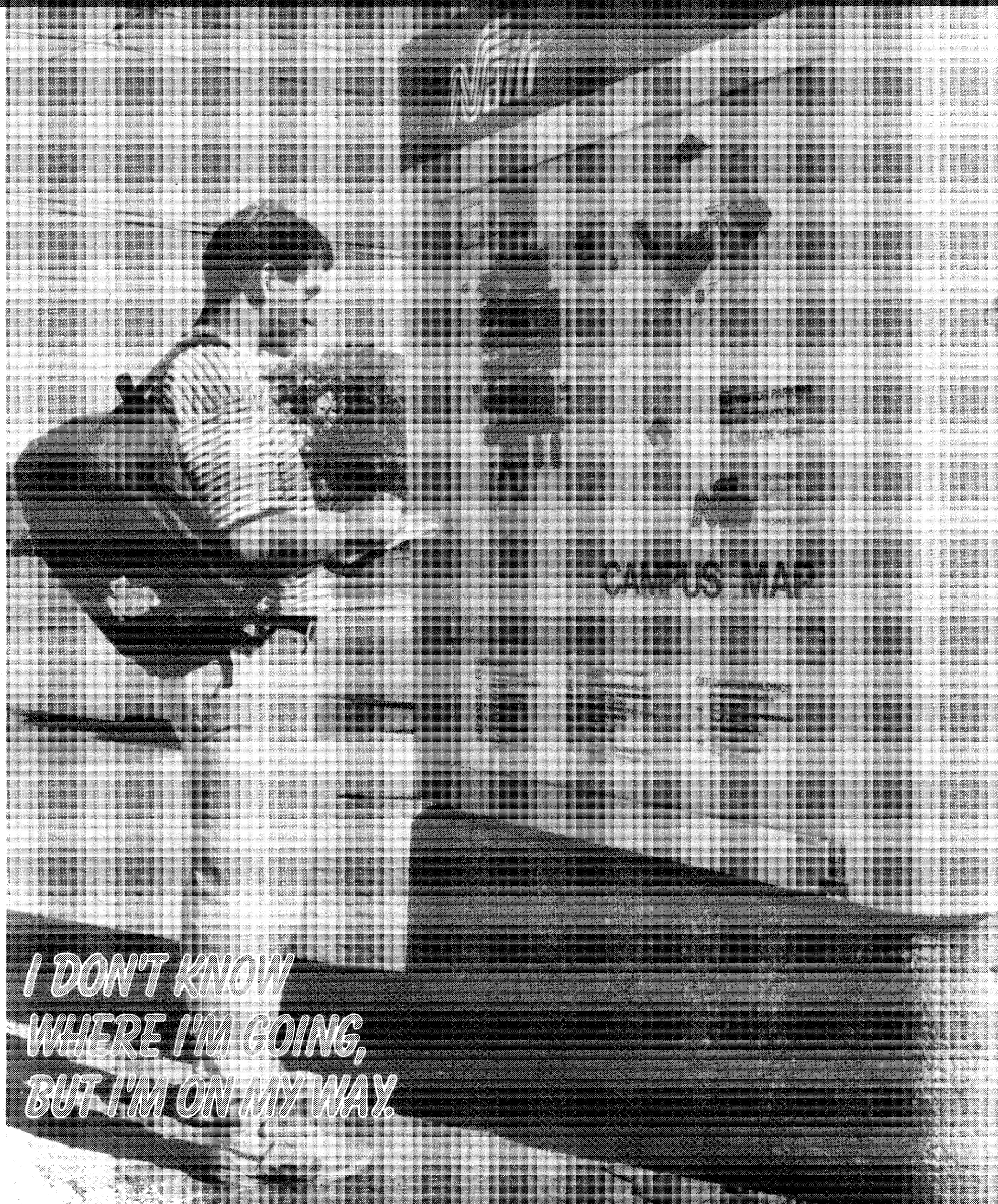

Digest**Pop can recycling**

Over the summer, Naitsa purchased ninety-five new plastic pop can bins after the janitorial staff complained about technologies using cardboard boxes as pop can bins. This results in a sticky mess and stains on the floor.

Twenty of the bins are from Coca Cola. The other seventy-five are blue Naitsa bins. The total cost is approximately \$1733.

The pop can bins will be "leased" by technologies. The technology will put down a \$20.00 deposit on the bin with the promise to keep the bin clean. In return, they will be able to return the pop cans and keep the revenue for their technology.

Naitsa Athletic VP Doug Popowich says, "Instrumentation made over \$1000 last year."

Technologies can lease as many bins as they want. Bins that are not leased will become the responsibility of janitorial staff.

Changing the face of NAIT

Construction promises future educational success

Construction on campus is an unusual sight in the age of cutbacks and increasing tuition. But, it's impossible to miss the huge construction site on what used to be NAIT's south lawn.

The South Instructional Centre has been under construction since May, 1995 and will be completed by June, 1996. The facili-

ties were originally intended to be used mainly for the health-sciences technologies. In July the plans altered with the result of an instructional centre aimed at the entire student population.

"NAIT has a future," according to Director of Facilities Management, Bob Kerr. Despite less money and fewer traditional jobs, NAIT needs to remain a leader in post-secondary education. Without construction of the new building, NAIT would be hard-pressed to do so.

"The South Instructional Centre will satisfy some longstanding needs NAIT has identified," says Kerr. For instance, the Centre will house a

Another facility NAIT currently lacks is an auditorium. The Centre will also satisfy this need with; a 350 seat auditorium; a 150 seat theatre; two, ninety seat theatres; as well as several smaller theatres and seminar rooms.

Other facilities in the Centre include a new Health Sciences Lab and an Animal Health Lab.

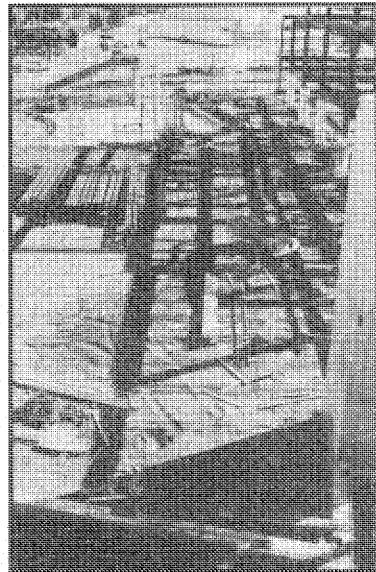
The South Instructional Centre will cost \$9.9 million. None of the funds for the facility are being extracted from any current operating budget. Nor is any of the money coming from new government funding.

funding from its own resources." Specifically, the money is drawn from the Partners in Tomorrow Campaign, capital reserves and new donations.

The Partners in Tomorrow Campaign, led by Chairman of the Board of Governors J.R. Shaw, concluded in 1992 raising over \$5 million.

Welcome to the real world

Students now accountable to the bank for their student loans

Student borrowers need to brace for changes to the Student Loan Program designed to help students manage their debt. The changes relax repayment guidelines, make loans more accessible to students with special needs and will prevent students from defaulting on their loans after graduation.

In essence, the Federal Government is deinsuring Student Loans. In the past, when students borrowed funds, the government selected who would be allowed to borrow and to how much they would be entitled. The banks would then lend the money to students on behalf of the government. After graduation, students would make payments to the bank. However, if the student defaulted on the loan, the government would step in and repay the bank. This process was called guaranteed student loans.

The government will still choose the criteria upon which the banks loan money. What is different is that they will no longer guarantee pay-back. Instead, they will pay the banks to assume the risk that the student may default on the loan. This payment equates to 5 per cent of loans granted.

Approximately one out of every five students loans are not paid back. Annually, this costs the Federal Government \$90-

million. The payment to the banks to assume the risk of default is only about \$50-million.

According to a release from the Minister of Human Resources Development, Lloyd Axworthy, "With so many deserving students in need, we cannot afford to overly subsidize those who can, but won't pay."

Approximately one out of five student loans are not paid back.

The Federal Government is also reserving the right to set a ceiling on loan interest rates. A student may choose either a maximum fixed interest rate of prime plus 5 per cent or a maximum floating interest rate of prime plus 2.5 per cent.

Loan repayment is currently calculated on an 114 (9 1/2 years) payment schedule. For example, if a student owes \$14,000, at a 12% interest rate, the student would pay \$206 per month. The total interest they would pay is \$9,527. The total amount they would end up paying back is \$23,527.

A fear of future post-secondary students is that the government will slowly get out of the Student Loan process all together and banks will end up determining loan criteria. This

would limit accessibility of Student Loans to people who need the loans the most. Naitsa President Chris Wilson says he doesn't foresee this becoming problematic. "Banks won't give up the risk premium paid by the Federal Government and the Government won't pay the risk premium to the banks without control of the selection process."

Another feature of the new program is the Interest Relief Program. If a student is unable to make the payments after graduation due to income or family, the student may not have to pay interest for an extended period of time. The maximum time frame for this extension is eighteen months. This program is available anytime during the first five years after graduation.

Only certain banks are participating in the new program. Students who took their loans to other banks last year will have to switch banks for the fall of 1995. Alberta banks which are participating are: CIBC, Royal Bank, Bank of Nova Scotia, Credit Union Central and National Bank of Canada.

Wilson says the changes, "address a lot of short-term concerns but in the long run don't solve the problem of increasing debt load."

The new program will also make grants and loans more accessible to students with special circumstances. Students with permanent disabilities and part-time students that need

more assistance (such as single mothers) will be eligible under this category.

Parking Procedures

At the beginning of every year there is always a rush to get a good parking spot. If you plan on driving, here are a few things you should know.

Car Parking

There are twice as many students as parking stalls, so the earlier you apply, the better.

Parking Services will only accept one application per student. When you apply, make sure you know your ID number.

Applications are accepted until 12 noon, Monday, August 28, 1995.

Parking

costs; \$19.00 per month for a parking spot with a plug in; \$17.00 per month for a parking stall without a plug in. You have to pay for the entire year when you pick-up your pass. If you withdraw from classes, you will receive a refund for the unused time and your pass will become invalid.

In the evening parking in any lot costs \$14.00 per month.

If you can participate in NAIT's Rideshare Program,

you are in a better position to get parking. You can sign-up for Rideshare in the main lobby on computer situated on the north side. You need your ID card to sign-up.

There is no charge for parking Friday evening and on weekends.

Bike Parking

If you are an environmentally friendly and physically fit person, you may want to ride your bike to school.

There is reserved parking

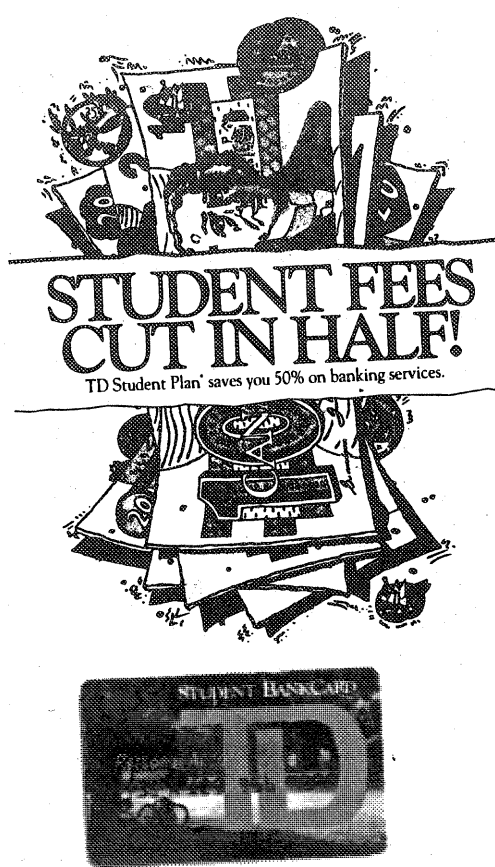
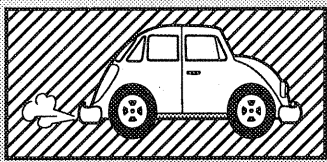
for bicycles. One area is just west of the main building - near the gym. The

other area is over by the Continuing Education Centre, 102 Street and Princess Elizabeth Avenue.

The parking area consists of a fenced "yard" with a gate that locks. To park in this area you must apply to Parking Services.

For a \$20.00 deposit Parking Services will give you a key for the gate. When you return the key, they give you your \$20.00 back.

There are also other bicycle racks provided.

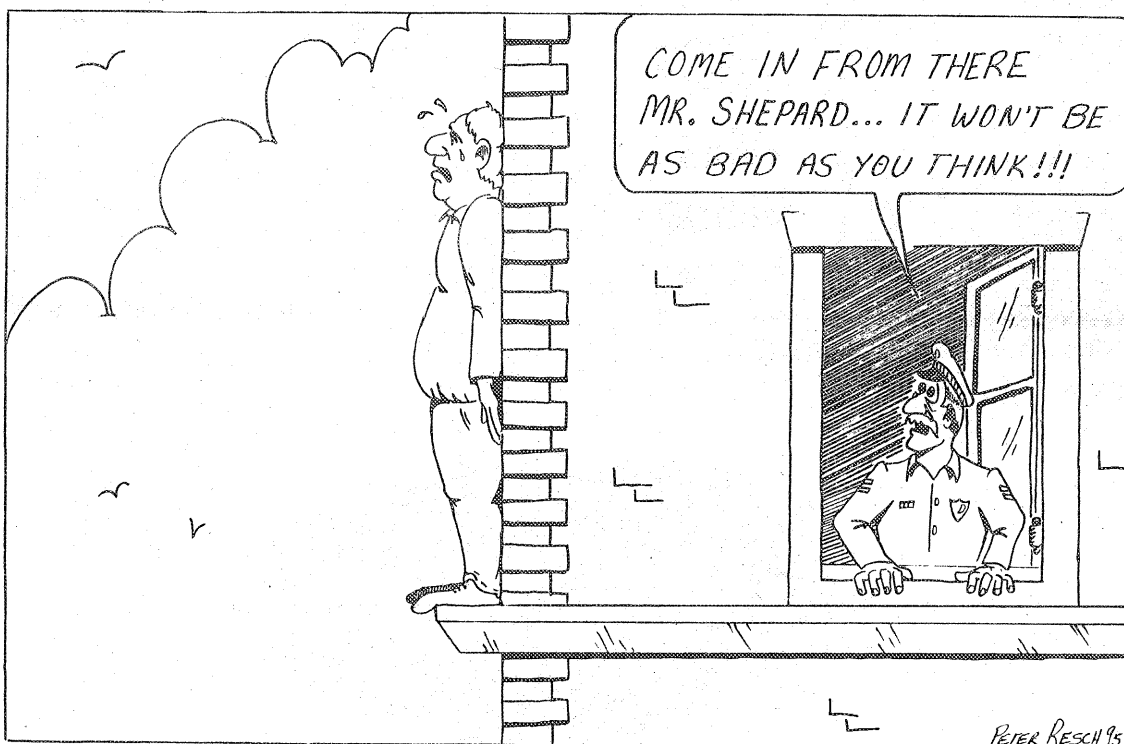
This is my first year as Editor in Chief of the *Nugget* and as you can see, I have a definite philosophy of what I would like it to be.

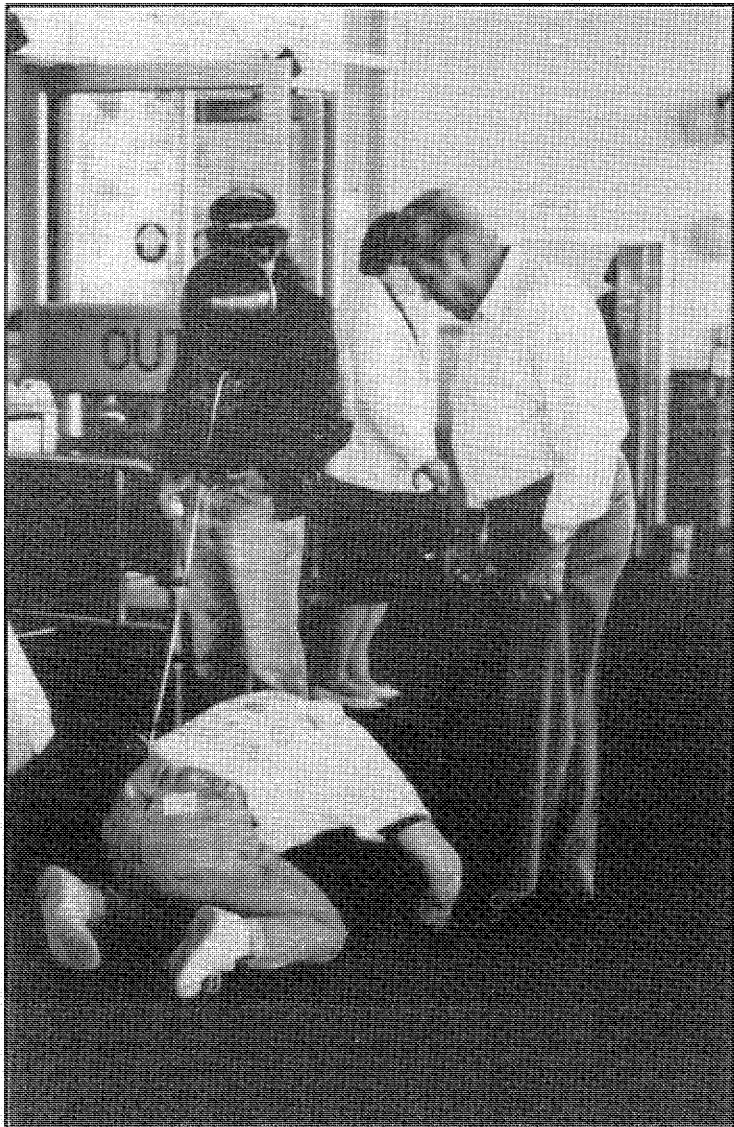

For the past thirty years NAIT students have been shining shoes for charity. It is a long tradition of compassion which is being honored once again this September.

Shinerama is an unique fundraiser. On Friday, September 9th, students participating in Shinerama will be bussed downtown during the business lunch rush (11 am - 1 pm). There they will set up shop to shine shoes for a donation. The charge for a shoe shine is essentially what the donor is willing to give.

On Saturday, September 10th, shiners will be sent to various areas around the city between 10 am and 4 pm.

Participating students receive a free breakfast in the main cafeteria on September 9th between 9 am and 10 am. They also receive a Shinerama t-shirt and a free meal voucher from McDonalds.

Other Shinerama activities coincide with the Welcome Week Activities between September 5-10. There will be an OoK obstacle course on Thursday, September 7.

Shiners can sign up at the Shinerama table during registration, at the beer gardens or at the Naitsa office. There is no deadline for registration.

On Saturday night after the shining is complete and the donations are collected, students can participate in a Naitsa organized pub crawl. The crawl will visit the Nest, Esmeraldas, The Thunderdome and finally Club Malibu the Morgue. The charge is \$5.00 for shiners and \$10.00 for non-shiners. The pub crawl can only accomodate 200 students.

According to Naitsa Activities VP Scott Fediow, "The pub crawl is sooooo much fun. **DON'T MISS IT!!!**"

Last year Shinerama raised \$11,203 and approximately 275 students participated.

The funds raised are donated to the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Cystic fibrosis is a disorder affecting mainly the lungs and digestive system. It is inherited and incurable. Most people with cystic fibrosis die of lung disease. The median age of these people is 30. Approximately one in every 2,500 children born in Canada have cystic fibrosis.

Of the money raised by Shinerama in 1994, 78% or \$8,738 went directly to treatment, research and medical conferences with regards to people with cystic fibrosis.
