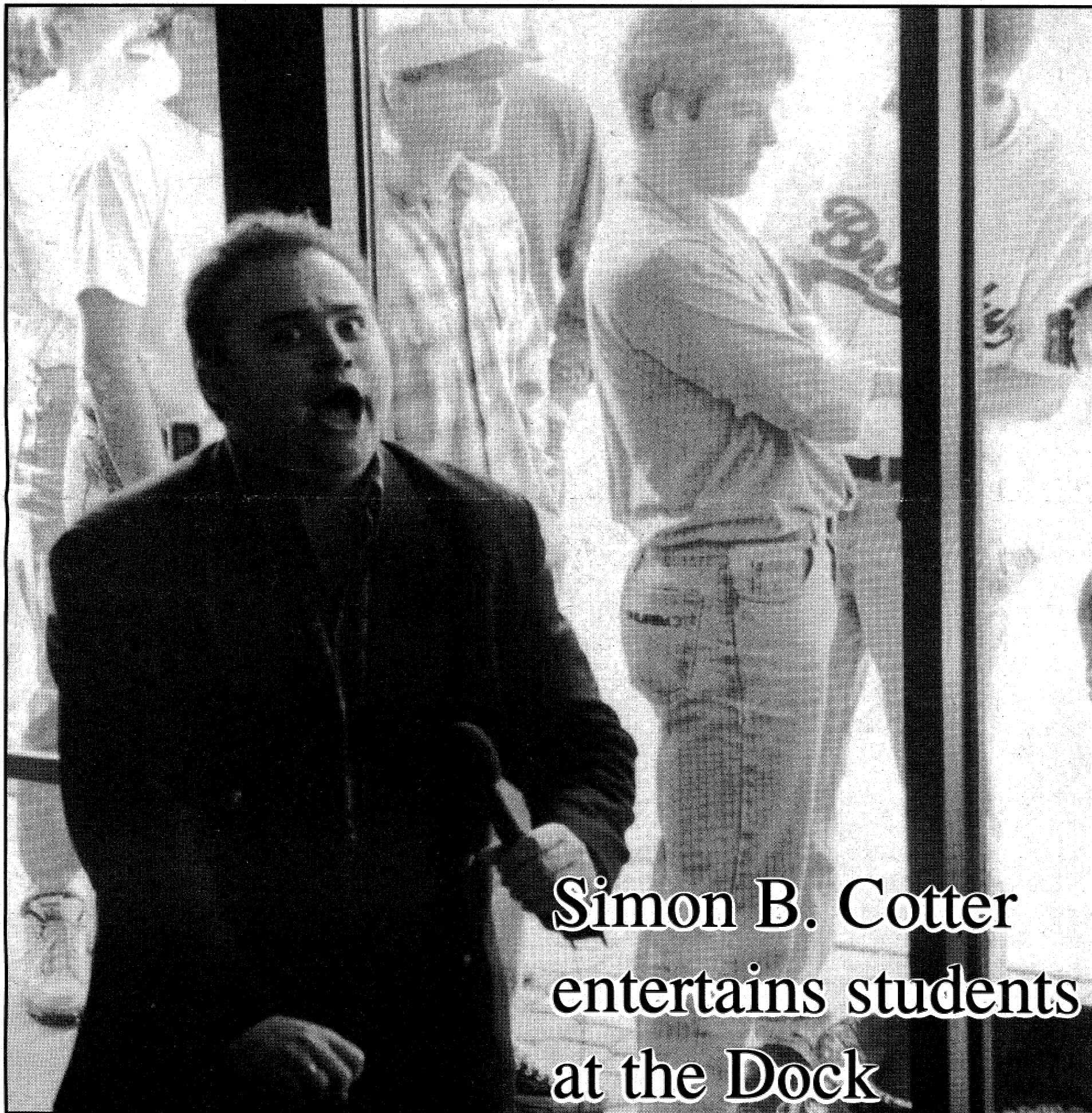

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## Bouchard in New York

### Opposition Leader Talks Separatism on Government Funds

**L**ucien Bouchard, Leader of Canada's Official Opposition met with American officials last week in New York. He was there to visit American business groups, and academics, as well as the Secretary General of the United Nations. His purpose seemed to be to generate interest in the United States for a "sovereign" Quebec, but whether his goal was reached remains in doubt. There were few reporters, other than a fair sized Canadian contingent, on hand to question Bouchard about his meeting at the UN. It was there that he used the word 'separate' instead of 'sovereign'. A much harsher word, and graphic enough for even Americans to understand. He spoke at an American think-tank, where he got a small

audience and an even smaller response. He stressed Quebec's ability to function without Canada, and stated that since they were keeping the Canadian currency, the province would hang on to it's financial feasibility. Reports show that the Americans were unresponsive and unimpressed. Bouchard seems to be campaigning for entrance into the NAFTA agreement if a separation does occur. American economists predict the answer will be no. Americans don't buy Bouchard's argument of an economical reason for separation rather than a language one. And it doesn't look like Bouchard is making any friends here back in Canada, where the comment has been made that the trip, financed with federal taxpayers money, was centered around Quebec's desire to leave.

## Spy Games

**I**nternational espionage reared it's ugly head in Canada last week with the swift expulsion of three Cuban diplomats from Ottawa.

The expulsions were an after-shock to the eruption of Cold War reminiscent spy games in the US the week before. Aldrich Ames and his wife Maria were arrested last month by the FBI under charges of selling CIA secrets to the Russians. Among these secrets were names of Russian double agents, 10 of which appear to have died under questionable circumstances. Throughout the years, the Americans have granted freedom, protection, and asylum to members of communist bloc countries in return for intelligence secrets. These spies were given new identities and placed in safe

houses in countries all around the world, including Canada. Many intelligence officials believe that the Ames's may have released some of these names and now these former agents are now at risk. The Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS), along with the FBI decided to expel three Cuban diplomats from Montreal with the fear that these diplomats knew the identities of some of the defectors here in Canada. The Cuban government denies that it's staff was expelled, instead calling it just a routine transference of personnel. Officials say that in the tense years of the Cold War, the Cuban Embassy in Montreal was used as a primary information exchange between Russian and Cuban spies. Now it seems as though Canada may be caught right in the middle of international espionage yet again.

## Job cuts, fee hikes proposed at NAIT

**J**ob cuts, wage rollbacks and tuition fee increases will be used to offset a \$15.8-million drop in the provincial grant to NAIT.

A proposal that goes to NAIT's board of governors today outlines \$5.6 million of the \$9.8 million in cuts the institute must make to balance this year's budget.

Tuition fees will rise \$107.75 to \$1,004.75 for 1994-95 along with the cost of student parking.

Four administrative jobs and 17 academic positions will be eliminated.

Management and administrative professional staff will take a five per cent wage rollback, effective July 1.

NAIT may also seek a wage

freeze or rollback in collective agreements with unionized employees.

"The primary issue not yet resolved is that of salary levels," NAIT president Stan Souch said in a prepared statement.

Talks have started with the NAIT Academic Staff Association, but management has yet to meet with local 38 of the Alberta Union of Public Employees.

Souch said in the statement that there will also be cuts of up to 25 per cent in travel, hospitality, the purchase of office supplies, books and magazines.

The institution will be looking for \$1.1 million more in revenue from continuing and internal education.

## General Council Notes

**A**t the last Student Council meeting a few interesting things happened. A police officer arrived, the NAITSA constitution was approved, and a motion was brought forward to impeach Activities V.P. Amanda Steenwinkel.

Constable Jim Neelan of the Edmonton Police Services stopped by to talk to the student council members. Constable Neelan is a member of the Crime Stoppers program and is involved in the community policing service. He is the officer assigned primarily to our area of town.

Constable Neelan will be working with NAIT's own security in a campus crime stopper program. The program fronted by Administrative V.P.

Troy Shostak will be set in place by April 1, 1994.

"The biggest problems at NAIT are vandalism and theft" said Constable Neelan. If you want to talk to our community officer his number is available in the NAITSA office.

A Chief Returning Officer was appointed after the officer's presentation. Athletics V.P. Neil Cantin will be overseeing any and all aspects of the upcoming elections.

The NAITSA Constitution was approved by the council. Minor changes were made, mostly involving the wording of certain sentences. After having the constitution approved Academic V.P. Dean Andres announced the resignation of the second Board of Governor's student representative.

Then some very saddening news was announced. NAIT

student Neil F. was involved in a tragic accident and is currently paralyzed below the waist. A friend of Neil's has brought one of Neil's old yearbooks from home to NAIT. Students are encouraged to sign the yearbook and pass their best wishes along to Neil. The yearbook is in the NAITSA office.

Finally, a motion was brought forth by Edmund Duggan, on behalf of the Electronics Engineering Society. The motion was under the NAITSA constitution section 6.09.4 (2). The motion was made to impeach Activities V.P. Amanda Steenwinkel. For more on this motion read the separate articles.

The next general council meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 15.

## Impeached?

A few days after the motion to impeach Activities V.P. Amanda Steenwinkel was made it was over. The motion was made under articles 6.09.4 (2) of the NAITSA constitution by Edmond Duggan.

Edmond Duggan who was representing the Electronics Society put forward the motion. However, Edmond was not an elected representative of the Electronics Society so the motion was terminated shortly thereafter. Currently, there are no elected representatives in the Electronics Society.

When questioned about the reasons behind the motion, Mr. Duggan refused to have the reasons published. However Ms. Steenwinkel told us the reasons she believed that she was being charged with.

According to Amanda the motion was made in relation to three topics. The first were some pictures taken by Edmond during the "Waves in the Pool/Suds in the Nest" activity back in November 1993.

Edmond released the pictures for a Nugget article. Amanda took several of the pictures from the file and mailed them to Bacchus. Bacchus sometimes publishes articles about campus activities. Mr. Duggan found out and wanted to get credit if the pictures were ever printed.

On Monday, February 28, Edmond went into the NAITSA executive meeting claiming of impropriety on Amanda's part. The pictures, incidentally, were never published and are being returned from Bacchus.

The second point was in regards to the "Chunk" newspaper. In it was a grapevine involving two people initialized R.K. and T.S. The Grapevine read as follows; "R.K. Thank you very much for the valentine. Even though you won't admit to it, I know you are lusting after my body. Wait until I get back from my Hawaiian vacation, my little sex kitten, and we will curl up by the fire and purr together T.S."

The person known by the initials R.K. was quite upset by this false grapevine. An apology was put in the last issue of the Nugget to R.K. and T.S.

The final claim came from a dispute over cabaret ticket sales. The dispute was over how many tickets Amanda claimed were sold and how many actually were sold. Amanda admits that a mistake quoting sales was made but did not intentionally lie to anyone.

So on Monday, February 28, Edmond went into the Executive Council with their demands.

It is important to stress that this is Amanda's side of the story. Edmond was given opportunity to respond.

Edmond Responds:

On the 1st of March in the general Council I raised a notice of motion dealing with the impeachment of a member of the NAITSA executive, in accordance with the NAITSA constitution Section 6.09.4(d). This section reads:

6.09.4(d) Dereliction of duty or misconduct - Approval of seventy five (75) percent of General Council shall be sufficient to remove a member of Executive Council from office for improper or indiscreet conduct or neglect of duty. Notice of Motion must be given at least one (1) General Council Meeting prior;

On the 15th I will deal with this matter, in its only appropriate forum, the General Council. Meetings of the General Council are normally open to all students.

Probably the most important qualification to become matched with a child is that you have to have the desire to be a friend. This is a program that really does work. Visible differences can be seen in the matched kids. They finally have someone they can talk to, do things with, and care about.

On March 4, 1994, Dr. Stan Souch - NAIT President, gave a news release outlining some of the changes to NAIT's budget which in turn gave students more of an idea as to what they will be facing next year. Tuition fees will continue to increase by the maximum allowed (\$107.75) for 1994/95, bringing the annual tuition for a

full-time student to \$1004.75. As well, student parking fees will increase by approximately \$3/month to equal levels charged by similar institutions in Edmonton.

In times of great cut backs, we as students can not complain that we have been dealt the ultimate deathly blow as students at the U of A have been. We must realize that we have to take responsibility for our education and that we can no longer sit on the tailcoats of the taxpayers to send us on our merry way through life. We know things are not always going to be a bed of roses and everything won't be handed to us on a silver platter, so we also don't expect to get blasted out of the water for trying to work with administration and the government to figure out the financial situation.

In January we lost one of

our Board of Governors student reps. to a job in Calgary and at the end of February we lost our other rep. to a job in Grande Prairie. Where does that leave us? Plain and simple - without any!! Do we panic - no! I have been sitting in on the meetings and at the last one if I felt that the students views needed to be represented I was given the opportunity. For the next meeting in April, Dr. Souch, Mr. J. **STUDENTS AWARDS PROGRAM**

The purpose of the Student Awards Program is to encourage academic achievement and provide financial assistance to students who are in financial need.

Various types of awards, such as scholarships, bursaries and prizes are available to full-time students. The majority of awards are available to students who have completed their first year of study and are enrolled in their second year. For the majority of awards, no application form is necessary. Candidates are selected upon the recommendation of the Program Head. Selection of award winners usually takes place during the month of September and students normally receive their award by December 20th..

Some awards are administered outside of NAIT and require a special application form. Generally, selection is performed by the individual donors, and each award has a different application deadline. A list of these awards is published in the Student Awards Handbook.

There are some scholarships and bursaries which are administered by NAIT and require an application form. These awards are awarded on a competitive basis.
