More Election Controversy

Frank Angotti's disqualification has brought up some interesting issues. I thought the student body should be aware of some of NAITSA's policies with regard to elections.

Lets say their are two candidates running as in the case of Angotti and Fediow. One candidate gets elected. The next week he is disqualified for breaking campaign procedures. In this case the second candidate would be appointed automatically. At NAIT there is supposed to be no wins by acclamation. If there is only one candidate running for the position he has to at least win a yes/no vote. However, in the case men-

tioned above, the second candidate doesn't have to win a vote at all.

With the Angotti/Fediow case it is not that big of a deal because Fediow only lost by eighteen votes. But lets say there was an eight hundred vote difference. Policy says the Elections Committee would appoint the second candidate anyway. I don't know about you, but that seems a little bizarre to me.

There is another interesting thing about the policy which quite frankly is a little disturbing. Lets say we've got the same scenario. One candidate loses to the other. Now, lets say the losing candidate gets upset. He decides to get back

at the guy who beat him. So he files a complaint and the Election Committee holds meetings. Now, this guy has nothing to lose. In the worst case scenario the Election Committee sides with the winner of the election. In the best case scenario, the Election Committee sides with the loser of the election and kicks out the guy who was actually elected.

The decisions of the Election Committee are final. There is no recourse for the person who is judged to be guilty. He is given an opportunity to tell his side of the story, but if they decide he's guilty ... it's over.

Also, the people who are giving testimony have no reason to tell the truth. They could lie for either party and nothing would become of it.

My point is that the system is set up to encourage a losing candidate to file a complaint and try to get the elected guy out. I'm not saying this is what happened this time around. All I'm saying is that if NAIT professes to not let anyone win through acclamation, perhaps they should hold a by-election in every case where there is only one candidate. This would eliminate a scenario where a candidate has nothing to lose.

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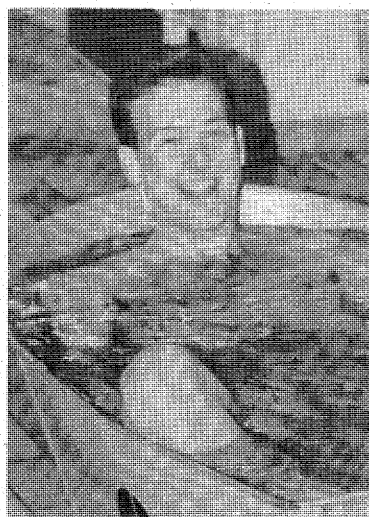

Grad Guest Speaker

Students graduating this spring should consider themselves fortunate. They are fortunate not only because they will be finishing their programs but because they will have a marvelous opportunity at their graduation ceremony. This opportunity is to be able to listen to Mr. Ted Rogers speak.

For those students who are not familiar with the name Ted Rogers, he is the President and CEO of Rogers Communications Inc.. Rogers Communications holding's include Rogers Cable systems, Rogers Cantel Mobile, Maclean Hunter Ltd. and a significant interest in Unitel Communications.

Rogers agreed to give a speech at this years graduation ceremony through his association with Mr. Jim Shaw, _____ Together Shaw and Rogers own the two largest television cable companies in Canada.

President of NAIT, Stan Souch is excited about Rogers speech. He says Rogers will, "enhance the graduation ceremony just through his reputation." Souch feels students will benefit from listening to Rogers presentation because, "his corporation hires a lot of people from various programs NAIT trains for. It will be

interesting to hear the thoughts he has about careers in the new economy."

Rogers speech will be taped and broadcast on cable channel ten.

At age 61 Rogers has had an interesting and extremely successful career. He began by achieving a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Toronto in 1956 followed by a Bachelor of Law from Osgoode Hall Law School in 1961.

Rogers first got involved in communications when he launched Rogers Radio Broadcasting Ltd. and bought Canada's pioneer FM station CHFI-FM for \$85,000. He was approximately 25 at the time. From there he entered the cable television industry and bought out Canadian Cable systems and Premier Cablevision in the 1970's. Both of these company's were larger than his own at the time. He continued to expand and by 1980 became the world's largest cable operator with over two thousand subscribers. Rogers latest acquisition is Maclean-Hunter Ltd.

Aside from his corporate responsibilities, Rogers serves as director for several other corporations. Some of these include the Toronto-Dominion Bank,

Mercedes-Benz Canada and Canada Publishing Corporation.

He has also been received several distinctions and awards. He has been awarded honorary doctoral degrees in law and science from the University of Victoria, York University and Clarkson University of Potsdam, New York. He also received the Order of Canada award in 1990.

Rogers did not become as successful as he is without a lot of sweat and tears. Macleans magazine said Rogers, "occasionally slows down enough to be called a workaholic . . . he never stops." Illness doesn't even hinder him. In 1992 after a quadruple by-pass he apparently was dictating letters before the anesthetic properly wore off.

Rogers comes from a history of successful ancestors. Most notable is his father. Rogers' father was the first amateur radio operator in Canada to transmit a signal trans-Atlantic. He established Rogers Majestic Corporation in the 1920's and eventually elevated his operation into a commercial radio station, CFRB. In the thirties, Rogers' father was given the first license to broadcast experimental television. Unfortunately, he died from overwork and a bleeding ulcer at age 38.

-NAIT carpenters win VO-TEC challenge. Beat out Red Deer and Lakeland College.

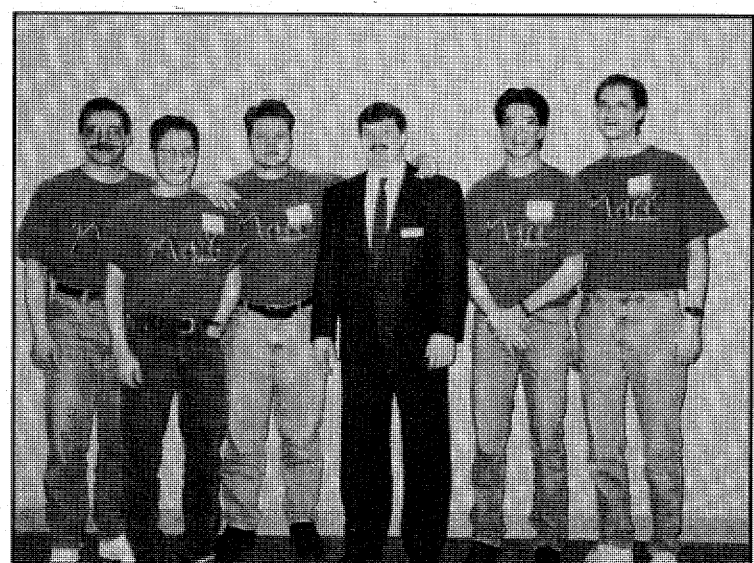
-NAITSA election turnout more than doubles over last year. Fantastic 24% turnout.

If anyone complains "Well, I don't have time to walk to the garbage because I'm late for class" I

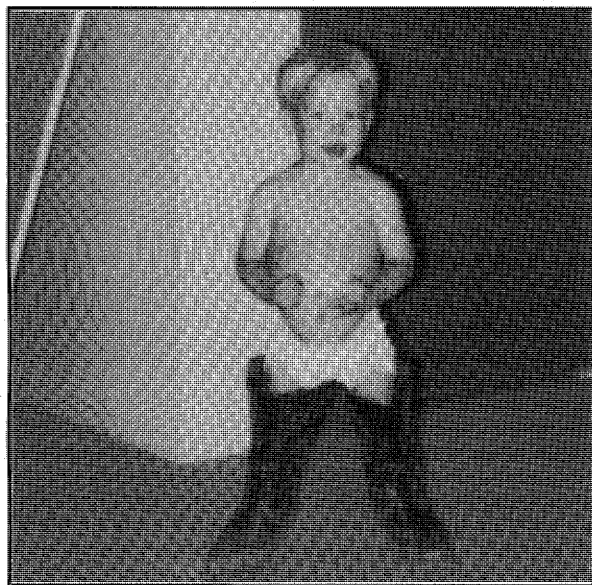
have a bit of advice for you, "Open your eyes, there are garbage's beside the door" so I don't want to hear any excuses any more.

Entire Nugget Staff Fired...Again

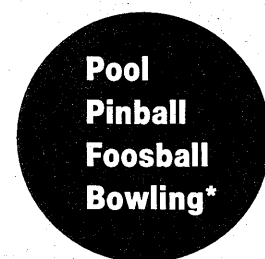
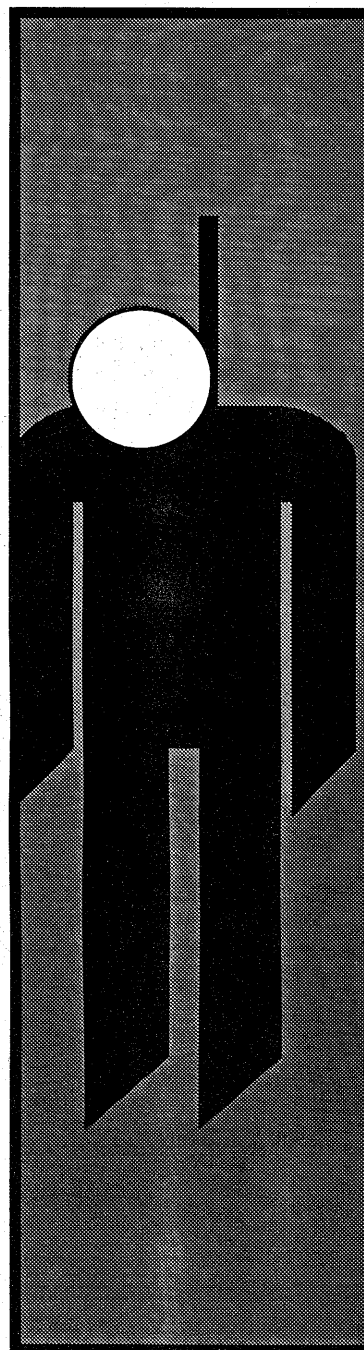

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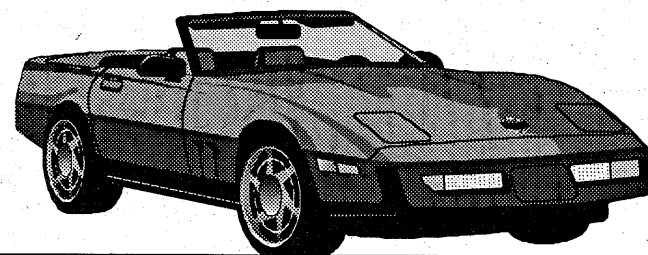

Business Students attend BUSCOMP '95

On Thursday, March 2, after writing our last midterm exam, six Business Administration students and two advisors climbed into a NAIT van and headed to Calgary. We were on our way to participate in the CMA sponsored Business Competition '95. BUSCOMP is a competition for all the colleges and technical schools in Alberta. There are two separate competitions held - a case analysis competition and a computer simulation competition. NAIT's case team included Mirjam Bret, Deborah Naoum and Jordan Nedeljak. The simulation team consisted of Jackie Carter, Jason Molden and Paula Thompson. The case advisor was Rod Ponech and the simulation advisor was Satya Bhardwaj.

After checking into the Village Park Inn, unpacking and resting for a short time we gathered for a pre-competition supper. Rod

presented the team members with NAIT portfolios which were gratefully received. After supper we attended a reception for the competition where we received sweatshirts, which were enthusiastically put on. We mingled with the other competitors and found out there were teams from nine schools - SAIT, Red Deer College, Grant MacEwan Community College, Medicine Hat College, Lakeland College, Fairview College, Grande Prairie College, Keyano College and NAIT. Later in the evening the simulation teams received their case manuals, they promptly disappeared to review the material. The case team crashed early in preparation for the grueling next day.

Friday morning we met for an early breakfast. The eggs were awful!! The competitions were held at the University of Calgary at Scurfield Hall. The case teams met at 8:00 to draw "lots" for presentation positions. We were ushered to our work rooms where we received our case and immediately

started the analysis. We had 8.5 hours to analyze the case and prepare a presentation. We enjoyed the challenge and felt we covered all the issues. Meanwhile, the simulation team had started at 8:30 with an orientation to the computer simulation. They were to run a company for ten years that manufactured and sold athletic shoes on a world wide market. Their task was to input data using a computer program that simulated the operation of an actual company. There were many variables and plenty of strategy was needed. They spend one hour with the advisors and one hour doing a dummy run. The team input data to simulate three years of operation. At the end of the day they were in third place.

The Friday evening activities consisted of a buffet supper and entertainment by Calgarian comedians. It was an enjoyable evening with lots of laughter. Comedy was an effective way to relieve the stress we had built up during the first day of competition. After the entertainment the simulation team met with Rod and Satya to discuss strategy. Then the case team met with them to run through our presentation and receive comments. We stayed up until 1:30 am refining the presentation.

Saturday we met for breakfast promptly at 7:00 am (the eggs

were better) as the case team was the first to present our case to the judges. We had one hour before we presented to review our notes and practice one last time. We presented in front of three judges who were Certified Management Accountants from industry. The presentation went very well and we were quite pleased with the results.

The simulation team input seven runs throughout the day. The race for first place was very close and it came down to the last run to see which team would win. The results would be announced at the banquet that evening.

At noon all the case teams gathered to find out which teams made it to the finals. Unfortunately, we did not make it. Grant MacEwan, Fairview, Keyano and Medicine Hat did. These four finalists had to analyze a second part to the case and prepare another presentation with four hours. We headed back to the hotel and spend the afternoon in the bar. At 4:00 we went back to Scurfield Hall to watch the four final presentations. The winner of this competition would also be announced at the banquet.

The banquet held Saturday evening had various dignitaries from the DMA Society in attend-

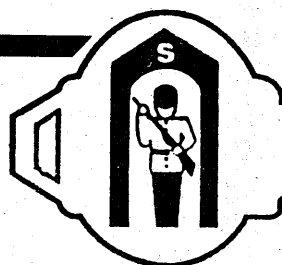
ance, some fun awards were given out, speeches were made and then the winners of the two competitions were announced. The case analysis competition was won by Fairview College. The computer simulation was won by Red Deer College. Our simulation team came in fourth, the highest ranking that NAIT has ever achieved. After the presentations, we attended a reception held in the Mountainview Suite at the hotel compliments of the CMA. Some of us partied until midnight and some of us partied all night.

Sunday breakfast was at the more tolerable hour of 10:00 am. We packed up, piled into the van and headed home.

P.S. Remember - the best team doesn't always win!



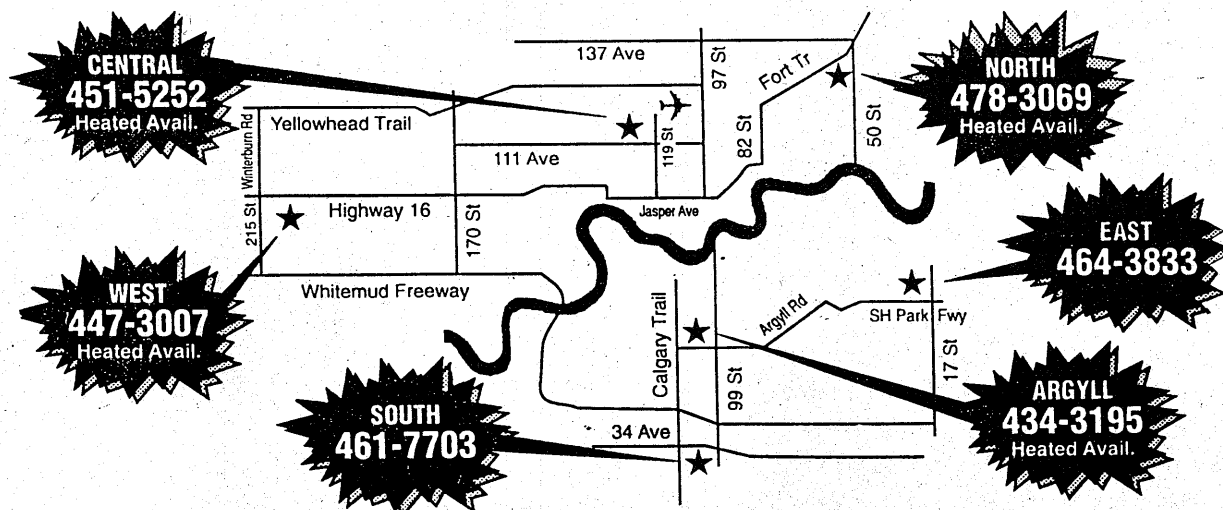
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Neil Fäser ..Unplugged (once and for all)

Salutations and welcome to the final installment of Ear Wax! This week I welcomed back an old friend, that had been absent from the music scene for some time now.

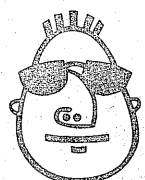

Egad! Life IS like a kick to the box of chocolates! Violent is like violent does...

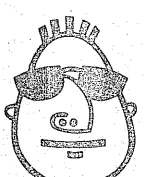


The whole feel of this album more resembles singer Mike Patton's other band, Mr. Bungle, as evidenced by such songs as

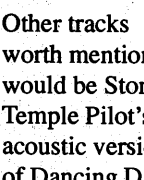
Cuckoo for Caca, a bittersweet ode to the joys of visiting the toilet.

Well. My choice this week is a little more mainstream:

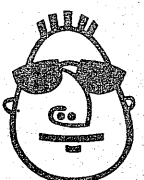

Odd you should mention that: it took me about the same time to catch on as well.

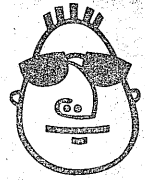

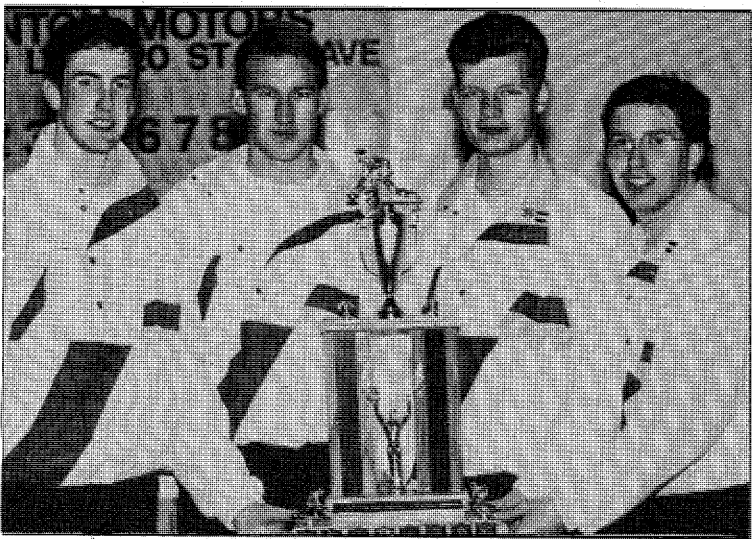

Badminton Ooks

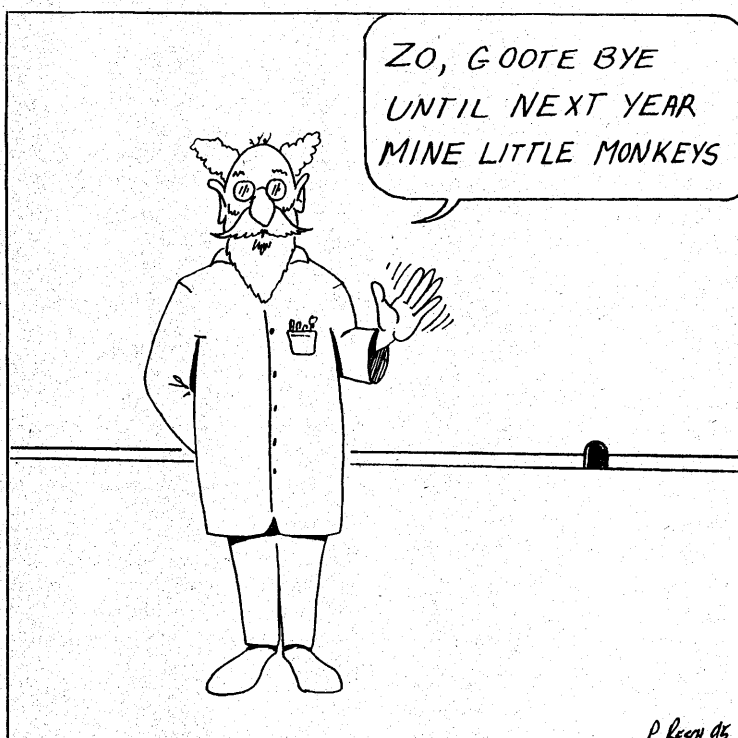

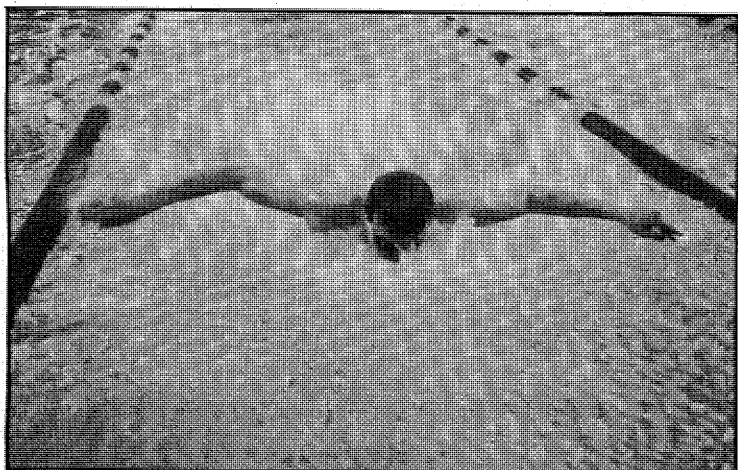

Outstanding Athletes Lorrayne Culham. This Silver Torch Award winner and Female Athlete of the Year nominee has played a tremendous role in the

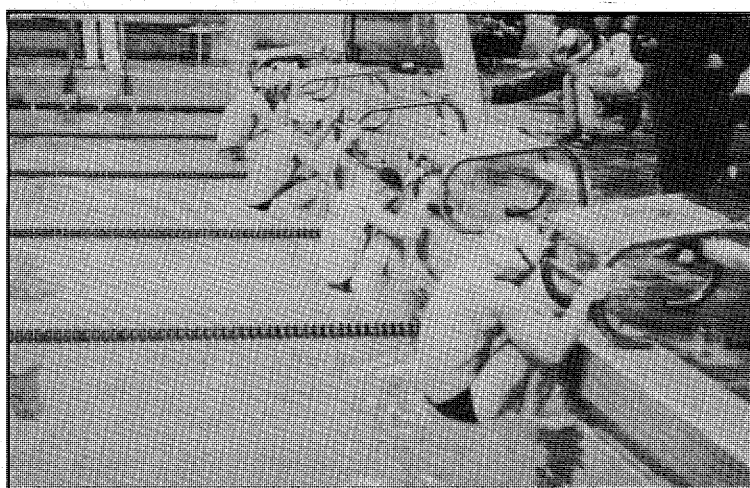

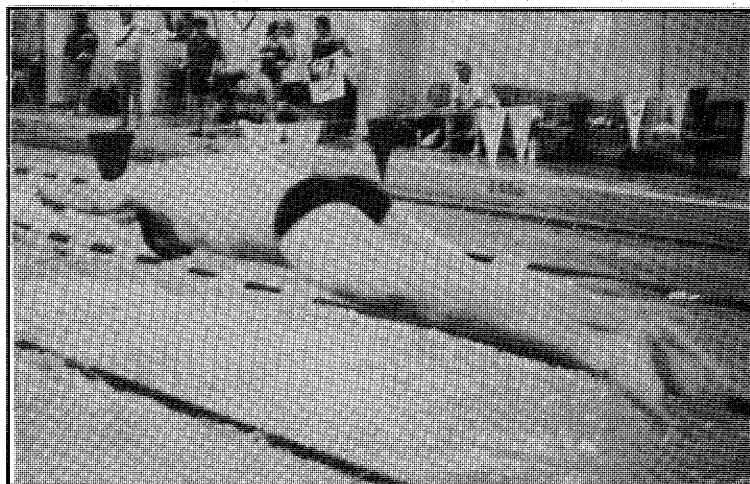

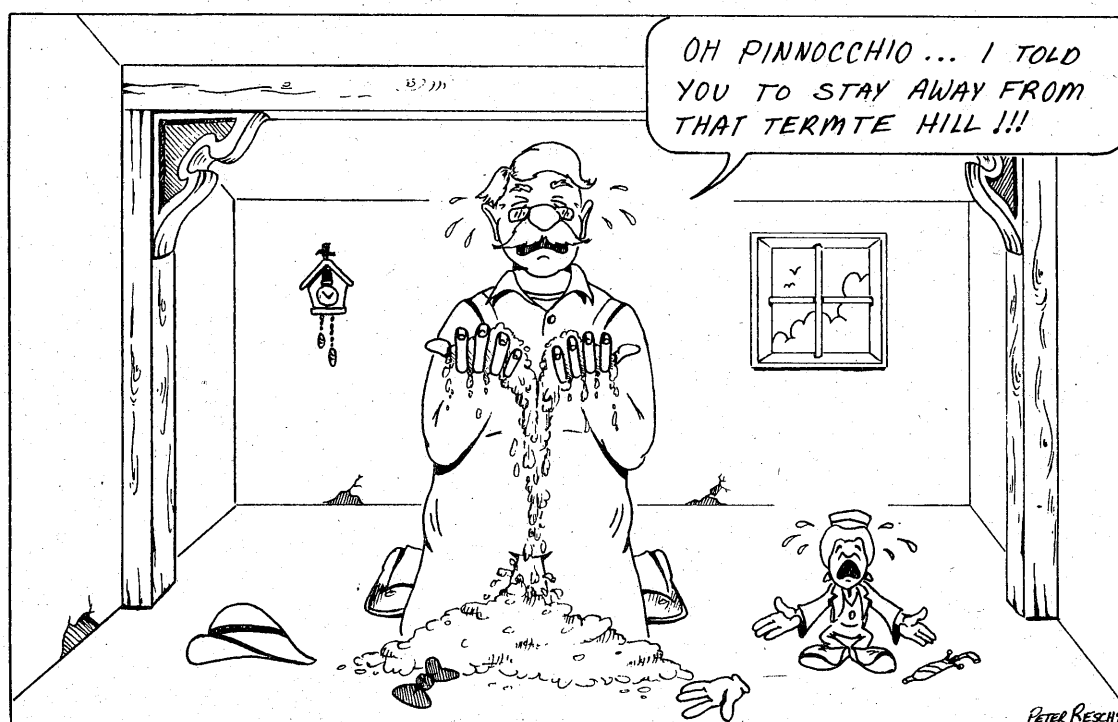
This team of eight skiers was made up of four members who had never ski raced before and four members who had only one year of experience. The team came a long way due to the dedication and hard training.

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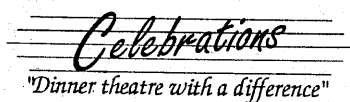


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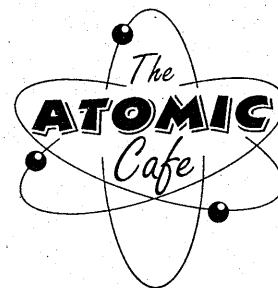
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A Political Statement
