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Part-time Jobs

As students, we're becoming more and more aware that full-time jobs are a trend of the past. The days when you could walk right out of NAIT and get a full-time job and stay until retirement are gone. But there is good news here in Alberta.

The number of part-time jobs has been growing steadily since 1975 with Alberta at the head of the pack. We have the highest rate of increase across Canada, about 5.3% annually.

Surprisingly enough, according to statistics Canada, more Canadians are choosing part-time jobs. In 1993, one quarter of all jobs in Canada were less than 30 hours a week. Many people worry about the low pay, few benefits, and little or no security of part-time jobs. But Statistics Canada said most of these workers did not want full-time work.

Almost 1.4 million people voluntarily held part-time jobs in 1993. Another 760,000 Canadians accepted part-time work because they couldn't find full-time jobs. Only 35% of Canada's population even wanted full-time jobs. And of the 760,000, 510,000 were women.

When forced with the rising threats of unemployment, most workers will accept part-time positions even if they are seeking full-time employment. It all follows the business cycle. When economic growth is suffering or in times of recession the number of full-time jobs decreases, but more part-time positions open up.

Most part-timers said they couldn't handle a full-time job. About half were in school and the rest simply didn't want full-time work. For a great many people, part-time employment best fits their busy lifestyles, and increasing responsibilities.

Alberta's boost in part-time positions is likely due to its continued economic growth in the past year.

Students may not have the same amount of job stability as in the past, but with more part-time jobs to replace the full-time positions, employers are giving students more of a chance. Students are making up more of Canada's workforce every year. And at the same time, a number of workers, students included, are holding down more than one job.

This is the 30th anniversary of the creation of Shinerama. This grand event was created way back in 1964 at the University of Western Ontario. With all the great success it achieved out there it was only a matter of four small years until NAIT decided to lend a helping hand and took up their cause. NAIT celebrated the 25th anniversary of Shinerama last year, and is hoping that this year they raise more for CF.

Although NAIT fell slightly short of its expected goal last year it has high hopes for this year. Last year NAIT collected \$14,022 where they had set a mark of \$15,000. However, all was not dim for the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, as we were able to redeem ourselves by raising more money than our sister school the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology. Although Shinerama frowns on competitions it felt good for NAIT to raise approximately \$1,000 more than SAIT.

While the money raised for Shinerama is always the most important fact, NAIT and SAIT always find a way to make things more interesting. For example, last year there was a very "delicately" chosen side-bet between then Academic VP (now current President of NAITSA) Dean Andres, and SAIT's VP of Student Affairs Trent Phalen. After it was found out that SAIT had lost, Trent had to come down to our very own NEST for an impromptu hair shaving event. Trent was then paraded around

town with the NAIT logo shaved in his head.

So if you are now interested in helping raise money for a very worthwhile cause go sign up in E-133.

General Council - Notes

The first general council meeting took place last Wednesday. Representatives from every technology, council, board, and group were in attendance. This would be the first of many general councils hosted by the new NAITSA staff consisting of (in case you didn't already know) Dean Andres (President), Chris Wilson (Academic VP), Carolyn Sitter (Activities VP), Angie Getzinger (Administrative VP), Lorraine Sitter (Communications VP), and Mike Bitz (Athletics VP).

At around 4:35pm the meeting was called to order by Dean Andres. Dean explained for all the members in attendance that general councils were run following the "Robert's Rules of Order". After a brief spelling correction of last April 12th general council meeting, Dean continued on with this meetings itinerary.

First up to bat was Angie Getzinger who briefly reminded all tech reps to sign in at every meeting. She also told the reps to fill out the standard form telling NAITSA about their individual technologies. Then Chris Chelmick was introduced to the masses, and was asked to speak about the Nugget. Chris Wilson then talked about Shinerama's BBQ and how good the meat was.

After discussing his fondness for charred animal flesh,

Mr. Wilson talked at great length about the Shinerama Pub Crawl that was happening this Saturday night. The Pub Crawl, which is only available to volunteers, starts at Lauderdale's with free prizes and munchies. The crawl then continues on to Mustang Saloon, Club Malibu Bourbon Street, and Ezzy's. Chris announced that the first 200 volunteers to show up Saturday morning to help shine shoes would receive a free Shinerama T-shirt. A Shinerama meeting is being held Thursday at 4:15pm in the little theater (H005). At the meeting there will be free donuts, and then afterwards a BBQ and Beer Garden will be in full swing (hosted by Molson's).

Dean announced that a Tech Rep Information Night will be held on Tuesday, September 20th at the Molson House. The night will include a dinner of steak, baked potato, and salad. Once dinner is over, Molson House is generously opening up their other, more favorite wares and allowing the students to sample their alcoholic wares. Remember tech reps, only two of you plus a staff adviser are allowed to attend. The dinner will begin around 5:00 p.m..

The Red Cross Clinic will be in the North Lobby next Thursday and Friday from 10:30 - 2 p.m. The Red Cross is in desperate need of O- blood.

Techs receive points for donating blood, and these points go towards the end of the year tech race.

A somewhat under-the-weather Carolyn Sitter took a moment to thank the student tech reps, as well as, the students themselves for making Welcome Week a huge success. Last year, the Welcome Week lost around \$4,000, this year the books should balance quite well.

The new budget was passed after Angie Getzinger described the differences between last year's and this year's budgets. The amount of money given to NAIT from the government is based on how many Full Time Equivalent students we have in attendance. The Registrar had offered an estimation on 7200 FTE's, while after registration we will only have 6100 now and another 600 in January.

A motion to amend a motion brought forward last April was brought forward. The old motion in question was to approve renovations around NAIT's various campuses, and the wording was not good enough for NAITSA's auditors.

After this came the uproar of the meeting. NAITSA came forward and asked for a new computer to better serve students. A new resume service is being installed in the NAITSA office and the old computer is not going

to "live another year". The old computer, although incompatible, will be given to Angie Getzinger so she can use it for administrative purposes. The new computer, which will be costing NAITSA (which by the way you will be paying approximately 53 cents out of your student fees) \$3530. The new computer contains the following hardware:

- 250 MB HDD
- 3 1/2 FDD
- 16 bit sound card
- CD ROM - Double Speed
- IMB Video Card
- AL1500 EPSON Laser Printer
- plus a variety of software

Many members of the council were upset because of the necessity to purchase yet another new computer. Last year, general council passed a motion to buy 2 new computers for The Nugget, and pay for the training.

Tammy (NAITSA secretary and the person for whom the computer is being bought) was trained on the Nugget computers along with several other people.

Andrew Chan was appointed unanimously to be the newest member on the Academic Council. Four more members are still needed to sit on the council and help make decisions that affect every student here at

NAIT.

After the council was over, a cooking student wanted to thank NAITSA for their help in a fund-raiser held last year. The fund-raiser was in memory of a classmate who was tragically killed in a car accident last year. The amount raised is around \$5,000 and the Mark Cerezke Scholarship will be handed out this year to a cooking student.

Several tech's came forward to announce special goings-on happening in the near future. On October 1st, Construction Engineering will be holding their annual bridge building competition. Prices have been lowered from last year to \$100/team, with teams consisting of 20 members. The Animal Health Tech. rep said she was looking for other techs to join in a joint cabaret around the 30th of September. She also made a plea for guys to respond because there are no men in her technology.

Finally, an idea was brought forward to have a calendar of cabarets and events to be posted in the NAITSA office. That way techs could see when other techs were holding cabarets and there wouldn't be as much confusion as there was last year.

General Council meetings are held every other Tuesday in the H005 at 4:30pm. All students are welcome to attend.

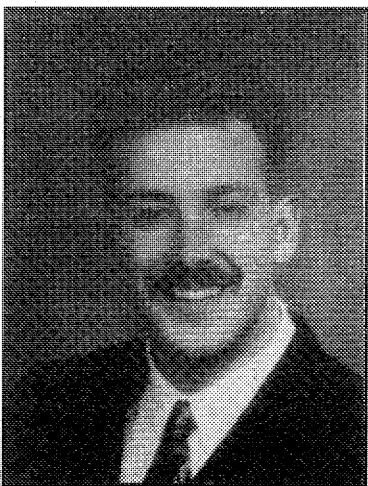

Well, by now Shinerama Week is well under way, and the big day (September 17) is just around the corner.

What is Shinerama anyway? Shinerama is an annual shoe shining campaign carried out in local communities across Canada in aid of Cystic Fibrosis.

What is Cystic Fibrosis? Cystic Fibrosis is a deadly hereditary disease affecting children, adolescents and adults. It attacks primarily the lungs and digestive system.

- 1 in 25 Canadians carries the gene for Cystic Fibrosis

- Cystic Fibrosis takes the lives of more Canadian children and young adults than any other inherited disease

- Those living with Cystic Fibrosis must undergo rigorous therapy programs every day just to stay alive

- There is no known cure for Cystic Fibrosis

Last year 62 universities, colleges and technical institutes and an estimated 20,000 students

participated in Shinerama raising \$675,356. NAIT raised \$14,217, U of A a measly \$7,849, SAIT managed to raise \$12,590 and the University of Western Ontario \$115,000, just to name a few.

What does Shinerama have to offer?

Great opportunities! Shinerama gives students the chance to help in the fight against Cystic Fibrosis. It also acquaints students with the community and fosters a strong school-commu-

nity rapport. Shinerama also lends the occasion to meet new students on campus; and it gives first year students a chance to get involved and demonstrate their pride in their school or program. Finally, Shinerama is a first class opportunity to have **SERIOUS FUN**.

This year our goal at NAIT is to raise \$15,500 for this very worthwhile cause.

Parking!!!!

To begin your new year at NAIT there are a few essentials that every student needs. New clothes, 100 blue ball-point pens, (since some teachers permanently borrow them), lunch money, and a little black book are all important. But at the top of the list is independent transportation, and therefore, a NAIT parking stall.

This has been the subject of never ending complaints up and down the hallways of NAIT and increased activity at the NAIT parking office.

Peggy Isley, the security clerk at the NAIT parking office says they received 2026 student parking applications, and no matter how hard they try, they can't fit that many cars into NAIT's 1337 spots.

The applications had to be in by noon on August 29. Students who were accepted could find their name on the parking acceptance lists posted at the parking office from September 2 - 7. Obviously, not everyone who wanted a parking stall got one. Angry students lined up in the south lobby listing reasons after

reason why they had to have a parking spot.

"We received 309 appeals from students and were able to grant 285," Peggy stated. "The reason we are able to satisfy so many is because we kept 50 stalls open for appeals." she explained that the parking office doesn't usually do that, however, this year they were trying to encourage students to car pool on NAIT's rideshare program. If three or more students come together they're guaranteed a parking spot. "We're trying to be more environmentally friendly."

The kinds of things they consider when accepting applications are distance, students who have part-time jobs after school, parents who have to pick up their children, handicapped students, etc.

The appeal process makes it possible for NAIT to accommodate its late registration and for students to present further documentation as to why they should receive parking. "A lot of students can just come in and say they have a part-time job," Peggy says. "We have to be fair." The

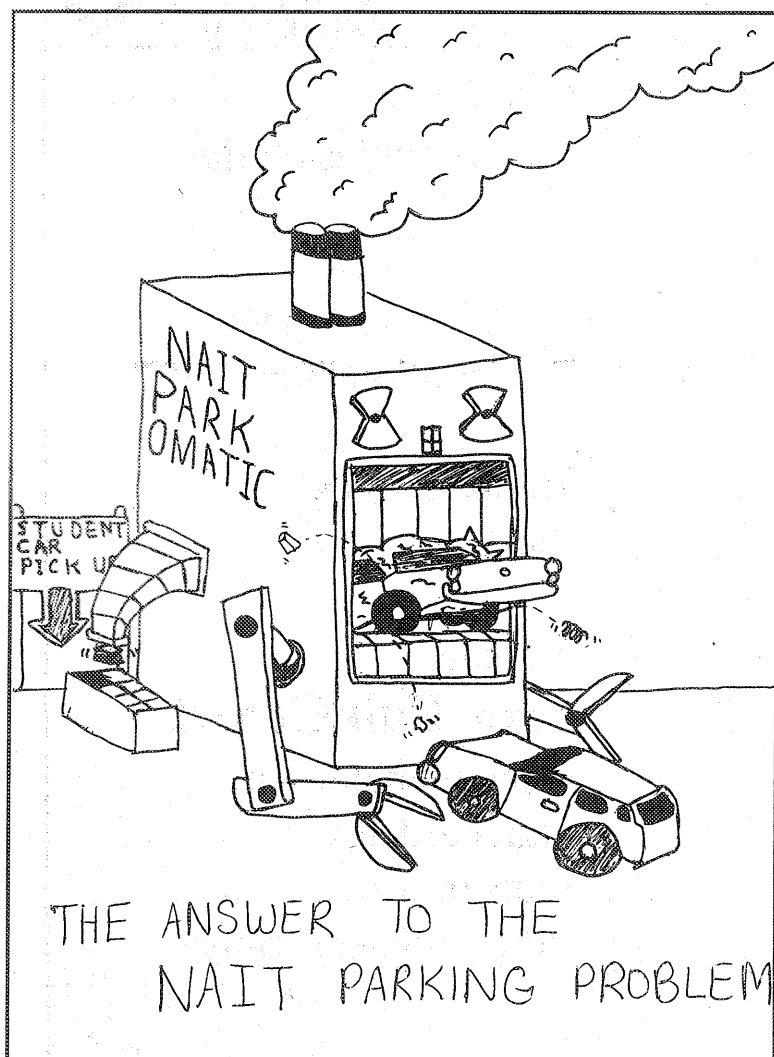
parking office also looks at the number of bus routes near each student's house. If sufficient public transportation is provided for them to get to NAIT, they won't get a spot.

For some students who didn't get parking, there's some alternate parking available.

Several streets such as the ones across from the south lobby and beside the parkade can be utilized. Entrance can be gained to some lots daily for a small fee, but you have to get there early. If you still need a stall and didn't get one there's parking at the airport. For \$300, you can get a

spot good until May 15, 1995, just contact 496-2844.

One last suggestion from the parking office — don't park in the residential areas by NAIT. There's a two hour limit and you just might return after school to find that a patrolling police officer left a present on your windshield.

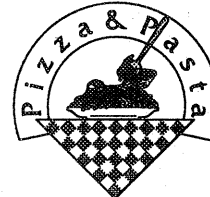
