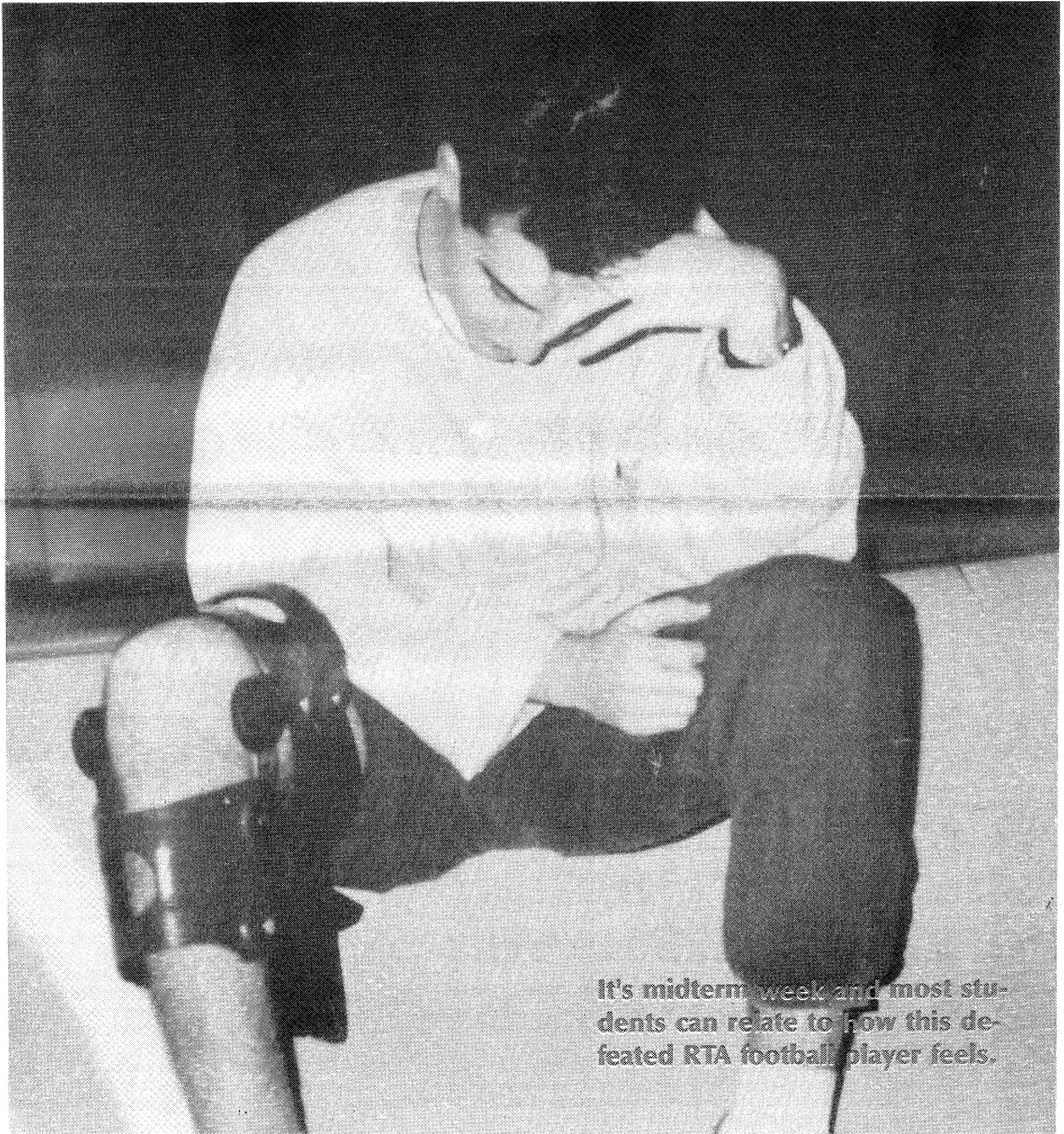

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Alberta Donors With AIDS

Many people donate blood every year to the Red Cross. In fact, just last month NAIT students lined up to take the tests and then make their donations at the blood drive. But a new study shows that the Red Cross missed 32 AID infected blood donors right here in Alberta.

"The bottom line is if you were ever a blood donor and are HIV positive that information must be made available to the Red Cross through your doctor," said Dr. Bryce Larke. Larke is the deputy medical director of the Red Cross blood centre in Edmonton, and he's very concerned. He states that unless these people come forward, the Red Cross has no conceivable way of knowing if a previous blood donor now tests positive.

Routine questioning of AIDS patients in southern Alberta

has turned up 32 previously undetected blood donors who may have infected blood recipients. This study was published in the Canadian Medical Association

whether or not they've ever donated blood. It was never usually a priority to ask for this kind of information before.

Although the Red Cross now tests all blood donations, it is still theoretically possible for blood that is infected with HIV to get through. The donor may have become infected with

the virus in the six months before the donation and therefore, would not yet test HIV positive.

All the Red Cross can do is perform rigorous questioning about personal lifestyles and use state-of-the-art laboratories and testing techniques. They hope that people who could be an HIV risk will come forward and get tested before donating blood because you never know, you could do more good by not donating.

Many of us have heard that if you received blood before 1985, you should get checked. But this contaminated blood was donated both before and after 1985, when the Red Cross started screening for HIV. The scary thing is those who donated after October 1985, may not have had the virus long enough to test positive yet.

Gill says doctors must question their HIV patients about

Haiti's Hero

President Jean-Bertrand Aristide was welcomed with open arms and hearts by the citizens of Haiti and the UN.

He proudly set foot on Haitian soil to regain the presidency that was stolen from him by the military.

After being forced to flee 3 years ago, he took to the podium behind a clear three-sided bullet proof shield to speak to the 50 - 75,000 people that had gathered - his people. Security was tight and he was accompanied by hundreds of dignitaries including Canadian Foreign Affairs Minister Andre Ouellet and U.S. Secretary of State Warren Christopher.

The UN Security Council gives its blessing to the president's return by voting to lift trade sanctions that had been imposed on Haiti in his absence.

Aristide himself praised the United States and other nations that had lobbied on his behalf and gave public thanks to Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chretien, Ouellet and Brian

He said the US didn't go far enough to disarm the paramilitary leaders that terrorized Haiti for three years or to do something about the 7000 member military group.

Kuzban wouldn't admit that Aristide's officials had drawn up a list of human rights violators in the military,

but he did say that they have all the information necessary to get rid of the FAHD (Haitian military) nationally all at once.

"We just have to do it and the longer you wait and drag it on, the greater the chance they will disappear with their weapons," Kurban said.

He also added the reconciliation Aristide is talking about is more than a reconciliation with the army and Haitian elites. It's something that must involve bringing to justice those people who have committed crimes.

But his speech was mostly directed to the people. He spoke for 50 minutes with sections in French, English, Spanish and Creole, the basic Haitian language.

He talked about national reconciliation and asked the Haitian people to forget thoughts of violence and vengeance, the times are changing.

Aristide's American lawyer Ira Kuzban talked but not too openly about his client's plans for Haiti.

NYI Program Good Opportunity

On Wednesday, October 12th, the little theatre (H005) was packed beyond capacity with students hoping to become part of the environmental future. A seminar sponsored by the Environment Services Association of Alberta outlined an upcoming educational and employment opportunity for Alberta's young adults.

The National Youth Internship program for the environmental industry is one of a number of federally funded projects aimed at helping stimulate environmental industry growth, as well as helping post-secondary students in the transition from school to the workplace. The program is co-sponsored by Human Resources Development Canada, Canadian Council for Human Resources in the Environmental Industry, NAIT, and the Environmental Services of Alberta.

It is estimated that the environmental industry currently employs 10,000 people in Canada, for an annual amount of over a billion dollars. With an expected growth of 10-15% per annum, it seems to be a good prospect for future employment opportunities.

The National Youth Internship program involves the students working in the industry for 34 weeks a year, and attending NAIT for 16 weeks, one semester, per year. This continues over a three year period. Upon completion, the student would be conferred with national certification as a Health, Safety and Environmental technician, with one year of college credit. If desired, the individual may then pursue an additional year of training to receive a technologist certificate, or two years of additional training, for an applied sciences Baccalaureate degree.

This is a pilot project, and the graduates will be the first of their kind in Canada. Similar projects are being undertaken; one in British Columbia, one for the Maritimes, and one for Ontario and Quebec.

Once in the industry graduates would then be certified to work with hazardous materials, dangerous goods transfers, environmental regulation of provincial safety standards and such things as safety training courses. They could expect work in such places as the forestry, petroleum, governmental or agricultural industries.

Of the expected 1000 applicants, between 50-57% students will be chosen, based on merit of personal references, academic achievement and a forty-five minute essay asking why they are applying for the National Youth Internship program.

Suicide

Have you ever known someone who's thought about committing suicide? Chances are in your life you will know someone who'll consider it. Why? What makes people think about ending their life? Well here's some information about the subject you may or may not know already.

The suicide rate in Edmonton last year (all stats are from 1993) was 21.8 people per 100,000. That figure might be hard to picture so here's another. There were 424 suicides in Alberta. Add on 25% of that for a likely error, because a death cannot be declared a suicide unless it's a definite suicide and not just an accident. Multiply that number by 100 to get the number of attempted suicides. Multiply that number by 5 to get the number of people (including friends and relatives) who have been touched by suicidal tendencies.

265,000.

Close to the population of Edmonton.

And according to Susan Patenaude of Edmonton's Distress Line some of those statistics are a bit conservative.

"We get an average of 3000 calls per month, 500 of which are persons who are currently considering it," says Patenaude. "An average of 12 are in the act when they call."

The Distress Line has been acknowledged by the American Association of Suicidology and is highly accredited for its work.

Patenaude says that it's hard to know how well the line is working because callers names are never known. However they do get thank-you calls from those who've gotten help from the line.

A person who may be thinking about suicide may feel trapped. Certain circumstances in their life may cause them to feel there's no way out of the situations they're in. What's more they may not talk to those they don't trust, even close friends.

Here's some signs to watch for: Changes in behavior, different sleep or eating patterns, depression, verbal threats of suicide.

Of course someone can have these symptoms and just be having a bad day. But it's very important to never ignore a situation. Also don't get into a "hostage taking" situation where the persons confides in you with threats of suicide if you tell someone. **Tell someone!** Be safe, not sorry.

President's Corner

Last week the Federal Government released a discussion paper on "Improving Social Security in Canada." I'd like to briefly summarize one of the important issues with respect to Canada's commitment to learning - funding.

Although the individual provinces are responsible for education, the Federal Government plays an important supporting role by funding post-secondary education to the tune of \$8 billion a year. This funding is provided to the provinces under Established Programs Financing (EPF) arrangements. These consist of tax transfer payments, cash and student loans.

The cash portion of Federal transfers to the provinces is running out. Under EPF arrangements, every year the provinces get a larger share of their Federal transfer payments through "Tax Room," which the Federal government gave to the provinces in 1977.

These tax points represent a permanent Federal endowment to support provincial post-secondary education costs. This leaves in question the cash portion of the transfers, which is falling. The Federal Government could let the current trend run its course which would have the cash portion disappear within 10 years, or they could explore other

options with the provinces for a better use of these funds.

This is where we fit in. On Wednesday, October 19th I will be attending a briefing in Calgary with the Honorable Lloyd Axworthy. The main reason for the briefing is to inform student leaders of proposed issues for discussion and see what we as students think. Judging from the discussion paper, there are three key issues for discussion:

1. With respect to Federal Government funding of education should the government:
 - a) maintain the current funding arrangements allowing the cash portion of the Federal transfer to

disappear within 10 years?

- b) shift Federal spending to an expanded and permanent system of student loans?
2. If a new, expanded student loans program is considered, should repayment be "Income Contingent" - linked to the borrower's future earnings and ability to repay?
3. Should Canadians be able to use their RRSP's to pay for education and training?

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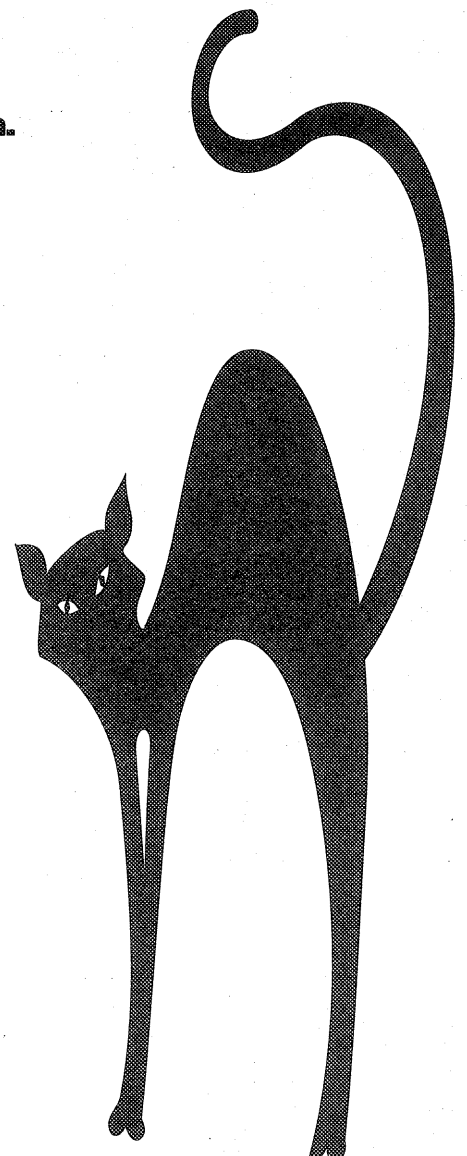

Now that you know about The Nest, where it is, and what it has to offer, what are you waiting for? Get over there, and have yourself a good time.



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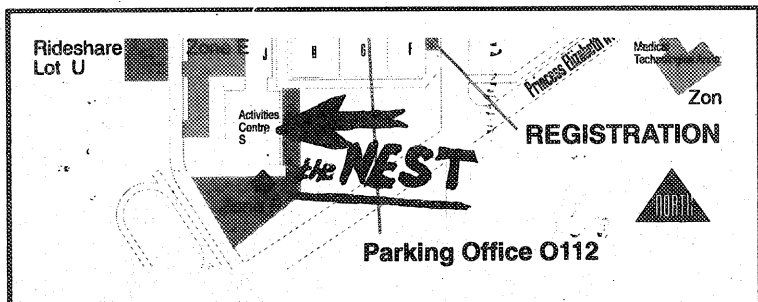

The Laos pulled it together by the second half and tied the game at 2, thank to a great cross

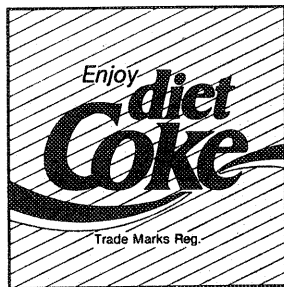

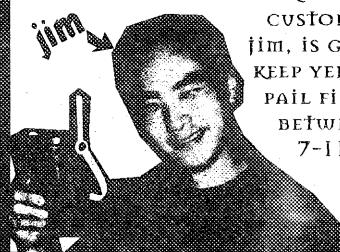
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Men's Volleyball Update
