Gov't Looks at Mercy Killing

It has been going on for decades but our eyes were opened to the issue last February with the case of Sue Rodriguez. Now Euthanasia, or assisted suicide is back in the news and the Canadian Government is having to deal with the issue once again. Will they make a decision this time?

Within a year, the House of Commons is expected to decide in a free vote how people may someday die. A committee of the Senate headed by Liberal Senator Joan Neiman has been listening to expert witnesses from all over the country. In December, Neiman and the other committee members will submit a list of recommendations that are expected to affect the national debate before parliament's decision.

This committee was organized after Sue Rodriguez's assisted suicide earlier this year. But the emotional side of the issue was raised again last week with the conviction of Robert Latimer for killing his severely disabled daughter, Tracy.

Holland is currently the only country in the world to fully ac-

cept Euthanasia, but Dutch officials admit there are still many problems enforcing the guidelines set for drugs administered to terminally ill patients. The senate committee conducted a video conference with officials in Holland about the issue. Dr. Dirkyan Bakker, a surgeon and member of the ethics committee of the Royal Dutch Medical Association told

said that legalizing Euthanasia would be a big mistake. Many Canadians have a false idea that legalizing the practice would do little but make us more honest, he said.

Roy believes legalizing it would increase the number of cases because many elderly would feel pressured to request death because of loneliness or family con-

cerns. "Economic pressures on hospitals would also likely tempt many doctors to push for Euthanasia."

But Svend Robinson an NDP PM wouldn't agree.

He proposed a House of Commons vote in September on a private member's bill to legalize euthanasia. Robinson actually attended the assisted suicide of Sue Rodriguez.

During a debate on the issue, Robinson admitted some people have moral/religious grounds for opposing Euthanasia. "But a law which imposes that personal religious philosophy on an entire nation is one that is both cruel and inhuman," he said.

the committee that he's one of about 4% of Dutch doctors who will not perform Euthanasia under any circumstances, mostly for religious reasons. He explained that he and other physicians worry that Euthanasia will become even more widely practiced in the future than it is today, as ethical considerations are forgotten.

The Dutch have recently expanded the Euthanasia guidelines to include comatose and severely disabled newborn children.

One of the witnesses who spoke to the committee, Dr. Roy

Women Not Safe at Home

There seems to be a never-ending supply of horror stories coming from the Millwoods area of Edmonton in the past months. Lately there has been a terrifying trend of sexual assaults, break-ins and attempted sexual assaults on women in their own homes.

Since October 10th there have been three separate incidents involving a man forcing his way into someone's home and actually assaulting, or trying to assault, the defenseless homeowners.

Although these incidents occurred in a relatively localized area over a short period of time, the Edmonton Police Service feels this is the work of separate perpetrators, not a serial rapist. Physical descriptions of the man involved, while in two cases were similar, are not alike enough to cause them to believe one man is the sole culprit.

Even if these are all unrelated incidents, it seems scary to think

that three separate individuals could be preying on innocent people in so small a community. No matter where or when this happens, it always seems to bring home the frailty of honest citizens, even within the sanctity of their own homes.

Due to the fact that a number of ladies attending NAIT may be

U.S. Wants Canadian Wolves

Alberta trappers are being paid by American wildlife agencies to capture wolves for a new controversial plan to restore wolves to the Northwest United States.

The wolves have almost been wiped out in these areas. In fact, they have endangered species status in all states but Alaska and Minnesota. But during the past 15 years, many wolves from Alberta and BC have decided to vacation in Montana and Idaho.

However, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is speeding things up. They're proposing a new plan to capture 15 wolves a year from Alberta for transplant in Idaho and 15 from BC for Yellowstone National Park, Wyoming.

Several Alberta trappers are being paid up to \$2,000 per wolf that is caught in an area east of the Banff and Jasper National Parks from near Sundre to the Berland River north of Hinton.

Every wolf that's caught is outfitted with a radio collar so they can be tracked, checking for movement and numbers. Biologists will come later by helicopter with nets and tranquilizer guns to make captures.

The transplant program has met with major controversy in the states. The Wildlife Service has been threatened with 3 lawsuits and even some Alberta groups aren't happy with how it's being handled.

Ranchers in Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho fear their

livestock will be killed with the introduction of wolves to the area. Environmental groups on the other hand, worry the wolves won't be adequately protected from hunters.

Dirk Dekker of Edmonton has been studying wolves for 30 years and is worried about what the program will do to the population here. He says the wolves range in and out of Jasper National Park and it can't afford to lose any of them. "I've been fighting for a buffer zone around

the park where the wolves will be protected," Dekker said.

Albert's winter wolf population sits at about 4000 says John Gunson from Alberta Fish and Wildlife. Trappers killed 399 last year and that was when pelt prices were a low \$90. He believes it's a fair trade to help the U.S. "Alberta's elk came from Yellowstone from 1917 to 1936 after

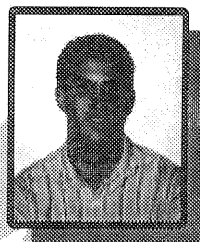
our province's population disappeared."

The Rocky Mountain House/Hinton area was specifically chosen because the wolves there hunt elk and deer which are also found in Idaho or Yellowstone. Wolves west of Lethbridge are not being exported because ranchers there claim they've acquired a taste for cattle. And northern Alberta Alaska wolves escaped the list because they only hunt moose and caribou.

Alberta hasn't given its final approval and may not for several weeks.

Murder or Mercy?

In October 1993, a young girl by the name of Tracy Latimer died. She didn't die of natural causes though. She was left in the cab of her father's pick-up truck with a hose running from the exhaust pipe to the window. She died from carbon monoxide poisoning as a result of this. Her father took her life from her, and there is no denying this fact.

Normally this would be an open-and-shut case of first degree murder, except for one small fact. Robert Latimer's daughter suffered from extreme Cerebral Palsy. As a result of this, she was unable to walk, talk, or even feed herself. She was unable to run, jump, play or do anything an able-bodied twelve year old girl would be able to do.

Robert Latimer loved his daughter very much and saw it as euthanasia, not murder. He was merely putting her out of pain. She didn't feel any pain or discomfort, she merely went to

sleep.

Mr. Latimer's trial began November 7th and ended November 16th with the jury delivering a guilty verdict to second degree murder. This is the minimum verdict they could have returned. Their other options were guilty or not-guilty to first degree murder. He now has to serve a life sentence in a maximum security facility, with no opportunity for parole for at least ten years.

The underlying issue of this whole court procedure, though, is not whether Rob Latimer killed his daughter or not, but rather if mercy killing is morally and ethically allowable in Canada.

In 1993, Sue Rodriguez had her appeals to the BC Provincial Court, and ultimately the Supreme Court of Canada denied. She wanted the right to have assistance to commit suicide.

Sue suffered from Lou Gehrig's disease, an inevitably fatal disease which deteriorates the victims muscle tissue until death. Even though the courts ruled against her still went ahead and

had an assisted suicide in February 1994.

Cases such as these continually raise the question as to whether or not any one person should be able to decide when it is time for themselves, or those they love, to pass on.

Anyone who has seen "My Left Foot", a movie about the life of cerebral Palsy victim Cristy Brown, can argue that Tracy Latimer may have had a full life ahead of her, but who knows for sure. Rob Latimer's lawyer summed it up by saying, "If my client has committed any sin against God, God will judge him." This may be the case, but until such a time, the Canadian Criminal Justice System has already passed judgment. Rob Latimer committed murder and will serve time in prison. The repercussions of this case will be felt for years to come, with arguments from both sides of the issue becoming louder and louder. In the end, who can say who is right and who is wrong?

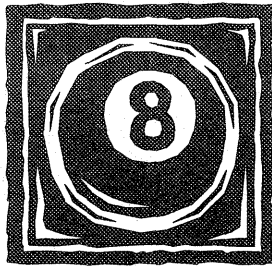
Editor's reply:

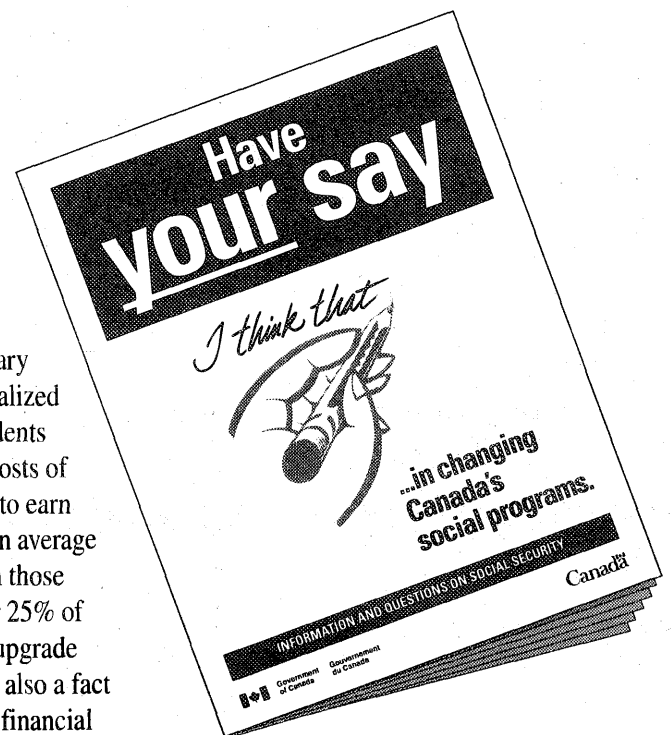

Canadian university students now pay only about 20% of the costs of their education. They can expect to earn 40% more over their lifetime — an average of \$11,700 more per year — than those with no university diploma. Over 25% of people in the workforce want to upgrade their skills but can't afford it. It's also a fact that all governments are facing a financial squeeze and have to review their programs.

Swimming in Red Deer

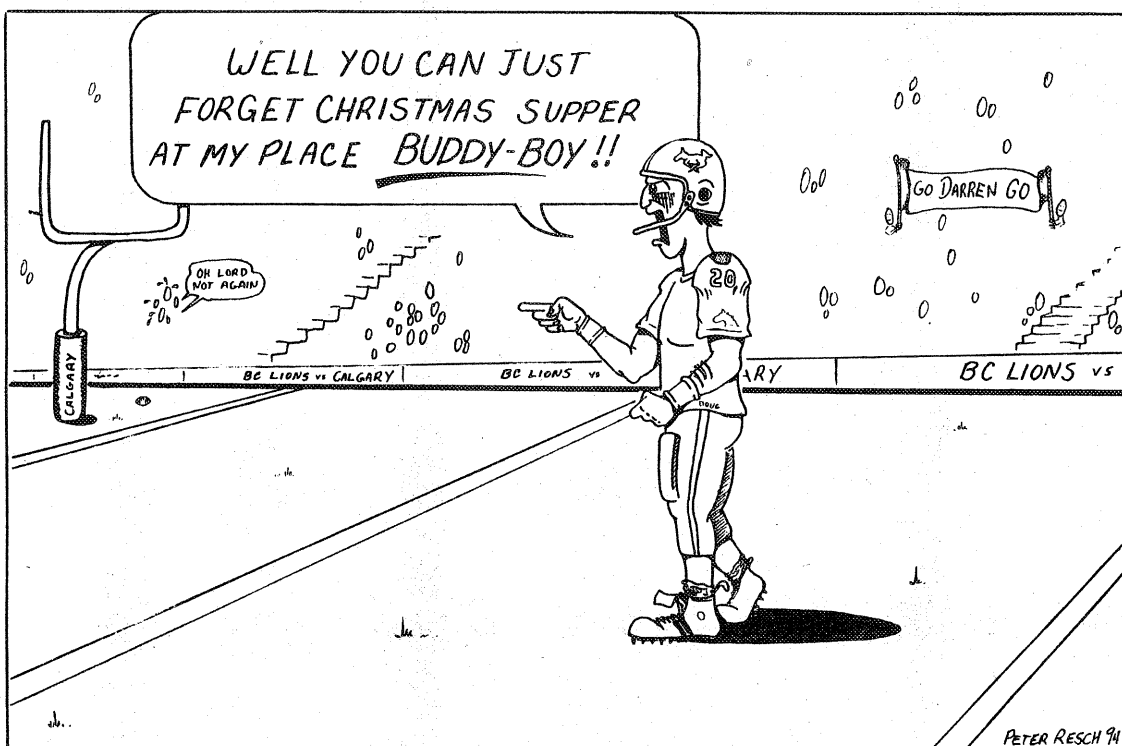

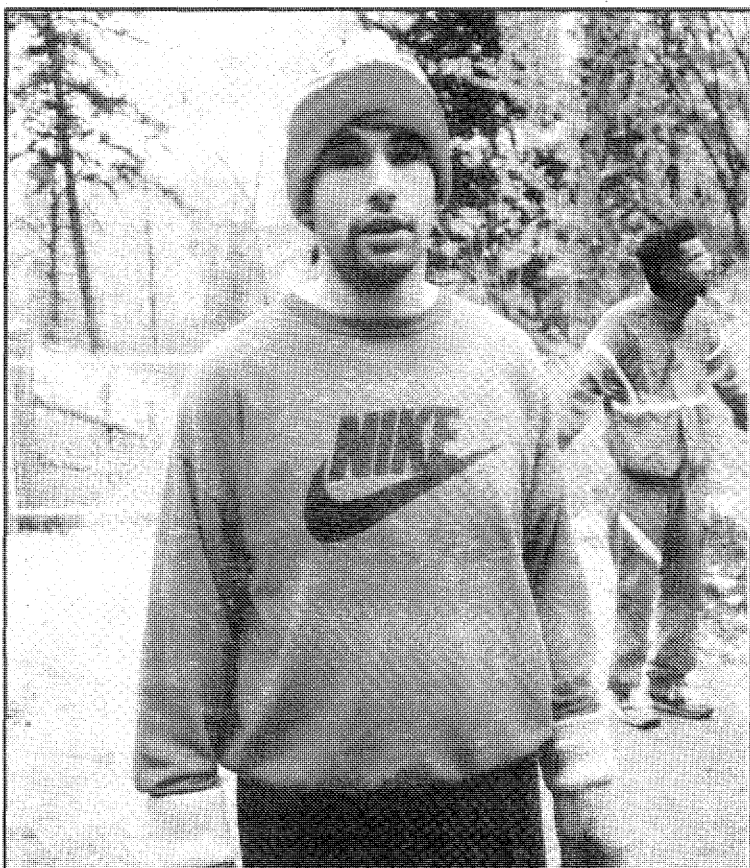
The top cross-country runners from B.C. and Alberta met in Kelowna on November 6th for the Interprovincial Championship.
